9	WHEREAS, the federal Community Development Block
10	Grant, which helps pay for community action agencies,
11	was begun more than 35 years ago as part of what was
12	called the war on poverty, providing a wide range of
13	housing, nutrition, education, and employment services
14	to low-income people; and
15	WHEREAS, the Community Development Block Grant
16	program is the cornerstone of the federal government's
17	partnership with state and local governments to
18	provide funding to rehabilitate affordable housing,
19	spur economic growth, and revitalize stagnant
20	neighborhoods; and
21	WHEREAS, as part of a broad reorganization, United
22	States President George W. Bush has proposed
<b>2</b> 3	eliminating the Community Development Block Grant
	program in fiscal year 2005-2006 and replacing it with
25	a new program under the jurisdiction of the United
26	States Department of Commerce; and
27	WHEREAS, this new program would consolidate 18
	existing community and economic development programs,
	which are providing almost \$6 billion in assistance
30	this year, into a \$3.71 billion "Strengthening

- 2 percent reduction in funding; and
- 3 WHEREAS, the National League of Cities fears this
- 4 reduction will seriously hamper efforts by cities to
- 5 revitalize and rehabilitate aging downtowns, replace
- 6 and build new affordable housing, reduce environmental
- 7 hazards, and support a range of jobs programs; and
- 8 WHEREAS, if implemented, the elimination of the
- 9 Community Development Block Grant program will have
- 10 the following impacts in Des Moines, Iowa, according
- 11 to Des Moines' 2004 Consolidated Annual Performance
- 12 and Evaluation Report submitted to the federal
- 13 Department of Housing and Urban Development:
- 9,800 fewer inspections for housing rehabilitation
- 15 and building code enforcement;
- 8,500 fewer households served by neighborhood site
- 17 offices;
- 18 1,295 fewer families receiving home ownership
