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#### EXPLANATION

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5 The bill provides an exemption for individuals licensed in 6 this state to practice medicine or surgery, osteopathic 7 medicine and surgery, osteopathy, chiropractic, cosmetology 8 arts and sciences, or podiatry, and for athletic trainers, 9 technicians, nurses, occupational therapists, or physical 10 therapists licensed, certified, or registered in this state or 11 acting under the prescription or supervision of a person 12 licensed to practice medicine or surgery or osteopathic 13 medicine and surgery in this state. The bill deletes language 14 regarding the same professions currently excluded from the 15 definition of message therapy in Code section 152C.1.

16 The bill also provides an exemption for individuals 17 licensed, registered, or certified in another state, 18 territory, the District of Columbia, or a foreign country when 19 incidentally present in this state to teach a course of 20 instruction related to massage and bodywork therapy or to 21 consult with a person licensed under subtitle 3 of Code Title 22 IV, dealing with the licensure of health-related professions.

The bill additionally exempts students enrolled in a program recognized by the board of massage therapy examiners while completing a clinical requirement for graduation performed under the supervision of a person licensed under subtitle 3 of Code Title IV, individuals giving massage and bodywork to members of their immediate family, and individuals practicing reflexology. The bill provides a definition of reflexology to mean the manipulation of the soft tissues of the human body which is restricted to the hands, feet, or ears, performed by persons who do not hold themselves out to massage therapists or to be performing massage therapy. The bill further exempts individuals engaged within the scope of practice of a profession with established standards

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1 and ethics utilizing touch, words, and directed movement to 2 deepen awareness of existing patterns of movement in the body 3 as well as to suggest new possibilities of movement, provided 4 that the practices performed or services rendered are not 5 designated or implied to be massage therapy. The bill 6 includes within this exemption, among others, the Feldenkrais 7 method, the Trager approach, and mind-body centering.
