This bill relates to the issuance of an order or consent 2 3 agreement in a domestic abuse case and provides for a study. The bill extends the period of time that a court may issue 5 an order for counseling, a protective order, or an approved 6 consent agreement from one year to three years upon a finding 7 that a defendant has engaged in domestic abuse. During the 8 three-year period, the court may terminate the order or consent 9 agreement at any time after one year from the issuance of 10 the order or consent agreement upon a petition filed by the 11 defendant and after notice and hearing. In such a case, the 12 defendant has the burden of proving the defendant no longer 13 poses a threat to the safety of the victim, persons residing 14 with the victim, or members of the victim's family. After the 15 three-year period, the court may extend and amend its order or 16 a consent agreement at any time upon petition filed by either

- 18 Current law provides that upon a finding that a defendant
 19 has engaged in domestic abuse, an order for counseling, a
 20 protective order, or an approved consent agreement shall be
 21 issued by the court for up to one year and the court may amend
 22 or extend the order or consent agreement at any time upon
 23 petition by either party.
- The bill requests the legislative council to establish an interim committee to study issues relating to domestic abuse and the issuance and enforcement of protective orders. The interim committee shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the general assembly not later than January 1, 2011.
