A BILL FOR

1	An	Act providing for a special education alternative reading
2		instruction pilot project and including a contingent
3		effectiveness clause and an effective date.
4	BE	IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. SPECIAL EDUCATION PILOT PROGRAM -- READING
 2 LABORATORY.
- 3 1. Recognizing the state's desire to assist children to
- 4 grow, develop, and learn to their fullest extent and empower
- 5 young readers in grades kindergarten through three, and to
- 6 support student achievement and overall academic performance,
- 7 and recognizing that instructional methodologies and
- 8 strategies are important considerations in determining the
- 9 appropriate education for a child with a learning disability,
- 10 a reading laboratory pilot program is established. The
- 11 objective of the program shall be to evaluate methodologies
- 12 and strategies used to teach reading that could be implemented
- 13 to ensure that the state is meeting the unique needs of
- 14 individual children; and to assist with student placement
- 15 decisions in education programs, including placement in the
- 16 special education program.
- 17 2. The program shall be administered by the department of
- 18 education, and shall afford a private education provider the
- 19 opportunity to demonstrate effective methodologies and
- 20 strategies in teaching reading for students in grades
- 21 kindergarten through three identified with special needs. A
- 22 private education provider shall be selected by the department
- 23 which meets the following criteria from among those submitting
- 24 an application for consideration:
- 25 a. The provider shall be doing business in at least two
- 26 locations in a county which contains a school district with an
- 27 enrollment of at least twenty-five thousand pupils in grades
- 28 kindergarten through twelve.
- 29 b. The provider shall possess at least fifteen years of
- 30 business experience in the application of methodologies and
- 31 strategies designed to improve reading skills for students in
- 32 grades kindergarten through twelve.
- 33 c. The provider shall employ at least forty trained staff,
- 34 including at least one staff member who is a licensed special
- 35 education consultant.

- d. The provider shall be able to document success in
- 2 improving student achievement in reading skills in grades
- 3 kindergarten through three.
- 4 The department shall develop private provider application
- 5 forms, and shall publish notice and provide information on the
- 6 department's website regarding the existence of the pilot
- 7 program, application procedures, and program participation.
- 8 The private education provider which meets all of the
- 9 eligibility criteria set forth in this subsection shall be
- 10 selected by the department, and the selection process shall be
- 11 conducted without bidding.
- 12 3. Students in grades kindergarten through three, residing
- 13 in a county which contains a school district with an
- 14 enrollment of at least twenty-five thousand students in grades
- 15 kindergarten through twelve, and who have been identified by
- 16 the school district as qualifying for special education
- 17 services with mild or moderate learning disabilities involving
- 18 difficulty in reading, shall be eligible to participate in the
- 19 program. School districts shall be responsible for
- 20 determining a pool of students who meet the eligibility
- 21 requirements, in coordination with the local area education
- 22 agency; for notifying parents regarding the existence of the
- 23 program and providing an application form and any other
- 24 necessary information; and for submitting applications to the
- 25 department. The department shall select a maximum of fifty
- 26 students from those students submitting an application.
- 27 Selection of students shall be done randomly in the event that
- 28 more than fifty students submit applications, beginning with
- 29 students in the third grade, then second, then first, and
- 30 finally kindergarten, with students eligible for free and
- 31 reduced-price meals under the federal National School Lunch
- 32 Act and the federal Child Nutrition Act of 1966, 42 U.S.C. §
- 33 1751-1785, given priority. Additional eligibility
- 34 requirements may be established by the private education
- 35 provider, including intelligence quotient testing scores, in

