A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act creating a mechanism for schools, school consortiums,
- 2 and school districts to increase opportunities for
- 3 innovation.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. NEW SECTION. 256I.1 Title.
- 2 This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the
- 3 "Innovation Schools and School Districts Act".
- 4 Sec. 2. NEW SECTION. 256I.2 Findings intent and
- 5 purposes.
- 6 l. Findings. The general assembly finds all of the
- 7 following:
- 8 a. The state's interests are best served by preserving local
- 9 flexibility and granting to the board of directors of each
- 10 school district the control of instruction in the schools they
- ll administer.
- 12 b. Delivery of educational services must be tailored to
- 13 the specific population of students the services are intended
- 14 to serve, and the parents and guardians of those students
- 15 should have every opportunity to participate in determining the
- 16 educational services their children receive.
- 17 c. The principal and faculty employed at a public school
- 18 must be granted the maximum degree of flexibility possible to
- 19 determine the most effective and efficient manner in which to
- 20 meet students' needs.
- 21 d. Upon adopting rules and establishing procedures for
- 22 the implementation of this chapter, the state board and the
- 23 department may implement this chapter without additional state
- 24 funding.
- 25 2. Intent. It is the intent of the general assembly to do
- 26 the following:
- 27 a. Further the goals of high-quality public education
- 28 throughout the state by granting the boards of directors of
- 29 each school district the authority to grant public schools
- 30 within the school district the maximum degree of flexibility
- 31 possible to meet the needs of individual students and the
- 32 communities in which the students live.
- 33 b. Encourage the board of directors of each school district
- 34 to delegate to each public school a high degree of autonomy
- 35 in implementing curriculum, making personnel decisions,

- 1 organizing the school day, determining the most effective
- 2 use of resources, and generally organizing the delivery of
- 3 high-quality educational services, and empowering each public
- 4 school to tailor its services most effectively and efficiently
- 5 to meet the needs of the population of students it serves.
- 6 c. Appropriate to the department moneys sufficient to offset
- 7 the costs incurred by the department and the state board in
- 8 adopting rules and otherwise establishing the procedures for
- 9 implementation of this chapter.
- 10 3. Purposes. It is the intent of this chapter to achieve
- 11 the following purposes:
- 12 a. To grant the state's school districts and public schools
- 13 greater ability to meet the educational needs of a diverse and
- 14 constantly changing student population.
- 15 b. To encourage diverse approaches to learning and education
- 16 within individual schools and school districts.
- 17 c. To improve educational performance through greater
- 18 individual school autonomy and managerial flexibility.
- 19 d. To encourage school districts, where appropriate, to
- 20 create and manage a portfolio of schools that meet a variety
- 21 of education needs, including identifying elementary, middle
- 22 or junior high, and high schools to collectively operate as a
- 23 vertically integrated innovation zone of schools.
- 24 e. To encourage innovation in education by providing
- 25 local school communities and principals with greater control
- 26 over levels of staffing, personnel selection and evaluation,
- 27 scheduling, and educational programming with the goal of
- 28 realizing improved student achievement.
- 29 f. To encourage school districts and public schools to
- 30 find new ways to allocate resources, including but not limited
- 31 to the implementation of specialized school budgets, for the
- 32 benefit of the students the public schools serve.
- g. To hold public schools that receive greater autonomy
- 34 under this chapter accountable for student academic achievement
- 35 in accordance with section 256.7, subsection 21, other more

