7 EXPLANATION

- 8 This bill relates to Iowa's food policy, including by
- 9 establishing a food policy council in the office of the
- 10 governor. The bill is based upon executive order 16,
- 11 subscribed by the governor on March 31, 2000.
- 12 The bill includes findings and declarations by the general
- 13 assembly which state the importance of food production and
- 14 food production-related activities to this state; the need to
- 15 expand opportunities in global markets for agricultural
- 16 products; the need to develop a food infrastructure which
- 17 links local producers, processors, distributors, and marketers
- 18 to vibrant and sustainable world markets; and the importance
- 19 of a state food policy that produces a safe, nutritious, and
- 20 adequate food supply stock for world consumption while
- 21 balancing economic, environmental, and social considerations.
- The bill establishes an Iowa food policy council within the
- 23 office of the governor. The bill provides that its purpose is
- 24 to advise the governor on all aspects of the food system in
- 25 Iowa which includes developing a baseline for agricultural
- 26 production output; identifying barriers that limit the access
- 27 of local businesses to production, distribution, and consumer
- 28 markets within this state and to markets outside this state;
- 29 identifying innovative local food system activities; and
- 30 identifying a number of strategies relating to training and
- 31 assistance, participation by state and local governments in
- 32 the development of a growing local food infrastructure, and
- 33 linking consumers to a local food infrastructure.
- The bill provides that the council is composed of ex
- 35 officio, nonvoting members, including the secretary of

1 agriculture, the director of the department of economic 2 development, the director of the department of human services, 3 and the director of the Iowa department of public health, or 4 their designees. The voting members must include one person 5 associated with the Iowa cooperative extension service in 6 agriculture and home economics and who is appointed by the 7 president of Iowa state university. The bill provides that 8 the governor may appoint from 11 to 16 voting members who are 9 actively engaged in areas of the food system in this state. 10 The bill provides procedures for the making of appointments 11 and the conduct of meetings which is based on other Code 12 sections. The bill provides that the council is required to 13 seek support from Drake university. The council is authorized 14 to seek and obtain financing to support its activities from 15 private and public sources.

- 5 grant assistance, and institutional support from Drake
- 6 university.

EXPLANATION

- 8 This bill relates to Iowa's food policy, including by
- 9 establishing a food policy council in the office of the
- 10 governor. The bill is based upon executive order 16,
- 11 subscribed by the governor on March 31, 2000.
- 12 The bill includes findings and declarations by the general
- 13 assembly which state the importance of food production and
- 14 food production-related activities to this state; the need to
- 15 expand opportunities in global markets for agricultural
- 16 products; the need to develop a food infrastructure which
- 17 links local producers, processors, distributors, and marketers
- 18 to vibrant and sustainable world markets; and the importance
- 19 of a state food policy that produces a safe, nutritious, and
- 20 adequate food supply stock for world consumption while
- 21 balancing economic, environmental, and social considerations.
- 22 The bill establishes an Iowa food policy council within the
- 23 office of the governor. The bill provides that its purpose is
- 24 to advise the governor on all aspects of the food system in
- 25 Iowa which includes developing a baseline for agricultural
- 26 production output; identifying barriers that limit the access
- 27 of local businesses to production, distribution, and consumer
- 28 markets within this state and to markets outside this state;
- 29 identifying innovative local food system activities; and
- 30 identifying a number of strategies relating to training and
- 31 assistance, participation by state and local governments in
- 32 the development of a growing local food infrastructure, and
- 33 linking consumers to a local food infrastructure.
- 34 The bill provides that the council is composed of ex
- 35 officio, nonvoting members, including the secretary of

1 agriculture, the director of the department of economic
2 development, the director of the department of human services,
3 and the director of the Iowa department of public health, or
4 their designees. The voting members must include one person
5 associated with the Iowa cooperative extension service in
6 agriculture and home economics and who is appointed by the
7 president of Iowa state university. The bill provides that
8 the governor may appoint from 11 to 16 voting members who are
9 actively engaged in areas of the food system in this state.
10 The bill provides procedures for the making of appointments
11 and the conduct of meetings which is based on other Code
12 sections. The bill provides that the council is required to
13 seek support from Drake university. The council is authorized
14 to seek and obtain financing to support its activities from

15 private and public sources.