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- 1 order to provide reliable and beneficial program results.
- 2 Students submitting an application shall be provided with an
- 3 intelligence test selected by the department and administered
- 4 by the local area education agency. The results of the test
- 5 shall remain confidential and shall only be used by the area
- 6 education agency to determine eligibility and participation in
- 7 the pilot program.
- 8 4. Pilot program instruction shall be provided on the
- 9 premises of the private education provider. Student
- 10 instruction shall be provided over a nine-week period during
- 11 the months of June, July, and August 2003. The private
- 12 education provider shall ensure that each student receives
- 13 reading instruction appropriate for the child, for a minimum
- 14 of seven hours per week, with the instruction received
- 15 considered separate and distinct from the student's current
- 16 individual education plan. The school district shall provide
- 17 transportation for the student to the private education
- 18 provider's location, or shall provide parental reimbursement
- 19 for transportation in an amount determined by the school
- 20 district board of directors.
- 21 5. The private education provider shall gather performance
- 22 data to provide for program accountability, including but not
- 23 limited to pretesting and posttesting, to measure improvement
- 24 by each student during instruction, and upon the conclusion of
- 25 the program. The private education provider shall consult
- 26 with the local area education agency for assistance with
- 27 pretesting and posttesting, and the area education agency
- 28 shall approve the tests utilized. The private education
- 29 provider shall provide progress reports to the parents or
- 30 guardians of participating students, to the school district in
- 31 which the participating students are enrolled, and to the
- 32 department. The department, in conjunction with the
- 33 legislative fiscal bureau and the private provider, shall
- 34 review and analyze the data collected and submitted by the
- 35 private education provider. Full assurance relating to

- 1 confidentiality of identification of individual students'
 2 scores shall be provided. The department shall submit a cost3 benefit analysis report to the members of the general assembly
 4 by January 1, 2004, summarizing the results of the pilot
- 5 program. The report shall include an analysis of the student
- 6 improvement as measured through test scores, and a short-term
- 7 and long-term cost savings analysis for implementing the
- 8 private education provider's instruction methodology and
- 9 strategies. The analysis of the cost savings shall include
- 10 savings due to a reduction in the statewide average length of
- 11 participation in the special education program. The report
- 12 shall also include recommendations relating to statewide
- 13 implementation of the pilot program. The legislative fiscal
- 14 bureau shall conduct a survey of other reading studies
- 15 conducted in the state and shall include in the report results
- 16 relating to public school reading initiatives. The department
- 17 shall submit a follow-up report by January 1, 2005, tracking
- 18 continued improvement by students who participated in the
- 19 program, and including the number of students who are no
- 20 longer identified as requiring special education instruction.
- 21 6. The establishment of the pilot program pursuant to this
- 22 section shall be contingent upon the appropriation of an
- 23 amount sufficient to fund the costs of the program for the
- 24 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending June 30, 2004.
- 25 Sec. 2. Section 256D.9, Code 2003, is amended to read as 26 follows:
- 27 256D.9 FUTURE REPEAL.
- This chapter is repealed effective July 1, 2003 2004.
- 29 Sec. 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act, being deemed of
- 30 immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.
- 31 EXPLANATION
- 32 This bill provides for the establishment of a special
- 33 education alternative instruction pilot program focusing on
- 34 improving reading skills in grades kindergarten through three.
- 35 The bill provides intent language supporting the

1 establishment of the program, citing the state's desire to 2 assist children to grow, develop, and learn to their fullest 3 extent, to empower young readers in grades kindergarten 4 through three, and to support student achievement and overall 5 academic performance. The bill provides that the objective of 6 the program shall be to evaluate methodologies and strategies 7 used to teach reading that could be implemented to ensure that 8 the state is meeting the unique needs of individual children, 9 and to assist with student placement decisions in education 10 programs, including placement in the special education 11 program. The bill provides that the program shall be administered by 12 13 the department of education, and shall involve instruction by 14 a private education provider intended to demonstrate effective 15 methodologies and strategies in teaching reading for students 16 in grades kindergarten through three identified with special 17 needs. The bill provides that a private provider shall be 18 selected by the department which meets specified criteria, 19 including doing business in at least two locations located in 20 a county which contains a school district with an enrollment 21 of at least 25,000 pupils in grades kindergarten through 12, 22 possessing at least 15 years of business experience in the 23 application of methodologies and strategies designed to 24 improve reading skills, employment of at least 40 trained 25 staff, including at least one staff member who is a licensed 26 special education consultant, and documented success in 27 improving student achievement in reading skills in grades 28 kindergarten through three. The bill provides that the 29 department shall develop private provider application forms 30 and shall publish notice regarding the program, and that the 31 selection process shall be conducted without bidding. The bill provides that eligible students shall be in grades 32 33 kindergarten through three, residing in a county containing a 34 school district with an enrollment of at least 25,000 students 35 in grades kindergarten through 12, and shall have been