- 1 specifically tailored accountability measures specified in the
- 2 innovation plan approved pursuant to section 2561.4, and the
- 3 requirements for adequate yearly progress specified under the
- 4 federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Pub. L. No. 107-110,
- 5 and any applicable federal regulations adopted pursuant to the
- 6 federal Act.
- 7 Sec. 3. NEW SECTION. 256I.3 Definitions.
- 8 As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise
- 9 requires:
- 10 1. "Department" means the department of education.
- 11 2. "Director" means the director of the department.
- 12 3. "District of innovation" means a school district that
- 13 is designated as a district of innovation pursuant to section
- 14 2561.7.
- 15 4. "Innovation school" means a public school implementing an
- 16 innovation plan pursuant to section 256I.4.
- 17 5. "Innovation school zone" means a group of public schools
- 18 within a school district for which a local school board
- 19 implements a plan for creating an innovation school zone
- 20 pursuant to section 256I.4.
- 21 6. "Local school board" means the board of directors of a
- 22 school district.
- 7. "Public school" means a school building administered by a
- 24 principal.
- 25 8. "State board" means the state board of education.
- 26 Sec. 4. NEW SECTION. 2561.4 Innovation plans submission
- 27 contents.
- 28 l. A public school within a school district may submit to
- 29 its local school board, or a local school board may develop
- 30 in collaboration with a public school, an innovation plan
- 31 as described in subsection 3. A group of public schools
- 32 within a school district that share common interests, such
- 33 as geographical location or educational focus, or that
- 34 sequentially serve classes of students as they progress through
- 35 elementary and secondary education may jointly submit to their

- 1 local school board a plan to create an innovation school zone 2 as described in subsection 4.
- 2. A local school board shall receive and review each4 innovation plan or plan for creating an innovation school zone
- 5 submitted pursuant to subsection 1. The local school board
- 6 shall either approve or disapprove the innovation plan or plan
- 7 for creating an innovation school zone within sixty days after
- 8 receiving the plan.
- 9 3. If the local school board rejects the plan, the local
- 10 school board shall provide to the public school or group of
- 11 public schools that submitted the plan a written explanation of
- 12 the basis for its decision. A public school or group of public
- 13 schools may resubmit a revised innovation plan or revised plan
- 14 for creating an innovation school zone at any time after the
- 15 initial plan is rejected by the local school board.
- 16 4. If the local school board approves the plan, it may
- 17 proceed to seek designation of the school district as a
- 18 district of innovation pursuant to section 2561.7.
- 19 5. A local school board may initiate and collaborate with
- 20 one or more public schools of the school district to create one
- 21 or more innovation plans as described in subsection 6, or one
- 22 or more plans to create innovation school zones as described
- 23 in subsection 7. In creating an innovation plan or a plan
- 24 to create an innovation school zone, the local school board
- 25 shall ensure that each public school that would be affected
- 26 by the plan has the opportunity to participate in creation
- 27 of the plan. A local school board may approve or create a
- 28 plan to create an innovation school zone that includes all
- 29 of the public schools of the school district. If the local
- 30 school board creates an innovation plan or a plan for creating
- 31 an innovation school zone, the local school board may seek
- 32 designation of the school district as a district of innovation
- 33 pursuant to section 256I.7.
- 34 6. An innovation plan shall include the following
- 35 information:

- 1 a. A statement of the public school's mission and why
- 2 designation as an innovation school would enhance the public
- 3 school's ability to achieve its mission.
- 4 b. A description of the innovations the public school would
- 5 implement, including but not limited to the following:
- 6 (1) Innovations in school staffing.
- 7 (2) Curriculum and assessment.
- 8 (3) Class scheduling.
- 9 (4) Use of financial and other resources.
- 10 (5) Faculty recruitment, employment, evaluation, and
- 11 compensation.
- 12 c. A listing of the programs, policies, or operations within
- 13 the public school that would be affected by the identified
- 14 innovations and the manner in which the public school would be
- 15 affected. The programs, policies, or operations may include
- 16 but need not be limited to the following:
- 17 (1) The research-based educational program the public
- 18 school would implement.
- 19 (2) The length of school day and school year at the public
- 20 school.
- 21 (3) The student promotion and graduation policies to be
- 22 implemented at the public school.
- 23 (4) The public school's academic achievement assessment
- 24 plan.
- 25 (5) The proposed budget for the public school.
- 26 (6) The proposed staffing plan for the public school.
- 27 d. An identification of the improvements in academic
- 28 performance that the public school expects to achieve in
- 29 implementing the innovations.
- 30 e. An estimate of the cost savings and increased
- 31 efficiencies, if any, the public school expects to achieve in
- 32 implementing its identified innovations.
- 33 f. Evidence that a majority of the administrators and a
- 34 majority of the teachers employed at the public school, and a
- 35 majority of the school district's school improvement advisory

- 1 committee consent to designation as an innovation school.
- 2 q. A statement of the level of support for designation as
- 3 an innovation school demonstrated by persons employed at the
- 4 public school other than those listed in paragraph "f'', the
- 5 students and parents of students enrolled in the public school,
- 6 and the community surrounding the public school.
- 7 h. A description of any statutory provisions or
- 8 administrative rules or school district policy requirements
- 9 that would need to be waived pursuant to section 256I.8 for the
- 10 public school to implement its identified innovations.
- i. A description of any provision of the collective
- 12 bargaining agreement in effect for the personnel at the public
- 13 school that would need to be waived in accordance with section
- 14 256I.9 for the public school to implement its identified
- 15 innovations.
- 16 j. Any additional information required by the local school
- 17 board of the school district in which the innovation plan would
- 18 be implemented.
- 19 7. Each plan for creating an innovation school zone,
- 20 whether submitted by a group of public schools or created by
- 21 a local school board through collaboration with a group of
- 22 public schools, shall include the information specified in
- 23 subsection 6 for each public school that would be included in
- 24 the innovation school zone. A plan for creating an innovation
- 25 school zone shall also include the following additional
- 26 information:
- 27 a. A description of how innovations in the public schools
- 28 in the school innovation zone would be integrated to achieve
- 29 results that would be less likely to be accomplished by each
- 30 public school working alone.
- 31 b. An estimate of any economies of scale that would be
- 32 achieved by innovations implemented jointly by the public
- 33 schools within the innovation school zone.
- 34 c. A statement of the level of support for creating an
- 35 innovation school zone demonstrated by persons, other than

- 1 those listed in subsection 6, paragraph "f", employed at each
- 2 public school that would be included in the zone, the students
- 3 and parents of students enrolled in each public school that
- 4 would be included in the zone, and the community in which
- 5 the local school board would approve the innovation school
- 6 zone. In determining the level of support, each public school
- 7 shall specifically solicit input concerning the selection of
- 8 public schools included in the innovation school zone and the
- 9 strategies and procedures that would be used in implementing
- 10 and integrating the innovations within the public schools in
- 11 the zone.
- 12 Sec. 5. NEW SECTION. 2561.5 Areas of innovation.
- 13 l. In considering or creating an innovation plan or a plan
- 14 for creating an innovation school zone, the local school board
- 15 may consider but is not limited to considering the following
- 16 areas of innovation:
- 17 a. Curriculum and academic standards and assessments.
- 18 b. Accountability measures, including but not limited to
- 19 expanding the use of a variety of accountability measures to
- 20 more accurately present a complete measure of student learning
- 21 and accomplishment. The accountability measures adopted by an
- 22 innovation school or an innovation school zone may include but
- 23 need not be limited to the following:
- 24 (1) Use of graduation or exit examinations.
- 25 (2) Use of end-of-course examinations.
- 26 (3) Use of student portfolio reviews.
- 27 (4) Use of national and international accountability
- 28 measures such as the national assessment of educational
- 29 progress and the program for international student assessment.
- 30 (5) Measuring the percentage of students continuing into
- 31 higher education.
- 32 (6) Measuring the percentage of students simultaneously
- 33 obtaining a high school diploma and an associate's degree or a
- 34 career and technical education certificate.
- 35 c. Provision of services, including but not limited to the

