Sec. 13. PRESCRIPTION DRUG COSTS. Notwithstanding section 270.7, the department of administrative services shall pay the state school for the deaf and the Iowa braille and sight saving school the moneys collected from the counties during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2010, for expenses relating to prescription drug costs for students attending the state school for the deaf and the Iowa braille and sight saving school. 18 This bill appropriates moneys for fiscal year 2010-2011
19 from the general fund of the state to the college student aid
20 commission, the department for the blind, the department of
21 education, and the state board of regents and its institutions.
22 The bill appropriates to the department for the blind for its
23 administration.

The bill includes appropriations to the college student aid commission for general administrative purposes, student aid programs, forgivable loans and loan forgiveness for students and physicians and surgeons, an initiative directing primary care physicians to areas of the state experiencing physician shortages, the national guard educational assistance program, the teacher shortage loan forgiveness program, the all Iowa opportunity foster care grant and scholarship programs, the registered nurse loan and nurse educator forgiveness program, and the barber and cosmetology arts and sciences tuition grant program.

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1 appropriation for the Iowa work-study program and provides that 2 the amount appropriated for the 2010-2011 fiscal year is zero. The bill appropriates moneys to the department of education 3 4 for purposes of the department's general administration; 5 vocational education administration; division of vocational 6 rehabilitation services including independent living, and the 7 entrepreneurs with disabilities program, and for centers for 8 independent living; state library for general administration 9 and the enrich Iowa program; library service area system; 10 public broadcasting division; regional telecommunications 11 councils; vocational education to secondary schools; school 12 food service; Iowa empowerment fund; expansion of the federal 13 Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act 14 birth through age three services; a four-year-old preschool 15 program; textbooks for nonpublic school pupils; the beginning 16 administrator mentoring and induction program; the core 17 curriculum and career information and decision-making system; 18 the student achievement and teacher quality program; jobs for 19 America's graduates; adult education capacity for dislocated 20 workers; and community colleges and community college salaries. 21 The bill eliminates for FY 2010-2011 a standing 22 appropriation for instructional support state aid, and limits 23 standing appropriations for FY 2010-2011 made for state 24 foundation aid for schools, nonpublic school transportation, 25 and programs for at-risk children. However, the bill 26 appropriates \$100 million from the cash reserve fund to the 27 department of education for state foundation aid.
