A BILL FOR 1 An Act relating to state and local funding for the costs of certain institutions for children under the jurisdiction of the director of human services. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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- 1 Section 1. Section 256.7, subsection 10, Code 2003, is
- 2 amended to read as follows:
- 3 10. Adopt rules pursuant to chapter 17A relating to
- 4 educational programs and budget limitations for educational
- 5 programs pursuant to sections 282-28, 282.29, 282.30, and
- 6 282.31, and 282.33.
- 7 Sec. 2. Section 282.32, Code 2003, is amended to read as
- 8 follows:
- 9 282.32 APPEAL.
- 10 An area education agency or local school district may
- 11 appeal a decision made pursuant to section 282.28-or 282.31 to
- 12 the state board of education. The decision of the state board
- 13 is final.
- 14 Sec. 3. NEW SECTION. 282.33 FUNDING FOR CHILDREN
- 15 RESIDING IN STATE MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTES OR INSTITUTIONS.
- 16 l. A child who resides in an institution for children
- 17 under the jurisdiction of the director of human services
- 18 referred to in section 218.1, subsection 3, 5, 7, or 8, and
- 19 who is not enrolled in the educational program of the district
- 20 of residence of the child, shall receive appropriate
- 21 educational services. The institution in which the child
- 22 resides shall submit a proposed program and budget based on
- 23 the average daily attendance of the children residing in the
- 24 institution to the department of education and the department
- 25 of human services by January 1 for the next succeeding school
- 26 year. The department of education shall review and approve or
- 27 modify the proposed program and budget and shall notify the
- 28 department of revenue and finance of its action by February 1.
- 29 The department of revenue and finance shall pay the approved
- 30 budget amount to the department of human services in monthly
- 31 installments beginning September 15 and ending June 15 of the
- 32 next succeeding school year. The installments shall be as
- 33 nearly equal as possible as determined by the department of
- 34 revenue and finance, taking into consideration the relative
- 35 budget and cash position of the state's resources. The

- 1 department of revenue and finance shall pay the approved
- 2 budget amount for the department of human services from the
- 3 moneys appropriated under section 257.16 and the department of
- 4 human services shall distribute the payment to the
- 5 institution. The institution shall submit an accounting for
- 6 the actual cost of the program to the department of education
- 7 by August 1 of the following school year. The department
- 8 shall review and approve or modify all expenditures incurred
- 9 in compliance with the guidelines adopted pursuant to section
- 10 256.7, subsection 10, and shall notify the department of
- 11 revenue and finance of the approved accounting amount. The
- 12 approved accounting amount shall be compared with any amounts
- 13 paid by the department of revenue and finance to the
- 14 department of human services and any differences added to or
- 15 subtracted from the October payment made under this subsection
- 16 for the next school year. Any amount paid by the department
- 17 of revenue and finance shall be deducted monthly from the
- 18 state foundation aid paid under section 257.16 to all school
- 19 districts in the state during the subsequent fiscal year. The
- 20 portion of the total amount of the approved budget that shall
- 21 be deducted from the state aid of a school district shall be
- 22 the same as the ratio that the budget enrollment for the
- 23 budget year of the school district bears to the total budget
- 24 enrollment in the state for that budget year in which the
- 25 deduction is made.
- 26 2. Programs may be provided during the summer and funded
- 27 under this section if the institution determines a valid
- 28 educational reason to do so and the department of education
- 29 approves the program in the manner provided in subsection 1.
- 30 Sec. 4. Section 282.28, Code 2003, is repealed.
- 31 Sec. 5. FY 2003-2004 FUNDING. For purposes of providing
- 32 funding for educational programs provided to children residing
- 33 in an institution for children under the jurisdiction of the
- 34 director of human services referred to in section 218.1,
- 35 subsection 3, 5, 7, or 8, the institution providing such

