## A BILL FOR

1 An Act providing for a summer reading loss prevention grant program for students in kindergarten through grade three, and making an appropriation. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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- Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 256.26 SUMMER READING LOSS 2 PREVENTION GRANT PROGRAM.
  - 1. A summer reading loss prevention grant program for 4 students in kindergarten through grade three is created under 5 the control of the department for the purpose of providing 6 grants to school districts.
- 2. Moneys appropriated to the department for purposes of 8 the grant program shall be used to provide grants to school 9 districts for summer reading loss prevention programs and 10 shall not be transferred, used, obligated, appropriated, or 11 otherwise encumbered, except as provided in this section. 1 12 Notwithstanding 12C.7, subsection 2, interest or earnings on 1 13 moneys appropriated for purposes of the grant program shall be 1 14 retained for purposes of the program.
- 3. For each fiscal year for which moneys are appropriated 1 16 for purposes of the program, such moneys shall be allocated to
- 17 school districts in accordance with the following formula:
  18 a. Fifty percent of the allocation shall be based upon the 1 18 1 19 proportion that the kindergarten through grade three 20 enrollment of a district bears to the sum of the kindergarten 21 through grade three enrollments of all school districts in the 1 22 state as reported for the base year.
- b. Fifty percent of the allocation shall be based upon the 24 proportion that the number of children who are eligible for 1 25 free or reduced price meals under the federal National School 1 26 Lunch Act and the federal Child Nutrition Act of 1966, 42 27 U.S.C. } 1751=1785, in grades one through three of a school 28 district bears to the sum of the number of children who are 1 29 eligible for free or reduced price meals under the federal 30 National School Lunch Act and the federal Child Nutrition Act 1 31 of 1966, 42 U.S.C. } 1751=1785, in grades one through three in 1 32 all school districts in the state for the base year.
- 4. The department shall adopt rules governing the use of 1 33 34 grant funds distributed under this section in accordance with 35 the following:
  - a. A school district shall use the grant funds for 2 students in kindergarten through grade three, giving priority 3 to low=income students.
  - A school district shall have a student to teacher ratio 5 of at least ten to one.
    - c. A school district shall hold a summer program that is five or six weeks long, five days per week, six hours per day.
  - d. A school district shall utilize the dynamic indicators 9 of basic early literacy skills (DIBELS) as one factor in 10 determining the success of the summer program.
- e. A school district's summer program shall incorporate 2 12 2 13 12 the following nine characteristics of effective summer learning programs:
  - (1)Intentional focus on accelerating learning.
- 2 15 2 16 (2) Firm commitment to youth development.
  - Proactive approach to summer learning.
- Strong, empowering leadership. 2 17 (4)
- 2 18 (5) Advanced, collaborative planning.
- (6) Extensive opportunities for staff development.

2 20 Strategic partnerships.

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(8) Rigorous approach to evaluation and commitment to 2 22 program improvement.

(9) Clear focus on sustainability and cost=effectiveness.5. For purposes of this section, "kindergarten through 25 grade three enrollment" means the same as defined in section 26 256D.4.

APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated from the Sec. 28 general fund of the state to the department of education for 29 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 30 2008, the following amount, or so much thereof as is 2 31 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

For the summer reading loss prevention grant program 33 created in section 256.26, as enacted by this Act:

..... \$ 48,000,000 EXPLANATION

This bill establishes a summer reading loss prevention 2 grant program for students in kindergarten through grade 3 three. The grant program is created under the control of the 4 department of education, which is charged with distributing 5 grants to school districts.

The bill requires that the moneys appropriated to the 7 department for purposes of the grant program shall be used to provide grants to school districts for summer reading loss 9 prevention programs, and are not to be transferred, used, 3 10 obligated, appropriated, or otherwise encumbered. However, 11 interest or earnings on moneys appropriated for purposes of 12 the grant program shall be retained for the purposes of the 3 13 grant program.

The bill sets out a formula for distributing the funds 3 15 appropriated for the purposes of the grant program. Fifty 3 16 percent of the funds shall be allocated to school districts 3 17 based on the proportion of kindergarten through grade three 3 18 enrollment a district bears to the sum of the kindergarten 3 19 through grade three enrollments of all districts in the state, 3 20 as reported for the base year. The other 50 percent is 21 allocated based on the proportion of children a school 22 district has who are eligible for free or reduced price meals 3 23 under the federal National School Lunch Act and the federal 24 Child Nutrition Act of 1966 in grades one through three that a 25 district bears to the sum of the qualifying children in grades 26 one through three in all districts in the state, as reported 3 27 for the base year.

The bill also requires that the department of education 29 adopt rules governing the use of grants with at least five 3 30 specific restrictions. First, the school district shall use 31 the grant money for students in kindergarten through grade 32 three and give priority to low=income students. Second, the 33 school district shall have a student to teacher ratio of at 34 least 10 to 1. Third, the school district shall hold a summer 35 program of five to six weeks long, five days a week, and six 1 hours a day. Fourth, the school district shall use the 2 dynamic indicators of basic early literacy skills (DIBELS) as 3 a factor in determining the success of the summer program. 4 Finally, the school district's summer program shall 5 incorporate the following nine characteristics of effective 6 summer learning programs: intentional focus on accelerating 7 learning; firm commitment to youth development; proactive 8 approach to summer learning; strong, empowering leadership; 9 advanced, collaborative planning; extensive opportunities for 10 staff development; strategic partnerships; rigorous approach 11 to evaluation and commitment to program improvement; and clear 4 12 focus on sustainability and cost=effectiveness.

The bill appropriates \$48 million from the general fund of 13 4 14 the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2007, and 4 15 ending June 30, 2008, for the summer reading loss prevention 4 16 grant program.

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
