A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal  
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of  
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal  
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block  
5 grants are more or less than anticipated.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 472

1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal  
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
5 30, 2004, the following amount:

6 ..... \$ 12,078,439

7 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the  
8 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government  
9 for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C.,  
10 chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the substance  
11 abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department  
12 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as  
13 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in  
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount  
16 not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for  
17 administrative expenses.

18 c. The department shall expend no less than an amount  
19 equal to the amount expended for treatment services in the  
20 state fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, for pregnant women  
21 and women with dependent children.

22 d. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount  
23 not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

24 2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in  
25 subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

26 a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for  
27 prevention programs.

28 b. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on  
29 drug treatment and prevention activities.

30 c. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on  
31 alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

32 3. The substance abuse block grant funds received from the  
33 federal government in excess of the amount of the anticipated  
34 federal fiscal year 2003-2004 award appropriated in subsection  
35 1 shall be distributed at least 50 percent to treatment

1 programs and 50 percent to prevention programs except that,  
2 based upon federal guidelines, the total amount of the excess  
3 awarded to prevention programs shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

4 4. In implementing the federal substance abuse prevention  
5 and treatment block grant under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A,  
6 subchapter XVII, and any other applicable provisions of the  
7 federal Public Health Service Act under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A,  
8 subchapter III-A, the department shall apply the provisions of  
9 Pub. L. No. 106-310, § 3305, as codified in 42 U.S.C. § 300x-  
10 65, relating to services under such federal law being provided  
11 by religious and other nongovernmental organizations.

12 Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

13 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by  
14 section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the  
15 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending  
16 September 30, 2004, the following amount:

17 ..... \$ 3,612,827

18 b. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the  
19 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government  
20 for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C.,  
21 chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the community  
22 mental health services block grant. The department shall  
23 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided  
24 in the federal law making the funds available and in  
25 conformance with chapter 17A.

26 c. The administrator of the division of mental health and  
27 developmental disabilities of the department of human services  
28 shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the  
29 block grant to eligible community mental health services  
30 providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved  
31 by the federal substance abuse and mental health services  
32 administration for the fiscal year involved.

33 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds  
34 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department  
35 of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds

1 set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the  
2 division of mental health and developmental disabilities shall  
3 pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the  
4 cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's  
5 portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The  
6 auditor of state shall bill the division of mental health and  
7 developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

8 Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

9 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
10 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal  
11 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
12 30, 2004, the following amount:

13 ..... \$ 7,131,009

14 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
15 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
16 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 7,  
17 subchapter V, which provides for the maternal and child health  
18 services block grant. The department shall expend the funds  
19 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law  
20 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter  
21 17A.

22 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not  
23 exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

24 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by  
25 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect  
26 costs.

27 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds  
28 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public  
29 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health  
30 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be  
31 used for audits in subsection 1.

32 The departments of public health, human services, and  
33 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional  
34 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the  
35 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of

1 services to women and children.

2 3. a. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds  
3 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement  
4 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within  
5 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,  
6 \$300,291 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care  
7 program.

8 b. Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds  
9 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the  
10 university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of  
11 the state board of regents for mobile and regional child  
12 health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals  
13 and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs  
14 from the funds for this program. Priority shall be given to  
15 establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile  
16 and regional child health specialty clinics.

17 4. The Iowa department of public health shall administer  
18 the statewide maternal and child health program and the  
19 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional  
20 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities  
21 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to  
22 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential  
23 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance  
24 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social  
25 Security Act.

26 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES  
27 APPROPRIATIONS.

28 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
29 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal  
30 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
31 30, 2004, the following amount:

32 ..... \$ 1,505,162

33 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
34 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
35 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A,

1 subchapter XVII, which provides for the preventive health and  
2 health services block grant. The department shall expend the  
3 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
4 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with  
5 chapter 17A.

6 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not  
7 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

8 2. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, the specific  
9 amount of funds stipulated by the notice of the block grant  
10 award shall be allocated for services to victims of sex  
11 offenses and for rape prevention education.