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- l programs to children residing in the institution shall submit
- 2 an estimated proposed program and budget based on the
- 3 estimated average daily attendance of children who will likely
- 4 be provided educational programs during the fiscal year
- 5 beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004, to the
- 6 department of education and the department of human services
- 7 by August 1, 2003. The department of education shall review
- 8 and approve or modify the proposed program and budget and
- 9 shall notify the department of revenue and finance of its
- 10 action by September 1, 2003. The department of revenue and
- 11 finance shall pay the approved budget amount, and the
- 12 department of human services shall distribute payments, as
- 13 provided in section 282.33.
- 14 EXPLANATION
- This bill modifies the procedures for authorizing and
- 16 funding educational programs provided to children residing in
- 17 institutions under the jurisdiction of the director of human
- 18 services, specifically the mental health institutes at
- 19 Cherokee and Independence, the state training school at
- 20 Eldora, and the Iowa juvenile home at Toledo.
- 21 The bill requires the institution in which a child resides
- 22 to submit to the department of education a proposed program
- 23 and budget for approval or modification. Once a proposed
- 24 program and budget are approved, the department of revenue and
- 25 finance is directed to pay the approved budget amount in
- 26 monthly installments to the department of human services,
- 27 which will distribute the payments to the appropriate
- 28 institutions. Adjustments will be made to subtract or add to
- 29 the October payment in the following year if costs were
- 30 greater or less than proposed.
- 31 Currently, the funding for the programs is derived from an
- 32 appropriation made to the department of human services, though
- 33 the area education agencies provide the Iowa juvenile home and
- 34 the state training school with services under Code section
- 35 282.28, which the bill repeals. Under the bill, funding for

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1 the education programs will come from the moneys appropriated
2 for school foundation aid.
3 For FY 2003-2004, the bill compresses the deadlines and
4 requires the institutions to provide to the department of
5 education, and the department of human services, an estimated

6 proposed program and budget based on the estimated average

7 daily attendance of children who will likely be provided

8 educational programs during the fiscal year.

HF 568 - DHS Institutions, Education Costs (LSB 2016 HV)

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Fiscal Note Version — New

Description

House File 568 provides that the four institutions under the control of the Department of Human Services (DHS), that serve school-aged children, receive educational program funding through the School Aid Formula. Currently, similar private facilities receive funding from the School Aid Formula.

Assumptions

- 1. The Mental Health Institute at Cherokee has 12 available beds for school-aged children with an average enrollment of ten. An Individual Education Plan (IEP) has been developed for five of the ten enrollees.
- 2. The Mental Health Institute at Independence has 55 available beds with an average enrollment of 55. This includes the beds classified as Psychiatric Medical Institution for Children (PMIC) beds. An Individual Education Plan has been developed for 40 of the 55 enrollees.
- 3. The State Training School at Eldora has 189 beds with an average enrollment of 179. An Individual Education Plan has been developed for 89 of the 179 enrollees.
- 4. The Juvenile Home at Toledo has 100 beds with an average enrollment of 100. An Individual Education Plan has been developed for 50 of the 100 enrollees.
- 5. Funding for students at the four institutions is currently included in the DHS budget but generally is not included in the School Aid Formula.
- 6. The FY 2003 average cost per student with an Individual Education Plan, paid to the private juvenile facilities, is \$15,000 per student.
- 7. The FY 2003 average cost per student without an Individual Education Plan, paid to the private juvenile facilities, is \$4,557 per student.

Fiscal Impact

House File 568 will result in a new net off-the-top allocation from the General Fund appropriation for School Aid of \$2.9 million as follows:

- An increase of \$3.5 million in a new allocation to the Department of Human Services (DHS) for education services at the four affected institutions.
- A decrease of \$600,000 in the allocation to the area education agencies because
 AEA VI will no longer be required to provide direct education services to the students at
 the State Training School in Eldora or the Juvenile Home at Toledo.

The new allocation to the DHS from School Aid funds will result in a General Fund reduction of \$3.5 million in the DHS budget.

Since School Aid off-the-top allocations have the effect of reducing the actual funds available to the 371 school districts in Iowa, they will have the option of recouping the funds rhrough increased cash reserve levies (property tax). The maximum impact to property tax is an increase of \$2.9 million. No data exists to determine how many of the school districts will seek to recoup the funds.
