A BILL FOR 1 An Act relating to city and county ordinances allowing adoption of ordinances by petition and election. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 331.309 ADOPTION OF ORDINANCES 2 BY PETITION AND ELECTION.
- 3 1. The board of supervisors of a county may adopt an
- 4 ordinance providing for the right of the people to propose
- 5 ordinances by petition for submission to the voters at an
- 6 election. Such proposed ordinances are limited in subject to
- 7 matters under the jurisdiction of the board of supervisors.
- 8 2. For purposes of this section, "ordinance" means a
- 9 county law of a general and permanent nature, and includes a
- 10 proposition adopting, amending, or repealing a new or existing
- 11 law, policy, or plan. An ordinance does not include a
- 12 proposition providing for the execution or administration of a
- 13 law, policy, or plan already adopted by the board.
- 14 3. a. Upon receipt of a valid petition containing the
- 15 signatures of eligible electors in the county equal in number
- 16 to five percent of those voting in the county for the office
- 17 of governor or president at the last preceding general
- 18 election, the board of supervisors shall direct the county
- 19 commissioner of elections to call an election on the matter.
- 20 b. The resolution submitted by the board to the
- 21 commissioner of elections shall include all of the following:
- 22 (1) The proposed date of the election which may be the
- 23 same day as another election if the elections do not conflict
- 24 as defined in section 47.6. The commissioner must receive the
- 25 resolution from the board not less than thirty-two days before
- 26 the election.
- 27 (2) The full text of the proposed ordinance to be
- 28 presented to the voters of the county.
- 29 (3) The date the ordinance will become effective if
- 30 approved by the voters.
- 31 4. The county commissioner of elections shall conduct the
- 32 election in the manner provided by chapters 39 through 53, as
- 33 applicable.
- 34 5. The right to petition for adoption of an ordinance by
- 35 election shall not extend to any of the following:

- 16 1. The city council of a city may adopt an ordinance

- 19 proposed ordinances are limited in subject to matters under
- 20 the jurisdiction of the city council.
- 21 2. For purposes of this section, "ordinance" means a city

- 27 EXPLANATION
- 28 This bill allows cities and counties to adopt an ordinance
- 29 granting the people the power to petition for a proposed
- 30 ordinance to be placed on the ballot. The subject matter of
- 31 an ordinance proposed by petition may be any subject under the
- 32 jurisdiction of the city council or board of supervisors,
- 33 except for matters pertaining to the budget and appropriation
- 34 of money, the levy of taxes and special assessments, the
- 35 issuance of bonds, the letting of contracts, city or county

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1 employee salaries, emergencies, and zoning. The bill also
2 does not allow petitioned ordinances on any measure of an
3 executive or administrative nature and any measure required to
4 be enacted by state or federal law.
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
