A BILL FOR

An Act appropriating moneys for and relating to fire and health
 safety grants for eligible school districts.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

SF 2383 APPROPRIATIONS

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Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION. There is appropriated
 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of
 education for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2000, and
 ending June 30, 2001, the following amount, or so much thereof
 as is necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:
 For fire and health safety grants for eligible school
 districts:

8 \$ 3,400,000

9 From the funds appropriated in this section, the sum of 10 \$100,000 may be allocated for use by the state fire marshal 11 for a collection and reporting system of fire code violations. 12 Sec. 2. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 422E.6 FIRE AND HEALTH SAFETY 13 GRANTS.

14 1. If the general assembly appropriates moneys for 15 purposes of fire and health safety grants for eligible school 16 districts, the department of education shall establish a fire 17 and health safety task force and shall award fire and health 18 safety grants based upon the recommendations of the task 19 force.

20 2. Voting members of the fire and health safety task force 21 shall include the members of the school budget review 22 committee and the state fire marshal. Nonvoting members shall 23 be appointed by the director of the department of education, 24 in consultation with the state fire marshal, and shall include 25 representatives from the education community and individuals 26 knowledgeable about school infrastructure and construction 27 issues. Nonvoting members may be eligible to receive per diem 28 and expenses as provided in section 7E.6. The task force 29 shall develop an equitable ranking system based upon the 30 following criteria:

31 a. The severity of the deficiencies.

32 b. The ability of the district to finance fire and health 33 safety repairs.

34 c. The percentage of at-risk students enrolled in the 35 district.

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d. The history of the district's effort to address fire
 and health safety repair issues.

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3 The task force shall give primary consideration to the 4 severity of the deficiencies. The task force shall review 5 applications submitted to the department of education and, if 6 necessary, conduct site visits to determine final eligibility 7 and identify inconsistencies in state and local fire and 8 building inspection standards.

9 3. A school district is eligible for a grant under this 10 section if the district agrees to provide matching funds in 11 the amount of twenty-five cents for every dollar of state fire 12 and health safety grant moneys received and if either of the 13 following occurs:

14 a. The school district receives an order or citation from
15 the state fire marshal or local fire department officials for
16 one or more fire safety or state building code violations in a
17 school facility used for instructional purposes.

b. A school facility used for instructional purposes is
operating with significant fire or health safety deficiencies
in the opinion of the state fire marshal or local fire or
building department officials.

4. Each school district that wishes to receive a fire and health safety grant shall submit an application to the department of education, on forms prescribed by the department, and shall include with the application a written plan to remedy fire or health safety defects within the time specified in the plan, a plan budget, and a five-year history of infrastructure repairs made within the district.

5. The department of education shall ensure that grant projects are consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, 42 U.S.C. § 12101 et seq., and section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. The department of education shall award grants of not more than two hundred fifty thousand dollars annually to districts in the following three size categories:

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a. Small school districts with enrollments of less than
 two thousand students.

b. Medium school districts with enrollments of not less
4 than two thousand or more than four thousand nine hundred
5 ninety-nine students.

6 c. Large school districts with enrollments of five7 thousand students or more.

8 To the extent possible, after consideration of the severity 9 of the deficiencies of all applicant school districts, funding 10 shall be awarded equitably among the three size categories. 11 6. The department of education shall prepare and submit a 12 report of the activities and expenditures funded under this 13 section to the chairpersons and ranking members of the 14 standing education committees and the joint subcommittees on 15 education appropriations, and the legislative fiscal bureau, 16 by December 1, 2001. The state fire marshal shall submit to 17 the department of education for inclusion in the report an 18 estimate of the percentage of schools left with serious fire 19 or state building code violations.

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EXPLANATION

This bill appropriates \$3.4 million from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of education for fiscal year 2000-2001, for fire and health safety grants for eligible kernel districts. The bill directs the department to award fire and health safety grants based upon the recommendations of the fire and health safety task force. The task force is composed of voting and nonvoting members.

28 Nonvoting members are to be appointed by the director of 29 the department of education, in consultation with the state 30 fire marshal and shall include representatives from the 31 education community and individuals knowledgeable about school 32 infrastructure and construction issues. Voting members 33 include the members of the school budget review committee and 34 the state fire marshal.

35 The task force is charged with developing grant criteria

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1 and an equitable ranking system, with reviewing the 2 applications submitted to the department and, if necessary, 3 with conducting site visits to determine final eligibility and 4 identify inconsistencies in state and local fire and building 5 inspection standards. The bill lists the criteria upon which 6 the task force is to base its recommendations.

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7 School districts are eligible for a grant if they agree to 8 provide matching funds in the amount of \$.25 on each dollar of 9 grant moneys and if either the school district receives an 10 order or citation from the state fire marshal or local fire 11 department officials for one or more fire safety or state 12 building code violations in a school facility used for 13 instructional purposes; or a school facility used for 14 instructional purposes is operating with significant fire or 15 health safety deficiencies in the opinion of the state fire 16 marshal or local fire or building department officials.

Each school district that wishes to receive a fire and health safety grant must submit an application to the gepartment that includes a written plan to remedy fire or health safety defects within a time specified in the plan, a plan budget, and a five-year history of infrastructure repairs and within the district.

The department must ensure that grant projects are consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, 5 42 U.S.C. § 12101 et seq., and section 504 of the federal 26 Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

27 Grants are awarded to small, medium, and large districts 28 with the awards capped at \$250,000.

The department is required to submit a report of the activities and expenditures funded to the general assembly's education committees and the legislative fiscal bureau by 2 December 1, 2001. The state fire marshal must submit to the 3 department of education for inclusion in the report an 3 estimate of the percentage of schools left with serious fire 3 or state building code violations.

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
