A BILL FOR

An Act establishing a child immunization reporting system for all
 minor children in the state and making penalties applicable.
 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 139A.8A CHILD IMMUNIZATION
 2 REPORTING SYSTEM.

3 1. A child immunization reporting system is established in
4 the department to collect, store, analyze, release, and report
5 immunization data of minor children residing in the state.

6 2. Beginning on January 1, 2003, a health care provider, 7 local board or local department, or any other entity that 8 provides immunizations to minor children residing in the 9 state, shall report the following information to the 10 department:

11 a. The name, business address, and business telephone 12 number of the health care provider, local board or local 13 department, or other entity.

b. The name, address, social security number if known, security number, date of birth, and mother's maiden name of the child immunized.

17 c. The type of vaccine administered and the date it was 18 administered or that a minor child did not receive 19 immunizations recommended by the department pursuant to 20 section 139A.8 and the reason that the minor child was not 21 immunized.

3. The health care provider, local board or local department, or other entity that provides immunizations to minor children residing in the state shall submit the information required to be reported under subsection 2 to the department on a monthly basis. The department shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 17A relating to the reporting of the information.

4. The department shall release identifying information regarding a child only to the child's health care provider, local board or department, or other entity that provided the immunization to the minor child, the minor child's parent or guardian, or a school official or licensed child care center who is authorized by law to receive and record immunization frecords. The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter

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1 17A allowing release of immunization information to other 2 persons for a specified purpose. The department may release 3 nonidentifying summary statistics relating to the immunization 4 of minor children in the state to other persons upon request 5 or as otherwise provided by rule.

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5. Information reported to the department that identifies
7 a minor child is confidential except as provided in subsection
8 4 and in section 139A.8. A person who is authorized to
9 receive such confidential information shall not disclose this
10 information to any other person.

11 6. A health care provider, local board or department, or 12 other entity that provides immunizations, that provides 13 information in good faith pursuant to this section is not 14 subject to civil or criminal liability.

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EXPLANATION

This bill establishes a child immunization reporting system in the Iowa department of public health to collect, store, analyze, release, and report immunization data concerning all minor children in the state. Currently, immunization and reporting requirements only apply to the immunization of children in certain day care facilities and who are school-22 aged.

23 Beginning on January 1, 2003, all health care providers, 24 local boards or departments of health, or other entities that 25 administer immunizations to minor children in the state are 26 required to make monthly reports to the Iowa department of 27 public health identifying minor children who were immunized 28 including what vaccine was administered or that a minor child 29 did not receive recommended immunizations and the reason. 30 The bill provides that the department shall only release 31 information that identifies a minor child to providers of 32 immunizations, a minor child's parent or guardian, or to a 33 school official or licensed child care center otherwise 34 authorized to receive immunization information. Otherwise, 5 such information is confidential although the department may,

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1 by rule, allow release of information to other persons for 2 specified purposes and may release nonidentifying summaries of 3 data.

A person who knowingly violates the provisions of the bill 5 is guilty of a simple misdemeanor. A simple misdemeanor is 6 punishable by confinement for no more than 30 days, or a fine 7 of at least \$50 but not more than \$500, or by both. A health 8 care provider who repeatedly fails to file a report required 9 by this bill is subject to being reported to the licensing 10 board governing the professional activities of the individual.

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
