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Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 135.26 EXPANDED SCREENING
 PROGRAM -- GENETIC AND METABOLIC DISORDERS -- FEE -- FUND.
 J. DEFINITIONS. As used in this section, unless the
 4 context otherwise requires:

5 a. "Accredited laboratory" means any laboratory that holds 6 a valid certificate issued under the clinical laboratory 7 improvement amendments of 1988, 42 U.S.C. § 263a, as amended, 8 and that reports its screening results by using normal 9 pediatric reference ranges.

b. "Expanded screening" means screening for genetic and ll metabolic disorders, including but not limited to amino acid l2 disorders, organic acid disorders, fatty acid disorders, and l3 other abnormal profiles, in newborn infants that can be l4 detected through the use of a tandem mass spectrometer. l5 c. "Tandem mass spectrometer" means an analytical

16 instrument used to detect numerous genetic and metabolic 17 disorders at one time.

18 2. Beginning July 1, 2004, all newborns shall be subjected 19 to expanded screening for the presence of genetic, endocrine, 20 or other metabolic disorders specified in paragraph "b", and 21 such other metabolic disorders as the department may deem 22 necessary. In establishing the expanded screening program 23 pursuant to this section, the department shall:

a. Implement an intensive educational program among
physicians, hospitals, public health nurses, and the public
concerning the diseases phenylketonuria, hypothyroidism,
galactosemia, and other metabolic disorders. The educational
program shall include information about the nature of the
disorders and examinations for their detection in early
infancy, in order that measures may be taken to prevent
resulting mental retardation.

32 b. Provide all newborns with expanded screening through 33 local health departments for phenylketonuria, galactosemia, 34 hypothyroidism, congenital adrenal hyperplasia, biotinidase 35 deficiency, and sickling disorders, as well as other amino

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acid disorders, organic acid disorders, fatty acid oxidation
 disorders, and other abnormalities detectable through the use
 of a tandem mass spectrometer.

4 c. Supply the necessary treatment product where
5 practicable for diagnosed cases for as long as medically
6 indicated, when the product is not available through other
7 state agencies.

8 d. Arrange for or provide, if determined necessary, public 9 health nursing, nutrition, and social services, and clinical 10 consultation.

11 e. Require that all specimens collected via the expanded 12 screening be submitted for testing to an accredited laboratory 13 designated by the department to perform such tests, with the 14 results of the tests reported to the department. The 15 department shall establish a reasonable fee to cover the cost 16 of providing the expanded screening, and shall deposit the 17 fees collected into a special fund created within the state 18 treasury and designated as the metabolic screening and 19 treatment fund. Additional state and federal funds for 20 expenses related to metabolic screening, follow-up, and 21 treatment may also be deposited into the fund. Monevs 22 deposited into the fund are appropriated to the department 23 solely for the purpose of providing metabolic screening, 24 follow-up, and treatment. Notwithstanding section 8.33, 25 moneys deposited into the special fund that remain 26 unencumbered or unobligated at the close of the fiscal year 27 shall not revert to any other fund but shall remain available 28 for expenditure for the purpose designated in future fiscal 29 years. Notwithstanding section 12C.7, subsection 2, interest 30 or earnings on moneys deposited into the special fund shall be 31 credited to and remain a part of the special fund.

32 3. The expanded screening program established pursuant to 33 this section shall not be construed to prohibit any licensed 34 medical facility from collecting additional specimens for 35 testing for metabolic or neonatal diseases or any other

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1 diseases or conditions which the facility deems necessary.

4. The provisions of this section shall not apply if a newborn's parent or legal guardian submits a signed affidavit to a physician or other person whose duty it is to administer and report the results of the expanded screening stating that the expanded screening conflicts with the tenets and practices 7 of a recognized religious denomination of which the newborn, 8 parent, or legal guardian is an adherent or member.

9 5. The department shall adopt rules relating to
10 administration of the educational program, expanded screening,
11 and reporting requirements required pursuant to this section.
12 EXPLANATION

13 This bill provides for the establishment of an expanded 14 screening program for newborns for specified genetic and 15 metabolic disorders, including phenylketonuria, beginning July 16 1, 2004. The bill defines "expanded screening" to mean 17 screening for genetic and metabolic disorders, including but 18 not limited to amino acid disorders, organic acid disorders, 19 fatty acid disorders, and other abnormal profiles, in newborn 20 infants that can be detected through the use of a tandem mass 21 spectrometer.

The bill provides that in establishing the expanded screening program, the Iowa department of public health shall implement an intensive educational program among physicians, hospitals, public health nurses, and the public concerning the diseases phenylketonuria, hypothyroidism, galactosemia, and other metabolic disorders, which shall include information about the nature of the disorders and examinations for their detection in early infancy. The bill provides that the department shall provide all newborns with expanded screening through local health departments for phenylketonuria, galactosemia, hypothyroidism, congenital adrenal hyperplasia, biotinidase deficiency, and sickling disorders, as well as other amino acid disorders, organic acid disorders, fatty acid scientality of the abnormalities detectable

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1 through the use of a tandem mass spectrometer.

2 The bill provides that the department shall supply the 3 necessary treatment product where practicable for diagnosed 4 cases for as long as medically indicated, when the product is 5 not available through other state agencies; arrange for or 6 provide necessary public health nursing, nutrition, and social 7 services, and clinical consultation; and require that all 8 specimens collected be submitted for testing to an accredited 9 laboratory designated by the department to perform such tests, 10 and require that the results of the tests be reported to the 11 department.

The bill provides that the department shall establish a 12 13 reasonable fee to cover the cost of providing the expanded 14 screening, and shall deposit the fees collected into a special 15 fund created within the state treasury and designated as the 16 metabolic screening and treatment fund. The bill provides 17 that additional state and federal funds for expenses related 18 to metabolic screening, follow-up, and treatment may also be 19 deposited into the fund, and that moneys deposited into the 20 fund are appropriated to the department solely for the purpose 21 of providing metabolic screening, follow-up, and treatment. The bill provides that the expanded screening program shall 22 23 not be construed to prohibit any licensed medical facility 24 from collecting additional specimens for testing for metabolic 25 or neonatal diseases or any other diseases or conditions which 26 the facility deems necessary. The bill additionally provides 27 that the program requirements shall not apply if a newborn's 28 parent or legal guardian submits a signed affidavit objecting 29 to the screening on the basis of a religious conflict. The 30 bill provides that the department shall adopt rules relating 31 to administration of the educational program, expanded 32 screening, and reporting requirements.

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
