A BILL FOR

Sec. 4. Section 256.7, subsections 8 and 9, Code 2 23 Supplement 2005, are amended by striking the subsections. Sec. 5. Section 256.9, subsection 41, Code Supplement 2 25 2005, is amended to read as follows:

41. Explore, in conjunction with the state board of 27 regents, the need for coordination between school districts, 2 28 area education agencies, regents institutions, and community 2 29 colleges for purposes of delivery of courses, use of 30 telecommunications educational technology, transportation, and 2 31 other similar issues. Coordination may include, but is not 32 limited to, coordination of calendars, programs, schedules, or 33 telecommunications emissions educational technology delivery.

Sec. 6. Section 256.33, unnumbered paragraphs 1 and 3, 35 Code 2005, are amended to read as follows: The department shall consort with school districts, area

2 education agencies, community colleges, and colleges and 3 universities to provide assistance to them in the use of 4 educational technology for instruction purposes. The 5 department shall consult with the advisory committee on 6 telecommunications educational technology, established in 7 section 256.7, subsection 7, and other users of educational 8 technology on the development and operation of programs under 9 this section.

Priority shall be given to programs integrating 11 telecommunications educational technology into the classroom. 12 The department may award grants to school corporations and 3 13 higher education institutions to perform the functions listed 3 14 in this section.

EXPLANATION

This bill updates language in the Code by replacing a 3 17 requirement that the state board of education adopt rules for 3 18 the use of telecommunications as an instructional tool with a 3 19 requirement that the state board adopt rules for the use of 3 20 educational technology as an instructional tool. The bill 21 defines "educational technology" to mean any course that is 22 delivered primarily through the use of electronic media. 23 The bill retains certain provisions relating to the

24 telecommunications requirements, but aligns the language to 25 the educational technology requirements, including language 26 which requires the state board to establish an advisory 3 27 committee to make recommendations for rules, which requires 28 the department to consult with the committee, and which 3 29 provides that the educational technology be used for students 3 30 enrolled in kindergarten through grade 12 and served by local 31 school districts, accredited or approved nonpublic schools, 32 area education agencies, community colleges, institutions of 33 higher education under the state board of regents, and 34 independent colleges and universities in elementary and 35 secondary school classes and courses. The bill makes conforming changes in a current Code provision to require the 2 director of the department to explore the need for 3 coordination in the use of educational technology.

The bill requires that curriculum delivered electronically 5 must be taught by an appropriately licensed teacher, and that 6 school districts provide supervision to students whose 7 instruction is electronically delivered at a remote site. 8 bill also prohibits the use of educational technology to 9 deliver core courses that apply toward graduation. 10

The bill eliminates a provision that requires the state 11 board to develop evaluation procedures to measure the effects 4 12 of instruction by means of telecommunications, as well as 13 language that defines "supervision" for purposes of

14 telecommunications.

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