1 identified as qualifying for special education services with 2 mild or moderate learning disabilities involving difficulty in 3 reading. The bill provides that school districts shall be 4 responsible for determining a pool of students who meet the 5 eligibility requirements, in coordination with the local area 6 education agency; for notifying parents regarding the 7 existence of the program and providing an application form and 8 any other necessary information; and for submitting 9 applications to the department. The bill provides that the 10 department shall select a maximum of 50 students from those 11 students submitting an application. The bill provides that in 12 the event that more than 50 students submit an application, 13 selection shall be done randomly, beginning with third grade 14 students, then second, then first, and finally kindergarten, 15 with students eligible for free and reduced-price meals under 16 the federal National School Lunch Act and the federal Child 17 Nutrition Act of 1966, 42 U.S.C. § 1751-1785, given priority. 18 The bill provides that additional eligibility requirements may 19 be established by the private provider, and that students 20 submitting an application shall be provided with an 21 intelligence test selected by the department and administered 22 by the local area education agency. The bill provides that 23 the results of the test shall remain confidential and shall 24 only be used by the area education agency to determine 25 eligibility and participation in the pilot program. 26 The bill provides that instruction shall be provided on the 27 premises of the private provider over a nine-week period 28 during the months of June, July, and August 2003, for a 29 minimum of seven hours per week, with the instruction received 30 considered separate and distinct from the student's current 31 individual education plan. The bill provides that the school 32 district shall provide transportation for the student to the 33 private provider's location, or parental reimbursement for 34 transportation expenses. The bill provides that the private provider shall gather 35

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1 performance data to provide for program accountability, with
 2 the assistance of the local area education agency, and shall
3 provide progress reports to the parents or quardians of
 4 participating students, to the school district in which the
5 participating students are enrolled, and to the department.
6 The bill provides that the department, in conjunction with the
7 legislative fiscal bureau and the private provider, shall
8 review and analyze the data, with full assurance relating to
9 confidentiality of identification of individual students'
10 scores, and that the department shall submit a cost-benefit
11 analysis report to the members of the general assembly by
12 January 1, 2004, summarizing the results of the pilot program.
13 The bill provides that the report shall include an analysis of
14 the student improvement as measured through test scores, a
15 short-term and long-term cost savings analysis for
16 implementing the provider's instruction methodology and
17 strategies, recommendations relating to statewide
18 implementation of the program, and results relating to public
19 school reading initiatives surveyed by the legislative fiscal
20 bureau. The bill provides for a follow-up progress report
21 regarding students who had participated in the program by
22 January 1, 2005.
      The bill provides that establishment of the program shall
24 be contingent upon an appropriation to fund the costs of the
25 program for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003, and ending
26 June 30, 2004.
      The bill additionally provides that Code chapter 256D,
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28 relating to the Iowa early intervention block grant program,
29 which contains a repeal date of July 1, 2003, shall instead be
30 repealed on July 1, 2004.
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The bill takes effect upon enactment.

Fiscal Note Version — New

Description

The Bill creates a special education alternative instruction pilot program for children in kindergarten through grade three in the Des Moines School District. The project is to evaluate methodologies and strategies to teach reading for possible expansion statewide. The Department of Education is to administer the project, and the instruction is to be provided by a private education provider. Fifty randomly selected students meeting program criteria and selected by the local Area Education Agency are to participate in the nine-week pilot project during the 2003 summer. Performance data is to be collected and analyzed.

Assumptions

- 1. Evaluations to determine eligibility will be performed for 150 students. Each evaluation will take six hours and cost \$35.00 per hour.
- 2. The Area Education Agency will consult with the local school and the private provider at a cost of \$60.00 per hour. Each of the 50 participants will require an average of four hours of consultation.
- 3. Summer transportation costs will be \$20.00 per student per day.
- 4. Administration, coordination, and follow-up by the Department of Education will require 0.5 FTE position in FY 2004 and FY 2005.
- 5. Private provider instruction costs are \$39.00 per hour per student for seven hours per week throughout the nine-week project.
- 6. Testing and data collection are estimated to be half the cost of instruction.

The estimated costs to carry out the pilot project under SF 406 are as follows:
