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1 Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 135M.1 TITLE.

2 This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the 3 "Children's Environmental Health and Protection Advisory 4 Council Act".

5 Sec. 2. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 135M.2 FINDINGS --6 RESPONSIBILITIES.

7 The general assembly finds all of the following: 8 1. That children in this state face an array of 9 preventable exposures to environmental hazards in their 10 schools, homes, and communities.

11 2. That in certain cases children are at greater risk than 12 adults for exposure to and possible illness from environmental 13 hazards due to all of the following:

14 a. Children have decreased ability to detoxify certain 15 substances.

b. Children have greater sensitivity to environmental
hazards during the stages of development and growth as a
result of their immature body organs and tissues and immature
immune systems.

20 c. Children have unique exposure behavior patterns, such 21 as hand-to-mouth behavior, spending a greater amount of time 22 outdoors near hazards, and spending more time on the floor and 23 on the ground where contaminants can concentrate.

d. Children take in a proportionately greater amount of
contaminants due to their eating proportionately more food,
breathing proportionately more air, and drinking
proportionately more fluids than adults.

3. Higher rates of poverty are one factor that places children in ethnic and minority communities at disproportionately higher risk for environmental exposures due to inadequate housing, poor nutrition, and limited access to 2 health care.

33 4. Solutions to complex environmental health problems
34 require the ongoing communication, collaboration, and
35 cooperation of affected communities and many disciplines

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1 including science, medicine, public health, economics, 2 planning, law, and policy.

5. It is necessary to assess the impacts of state policies, 4 programs, and activities on children.

5 6. The state recognizes the state's responsibility to do 6 all of the following:

7 a. Enable all children to grow up in a safe and healthy 8 environment.

9 b. Use the state's resources to ensure that every child is 10 provided with an environmentally safe and healthy learning 11 environment in which to grow, develop, and mature into a 12 productive and healthy adult.

13 7. The state will endeavor to meet the state's 14 responsibilities by creating an advisory council to identify 15 environmental hazards that may affect children's health and 16 recommend solutions to those hazards through interdisciplinary 17 problem solving and coalition building.

Sec. 3. NEW SECTION. 135M.3 DEFINITIONS.

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19 As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise 20 requires:

1. "Advisory council" means the children's environmental
 health and protection advisory council created in this
 chapter.

24 2. "Environmental hazard" means one or a group of toxic 25 chemical, biological, or physical agents in the environment, 26 resulting from human activities or natural processes, that may 27 impact the health of children exposed to the agent, including 28 such agents as lead, pesticides, air pollutants, contaminated 29 drinking water, polluted waters, toxic waste, polychlorinated 30 biphenyls, secondhand cigarette or tobacco product smoke, and 31 industrial and home chemicals.

32 Sec. 4. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 135M.4 CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL 33 HEALTH AND PROTECTION ADVISORY COUNCIL -- MEMBERSHIP --34 PROCEDURES.

5 1. A children's environmental health and protection

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1 advisory council is created within the Iowa department of 2 public health.

3 2. The advisory council shall be composed of the following 4 members:

5 a. The director of public health, or the director's 6 designee.

7 b. The director of human services, or the director's 8 designee.

9 c. The director of the department of natural resources, or 10 the director's designee.

11 d. The secretary of agriculture, or the secretary's
12 designee.

13 e. The director of the department of education, or the 14 director's designee.

15 f. Two licensed pediatric health care providers with 16 expertise in the field of children's environmental health, 17 appointed by the governor.

18 g. One representative of the university of Iowa hospitals 19 and clinics with expertise in studying the impact of 20 environmental hazards on children, appointed by the governor. 21 h. One parent whose child has been clinically diagnosed 22 with exposure to an environmental hazard such as lead paint or 23 pesticides, appointed by the governor.

i. One environmental epidemiologist with expertise in
25 issues of importance to children's environmental health,
26 appointed by the governor.

j. One economist with expertise in measuring the economic 28 costs of illness and the benefits of prevention, appointed by 29 the governor.

k. One environmental toxicologist with expertise in issues
of importance to children's environmental health, appointed by
the governor.

33 1. One representative of the Iowa association of counties,34 appointed by the governor.

35 m. One representative of private industry who represents

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1 the regulated community, appointed by the governor.

Four members of the general assembly. 2 n.

3 3. The legislative members of the council shall be 4 appointed by the majority leader of the senate, after 5 consultation with the president of the senate and the minority 6 leader of the senate, and by the speaker of the house, after 7 consultation with the majority leader and the minority leader 8 of the house of representatives. Members shall serve 9 staggered terms of two years. Appointments shall comply with 10 sections 69.16 and 69.16A. Each term shall commence and end 11 as provided by section 69.19. Vacancies shall be filled by 12 the original appointing authority and in the manner of the 13 original appointments.

4. Nonlegislative members shall receive actual expenses 14 15 incurred while serving in their official capacity and may also 16 be eligible to receive compensation as provided in section 17 7E.6. Legislative members shall receive compensation pursuant 8 to section 2.12.

19 5. The director of public health or the director's 20 designee shall serve as the chairperson of the committee. A 21 majority of the members of the advisory council shall 22 constitute a quorum. The Iowa department of public health 23 shall provide staff support to the advisory council. The 24 advisory council shall meet on a quarterly basis, or more 25 frequently at the request of the chairperson.

26 Sec. 5. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 135M.5 CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL 27 HEALTH AND PROTECTION ADVISORY COUNCIL -- DUTIES.

The advisory council shall do all of the following: 28 29 1. Review and comment on existing rules, regulations, and 30 standards to ensure that the rules, regulations, and standards 31 adequately protect the health of children from environmental 32 hazards by considering the special vulnerability of children 33 due to such factors as children's developing physiology, 34 exposures, behaviors, and diets relative to adults. 5

2. Review proposed rules submitted to the advisory council

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1 to determine if the proposed rule:

a. Adequately protects the health of children from

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b. Is consistent and uniform with the children's
8 environmental health policies, rules, regulations, and
9 standards of other state agencies.

10 3. Following the review of a proposed rule, the advisory 11 council shall recommend to the entity proposing the rule 12 measures that would avoid or minimize any negative impact that 13 the proposed rule may have on the health of children.

14 4. Comment on any proposed rule that may be submitted by a 15 state agency during the public comment period if the advisory 16 council determines that the proposed rule will have an adverse 17 impact on children's health.

18 5. Gather and disseminate information to the public, 19 including the research and medical communities, community-20 based organizations, schools, and state agencies regarding 21 reduction, treatment, and elimination of children's exposures 22 to environmental hazards to further the public's understanding 23 of the environmental hazards that may potentially affect 24 children.

25 6. Recommend uniform guidelines for state agencies to
26 follow to reduce and eliminate children's exposures to
27 environmental hazards.

7. Create and promote educational programs, in partnership
with health and environmental professionals, for parents and
caregivers of children that include information regarding:

a. The potential health effects of environmental hazards.
b. Practical suggestions regarding reduction of children's
a. a. The potential hazards.

34 c. Any other relevant information to assist parents and 35 caregivers of children in protecting children from

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1 environmental hazards.

8. Provide input to the general assembly regarding
3 legislation that may impact environmental hazards that affect
4 the health of children.

5 9. Report to the general assembly and the governor on or 6 before December 1, 2002, and annually thereafter by December 7 1, describing the activities of the advisory council.

8 Sec. 6. Section 17A.4, subsection 1, Code 2001, is amended 9 by adding the following new paragraph:

10 <u>NEW PARAGRAPH</u>. d. Submit to the state children's 11 environmental health and protection advisory council created 12 in section 135M.3 any proposed rule identified by the agency 13 as having an impact on an environmental hazard, as defined in 14 section 135M.3, affecting the health of children. 15 EXPLANATION

This bill creates a children's environmental health and 16 17 protection advisory council. The bill provides findings and 8 responsibilities recognized by the general assembly regarding 19 children's environmental health, provides definitions, and 20 specifies the membership of the advisory council and the 21 procedures for the advisory council. The bill specifies the 22 duties of the advisory council, which include review of 23 existing and proposed rules of state agencies to determine any 24 negative effect on children's environmental health; to provide 25 information to the public, including the research and medical 26 communities, community-based organizations, schools, and state 27 agencies regarding reduction, treatment, and elimination of 28 children's exposures to environmental hazards to further the 29 public's understanding of the environmental hazards that may 30 potentially affect children; recommend uniform guidelines for 31 state agencies to follow to reduce and eliminate children's 32 exposures to environmental hazards; create and promote 33 educational programs, in partnership with health and 34 environmental professionals, for parents and caregivers of 5 children that include information regarding the potential

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1 health effects of environmental hazards, practical suggestions 2 regarding reduction of children's exposure to environmental 3 hazards, and any other relevant information to assist parents 4 and caregivers of children in protecting children from 5 environmental hazards; provide input to the general assembly 6 regarding legislation that may impact environmental hazards 7 that affect the health of children; and report to the general 8 assembly and the governor on or before December 1, 2002, and 9 annually thereafter by December 1, describing the activities 10 of the advisory council. The bill also requires that a state 11 agency, prior to the adoption, amendment, or repeal of any 12 rule that the agency identifies as having an impact on the 13 environmental hazards affecting the health of children, submit 14 the proposed rule to the advisory council.

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