12 3. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1  
13 and 2, an amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds  
14 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa  
15 department of public health for administrative expenses in  
16 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

17 4. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1,  
18 2, and 3, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1  
19 shall be used by the department for healthy people  
20 2010/healthy Iowans 2010 program objectives, preventive health  
21 advisory committee, and risk reduction services, including  
22 nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease  
23 services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the  
24 fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and  
25 acquired immune deficiency syndrome services. The moneys  
26 specified in this subsection shall not be used by the  
27 university of Iowa hospitals and clinics or by the state  
28 hygienic laboratory for the funding of indirect costs. Of the  
29 funds used by the department under this subsection, an amount  
30 not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the  
31 fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation grants to  
32 public water systems, and an amount not exceeding \$50,000  
33 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

34 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM  
35 APPROPRIATION.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
2 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug policy  
3 coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,  
4 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:  
5 ..... \$ 6,731,524

6 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated  
7 funds to be received from the federal government for the  
8 designated fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 46, subchapter  
9 V, which provides for the drug control and system improvement  
10 grant program. The drug policy coordinator shall expend the  
11 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
12 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with  
13 chapter 17A.

14 2. An amount not exceeding 10 percent of the funds  
15 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug policy  
16 coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set  
17 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug  
18 policy coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount  
19 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and  
20 administration of the state's portion of the funds  
21 appropriated in subsection 1.

22 Sec. 6. STOP VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN GRANT PROGRAM  
23 APPROPRIATION.

24 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
25 8.41 to the department of justice for the federal fiscal year  
26 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
27 following amount:  
28 ..... \$ 1,853,100

29 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated  
30 funds to be received from the federal government for the  
31 designated fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 46, subchapter  
32 XII-H, which provides for grants to combat violent crimes  
33 against women. The department of justice shall expend the  
34 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
35 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with

1 chapter 17A.

2 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds  
3 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department  
4 of justice for administrative expenses. From the funds set  
5 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the  
6 department shall pay to the auditor of state an amount  
7 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and  
8 administration of the state's portion of the funds  
9 appropriated in subsection 1.

10 Sec. 7. LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT BLOCK GRANT APPROPRIATION.

11 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
12 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug policy  
13 coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,  
14 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

15 ..... \$ 304,748

16 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
17 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
18 designated federal fiscal year under annual federal  
19 appropriations which provide for grants to reduce crime and  
20 improve public safety. The drug policy coordinator shall  
21 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided  
22 in the federal law making the funds available and in  
23 conformance with chapter 17A.

24 2. An amount not exceeding 3 percent of the funds  
25 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug policy  
26 coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set  
27 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug  
28 policy coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount  
29 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and  
30 administration of the state's portion of the funds  
31 appropriated in subsection 1.

32 Sec. 8. RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT FOR STATE  
33 PRISONERS FORMULA GRANT PROGRAM. There is appropriated from  
34 the fund created by section 8.41 to the office of the governor  
35 for the drug policy coordinator for the federal fiscal year



1 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
2 following amount:

3 ..... \$ 633,248

4 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds  
5 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
6 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 136,  
7 which provides grants for substance abuse treatment programs  
8 in state and local correctional facilities. The drug policy  
9 coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated in this  
10 section as provided in the federal law making the funds  
11 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

12 Sec. 9. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

13 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by  
14 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of  
15 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year  
16 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
17 following amount:

18 ..... \$ 6,956,142

19 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
20 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
21 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 106,  
22 which provides for the community services block grant. The  
23 division of community action agencies of the department of  
24 human rights shall expend the funds appropriated in this  
25 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds  
26 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

27 b. The administrator of the division of community action  
28 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not  
29 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to  
30 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting  
31 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a  
32 minimum allocation of not less than \$100,000. The minimum  
33 allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds  
34 from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds.  
35 The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-

1 level population in the area represented by the community  
2 action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level  
3 population in the state.

4     2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds  
5 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of  
6 community action agencies of the department of human rights  
7 for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this  
8 subsection for administrative expenses, the division of  
9 community action agencies of the department of human rights  
10 shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay  
11 the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's  
12 portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The  
13 auditor of state shall bill the division of community action  
14 agencies for the costs of the audits.

15     Sec. 10. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

16     1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
17 8.41 to the Iowa department of economic development for the  
18 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending  
19 September 30, 2004, the following amount:

20 ..... \$ 32,600,000

21     Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
22 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
23 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 69,  
24 which provides for community development block grants. The  
25 Iowa department of economic development shall expend the funds  
26 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law  
27 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter  
28 17A.

29     2. An amount not exceeding \$1,504,000 for the federal  
30 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, shall be used by the  
31 Iowa department of economic development for administrative  
32 expenses for the community development block grant. The total  
33 amount used for administrative expenses includes \$752,000 for  
34 the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, of funds  
35 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from

1 the state equal to \$752,000 from the appropriation of state  
2 funds for the community development block grant and state  
3 appropriations for related activities of the Iowa department  
4 of economic development. From the funds set aside for  
5 administrative expenses by this subsection, the Iowa  
6 department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of  
7 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use  
8 and administration of the state's portion of the funds  
9 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill  
10 the department for the costs of the audit.

11 Sec. 11. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

12 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
13 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the  
14 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year  
15 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
16 following amount:

17 ..... \$ 31,116,126

18 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
19 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
20 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 94,  
21 subchapter II, which provides for the low-income home energy  
22 assistance block grants. The division of community action  
23 agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the  
24 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
25 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with  
26 chapter 17A.

27 2. Up to 15 percent of the amount appropriated in this  
28 section that is actually received shall be used for  
29 residential weatherization or other related home repairs for  
30 low-income households. Of this allocation amount, not more  
31 than 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses. In  
32 order to receive low-income home energy assistance program  
33 funding, the head of an eligible household must be willing to  
34 allow residential weatherization or other related home  
35 repairs. However, if the eligible household is located in

1 rental property, the unwillingness of the property owner to  
2 allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs  
3 shall not prevent the eligible household from receiving low-  
4 income home energy assistance program funding.

5 3. After subtracting the allocation in subsection 2, up to  
6 \$2,645,721 is allocated for administrative expenses of the  
7 low-income home energy assistance program of which \$290,000 is  
8 allocated for administrative expenses of the division. The  
9 costs of auditing the use and administration of the portion of  
10 the appropriation in this section that is retained by the  
11 state shall be paid from the amount allocated in this  
12 subsection to the division. The auditor of state shall bill  
13 the division for the audit costs.

14 4. The remainder of the appropriation in this section  
15 following the allocations made in subsections 2 and 3, shall  
16 be used to help eligible households as defined in 42 U.S.C.,  
17 chapter 94, subchapter II, to meet home energy costs.

18 5. Not more than 10 percent of the amount appropriated in  
19 this section that is actually received may be carried forward  
20 for use in the succeeding federal fiscal year.

21 6. Expenditures for assessment and resolution of energy  
22 problems shall be limited to 5 percent of the amount  
23 appropriated in this section that is actually received.

24 Sec. 12. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
26 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal  
27 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
28 30, 2004, the following amount:

29 ..... \$ 17,578,494

30 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
32 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 7,  
33 subchapter XX, which provides for the social services block  
34 grant. The department of human services shall expend the  
35 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the

1 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with  
2 chapter 17A.

3 2. Not more than \$1,117,774 of the funds appropriated in  
4 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services  
5 for general administration. From the funds set aside in this  
6 subsection for general administration, the department of human  
7 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount  
8 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and  
9 administration of the state's portion of the funds  
10 appropriated in subsection 1.

11 3. In addition to the allocation for general  
12 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds  
13 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the  
14 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal  
15 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, for the following  
16 programs within the department of human services:

- 17 a. Field operations:
- 18 ..... \$ 6,685,530
- 19 b. Child and family services:
- 20 ..... \$ 999,970
- 21 c. Local administrative costs and other local services:
- 22 ..... \$ 709,019
- 23 d. Volunteers:
- 24 ..... \$ 77,490
- 25 e. Community-based services:
- 26 ..... \$ 89,111
- 27 f. MH/MR/DD/BI community service (local purchase):
- 28 ..... \$ 7,899,600

29 Sec. 13. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department  
30 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop  
31 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant  
32 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

33 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services  
34 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with  
35 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify

1 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to  
2 fund the state programs and services.

3 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and  
4 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social  
5 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social  
6 services block grant funds available for the local programs  
7 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal  
8 social services block grant funds to the counties. The  
9 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will  
10 be used to fund the local programs and services.

11 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's  
12 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

13 Sec. 14. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM  
14 HOMELESSNESS.

15 1. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the  
16 federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration  
17 to provide mental health services for the homeless, for the  
18 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending  
19 September 30, 2004, the department of human services shall  
20 assure that a project which receives funds under the formula  
21 grant from either the federal or local match share of 25  
22 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who  
23 have chronic mental illness and are homeless or who are  
24 subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless  
25 shall do all of the following:

26 a. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic  
27 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and  
28 rehabilitation services.

29 b. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary  
30 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health  
31 services and substance abuse services.

32 c. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide  
33 services to persons targeted by the grant.