- 1 following:
- 2 (1) Special education services.
- 3 (2) Services for gifted and talented students.
- 4 (3) Services for limited English proficient students.
- 5 (4) Educational services for students at risk of academic
- 6 failure, expulsion, or dropping out.
- 7 (5) Support services provided by the department of human
- 8 services or local social services agencies.
- Teacher recruitment, employment, training, preparation,
- 10 and professional development.
- 11 e. Performance expectations and evaluation procedures for
- 12 teachers and administrators.
- 13 f. Compensation for teachers, principals, and other school
- 14 building personnel, including but not limited to performance
- 15 pay plans, total compensation plans, and other innovations with
- 16 regard to retirement and other benefits.
- 17 g. School governance and the roles, responsibilities, and
- 18 expectations of administrators in innovation schools or schools
- 19 within an innovation school zone.
- 20 h. Preparation and counseling of students for transition to
- 21 higher education or the work force.
- 22 Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. 256I.6 Innovation planning and
- 23 financial support.
- 24 Each public school and each local school board is authorized
- 25 to seek and accept public and private gifts, grants, and
- 26 donations to offset the costs of developing and implementing
- 27 innovation plans and plans for creating innovation school
- 28 zones.
- 29 Sec. 7. NEW SECTION. 256I.7 Innovation district designation
- 30 by state board.
- 31 l. Each local school board may seek for its school district
- 32 designation by the state board as a district of innovation. A
- 33 local school board may seek the designation on the basis of
- 34 one or more innovation plans or plans for creating innovation
- 35 school zones approved or collaboratively created by the local

- 1 school board pursuant to section 256I.4.
- A local school board that seeks designation as a district
- 3 of innovation shall submit one or more innovation plans or
- 4 plans for creating an innovation school zone to the director
- 5 for review and comment by the director and the state board.
- 6 Within sixty days after receiving a local school board's plan,
- 7 the director and the state board shall respond to the local
- 8 school board with any suggested changes or additions to the
- 9 plan, including but not limited to suggestions for further
- 10 innovations or for measures to increase the likelihood that the
- ll innovations will result in greater academic achievement within
- 12 the innovation schools or innovation school zones. Based on
- 13 the director's and the state board's comments, the local school
- 14 board may choose to withdraw and resubmit its innovation plan
- 15 or plan for creating an innovation school zone.
- 16 3. Within sixty days after receiving a local school board's
- 17 innovation plan or plan for creating an innovation school
- 18 zone, the state board shall designate the local school board's
- 19 school district as a district of innovation unless the state
- 20 board determines that the submitted plan meets either of the
- 21 following criteria:
- 22 a. The plan is likely to result in a decrease in academic
- 23 achievement in the innovation schools or innovation school
- 24 zones.
- 25 b. The plan is not fiscally feasible.
- 26 4. If the state board does not designate a school district
- 27 as a district of innovation, it shall provide to the local
- 28 school board a written explanation of the basis for its
- 29 decision. The local school board may resubmit a revised
- 30 innovation plan or plan for creating an innovation school
- 31 zone and seek designation of its school district as a school
- 32 district of innovation at any time after denial.
- 33 Sec. 8. NEW SECTION. 2561.8 Waiver of statutory and
- 34 regulatory requirements for districts of innovation.
- 35 l. Upon designation of a district of innovation, the state

- 1 board shall waive any statutes or administrative rules adopted
- 2 by the state board and specified in the school district's
- 3 innovation plan as the statutes or administrative rules pertain
- 4 to the innovation schools or innovation school zones of the
- 5 district of innovation, except that the state board shall not
- 6 waive the following:
- 7 a. Member benefits under chapter 97B or 294.
- 8 b. Administrative rules adopted to implement chapter 285.
- 9 c. The reporting requirements of section 256.7, subsection
- 10 21.
- 11 d. The core curriculum and core content standards
- 12 established pursuant to rules adopted under section 256.7,
- 13 subsections 26 and 28.
- 14 e. The federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Pub. L. No.
- 15 107-110.
- 2. Each district of innovation shall continue to be subject
- 17 to all statutes and administrative rules that are not waived by
- 18 the state board pursuant to subsection 1.
- 19 3. Designation as a district of innovation shall not affect
- 20 a school district's total state school foundation program
- 21 funding or eligibility for funding.
- 22 4. Each district of innovation that receives a waiver
- 23 pursuant to this section shall specify the manner in which
- 24 the innovation school or the schools within the innovation
- 25 school zone shall comply with the intent of the waived statutes
- 26 or rules and shall be accountable to the state for such
- 27 compliance.
- 28 5. If the local school board for a district of innovation
- 29 revises an innovation plan as provided in section 2561.10,
- 30 the local school board may request, and the state board shall
- 31 grant, except as provided in subsection 2, additional waivers
- 32 or changes to existing waivers as necessary to accommodate the
- 33 revisions to the innovation plan.
- 34 6. In requesting a new waiver or a change to an existing
- 35 waiver, the local school board shall demonstrate to the state

- 1 board the consent of a majority of the teachers and a majority
- 2 of the administrators employed at each public school that is
- 3 affected by the new or changed waiver, and a majority of the
- 4 school district's school improvement advisory committee.
- Except as otherwise provided in subsection 5, a waiver
- 6 that is granted pursuant to this section shall continue to
- 7 apply to a public school so long as the public school continues
- 8 to be designated as an innovation school or included in an
- 9 innovation school zone.
- 10 Sec. 9. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. **256I.9** District of innovation —
- 11 collective bargaining.
- 12 1. On and after the date on which the state board designates
- 13 a school district as a district of innovation, any collective
- 14 bargaining agreement initially entered into or renewed by
- 15 the local school board of the district of innovation shall
- 16 include a term that allows each innovation school and each
- 17 innovation school zone in the school district to waive any
- 18 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement identified
- 19 in the innovation plan as needing to be waived for the
- 20 innovation school or the innovation school zone to implement
- 21 its identified innovations.
- 22 2. For an innovation school, waiver of one or more of
- 23 the provisions of the collective bargaining agreement shall
- 24 be based on obtaining the approval, by means of a secret
- 25 ballot vote, of at least sixty percent of the members of the
- 26 collective bargaining unit who are employed at the innovation
- 27 school.
- 28 3. For an innovation school, waiver of one or more of the
- 29 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement shall be
- 30 based on obtaining, at each school included in the innovation
- 31 school zone, the approval of at least sixty percent of the
- 32 members of the collective bargaining unit who are employed at
- 33 the school. The innovation school zone shall seek to obtain
- 34 approval of the waivers through a secret ballot vote of the
- 35 members of the collective bargaining unit at each school

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- 1 included in the innovation school zone. The local school board
- 2 for the innovation school zone may choose to revise the plan
- 3 for creating an innovation school zone to remove from the zone
- 4 any school in which at least sixty percent of the members of
- 5 the collective bargaining unit employed at the school do not
- 6 vote to waive the identified provisions of the collective
- 7 bargaining agreement.
- 8 4. If a local school board, in collaboration with the
- 9 innovation school or the public schools included in the
- 10 innovation school zone, revises the innovation plan as provided
- 11 in section 256I.10 and the revisions include changes to the
- 12 identified provisions of the collective bargaining agreement
- 13 that need to be waived to implement the innovations that are
- 14 included in the innovation plan, the local school board shall
- 15 seek such additional waivers or revision or revocation of the
- 16 existing waivers of provisions of the collective bargaining
- 17 agreement as are necessary to implement the revised innovation
- 18 plan. Any changes to waivers, or additional waivers, of the
- 19 identified provisions of the collective bargaining agreement
- 20 shall be subject to approval in the same manner as provided
- 21 in subsections 2 and 3 for the initial approval of waivers of
- 22 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement.
- 23 5. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4, waiver of
- 24 identified provisions of a collective bargaining agreement for
- 25 an innovation school or the public schools within an innovation
- 26 school zone pursuant to this section shall continue so long as
- 27 the innovation school remains an innovation school or public
- 28 school remains a part of the innovation school zone. A waiver
- 29 approved pursuant to this section shall continue to apply to
- 30 any substantially similar provision that is included in a new
- 31 or renewed collective bargaining agreement for the schools of
- 32 the district of innovation.
- 33 6. A district of innovation shall not be required to seek
- 34 a waiver by an innovation school or a public school in an
- 35 innovation school zone of any provision of the collective

- 1 bargaining agreement. Each district of innovation shall
- 2 include in its innovation plan a statement as to whether it
- 3 will seek a waiver by an innovation school or the public
- 4 schools included in an innovation school zone of any of the
- 5 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement.
- 6 7. A person who is a member of the collective bargaining
- 7 unit and is employed by an innovation school or by a school
- 8 included in an innovation school zone may request a transfer to
- 9 another public school of the district of innovation. The local
- 10 school board shall make every reasonable effort to accommodate
- 11 the person's request.
- 12 Sec. 10. NEW SECTION. 256I.10 Review of innovation schools
- 13 and innovation school zones.
- 14 l. Three years after the local school board of a district of
- 15 innovation approves an innovation plan or a plan for creating
- 16 an innovation school zone, and every three years thereafter,
- 17 the local school board shall review the level of performance of
- 18 the innovation school and each public school included in the
- 19 innovation school zone and determine whether the innovation
- 20 school or innovation school zone is achieving or making
- 21 adequate progress toward achieving the academic performance
- 22 results identified in the school's or zone's innovation plan.
- 23 The local school board, in collaboration with the innovation
- 24 school or the innovation school zone, may revise the innovation
- 25 plan, including but not limited to revising the identification
- 26 of the provisions of the collective bargaining agreement that
- 27 need to be waived to implement the innovations, as necessary
- 28 to improve or continue to improve academic performance at the
- 29 innovation school or innovation school zone. Any revisions to
- 30 the innovation plan shall require the consent of a majority
- 31 of the teachers and a majority of the administrators employed
- 32 at each affected public school and a majority of the school
- 33 advisory council for each affected public school.
- Following review of an innovation school's performance,
- 35 if a local school board finds that the academic performance of

- 1 students enrolled in the innovation school is not improving
- 2 at a sufficient rate, the local school board may revoke the
- 3 school's innovation status.
- 4 3. Following review of the performance of an innovation
- 5 school zone, if a local school board finds that the academic
- 6 performance of students enrolled in one or more of the public
- 7 schools included in the innovation school zone is not improving
- 8 at a sufficient rate, the local school board may remove the
- 9 underperforming public school or schools from the innovation
- 10 school zone or may revoke the designation of the innovation
- 11 school zone.
- 12 Sec. 11. NEW SECTION. 256I.11 Reporting.
- 13 1. The department and the state board shall monitor and
- 14 review the districts of innovation and on or before March 1,
- 15 2011, and on or before March 1 each year thereafter, shall
- 16 submit a report to the governor and to the general assembly
- 17 regarding the performance of the districts of innovation. At a
- 18 minimum, the annual report shall include all of the following:
- 19 a. The number of school districts designated as districts of
- 20 innovation in the preceding academic year and the total number
- 21 of districts of innovation in the state.
- 22 b. The number of innovation schools and the number of
- 23 innovation school zones, including the number of schools in the
- 24 zone, in each district of innovation and the number of students
- 25 served in the innovation schools and innovation school zones,
- 26 expressed as a total number and as a percentage of the students
- 27 enrolled in the district of innovation.
- 28 c. An overview of the innovations implemented in the
- 29 innovation schools and the innovation school zones in the
- 30 districts of innovation.
- 31 d. An overview of the academic performance of the students
- 32 served in innovation schools and innovation school zones in
- 33 each district of innovation, including a comparison between the
- 34 students' academic performance before and since implementation
- 35 of the innovations.

- 1 e. Any recommendations for legislative changes based on the
- 2 innovations implemented or to further enhance the ability of
- 3 local school boards to implement innovations.
- 4 f. Any additional information requested by the governor or a
- 5 member of the general assembly.
- 6 2. The director shall promptly post the annual report
- 7 submitted pursuant to this section on the department's internet
- 8 site.
- 9 EXPLANATION
- 10 This bill creates a mechanism for a public school, a group
- ll of public schools, or a school district to adopt an innovation
- 12 plan or a plan for creating an innovation school zone and
- 13 to submit those plans to the director of the department
- 14 of education and the state board of education for review.
- 15 Unless a plan is likely to result in a decrease in academic
- 16 achievement or is not fiscally feasible, the state board must
- 17 designate the school district as a district of innovation and
- 18 waive any statutes or rules specified in the innovation plan
- 19 except those relating to school transportation, pension and
- 20 annuity retirement benefits for teachers, core curriculum and
- 21 core content standards, and the federal No Child Left Behind
- 22 Act of 2001.
- 23 PURPOSES. The bill establishes Code chapter 2561, to
- 24 be known and cited as the "Innovation Schools and School
- 25 Districts Act". The Code chapter includes the general
- 26 assembly's findings, intent, and purposes. The purposes
- 27 include encouraging intentionally diverse approaches to
- 28 learning and education within individual school districts;
- 29 improving educational performance through greater individual
- 30 school autonomy and managerial flexibility; encouraging school
- 31 districts to create and manage a portfolio of schools to
- 32 collectively operate as a vertically integrated innovation zone
- 33 of schools; encouraging innovation in education by providing
- 34 school communities and principals with greater control over
- 35 levels of staffing, personnel selection and evaluation,

1 scheduling, and educational programming with the goal of 2 achieving improved student achievement; and encouraging school 3 districts and schools to find new ways to allocate resources. PLAN SUBMISSION AND PARTICIPATION. A public school within 5 a school district may submit to its school board, or a school 6 board may create in collaboration with a public school, an 7 innovation plan. A group of public schools within a school 8 district may jointly submit to their school board a plan to 9 create an innovation school zone. If a school board creates a plan, it must ensure that each 10 11 school affected by the plan has the opportunity to participate 12 in creation of the plan. A school board may approve or create 13 a plan to create an innovation school zone that includes all of 14 the public schools of the school district. 15 PLAN APPROVAL PROCESS. The school board has 60 days to 16 review a plan submitted by a school or group of schools. 17 it rejects a plan, it must provide to the school or group of 18 schools a written explanation of the basis for its decision, 19 and the school or group of schools may resubmit a revised plan 20 at any time after denial. If the school board approves a plan, 21 it may proceed to seek designation of the school district as a 22 district of innovation from the state board by submitting the 23 plan to the director for review and comment by the director and 24 the state board. Within 60 days, the director and state board 25 must respond to the school board with any suggested changes or 26 additions to the plan. Based on these comments, the school 27 board may choose to withdraw and resubmit a revised plan. PLAN COMPONENTS. 28 The bill includes a list of the components 29 each plan must contain, including a mission statement; a 30 description of the innovations the school would implement; a 31 listing of the programs, policies, or operational documents 32 within the school that would be affected by the identified 33 innovation and the manner in which the school would be

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34 affected, such as the length of the school day and year, 35 the budget, and the staffing plan; an identification of

- 1 the improvements in academic performance that the school
- 2 expects to achieve; an estimate of cost savings and increased
- 3 efficiencies, if any, the school expects to achieve; evidence
- 4 that a majority of the administrators, teachers, and the
- 5 district's school improvement advisory committee consent to
- 6 designation as an innovation school; a statement of support
- 7 demonstrated by the other persons employed at the school, the
- 8 students and parents of students enrolled in the school, and
- 9 the community surrounding the school; a description of any
- 10 statutory provisions or administrative rules that would need to
- 11 be waived; and a description of any provision of the collective
- 12 bargaining agreement in effect for the personnel at the school
- 13 that would need to be waived.
- 14 A plan for creating an innovation school zone must include
- 15 the same components as that provided for an innovation
- 16 plan, and in addition must include a description of how the
- 17 innovations would achieve results that a school working alone
- 18 would be less likely to accomplish.
- 19 COLLECTIVE BARGAINING. On and after the date on which
- 20 the state board designates a school district as a district
- 21 of innovation, any collective bargaining agreement initially
- 22 entered into or renewed by the school board of the district
- 23 of innovation must include a term that allows each innovation
- 24 school and each innovation school zone in the school district
- 25 to waive any provisions of the collective bargaining agreement
- 26 identified in the plan as needing to be waived.
- 27 Waiver of one or more of the provisions of the collective
- 28 bargaining agreement must be based on obtaining the approval,
- 29 by means of a secret ballot vote, of at least 60 percent of
- 30 the members of the collective bargaining unit who are employed
- 31 at the affected school or at each affected school in the
- 32 innovation school zone. The school board may choose to revise
- 33 the plan to remove from the zone any school in which at least
- 34 60 percent of the members of the collective bargaining unit
- 35 employed at the school do not vote to waive the identified

- 1 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement.
- 2 A district of innovation shall not be required to seek a
- 3 waiver of any provision of the collective bargaining agreement.
- 4 Each district of innovation must include in its plan a
- 5 statement as to whether it will seek a waiver of any of the
- 6 provisions of the collective bargaining agreement.
- 7 A member of the collective bargaining unit who is employed by
- 8 an innovation school may request a transfer to another school
- 9 of the district of innovation and the school board shall make
- 10 every reasonable effort to accommodate the person's request.
- 11 POTENTIAL AREAS OF INNOVATION. The bill includes a list of
- 12 potential areas of innovation that schools and school districts
- 13 may consider.
- 14 FUNDING. A school district's funding or eligibility for
- 15 funding is unaffected by being designated as a district of
- 16 innovation. Schools and school districts are authorized to
- 17 seek and accept public and private gifts, grants, and donations
- 18 to offset the costs of developing and implementing the plans.
- 19 COMPLIANCE WITH STATUTORY AND REGULATORY INTENT. Each
- 20 district of innovation that receives a waiver must specify the
- 21 manner in which the innovation school or the schools within
- 22 the innovation school zone shall comply with the intent of the
- 23 waived statutes or rules and shall be accountable to the state
- 24 for such compliance.
- 25 PERIODIC SCHOOL BOARD REVIEW, REVISION, AND REVOCATION.
- 26 Three years after a plan is approved and every three years
- 27 thereafter the school board must review the level of
- 28 performance of each innovation school and determine whether
- 29 each is achieving or making adequate progress toward achieving
- 30 the academic performance results identified in the plan.
- 31 If a school board finds that the academic performance of
- 32 students enrolled in an innovation school is not improving at
- 33 a sufficient rate, the school board may revoke the school's
- 34 innovation status. The school board, in collaboration with
- 35 the affected school, may also revise the plan as necessary to

- 1 improve or continue to improve academic performance at the
- 2 school. Any revisions to the plan require implementation of
- 3 the same consent process as was required to implement the
- 4 original plan.
- 5 REPORT. The department and the state board are directed to
- 6 monitor and review the districts of innovation and on or before
- 7 March 1, 2011, and on or before March 1 each year thereafter,
- 8 to submit a report to the governor and to the general assembly
- 9 regarding the performance of the districts of innovation. The
- 10 report must also be posted on the department's internet site.
