A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to the state minimum hourly wage rate and the
- 2 hourly wage paid by businesses applying for or receiving state
- 3 financial assistance.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. Section 15A.1, Code Supplement 2001, is amended 2 by adding the following new subsection:
- 3 NEW SUBSECTION. 6. In addition to the requirements of
- 4 subsections 2 and 3, a state agency shall not provide a grant,
- 5 loan, or other financial assistance to a private person or on
- 6 behalf of a private person unless the business for whose
- 7 benefit the financial assistance is to be provided pays at
- 8 minimum a living wage to its employees. For purposes of this
- 9 subsection, "living wage" means an hourly wage of no less than
- 10 the annualized federal poverty level for a family of four, as
- 11 defined by the most recently revised poverty income guidelines
- 12 as published by the United States department of health and
- 13 human services, divided by two thousand eighty. If any
- 14 provision of this subsection that relates to a living wage
- 15 paid by a business applying for or receiving state financial
- 16 assistance is inconsistent or conflicts with other provisions
- 17 of chapter 15 or this chapter, the provision that specifies
- 18 the higher wage rate prevails.
- 19 Sec. 2. Section 91D.1, subsection 1, paragraphs a and d,
- 20 Code 2001, are amended to read as follows:
- 21 a. The hourly wage stated in the federal minimum wage law,
- 22 pursuant to 29 U.S.C. § 206, shall be increased to \$3.85 \$5.65
- 23 on January 1, of-1990, 2003, \$4-25-on-January-1-of-1991, and
- 24 \$4.65 to \$6.15 on January 1, of-1992 2004.
- 25 d. An employer is not required to pay an employee the
- 26 applicable minimum wage provided in paragraph "a" until the
- 27 employee has completed ninety calendar days of employment with
- 28 the employer. An employee who has completed ninety calendar
- 29 days of employment with the employer prior to January 1, of
- 30 1990 2003, 1991, or 1992 <u>January 1, 2004</u>, shall earn the
- 31 applicable hourly minimum wage. An employer shall pay an
- 32 employee who has not completed ninety calendar days of
- 33 employment with the employer an hourly wage of at least \$3.35
- 34 \$5.15 as of January 1, of-1990 2003, \$3.85-as-of-January-1-of
- 35 ± 9917 and \$4.25 \$5.65 as of January 1, of ± 1992 2004.

1 **EXPLANATION** 2 This bill prohibits a state agency from providing state 3 financial assistance to any business that does not pay a 4 "living wage", raises the state's minimum wages and strikes a 5 provision that cites a repealed United States Code provision. The bill prohibits a state agency from providing financial 7 assistance to a business unless the business pays its 8 employees a "living wage", which the bill defines as an hourly 9 wage of no less than the annualized federal poverty level for 10 a family of four, divided by 2,080 (40 hours' work per week 11 for 52 weeks). The bill also raises the state's hourly minimum wage to 12 13 \$5.65 beginning January 1, 2003, and to \$6.15 beginning 14 January 1, 2004. The hourly minimum wage for employees 15 serving a 90-day training period is raised to \$5.15 on January 16 1, 2003, and to \$5.65 on January 1, 2004.
