A retailer that provides electronic funds transfer 8 system equipment for transactions pursuant to the program and 9 who makes cash disbursements pursuant to the program utilizing 10 the retailer's equipment shall be paid a fee of fifteen five 11 cents by the department for each cash disbursement transaction 12 by the retailer.

13 EXPLANATION

This bill reduces the reimbursement fee to retailers who participate in the electronic benefits transfer program feelating to programs offered through the department of human revices from 15 cents per each approved transaction or each action disbursement transaction to five cents per transaction.

The lowa Department of Human Services (DHS) is proposing legislation relating to: The retailer fee in Section 234.12A Subsection 1, b and c, Code 2001. The proposal is to reduce the fifteen cent authorized food stamp retailer fee to five cents.

This proposed change is needed for two reasons. The department must implement an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) system for the issuance of food stamp benefits by October 1, 2002. The system must be cost effective in relation to the cost of issuing food stamps because federal participation is limited to the cost of issuing food stamps. The federal government will only match up to the established cost cap for food stamp issuance.

Procurement of a vendor is currently in process. When the system is complete adequate funds must be available to pay the authorized food stamp retailer transaction fees and the vendor case month fees for the EBT issuance of benefits.

Reducing the legislated fifteen-cent authorized food stamp retailer fee to five cents would decrease the FY'02 budget need from \$222,464 to \$74,154.

This bill reduces the reimbursement fee to retailers who participate in the electronic benefits transfer program relating to programs offered through the department of human revices from 15 cents per each approved transaction or each cash disbursement transaction to seven cents per transaction.

SENATE FILE 430 FISCAL NOTE

A fiscal note for **Senate File 430** is hereby submitted pursuant to Joint Rule 17. Data used in developing this fiscal note is available from the Legislative Fiscal Bureau to members of the Legislature upon request.

Senate File 430 amends Section 234.12A, Subsection 1, Paragraphs b and c, Code of Iowa, relating to the reimbursement fee paid to retailers who participate in the Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) Program within the Department of Human Services. The current fee of \$.15 per transaction is reduced to \$.07 per transaction by the Bill. Retailers who currently participate in EBT are not receiving any reimbursement.

ASSUMPTIONS

- 1. Eighty percent of food stamp transactions occur at 20.0% of the large supermarkets which are equipped to accept debit cards.
- 2. The average transaction used was \$27.40 to determine the number of transactions contained in the monthly benefit issuance.
- Participation into EBT will be a phased in throughout FY 2002. By the end
 of FY 2002, it is estimated that 51,500 average monthly Food Stamp cases
 will participate in EBT.
- 4. The reimbursement fees paid to retailers who participate in EBT are projected to be 100.0% State costs without any federal funding.
- 5. There is a federal fund cap associated with Food Stamp issuance. Costs incurred at or below this cap receive federal participation. Costs incurred above this cap receive no federal funding.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact of Senate File 430 will result in a total cost of approximately \$205,000 for FY 2002 and \$290,000 for FY 2003 in the Family Investment Program. The total cost will require 100.0% State funding.
