A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to the department
2 for the blind, the Iowa state civil rights commission, the
3 department of elder affairs, the Iowa department of public
4 health, the department of human rights, the governor's
5 alliance on substance abuse, and the commission of veterans
6 affairs, and providing an effective date.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 737

1 Section 1. DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND. There is
2 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
3 department for the blind for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
4 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following amount, or so
5 much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
6 designated:

7 For salaries, support, maintenance, miscellaneous purposes,
8 and for not more than the following full-time equivalent
9 positions:

10	\$	1,736,308
11	FTEs	103.50

12 Sec. 2. CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION. There is appropriated
13 from the general fund of the state to the Iowa state civil
14 rights commission for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999,
15 and ending June 30, 2000, the following amount, or so much
16 thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
17 designated:

18 For salaries, support, maintenance, miscellaneous purposes,
19 and for not more than the following full-time equivalent
20 positions:

21	\$	1,189,494
22	FTEs	38.50

23 If the anticipated amount of federal funding from the
24 federal equal employment opportunity commission and the
25 federal department of housing and urban development exceeds
26 \$715,000 during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, the
27 Iowa state civil rights commission may exceed the staffing
28 level authorized in this section to hire additional staff to
29 process or to support the processing of employment and housing
30 complaints during that fiscal year.

31 Sec. 3. DEPARTMENT OF ELDER AFFAIRS. There is
32 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
33 department of elder affairs for the fiscal year beginning July
34 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following amounts, or
35 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes

1 designated:

2 1. For aging programs and for salaries, support,
3 maintenance, miscellaneous purposes, and for not more than the
4 following full-time equivalent positions:

5	\$	4,965,799
6	FTEs	29.00

7 a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection,
8 \$4,285,598 shall be received and disbursed by the director of
9 elder affairs for aging programs and services. These funds
10 shall not be used by the department for administrative
11 purposes, and not more than \$151,654 shall be used for area
12 agencies on aging administrative purposes, and shall be used
13 for citizens of Iowa over 60 years of age for case management
14 for the frail elderly, mental health outreach, Alzheimer's
15 support, retired senior volunteer program, care review
16 committee coordination, employment, adult day care, respite
17 care, chore services, telephone reassurance, information and
18 assistance, and home repair services, including the
19 winterizing of homes, and for the construction of entrance
20 ramps which make residences accessible to the physically
21 handicapped.

22 b. Funds appropriated in this subsection may be used to
23 supplement federal funds under federal regulations. To
24 receive funds appropriated in this subsection, a local area
25 agency on aging shall match the funds with moneys from other
26 sources according to rules adopted by the department. Funds
27 appropriated in this subsection may be used for elderly
28 services not specifically enumerated in this subsection only
29 if approved by an area agency on aging for provision of the
30 service within the area.

31 c. It is the intent of the general assembly that the Iowa
32 chapters of the Alzheimer's association and the case
33 management program for frail elders shall collaborate and
34 cooperate fully to assist families in maintaining family
35 members with Alzheimer's disease in the community for the

1 longest period of time possible.

2 d. The department shall maintain policies and procedures
3 regarding Alzheimer's support and the retired senior volunteer
4 program.

5 2. The department may grant an exception for a limited
6 period of time, determined by the department to be reasonable,
7 to allow for compliance by persons regulated by the department
8 or applicants for assisted living certification with any part
9 of chapter 104A relative to buildings in existence on July 1,
10 1998. The determination of the period of time allowed for
11 compliance shall be commensurate with the anticipated
12 magnitude of expenditure, disruption of services, and the
13 degree of hazard presented. The department shall also be
14 authorized to modify the accessibility requirements otherwise
15 applicable to such applicants for buildings in existence on
16 July 1, 1998, if the department determines that compliance
17 with the requirements would be unreasonable, but only if it is
18 determined that noncompliance with the requirements would not
19 present an unreasonable degree of danger.

20 Sec. 4. GOVERNOR'S ALLIANCE ON SUBSTANCE ABUSE. There is
21 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
22 governor's alliance on substance abuse for the fiscal year
23 beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the
24 following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
25 used for the purposes designated:

26 For salaries, support, maintenance, miscellaneous purposes,
27 and for not more than the following full-time equivalent
28 positions:

31 Sec. 5. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH. There is
32 appropriated from the general fund of the state to the Iowa
33 department of public health for the fiscal year beginning July
34 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following amounts, or
35 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes

1 designated:

2 1. ADDICTIVE DISORDERS

3 For reducing the prevalence of use of tobacco, alcohol, and
4 other drugs, and treating individuals affected by addictive
5 behaviors, including gambling, and for not more than the
6 following full-time equivalent positions:

7	\$	8,399,406
8	FTEs	15.75

9 a. The department shall continue to coordinate with
10 substance abuse treatment and prevention providers regardless
11 of funding source to assure the delivery of substance abuse
12 treatment and prevention programs.

13 b. The commission on substance abuse, in conjunction with
14 the department, shall continue to coordinate the delivery of
15 substance abuse services involving prevention, social and
16 medical detoxification, and other treatment by medical and
17 nonmedical providers to uninsured and court-ordered substance
18 abuse patients in all counties of the state.

19 2. ADULT WELLNESS

20 For maintaining or improving the health status of adults,
21 with target populations between the ages of 18 to 60, and for
22 not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

25 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, not more than
26 \$140,000 shall be used to continue existing mid-level
27 practitioners demonstration projects in Black Hawk, Polk, and
28 Scott counties. The funds shall be issued in three equal
29 grant amounts and shall be used to promote the use of mid-
30 level practitioners, which includes obstetrical-gynecological
31 nurse practitioners and family nurse practitioners focusing on
32 maternal and child health, to improve access to prenatal care
33 and obstetrical services.

34 3. CHILD AND ADOLESCENT WELLNESS

35 For promoting the optimum health status for children and

1 adolescents from birth through 21 years of age, and for not
2 more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

5 a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$61,693
6 shall be allocated to the state university of Iowa hospitals
7 and clinics under the control of the state board of regents
8 for the statewide perinatal program.

9 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$261,187
10 shall be allocated for the physician care for children
11 program.

12 The program's physician services shall be subject to
13 managed care and selective contracting provisions and shall be
14 used to provide for the medical treatment of children and
15 shall include coverage of diagnostic procedures, prescription
16 drugs, and physician-ordered treatments necessary to treat an
17 acute condition. Services provided under this lettered
18 paragraph shall be reimbursed according to medical assistance
19 reimbursement rates established as of July 1, 1998.

20 c. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$75,000
21 shall be allocated for primary and preventive health care for
22 children.

23 Funds appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used
24 for the public purpose of providing a renewable grant,
25 following a request for proposals, to a statewide charitable
26 organization within the meaning of section 501(c)(3) of the
27 Internal Revenue Code which was organized prior to April 1,
28 1989, and has as one of its purposes the sponsorship or
29 support for programs designed to improve the quality,
30 awareness, and availability of health care for the young, to
31 serve as the funding mechanism for the provision of primary
32 health care and preventive services to children in the state
33 and for a continuum of health care for children with special
34 health care needs who are uninsured and who are not eligible
35 under any public plan of health insurance, provided all of the

1 following conditions are met:

2 (1) The organization shall provide a match of four dollars
3 in advance of each state dollar provided.

4 (2) The organization coordinates services with new or
5 existing public programs and services provided by or funded by
6 appropriate state agencies in an effort to avoid inappropriate
7 duplication of services and ensure access to care to the
8 extent as is reasonably possible. The organization shall work
9 with the Iowa department of public health, family and
10 community health division, to ensure duplication is minimized.

11 (3) The organization's governing board includes in its
12 membership representatives from the executive and legislative
13 branches of state government.

14 (4) Grant funds are available as needed to provide
15 services and shall not be used for administrative costs of the
16 department or the grantee.

17 d. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, not more
18 than \$165,000 shall be used to continue the existing infant
19 mortality and morbidity prevention pilot projects in Polk,
20 Scott, and Woodbury counties with no more than 15 percent
21 being used for administrative expenses.

22 e. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, not more
23 than \$25,000 shall be used to continue supporting
24 multidisciplinary research into the cause of individual infant
25 deaths in the state and shall be used solely for research
26 purposes.

27 4. CHRONIC CONDITIONS

28 For serving individuals identified as having chronic
29 conditions or special health care needs, and for not more than
30 the following full-time equivalent positions:

33 a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$738,185
34 shall be used for the chronic renal disease program. The
35 types of assistance available to eligible recipients under the

1 program may include insurance premiums, travel reimbursement,
2 and prescription and nonprescription drugs. The program
3 expenditures shall not exceed this allocation. If projected
4 expenditures will exceed the allocation, the department shall
5 establish by administrative rule a mechanism to reduce
6 financial assistance under the renal disease program in order
7 to keep expenditures within the amounts allocated.

8 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, at least
9 \$587,865 shall be allocated by the department for the birth
10 defects and genetics counseling program and of these funds,
11 \$279,402 is allocated for regional genetic counseling services
12 contracted from the state university of Iowa hospitals and
13 clinics under the control of the state board of regents. The
14 birth defects and genetic counseling service shall apply a
15 sliding fee scale to determine the amount a person receiving
16 the services is required to pay for the services. These fees
17 shall be considered repayment receipts and used for the
18 program.

19 c. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, the
20 following amounts shall be allocated to the state university
21 of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state
22 board of regents for the following programs under the Iowa
23 specialized child health care services:

24 (1) Mobile and regional child health specialty clinics:
25 \$ 392,931

26 Of the funds allocated in this subparagraph, \$97,937 shall
27 be used for a specialized medical home care program providing
28 care planning and coordination of community support services
29 for children who require technical medical care in the home.

30 (2) Muscular dystrophy and related genetic disease
31 programs:
32 \$ 115,613

33 5. COMMUNITY CAPACITY

34 For strengthening the health care delivery system at the
35 local level, and for not more than the following full-time

1 equivalent positions:

2 \$ 1,586,221

3 FTEs 23.55

4 a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$350,000
5 shall be allocated to and used by local boards of health to
6 ensure that core public health functions are maintained and to
7 support essential services in their communities.

8 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$165,391
9 shall be allocated for the office of rural health to provide
10 technical assistance to rural areas in the area of health care
11 delivery.

12 c. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$235,000
13 shall be allocated for primary care provider recruitment and
14 retention endeavors.

15 6. ELDERLY WELLNESS

16 For optimizing the health of persons over 55 years of age:
17 \$ 10,932,737

18 7. ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS

19 For reducing the public's exposure to hazards in the
20 environment, primarily chemical hazards, and for not more than
21 the following full-time equivalent positions:

24 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$39,547 shall
25 be used for the lead abatement program.

26 8. INFECTIOUS DISEASES

27 For reducing the incidence and prevalence of communicable
28 diseases, and for not more than the following full-time
29 positions:

31 FTEs 34.55

32 9. INJURIES

33 For providing support and protection to victims of abuse or
34 injury, or programs that are designed to prevent abuse or
35 injury, and for not more than the following full-time

1 equivalent positions:

4 10. PUBLIC PROTECTION

5 For protecting the health and safety of the public through
6 establishing standards and enforcing regulations, and for not
7 more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

8 \$ 6,179,446

9 FTEs 124.25

10 a. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent
11 positions authorized in this subsection, not more than
12 \$342,504 and 5.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support,
13 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the
14 state board of dental examiners.

15 b. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent
16 positions authorized in this subsection, not more than
17 \$1,261,392 and 19.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support,
18 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the
19 state board of medical examiners.

20 c. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent
21 positions authorized in this subsection, not more than
22 \$1,069,817 and 18.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support,
23 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the
24 state board of nursing examiners.

25 d. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent
26 positions authorized in this subsection, not more than
27 \$761,948 and 12.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support,
28 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the
29 state board of pharmacy examiners.

30 e. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent
31 positions authorized in this subsection, not more than
32 \$1,119,627 and 16.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support,
33 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for the operation of
34 the bureau of professional licensure.

35 The director of public health, when estimating expenditure

1 requirements for the boards funded under this lettered
2 paragraph, shall base the budget on 85 percent of the average
3 annual fees generated for the previous two fiscal years. The
4 department shall confer with the boards funded under this
5 paragraph in estimating the boards' annual fee generation and
6 administrative costs. When the department develops each
7 board's annual budget, a board's budget shall not exceed 85
8 percent of fees collected, based on the average of the
9 previous two fiscal years. The department may expend funds in
10 addition to amounts budgeted, if those additional expenditures
11 are directly the result of a scope of practice review
12 committee or unanticipated litigation costs arising from the
13 discharge of the board's regulatory duties. Before the
14 department expends or encumbers funds for a scope of practice
15 review committee or an amount in excess of the funds budgeted
16 for a board, the director of the department of management
17 shall approve the expenditure or encumbrance. The amounts
18 necessary to fund the unanticipated litigation in the fiscal
19 year beginning July 1, 1999, shall not exceed 5 percent of the
20 average annual fees generated by the boards for the previous
21 two fiscal years.

22 f. The department shall retain fees collected from the
23 certification of lead inspectors and lead abaters pursuant to
24 section 135.105A to support the certification program; and
25 shall retain fees collected from the licensing, registration,
26 authorization, accreditation, and inspection of x-ray machines
27 used for mammographically guided breast biopsy, screening, and
28 diagnostic mammography, pursuant to section 136C.10 to support
29 the administration of the chapter. The department shall also
30 retain any new or increased fees implemented by the department
31 pursuant to legislation enacted by the general assembly in
32 1999 for activities not otherwise funded by amounts
33 appropriated in this section.

34 g. The department may retain and expend not more than
35 \$361,000 for moving expenses and \$444,000 for lease and

1 maintenance expenses for the relocation of licensure boards
2 from the executive hills state office building from fees
3 collected pursuant to section 147.80 by the board of dental
4 examiners, the board of pharmacy examiners, the board of
5 medical examiners, and the board of nursing examiners in the
6 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000.

7 h. If a person in the course of responding to an emergency
8 renders aid to an injured person and becomes exposed to bodily
9 fluids of the injured person, that emergency responder shall
10 be entitled to hepatitis testing and immunization in
11 accordance with the latest available medical technology to
12 determine if infection with hepatitis has occurred. The
13 person shall be entitled to reimbursement from the EMS funds
14 available under this subsection only if the reimbursement is
15 not available through any employer or third-party payor.

16 i. The state board of medical examiners, the state board
17 of pharmacy examiners, the state board of dental examiners,
18 and the state board of nursing examiners shall prepare
19 estimates of projected receipts to be generated by the
20 licensing, certification, and examination fees of each board
21 as well as a projection of the fairly apportioned
22 administrative costs and rental expenses attributable to each
23 board. Each board shall annually review and adjust its
24 schedule of fees so that, as nearly as possible, projected
25 receipts equal projected costs.

26 j. The state board of medical examiners, the state board
27 of pharmacy examiners, the state board of dental examiners,
28 and the state board of nursing examiners shall retain their
29 individual executive officers, but are strongly encouraged to
30 share administrative, clerical, and investigative staffs to
31 the greatest extent possible.

14 coordination of services by local health care providers or
15 nonprofit health care organizations with other local entities
16 providing similar services, as described in this subsection.
17 Grantees shall assist the department in obtaining the
18 information necessary to complete the report. The department
19 shall provide a copy of the completed report to each member of
20 the joint appropriations subcommittee on health and human
21 rights by January 1, 2000.

22 14. a. The department shall apply for available federal
23 funds for sexual abstinence education programs in accordance
24 with the federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity
25 Reconciliation Act of 1996, Pub. L. No. 104-193, § 912.

26 b. It is the intent of the general assembly to comply with
27 the United States Congress' intent to assist welfare
28 recipients to terminate dependency upon government benefits by
29 promoting marriage, reducing the incidence of out-of-wedlock
30 pregnancies, and encouraging abstinence from sexual activities
31 outside of marriage with a focus upon those persons who are
32 most likely to bear children out-of-wedlock.

33 c. Any sexual abstinence education program awarded moneys
34 under the grant program shall meet the definition of
35 abstinence education in the federal law. Grantees shall be

1 evaluated based upon the extent to which the abstinence
2 program successfully communicates the goals set forth in the
3 federal law.

4 Sec. 6. DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RIGHTS. There is appropriated
5 from the general fund of the state to the department of human
6 rights for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending
7 June 30, 2000, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is
8 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

26 Of the full-time equivalent positions allocated in this
 27 subsection, one and one-half positions are contingent upon the
 28 appropriation of \$1,108,972 for a justice data warehouse.

29 a. The criminal and juvenile justice planning advisory
 30 council and the juvenile justice advisory council shall
 31 coordinate their efforts in carrying out their respective
 32 duties relative to juvenile justice.

33 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, at least
 34 \$36,300 shall be spent for expenses relating to the

1 is the intent of the general assembly that the department of

If the anticipated amount of federal funding from the federal equal employment opportunity commission and the federal department of housing and urban development exceeds \$715,000 during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, the Iowa state civil rights commission may exceed the staffing level authorized in this section to hire additional staff to process or to support the processing of employment and housing complaints during that fiscal year.

Sec. 3. DEPARTMENT OF ELDER AFFAIRS. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the department of elder affairs for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

1. For aging programs and for salaries, support, maintenance, miscellaneous purposes, and for not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$4,285,598 shall be received and disbursed by the director of elder affairs for aging programs and services. These funds shall not be used by the department for administrative purposes, and not more than \$151,654 shall be used for area agencies on aging administrative purposes, and shall be used for citizens of Iowa over 60 years of age for case management for the frail elderly, mental health outreach, Alzheimer's support, retired senior volunteer program, care review committee coordination, employment, adult day care, respite care, chore services, telephone reassurance, information and

assistance, and home repair services, including the winterizing of homes, and for the construction of entrance ramps which make residences accessible to the physically handicapped.

b. Funds appropriated in this subsection may be used to supplement federal funds under federal regulations. To receive funds appropriated in this subsection, a local area agency on aging shall match the funds with moneys from other sources according to rules adopted by the department. Funds appropriated in this subsection may be used for elderly services not specifically enumerated in this subsection only if approved by an area agency on aging for provision of the service within the area.

c. It is the intent of the general assembly that the Iowa chapters of the Alzheimer's association and the case management program for frail elders shall collaborate and cooperate fully to assist families in maintaining family members with Alzheimer's disease in the community for the longest period of time possible.

d. The department shall maintain policies and procedures regarding Alzheimer's support and the retired senior volunteer program.

2. determined that noncompliance with the requirements would not present an unreasonable degree of danger.

Sec. 5. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the Iowa department of public health for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

1. ADDICTIVE DISORDERS

For reducing the prevalence of use of tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs, and treating individuals affected by addictive behaviors, including gambling, and for not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

a. The department shall continue to coordinate with substance abuse treatment and prevention providers regardless of funding source to assure the delivery of substance abuse treatment and prevention programs.

b. The commission on substance abuse, in conjunction with the department, shall continue to coordinate the delivery of substance abuse services involving prevention, social and medical detoxification, and other treatment by medical and nonmedical providers to uninsured and court-ordered substance abuse patients in all counties of the state.

2. ADULT WELLNESS

For maintaining or improving the health status of adults, with target populations between the ages of 18 to 60, and for not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

(1) The organization shall provide a match of four dollars in advance of each state dollar provided.

(2) The organization coordinates services with new or existing public programs and services provided by or funded by appropriate state agencies in an effort to avoid inappropriate duplication of services and ensure access to care to the extent as is reasonably possible. The organization shall work with the Iowa department of public health, family and community health division, to ensure duplication is minimized.

(3) The organization's governing board includes in its membership representatives from the executive and legislative branches of state government.

(4) Grant funds are available as needed to provide services and shall not be used for administrative costs of the department or the grantee.

d. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, not more than \$165,000 shall be used to continue the existing infant mortality and morbidity prevention pilot projects in Polk,

Scott, and Woodbury counties with no more than 15 percent being used for administrative expenses.

e. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, not more than \$25,000 shall be used to continue supporting multidisciplinary research into the cause of individual infant deaths in the state and shall be used solely for research purposes.

4. CHRONIC CONDITIONS

For serving individuals identified as having chronic conditions or special health care needs, and for not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

a. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, \$738,185 shall be used for the chronic renal disease program. The types of assistance available to eligible recipients under the program may include insurance premiums, travel reimbursement, and prescription and nonprescription drugs. If projected expenditures will exceed the allocation, the department shall establish by administrative rule a mechanism to reduce financial assistance under the renal disease program in order to keep expenditures within the amounts allocated.

b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, at least \$587,865 shall be allocated by the department for the birth defects and genetics counseling program and of these funds, \$279,402 is allocated for regional genetic counseling services contracted from the state university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents. The birth defects and genetic counseling service shall apply a sliding fee scale to determine the amount a person receiving the services is required to pay for the services. These fees shall be considered repayment receipts and used for the program.

a. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent positions authorized in this subsection, not more than \$342,504 and 5.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the state board of dental examiners.

b. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent positions authorized in this subsection, not more than \$1,261,392 and 19.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the state board of medical examiners.

c. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent positions authorized in this subsection, not more than \$1,069,817 and 18.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the state board of nursing examiners.

d. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent positions authorized in this subsection, not more than \$761,948 and 12.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for operating the state board of pharmacy examiners.

e. Of the funds appropriated and full-time equivalent positions authorized in this subsection, not more than \$1,119,627 and 16.00 FTEs shall be used for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes for the operation of the bureau of professional licensure.

The director of public health, when estimating expenditure requirements for the boards funded under this lettered paragraph, shall base the budget on 85 percent of the average annual fees generated for the previous two fiscal years. The department shall confer with the boards funded under this paragraph in estimating the boards' annual fee generation and administrative costs. When the department develops each board's annual budget, a board's budget shall not exceed 85 percent of fees collected, based on the average of the previous two fiscal years. The department may expend funds in addition to amounts budgeted, if those additional expenditures are directly the result of a scope of practice review committee or unanticipated litigation costs arising from the discharge of the board's regulatory duties. Before the department expends or encumbers funds for a scope of practice review committee or an amount in excess of the funds budgeted for a board, the director of the department of management shall approve the expenditure or encumbrance. The amounts necessary to fund the unanticipated litigation in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, shall not exceed 5 percent of the

average annual fees generated by the boards for the previous two fiscal years.

f. If a person in the course of responding to an emergency renders aid to an injured person and becomes exposed to bodily fluids of the injured person, that emergency responder shall be entitled to hepatitis testing and immunization in accordance with the latest available medical technology to determine if infection with hepatitis has occurred. The person shall be entitled to reimbursement from the EMS funds available under this subsection only if the reimbursement is not available through any employer or third-party payor.

i. The state board of medical examiners, the state board of pharmacy examiners, the state board of dental examiners, and the state board of nursing examiners shall prepare estimates of projected receipts to be generated by the

licensing, certification, and examination fees of each board as well as a projection of the fairly apportioned administrative costs and rental expenses attributable to each board. Each board shall annually review and adjust its schedule of fees so that, as nearly as possible, projected receipts equal projected costs.

j. The state board of medical examiners, the state board of pharmacy examiners, the state board of dental examiners, and the state board of nursing examiners shall retain their individual executive officers, but are strongly encouraged to share administrative, clerical, and investigative staffs to the greatest extent possible.

b. It is the intent of the general assembly to comply with the United States congress' intent to provide education that promotes abstinence from sexual activity outside of marriage and reduces pregnancies, by focusing efforts on those persons most likely to bear children out of wedlock.

c. Any sexual abstinence education program awarded moneys under the grant program shall meet the definition of abstinence education in the federal law. Grantees shall be evaluated based upon the extent to which the abstinence program successfully communicates the goals set forth in the federal law.

The governor shall appoint the administrators of each of the divisions, ~~except for the division of persons with disabilities,~~ subject to confirmation by the senate. Each administrator shall serve at the pleasure of the governor and is exempt from the merit system provisions of chapter 19A. The governor shall set the salary of the division administrators within the ranges set by the general assembly.

Sec. 12. Section 216A.71, subsection 1, Code 1999, is amended to read as follows:

1. "Administrator" means the administrator of the division of persons with disabilities of the department of human rights.

Sec. 13. Section 216A.92A, subsection 2, Code 1999, is amended to read as follows:

2. Commission members shall serve three-year terms which shall begin and end pursuant to section 69.19, and shall serve the entire term even if the member experiences a change in the status which resulted in their appointment under subsection 1. Vacancies on the commission shall be filled for the remainder of the term of the original appointment. Members whose terms expire may be reappointed. Members of the commission shall receive actual expenses for their services. Members may also be eligible to receive compensation as provided in section 7E.6. Members as specified under subsection 1, paragraph "c", however, shall receive per diem compensation as provided in section 7E.6 and actual expenses. The membership of the commission shall also comply with the political party affiliation and gender balance requirements of sections 69.16 and 69.16A.

Sec. 14. GAMBLING TREATMENT FUND -- APPROPRIATION.

3. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, \$20,000 shall be transferred to the office of the auditor of state to perform an audit of the gambling treatment program. The results of the audit shall be reported to the members of the general assembly by January 1, 2000.

4. Funds which remain after the allocations in subsections 2 and 3, if any, shall be allocated for funding of administrative costs and to provide programs which may include, but are not limited to, outpatient and follow-up

treatment for persons affected by problem gambling, rehabilitation and residential treatment programs, information and referral services, education and preventive services, and financial management services.

Sec. 15. GAMBLING TREATMENT FUND DEPOSITS. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2000, an amount of the tax revenue received by the state racing and gaming commission pursuant to section 99D.15, subsections 1, 3, and 4, equal to three-tenths of one percent of the gross sum wagered by the pari-mutuel method is appropriated to the Iowa department of public health for the sole purpose of funding the position of deputy state medical examiner, contingent upon the passage of 1999 Iowa Acts, Senate File 376 or similar legislation transferring the office of the state medical examiner from the department of public safety to the Iowa department of public health. The full-time equivalent position authorizations in this Act for the Iowa department of public health shall be increased by 1.00 FTE position if 1999 Iowa Acts, Senate File 376, or similar legislation transferring the office of the state medical examiner from the department of public safety to the Iowa department of public health, is enacted. Moneys appropriated in this section that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close of the fiscal year shall be credited to the general fund of the state.

Sec. 16. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the board of dental examiners of the department of public health for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1998, and ending June 30, 1999, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

For the board of dental examiners to pay the necessary expenses of the members of the dental hygiene committee created in section 153.33A and administrative costs relating to the committee:

Sec. 17. VITAL RECORDS. The vital records modernization project as enacted in 1993 Iowa Acts, chapter 55, section 1, as amended by 1994 Iowa Acts, chapter 1068, section 8, as amended by 1997 Iowa Acts, chapter 203, section 9, and as amended by 1998 Iowa Acts, chapter 1221, section 9, shall be extended until June 30, 2000, and the increased fees to be collected pursuant to that project shall continue to be collected until June 30, 2000.

Sec. 18. COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY STUDY. The legislative council is requested to establish an interim study committee to evaluate and review whether community action agencies are maximizing opportunities to match funding for community service block grants received by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights pursuant to Code chapter 216A.

Sec. 19. OPERATING A MOTOR VEHICLE WHILE INTOXICATED COURSE REQUIREMENT STUDY. The legislative council is requested to establish an interim study committee to evaluate courses required for persons who have committed an operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated offense. The study should include a review of courses offered through the community colleges, either alone or in conjunction with local licensed substance abuse agencies, and include consideration of the practice of combining juveniles and adults in the same course, authorizing, and ensuring the availability of expertise to offer separate courses geared toward juveniles and adults, the potential mixed message sent to recovering alcohol or drug abusers who should be receiving a zero tolerance for use directive, enrollment procedures, course fees and costs, and course evaluation.

Sec. 20. EFFECTIVE DATES. Section 16 of this Act, relating to a supplemental appropriation for the board of dental examiners of the Iowa department of public health, being deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment. Section 17 of this Act, relating to the vital

records modernization project, being deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.
