## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

- 1 A Joint Resolution directing the Secretary of State to conduct a
- 2 | nonbinding election on Iowa's state motto to be held in
- 3 conjunction with a statewide special election and providing an
- 4 effective date.
- 5 WHEREAS, Iowans take great pride in their state and want the
- 6 rest of the world to know it; and
- 7 WHEREAS, all states give serious consideration to the choice
- 8 of a state motto because the perception of a state is derived
- 9 from its motto; and
- 10 WHEREAS, the task of determining a state motto for Iowa is a
- 11 formidable task because it requires that the great history,
- 12 characteristics, and assets of the state be encapsulated in one
- 13 brief, forceful, and meaningful phrase; and
- 14 WHEREAS, recent media attention given to the choice of Iowa's
- 15 state motto has both engendered and revealed a great deal of
- 16 enthusiasm on the part of Iowans to have a say in choosing Iowa's
- 17 next state motto; NOW THEREFORE,
- 18 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 That the Secretary of State is directed to place on the 2 ballot of a special election to be held Tuesday, June 29, 3 1999, if such a special election is held on that date, three 4 possible state mottoes submitted by the Governor, requesting 5 the voters to choose one. The results of this election shall 6 be nonbinding on the General Assembly. This Joint Resolution, being deemed of immediate 8 importance, takes effect upon enactment. 9 **EXPLANATION** 10 This joint resolution directs the Secretary of State to 11 place on the ballot of the special election to be held on June 12 29, 1999, a choice of three possible state mottoes, asking 13 each voter to choose one as the next state motto. The results 14 of the election are nonbinding.
