A BILL FOR 1 An Act establishing a child protection center grant program. 2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 136.11 CHILD PROTECTION CENTER 2 GRANT PROGRAM.
- 3 1. A child protection center grant program is established
- 4 in the Iowa department of public health in accordance with
- 5 this section. The state board of health shall establish
- 6 requirements for the grant program and shall award grants in a
- 7 manner so that there is a child protection center providing
- 8 services in each of the five department of human services
- 9 region areas, as the areas were approved by the council on
- 10 human services pursuant to section 217.3. A grant may be used
- 11 for establishment of a new center or for support of an
- 12 existing center.
- 2. The eligibility requirements for a child protection
- 14 center grant shall include but are not limited to all of the
- 15 following:
- 16 a. A grantee must meet or be in the process of meeting the
- 17 standards established by the national children's alliance for
- 18 children's advocacy centers.
- 19 b. A grantee must have in place an interagency memorandum
- 20 of understanding regarding participation in the operation of
- 21 the center and for coordinating the activities of the
- 22 government entities that respond to cases of child abuse in
- 23 order to facilitate the appropriate disposition of child abuse
- 24 cases through the juvenile and criminal justice systems.
- 25 Agencies participating under the memorandum must include the
- 26 following that are operating in the area served by the
- 27 grantee:
- 28 (1) Department of human services county offices assigned
- 29 to child protection.
- 30 (2) County and municipal law enforcement agencies.
- 31 (3) Office of the county attorney.
- 32 (4) Other government agencies involved with child abuse
- 33 assessments or service provision.
- 34 c. The interagency memorandum must provide for a
- 35 cooperative team approach to responding to child abuse,

1 reducing the number of interviews required of a victim of

2 child abuse, and establishing an approach that emphasizes the

3 best interest of the child and that provides investigation,

4 assessment, and rehabilitative services.

5 d. As necessary to address serious cases of child abuse

6 such as those involving sexual abuse, serious physical abuse,

7 and substance abuse, a grantee must be able to involve or

8 consult with persons from various professional disciplines who

9 have training and expertise in addressing special types of

10 child abuse. These persons may include but are not limited to

11 physicians and other health care professionals, mental health

12 professionals, social workers, child protection workers,

13 attorneys, juvenile court officers, public health workers,

14 child development experts, child educators, and child

15 advocates.

- 16 3. The state board of health shall create a committee to
- 17 consider grant proposals and to make grant recommendations to

18 the state board. The committee membership may include but is

19 not limited to representatives of the following: departments

20 of human services, justice, and public health, Iowa medical

21 society, Iowa hospital association, Iowa nurses association,

22 and an association representing social workers.

4. Implementation of the grant program is subject to the

24 availability of funding for the grant program.

25 EXPLANATION

26 This bill establishes a child protection center grant

27 program in the Iowa department of public health with grants to

28 be awarded by the state board of health.

29 Grants are to be awarded in a manner so that each of the

30 five department of human services regions is served by a child

31 protection center. The bill specifies eligibility

32 requirements for a grant, including meeting national

33 standards, having in place an interagency memorandum of

34 understanding, utilizing a cooperative team approach in

35 addressing cases of child abuse, and ability to involve or

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1 consult with professionals with special expertise or training
2 in child abuse. The state board of health is to utilize a
3 committee to consider grant proposals and to make grant
4 recommendations to the board and a list of possible members of
5 the committee is provided. Implementation of the grant
.6 program is made subject to the availability of funding for the
7 program.
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HOUSE FILE 344 FISCAL NOTE

A fiscal note for **House File 344** is hereby submitted pursuant to Joint Rule 17. Data used in developing this fiscal note is available from the Legislative Fiscal Bureau to members of the Legislature upon request.

House File 344 creates a child protection center grant program within the Iowa Department of Public Health and specifies the manner in which the grants are to be awarded as well as eligibility requirements for the grants.

ASSUMPTIONS

- 1. In the first year of development of the grant program, the Department of Public Health would require 1.0 FTE position for a Community Health Consultant to develop and implement the grant program, provide training and/or consultation, and technical assistance to five regional Department of Human Services grantees. Costs incurred for the Community Health Consultant would be approximately \$55,000 for FY 2002. In FY 2003, the grant program would be established and the Department would only require 0.5 FTE position for the Community Health Consultant. For FY 2003, costs incurred for the Community Health Consultant would be reduced by 50.0% totalling approximately \$28,000.
- 2. The Department would also require 0.25 FTE position for a Secretary to provide clerical support. The total salary costs for the Secretary in FY 2002 would be approximately \$11,000. The same cost would be incurred for FY 2003.
- 3. The estimated fiscal impact of the purposed legislation does not include any funding for the grants to be awarded as specified in the Bill nor does the estimate include any costs associated with the creation and support of a committee to consider grant proposals.

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2002 General Fund Impact of House File 344 would be approximately \$70,000. For FY 2003 the cost would be reduced to \$43,000 due to lower staffing requirements once the program has been established.
