2 Section 1. ENFORCEMENT. There is appropriated from the
3 general fund of the state to the department of public safety,
4 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June
5 30, 2000, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is
6 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

7 1. For the division of narcotics enforcement:

8 For the employment of six narcotics enforcement agents, and
9 for not more than the following full-time equivalent
10 positions:

11	\$	505,000
12	FTEs	6.00

13 2. For the division of criminal investigation:

14 For two criminalists for the division's laboratory who will
15 primarily focus on methamphetamine testing, and for not more
16 than the following full-time equivalent positions:

17	\$	80,956
18	FTEs	2.00

19 3. For the establishment of a clandestine methamphetamine
20 laboratory emergency response team within the department, and
21 for not more than the following full-time equivalent
22 positions:

23	\$	980,000
24	FTEs	13.00

25 The clandestine methamphetamine laboratory emergency
26 response team established pursuant to this subsection shall
27 consist of five narcotics agents, one fire marshal special
28 agent, five state patrol officers, one division of criminal
29 investigation investigator, and one division of narcotics
30 enforcement technical support employee.

31 Sec. 2. YOUTH LEADERSHIP MODEL. There is appropriated
32 from the general fund of the state to the Iowa department of
33 corrections for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and
34 ending June 30, 2000, the following amount, or so much thereof
35 as is necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

1 For the establishment of youth leadership model programs to
2 help at-risk youth in the judicial district departments of
3 correctional services selected by the department:

4 \$ 100,000

5 As a part of the program, the judicial district department
6 of correctional services may recruit high school athletes in
7 communities in the judicial district to work with at-risk
8 children.

9 Sec. 3. DRUG COURT PILOT PROGRAMS. The governor's
10 alliance on substance abuse shall subgrant on a reimbursement
11 basis from moneys received by the alliance under the federal
12 Edward Byrne memorial state and local law enforcement
13 assistance program to the judicial branch for the fiscal year
14 beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the
15 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
16 used for the purpose designated:

17 For expenses associated with establishment of two drug
18 court pilot programs:

19 \$ 60,000

20 DIVISION II

21 Sec. 4. JUVENILE DELINQUENT TREATMENT. There is
22 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
23 department of human services for the state training school at
24 Eldora, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending
25 June 30, 2000, the following amount, or so much thereof as is
26 necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

27 For providing treatment programs for every substance abuser
28 and sexual predator placed at the state training school
29 needing treatment:

30 \$ 62,000

31 Sec. 5. Section 217.12, subsection 3, paragraph b, Code
32 1999, is amended to read as follows:

33 b. Designation of the services to be provided for the
34 families served, including assistance regarding job-seeking
35 skills, family budgeting, nutrition, self-esteem,

1 methamphetamine education, health and hygiene, child rearing,
 2 child education preparation, and goal setting. Grant
 3 proposals shall indicate the support groups and support
 4 systems to be developed for the families served during the
 5 transition between the need for assistance and self-
 6 sufficiency.

 8 Sec. 6. METHAMPHETAMINE TREATMENT. There is appropriated
 9 from the general fund of the state to the Iowa department of
 10 public health for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and
 11 ending June 30, 2000, the following amounts, or so much
 12 thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
 13 designated:

14 1. For additional methamphetamine treatment under the
 15 substance abuse treatment program:
 16 \$ 1,500,000

17 2. For development of a model substance abuse prevention
 18 program based upon the North high school program in Des
 19 Moines:
 20 \$ 30,000

21 Information about the model substance abuse prevention
 22 program developed under this subsection shall be distributed
 23 to schools in this state that have a high percent of students
 24 susceptible to substance abuse, particularly methamphetamine
 25 abuse, to assist those schools that are submitting
 26 applications for competitive grants from the department.

27 Sec. 7. YOUTH LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE ON MENTORING. There
 28 is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
 29 governor's alliance on substance abuse for the fiscal year
 30 beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the
 31 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
 32 used for the purpose designated:

33 For planning and holding a youth leadership conference on
 34 mentoring for individuals who agree to serve as mentors to
 35 youth to help reduce substance abuse, especially

1 methamphetamine abuse, in schools:
2 \$ 20,000

3 Sec. 8. NEW SECTION. 135.16 SPECIAL WOMEN, INFANTS, AND
4 CHILDREN SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAM -- FUNDING ALLOCATION.

5 As a component of the federal funding received by the
6 department as the administering agency for the special women,
7 infants, and children supplemental food program, from the
8 United States department of agriculture, food and consumer
9 service, the department shall incorporate a methamphetamine
10 education program into its nutrition and health-related
11 education services. The department shall be responsible for
12 the development of the education program to be delivered, and
13 for the selection of qualified contract agencies to deliver
14 the instruction under the program.

15 DIVISION IV

16 Sec. 9. LABOR MANAGEMENT SUBSTANCE ABUSE EDUCATION
17 PROGRAM. The executive council shall transfer from the health
18 insurance surplus account to the department of personnel for
19 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30,
20 2000, the following amount, or so much thereof as is
21 necessary, which is appropriated to be used for the purpose
22 designated:

23 For development of a labor management substance abuse
24 education program, with an emphasis on methamphetamine abuse,
25 that can serve as a model to be used by labor and management
26 throughout the state:

27 \$ 30,000

28 DIVISION V

29 Sec. 10. STRENGTHENING FAMILIES PROGRAM.

30 1. The cooperative extension service at Iowa state
31 university, in association with the institute of social and
32 behavioral research at Iowa state university, shall develop a
33 strengthening families program to provide funding and
34 assistance to communities for families who have children
35 between the ages of 10 and 14 years of age for prevention of

1 substance abuse with an emphasis on prevention of
2 methamphetamine abuse. Communities participating in the
3 program must contract with the cooperative extension service
4 and provide a match for the cooperative extension service to
5 bring the program to the community.

6 2. The governor's alliance on substance abuse shall
7 subgrant on a reimbursement basis an amount not exceeding
8 \$270,000 of moneys received by the alliance under the federal
9 Edward Byrne memorial state and local law enforcement
10 assistance program to support the strengthening families
11 program. A strengthening families program fund is established
12 in the office of the treasurer of state under the authority of
13 the department of education. The moneys shall be distributed
14 on a first-come, first-served matching funds basis by the
15 department of education to communities participating in the
16 strengthening families program.

17 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys in the fund that
18 remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close of the fiscal
19 year shall not revert but shall remain available for
20 expenditure for the purposes designated until the close of the
21 succeeding fiscal year.

22 3. The cooperative extension service shall solicit the
23 assistance of the department of education, the Iowa department
24 of public health, and other public and private agencies
25 providing services to families in promoting the program.

26 4. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
27 state to the department of education for the fiscal year
28 beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the
29 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
30 used for the purpose designated:

31 For communities to participate in the strengthening
32 families program:

33 \$ 50,000

34 Sec. 11. Section 279.51, subsection 1, paragraph d, Code
35 1999, is amended to read as follows:

1 d. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1996, and for
2 each fiscal year thereafter, three million five hundred
3 thousand dollars of the funds appropriated shall be allocated
4 as grants to school districts that have elementary schools
5 that demonstrate the greatest need for programs for at-risk
6 students with preference given to innovative programs for the
7 early elementary school years. School districts receiving
8 grants under this paragraph shall at a minimum provide
9 activities and materials designed to encourage children's
10 self-esteem, provide role modeling and mentoring techniques in
11 social competence and social skills, and discourage
12 inappropriate drug use. The grant allocations made in this
13 paragraph may be renewed for additional periods of time. Of
14 the amount allocated under this paragraph for each fiscal
15 year, seventy-five thousand dollars shall be allocated to
16 school districts which have an actual student population of
17 ten thousand or less and have an actual non-English speaking
18 student population which represents greater than five percent
19 of the total actual student population for grants to
20 elementary schools in those districts.

21 Sec. 12. Section 279.51, subsection 3, unnumbered
22 paragraph 3, Code 1999, is amended to read as follows:

23 Programs shall provide at a minimum recreation
24 opportunities; personal skills development; activities and
25 materials designed to encourage children's self-esteem,
26 provide role modeling and mentoring techniques in social
27 competence and social skills, and discourage inappropriate
28 drug use; basic academic skills development; family
29 interaction opportunities; and mentoring. Additional
30 objectives of the programs shall be: to increase the ability
31 of existing agencies within the community to address the
32 multiple problems of children and youth and to coordinate
33 their activities and to facilitate joint planning to make the
34 most economic and innovative use of community resources.
35 Priority shall be given to programs that provide access to a

1 center for children and youth after school, in the evening,
2 and on weekends, and during the summer and that provide a
3 twenty-four-hour telephone hotline or similar service, and
4 that provide access to day care or on-site child day care.
5 Programs shall at a minimum provide career development
6 services, mental health and family counseling services, and
7 primary health care services that include but are not limited
8 to physical examinations, immunizations, hearing and vision
9 screening, and preventive and primary health care services, in
10 the context of the educational needs of the students.
11 Programs shall not include abortion counseling or the
12 dispensing of contraceptives.

EXPLANATION

14 This bill provides funding and establishes programs for
15 enforcement, prevention, education, and treatment for
16 substance abuse, especially methamphetamine abuse and sexual
17 abuse, and for programs for at-risk youth.

18 This bill appropriates moneys to the department of public
19 safety for the division of narcotics enforcement for the
20 purpose of employing six narcotics enforcement agents, and for
21 the division of criminal investigation for two criminalists
22 within the division of criminal investigation of the
23 department of public safety to focus on methamphetamine
24 testing.

25 The bill appropriates moneys to the department of public
26 safety for the establishment of a clandestine methamphetamine
27 laboratory emergency response team and specifies the members
28 of the response team.

29 The bill appropriates moneys to the department of
30 corrections for establishing a youth leadership model program
31 to help at-risk youth in a judicial district.

32 Federal moneys are transferred to the judicial branch for
33 establishing two pilot program drug courts.

34 The bill appropriates moneys to the department of human
35 services for the state training school at Eldora for treatment

1 for substance abusers and sexual predators.

2 | The bill appropriates moneys to the Iowa department of
3 public health for additional methamphetamine treatment and for
4 development of a model substance abuse prevention program
5 based upon the North high school program.

6 | The bill appropriates moneys to the governor's alliance on
7 substance abuse for a youth leadership conference on
8 mentoring.

9 The bill transfers moneys from the health insurance surplus
10 account to the department of personnel for development of a
11 labor-management substance abuse education program, with an
12 emphasis on methamphetamine abuse.

13 | The bill directs the cooperative extension service, in
14 association with the institute for social and behavioral
15 research, to develop a strengthening families program to
16 assist communities providing programs for families with
17 children between 10 and 14 years of age for prevention of
18 substance abuse, especially methamphetamine abuse. The
19 program shall be funded through the department of education
20 using federal moneys and state moneys appropriated for use by
21 communities. In addition, a strengthening families program
22 fund is established under the authority of the department of
23 education.

24 | The bill amends several Code provisions to require that the
25 Iowa department of public health include a methamphetamine
26 education program component in the nutrition and health-
27 related education services it administers under the federal
28 special supplemental food program for women, infants, and
29 children; that grant proposals submitted to the family
30 development and self-sufficiency council by public or private
31 organizations for provision of family development services to
32 families at risk of long-term welfare dependency must include
33 methamphetamine education as part of the services; and that
34 school districts which receive school-based youth services
35 grants or grants for elementary schools demonstrating the

1 greatest need for at-risk programs must provide activities and
2 materials designed to encourage children's self-esteem,
3 provide role modeling and mentoring techniques in social
4 competence and social skills, and discourage inappropriate
5 drug use.

8 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
9 department of education for the fiscal year beginning
10 July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following
11 amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used
12 for the purposes designated:

13 For implementing pilot student assistance programs,
14 including salaries for substance abuse prevention
15 specialist positions:

16 \$ 500,000

17 The department of education shall provide for the
18 evaluation of programs and shall establish criteria
19 for a consortium of at least five school districts in
20 collaboration with an area education agency to apply
21 for and for participating school districts to receive
22 moneys from the department for assistance in
23 implementing a pilot student assistance program.

24 Of the moneys appropriated in this section, not
25 more than \$50,000 shall be used to evaluate student
26 assistance programs.

27 The department of education shall establish
28 requirements governing the implementation by a
29 consortium of a student assistance program designed to
30 prevent drug and alcohol abuse by children in grades
31 kindergarten through twelve. Each consortium seeking
32 to implement the program shall provide that
33 participating school districts establish a substance
34 abuse prevention specialist position. The specialist
35 shall be responsible for implementing the program in
36 the school district, including the development of
37 student assistance teams.

38 The purpose of a student assistance team is to
39 provide a means of identifying students' academic and
40 social at-risk behaviors as early as possible and to
41 remediate the behaviors. Remediation approaches may
42 include but are not limited to linking students with
43 adult or student mentors, tutoring, reading recovery
44 programming, developing appropriate curriculum,
45 promoting activities to build social skills, fostering
46 parental involvement, and encouraging appropriate
47 community activities. A student assistance team may
48 include school faculty, administrators, other school
49 staff, juvenile court officers, parents, and other
50 volunteers."