34 d. Provide case management to homeless persons.

35 e. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain

1 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not  
2 otherwise supported.

3 2. Projects may expend funds for housing services  
4 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,  
5 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance  
6 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing  
7 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless  
8 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental  
9 payments to prevent eviction.

10 3. If the department has data indicating that a geographic  
11 area has a substantial number of persons with mental illness  
12 who are homeless and are not being served by an existing  
13 grantee for that area under the formula grant and the existing  
14 grantee has expressed a desire to no longer provide services  
15 or the grantee's contract was terminated by the department for  
16 nonperformance, the department shall issue a request for  
17 proposals to replace the grantee. Otherwise, the department  
18 shall maximize available funding by continuing to contract to  
19 the extent possible with those persons who are grantees as of  
20 the effective date of this subsection. The department shall  
21 issue a request for proposals if additional funding becomes  
22 available for expansion to persons who are not being served  
23 and it is not possible to utilize existing grantees.

24 Sec. 15. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION. There  
25 is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the  
26 department of human services for the federal fiscal year  
27 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
28 following amount:

29 ..... \$ 42,089,767

30 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds  
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government under  
32 42 U.S.C., chapter 105, subchapter II-B, which provides for  
33 the child care and development block grant. The department  
34 shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as  
35 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in

1 conformance with chapter 17A.

2 Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

3 1. If the funds received from the federal government for  
4 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the  
5 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be  
6 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than  
7 for the services to victims of sex offenses and for rape  
8 prevention education under section 4, subsection 2, of this  
9 Act, for which each block grant is available according to the  
10 percentages that each program is to receive as specified in

12 allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect

1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal  
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
5 30, 2004, the following amount:

6 ..... \$ 12,078,439

7 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the  
8 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government  
9 for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C.,  
10 chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the substance  
11 abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department  
12 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as

14 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law

17 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,504,000 for the federal

3 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
4 following amount:

5 ..... \$ 31,116,126

6 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
7 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
8 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 94,  
9 subchapter II, which provides for the low-income home energy  
10 assistance block grants. The division of community action  
11 agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the  
12 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
13 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with  
14 chapter 17A.

15 2. Up to 15 percent of the amount appropriated in this  
16 section that is actually received shall be used for  
17 residential weatherization or other related home repairs for  
18 low-income households. Of this allocation amount, not more  
19 than 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses. In  
20 order to receive low-income home energy assistance program  
21 funding, the head of an eligible household must be willing to  
22 allow residential weatherization or other related home  
23 repairs. However, if the eligible household is located in  
24 rental property, the unwillingness of the property owner to  
25 allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs  
26 shall not prevent the eligible household from receiving low-

17 Sec. 13. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department  
18 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop  
19 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant  
20 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

21 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services  
22 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with  
23 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify  
24 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to  
25 fund the state programs and services.

26 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and  
27 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social  
28 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social  
29 services block grant funds available for the local programs  
30 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal  
31 social services block grant funds to the counties. The

3     1. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the  
4 federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration  
5 to provide mental health services for the homeless, for the  
6 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending  
7 September 30, 2004, the department of human services shall  
8 assure that a project which receives funds under the formula  
9 grant from either the federal or local match share of 25  
10 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who  
11 have chronic mental illness and are homeless or who are  
12 subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless  
13 shall do all of the following:

14     a. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic  
15 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and  
16 rehabilitation services.

17     b. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary  
18 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health  
19 services and substance abuse services.

20     c. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide  
21 services to persons targeted by the grant.

23     e. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain  
24 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not  
25 otherwise supported.

26     2. Projects may expend funds for housing services  
27 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,  
28 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance  
29 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing  
30 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless  
31 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental  
32 payments to prevent eviction.

33     3. If the department has data indicating that a geographic  
34 area has a substantial number of persons with mental illness  
35 who are homeless and are not being served by an existing

1 grantee for that area under the formula grant and the existing  
2 grantee has expressed a desire to no longer provide services  
3 or the grantee's contract was terminated by the department for  
4 nonperformance, the department shall issue a request for  
5 proposals to replace the grantee. Otherwise, the department  
6 shall maximize available funding by continuing to contract to  
7 the extent possible with those persons who are grantees as of  
8 the effective date of this subsection. The department shall  
9 issue a request for proposals if additional funding becomes  
10 available for expansion to persons who are not being served  
11 and it is not possible to utilize existing grantees.

12 Sec. 15. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION. There  
13 is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the  
14 department of human services for the federal fiscal year

18 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds  
19 anticipated to be received from the federal government under  
20 42 U.S.C., chapter 105, subchapter II-B, which provides for  
21 the child care and development block grant. The department  
22 shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as  
23 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in  
24 conformance with chapter 17A.

4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block  
5 grants are more or less than anticipated.

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1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section  
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal  
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September  
5 30, 2004, the following amount:

7 a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the  
8 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government  
9 for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C.,  
10 chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the substance  
11 abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department  
12 shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as  
13 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in  
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount  
16 not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for  
17 administrative expenses.

18 c. The department shall expend no less than an amount  
19 equal to the amount expended for treatment services in the

19 anticipated funds to be received from the federal government

23 expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided  
24 in the federal law making the funds available and in  
25 conformance with chapter 17A.

26 c. The administrator of the division of mental health and  
27 developmental disabilities of the department of human services  
28 shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the  
29 block grant to eligible community mental health services  
30 providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved

12 30, 2004, the following amount:

14 The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
15 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
16 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 7,  
17 subchapter V, which provides for the maternal and child health  
18 services block grant. The department shall expend the funds  
19 appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law  
20 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter  
21 17A.

22 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not  
23 exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

24 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by  
25 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect  
26 costs.

27 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds  
28 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public

19 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and

29 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated  
30 funds to be received from the federal government for the  
31 designated fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 46, subchapter  
32 XII-H, which provides for grants to combat violent crimes  
33 against women. The department of justice shall expend the  
34 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the  
35 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with

2 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds  
3 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department  
4 of justice for administrative expenses. From the funds set

13 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by

15 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year  
16 beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the  
17 following amount:

19 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds  
20 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the  
21 designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 106,  
22 which provides for the community services block grant. The

23 agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the  
24 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the

4 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services  
5 for general administration. From the funds set aside in this  
6 subsection for general administration, the department of human  
7 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount  
8 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and  
9 administration of the state's portion of the funds

12 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds  
13 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the

29 Sec. 13. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department  
30 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop  
31 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant  
32 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

33 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services  
34 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with  
35 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify



1 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to  
2 fund the state programs and services.

3 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and  
4 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social  
5 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social  
6 services block grant funds available for the local programs  
7 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal  
8 social services block grant funds to the counties. The  
9 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will

17 to provide mental health services for the homeless, for the  
18 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending  
19 September 30, 2004, the department of human services shall  
20 assure that a project which receives funds under the formula  
21 grant from either the federal or local match share of 25  
22 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who  
23 have chronic mental illness and are homeless or who are  
24 subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless

1 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not  
2 otherwise supported.

3 2. Projects may expend funds for housing services  
4 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,  
5 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance  
6 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing  
7 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless  
8 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental  
9 payments to prevent eviction.

10 3. If the department has data indicating that a geographic  
11 area has a substantial number of persons with mental illness  
12 who are homeless and are not being served by an existing  
13 grantee for that area under the formula grant and the existing  
14 grantee has expressed a desire to no longer provide services  
15 or the grantee's contract was terminated by the department for  
16 nonperformance, the department shall issue a request for

30 Funds appropriated in this section are the funds  
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government under  
32 42 U.S.C., chapter 105, subchapter II-B, which provides for  
33 the child care and development block grant. The department  
34 shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as  
35 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in

1 conformance with chapter 17A.

2 Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

3 1. If the funds received from the federal government for  
4 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the  
5 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be  
6 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than  
7 for the services to victims of sex offenses and for rape  
8 prevention education under section 4, subsection 2, of this  
9 Act, for which each block grant is available according to the  
10 percentages that each program is to receive as specified in  
11 this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds  
12 allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect  
13 the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation  
14 is not allocated by percentage, the governor may allocate the  
15 funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent  
16 possible the purposes of the various programs for which the  
17 block grants are available.

AN ACT

APPROPRIATING FEDERAL FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE FROM FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS AND OTHER FEDERAL GRANTS, ALLOCATING PORTIONS OF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS, AND PROVIDING PROCEDURES IF FEDERAL FUNDS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 12,078,439

a. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C.,

chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the substance abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for administrative expenses.

c. The department shall expend no less than an amount equal to the amount expended for treatment services in the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, for pregnant women and women with dependent children.

d. Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

2. At least 20 percent of the funds remaining from the appropriation made in subsection 1 shall be allocated for prevention programs.

3. In implementing the federal substance abuse prevention and treatment block grant under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, and any other applicable provisions of the federal Public Health Service Act under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A, subchapter III-A, the department shall apply the provisions of Pub. L. No. 106-310, § 3305, as codified in 42 U.S.C. § 300x-65, relating to services under such federal law being provided by religious and other nongovernmental organizations.

Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 3,612,827

b. Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the community

mental health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

c. The administrator of the division of mental health and developmental disabilities of the department of human services shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community mental health services providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the federal substance abuse and mental health services administration for the fiscal year involved.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of mental health and developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of mental health and developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 7,131,009

The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 7, subchapter V, which provides for the maternal and child health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect costs.

2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

The departments of public health, human services, and education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of services to women and children.

3. a. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement appropriations for maternal and child health programs within the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds, \$300,291 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care program.

b. Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents for mobile and regional child health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

4. The Iowa department of public health shall administer the statewide maternal and child health program and the crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities to improve the health of low-income women and children and to

promote the welfare of children with actual or potential handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social Security Act.

**Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.**

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 1,505,162

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 6A, subchapter XVII, which provides for the preventive health and health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

2. Of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of the block grant award shall be allocated for services to victims of sex offenses and for rape prevention education.

3. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1 and 2, an amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

4. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1, 2, and 3, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy people 2010/healthy Iowans 2010 program objectives, preventive health advisory committee, and risk reduction services, including

nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome services. The moneys specified in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics or by the state hygienic laboratory for the funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and an amount not exceeding \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

**Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.**

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug policy coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 6,731,524

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 46, subchapter V, which provides for the drug control and system improvement grant program. The drug policy coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug policy coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug policy coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 6. STOP VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN GRANT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of justice for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 1,853,100

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 46, subchapter XII-H, which provides for grants to combat violent crimes against women. The department of justice shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of justice for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the department shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 7. LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT BLOCK GRANT APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug policy coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 304,748

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under annual federal appropriations which provide for grants to reduce crime and improve public safety. The drug policy coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided

in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 3 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug policy coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug policy coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 8. RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT FOR STATE PRISONERS FORMULA GRANT PROGRAM. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug policy coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 633,248

Funds appropriated in this section are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 136, which provides grants for substance abuse treatment programs in state and local correctional facilities. The drug policy coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 9. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 6,956,142

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 106,

which provides for the community services block grant. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a minimum allocation of not less than \$100,000. The minimum allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds. The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-level population in the area represented by the community action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level population in the state.

2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 10. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of economic development for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 32,600,000

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 69, which provides for community development block grants. The Iowa department of economic development shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$1,504,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, shall be used by the Iowa department of economic development for administrative expenses for the community development block grant. The total amount used for administrative expenses includes \$752,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, of funds appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from the state equal to \$752,000 from the appropriation of state funds for the community development block grant and state appropriations for related activities of the Iowa department of economic development. From the funds set aside for administrative expenses by this subsection, the Iowa department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the department for the costs of the audit.

Sec. 11. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 31,116,126

The funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 94,

subchapter II, which provides for the low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Up to 15 percent of the amount appropriated in this section that is actually received shall be used for residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households. Of this allocation amount, not more than 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses. In order to receive low-income home energy assistance program funding, the head of an eligible household must be willing to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs. However, if the eligible household is located in rental property, the unwillingness of the property owner to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs shall not prevent the eligible household from receiving low-income home energy assistance program funding.

3. After subtracting the allocation in subsection 2, up to \$2,645,721 is allocated for administrative expenses of the low-income home energy assistance program of which \$290,000 is allocated for administrative expenses of the division. The costs of auditing the use and administration of the portion of the appropriation in this section that is retained by the state shall be paid from the amount allocated in this subsection to the division. The auditor of state shall bill the division for the audit costs.

4. The remainder of the appropriation in this section following the allocations made in subsections 2 and 3, shall be used to help eligible households as defined in 42 U.S.C., chapter 94, subchapter II, to meet home energy costs.

5. Not more than 10 percent of the amount appropriated in this section that is actually received may be carried forward for use in the succeeding federal fiscal year.

6. Expenditures for assessment and resolution of energy problems shall be limited to 5 percent of the amount appropriated in this section that is actually received.

Sec. 12. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 17,578,494

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under 42 U.S.C., chapter 7, subchapter XX, which provides for the social services block grant. The department of human services shall expend the funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Not more than \$1,117,774 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for general administration. From the funds set aside in this subsection for general administration, the department of human services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

3. In addition to the allocation for general administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, for the following programs within the department of human services:

- a. Field operations: .....

- c. Local administrative costs and other local services: .....

Sec. 13. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop a plan for the use of federal social services block grant funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

The proposed plan shall include all programs and services at the state level which the department proposes to fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify state and other funds which the department proposes to use to fund the state programs and services.

The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and services which are eligible to be funded with federal social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social services block grant funds available for the local programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal social services block grant funds to the counties. The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will be used to fund the local programs and services.

The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

Sec. 14. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS.

1. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration to provide mental health services for the homeless, for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the department of human services shall assure that a project which receives funds under the formula grant from either the federal or local match share of 25

percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who have chronic mental illness and are homeless or who are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless shall do all of the following:

- a. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services.
- b. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health services and substance abuse services.
- c. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide services to persons targeted by the grant.
- d. Provide case management to homeless persons.
- e. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain homeless persons living in residential settings which are not otherwise supported.

2. Projects may expend funds for housing services including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing, security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental payments to prevent eviction.

3. If the department has data indicating that a geographic area has a substantial number of persons with mental illness who are homeless and are not being served by an existing grantee for that area under the formula grant and the existing grantee has expressed a desire to no longer provide services or the grantee's contract was terminated by the department for nonperformance, the department shall issue a request for proposals to replace the grantee. Otherwise, the department shall maximize available funding by continuing to contract to the extent possible with those persons who are grantees as of the effective date of this subsection. The department shall issue a request for proposals if additional funding becomes



available for expansion to persons who are not being served and it is not possible to utilize existing grantees.

Sec. 15. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 2003, and ending September 30, 2004, the following amount:

..... \$ 42,089,767

Funds appropriated in this section are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under 42 U.S.C., chapter 105, subchapter II-B, which provides for the child care and development block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated in this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If the funds received from the federal government for the block grants specified in this Act are less than the amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than for the services to victims of sex offenses and for rape prevention education under section 4, subsection 2, of this Act, for which each block grant is available according to the percentages that each program is to receive as specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various programs for which the block grants are available.

2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate

chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those committees, and the director of the legislative service bureau and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau or the director of legislative services agency succeeding the two bureaus if such agency is established by law, shall be notified of the proposed action.

b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and information on the reasons why particular percentages or amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the departments and programs affected, and other information deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

3. If the amount of moneys received from the federal government for a specific grant number specified in this Act is less than the amount appropriated, the amount appropriated shall be reduced accordingly. An annual report listing any such appropriation reduction shall be submitted to the fiscal committee of the legislative council.

Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If funds received from the federal government in the form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 10, and 12 of this Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according to the percentages specified in those sections, except additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative expenses.

2. If actual funds received from the federal government from block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 11 of this Act for the low-income home energy assistance program, not more than 15 percent of the excess may be allocated to the low-income residential weatherization program and not more than 5 percent of the excess may be used for administrative costs.

3. If funds received from the federal government from community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated

in section 9 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is allocated to the community services block grant program.

4. If the amount of moneys received from the federal government for a specific grant number specified in this Act exceeds the amount appropriated, the excess amount is appropriated for the purpose designated in the specific grant's appropriation. An annual report listing any such excess appropriations shall be submitted to the fiscal committee of the legislative council.

Sec. 18. PROCEDURE FOR EXPENDITURE OF ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS. If other federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds become available or are awarded which are not available or awarded during the period in which the general assembly is in session, but which require expenditure by the applicable department or agency prior to March 15 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, these grants, receipts, and funds are appropriated to the extent necessary, provided that the fiscal committee of the legislative council is notified within thirty days of receipt of the grants, receipts, or funds and the fiscal committee of the legislative council has an opportunity to comment on the expenditure of the grants, receipts, or funds.

Sec. 19. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES. Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, are appropriated to the department of administrative services, if the department is established in law by the Eightieth General Assembly, 2003 Session, for the purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 20. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP. Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the

fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, are appropriated to the department of agriculture and land stewardship for the purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law. The following amounts are appropriated to the department of agriculture and land stewardship for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004:

Sec. 21. OFFICE OF AUDITOR OF STATE. Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, are appropriated to the office of auditor of state for the purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 22. DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND. Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, are appropriated to the department for the blind for the purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law. The following amounts are appropriated to the department for the blind for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004:
