A BILL FOR

1 An Act establishing requirements for school districts, area education agencies, postsecondary institutions, and the department of education relating to student testing and remediation services at the secondary level and the alignment of the secondary curricula with the curricula requirements of accredited postsecondary institutions. 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA: Section 1. Section 256.7, subsection 26, paragraph a,
 subparagraph (1), Code Supplement 2011, is amended to read as
 follows:

4 (1) The rules establishing high school graduation 5 requirements shall authorize a school district or 6 accredited nonpublic school to consider that any student 7 who satisfactorily completes a high school-level unit of 8 English or language arts, mathematics, science, or social 9 studies has satisfactorily completed a unit of the high school 10 graduation requirements for that area as specified in this 11 lettered paragraph, and shall authorize the school district 12 or accredited nonpublic school to issue high school credit 13 for the unit to the student. By July 1, 2013, these rules 14 shall also require school districts to administer compass, a 15 computer-adaptive college placement test published by ACT, 16 inc., to all students enrolled in grade eleven. The state 17 board shall establish by rule English or language arts and 18 mathematics proficiency scoring thresholds on the placement 19 test for identifying students in need of academic remediation 20 in English and mathematics. The scoring thresholds shall also 21 be used by area education agencies and school districts to 22 design and implement curriculum alignment activities that lead 23 to better prepared high school graduates.

24 Sec. 2. Section 256.9, subsection 48, Code Supplement 2011, 25 is amended to read as follows:

48. <u>a.</u> Develop and implement a comprehensive management information system designed for the purpose of establishing standardized electronic data collections and reporting protocols that facilitate compliance with state and federal reporting requirements, improve school-to-school and district-to-district information exchanges, and maintain the confidentiality of individual student and staff data. The system shall provide for the electronic transfer of individual student records between schools, districts, postsecondary institutions, and the department. The director may establish,

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1 to the extent practicable, a uniform coding and reporting
2 system, including a statewide uniform student identification
3 system.

4 b. By July 1, 2013, collect, utilizing the statewide 5 longitudinal data system and unique student identifiers, 6 test data from school districts pursuant to section 279.60, 7 subsection 2. Each institution of higher education governed 8 by the state board of regents and each accredited private 9 institution as defined in section 261.9 shall, by July 1, 2013, 10 submit student academic performance data to the department if 11 a student enrolled in the institution has a unique student 12 identifier provided by the department. Data collected shall 13 be shared with the student's school district and the area 14 education agencies in which the school districts are located. 15 With regard to students who have unique student identifiers 16 provided by the department, the director shall collaborate with 17 the postsecondary institutions, area education agencies, and 18 school districts to reach the goal of decreasing the number of 19 students who require postsecondary remediation services in the 20 2012 academic year by twenty-five percent by the 2017 academic 21 year. Sec. 3. Section 273.2, subsection 8, Code Supplement 2011, 22 23 is amended to read as follows: 24 8. The area education agency board shall collaborate 25 with the department of education to provide a statewide 26 infrastructure for educational data to create cost 27 efficiencies, provide storage and disaster mitigation, 28 and improve interconnectivity between schools, and school 29 districts, and, by July 1, 2013, accredited postsecondary 30 institutions. Efforts to improve interconnectivity after 31 July 1, 2013, shall include but not be limited to the 32 identification of deficiencies in school districts' English and 33 mathematics coursework and curricula based on the assessment 34 results submitted to the department of education's statewide 35 longitudinal data system. In addition, the area education

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1 agency boards shall work with the department to provide 2 systemwide coordination in the implementation of the statewide 3 longitudinal data system consistent with the federal American 4 Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The area education 5 agencies shall provide support to school districts' information 6 technology infrastructure that is consistent with the statewide 7 infrastructure for the educational data collaborative.

8 Sec. 4. Section 273.7A, Code 2011, is amended to read as 9 follows:

10 273.7A Services to school districts.

11 <u>1.</u> The board of an area education agency may provide
12 services to school districts located in the area education
13 agency under contract with the school districts. These
14 services may include, but are not limited to, superintendency
15 services, personnel services, business management services,
16 specialized maintenance services, <u>curricula alignment and</u>
17 <u>remediation services</u>, and transportation services. In
18 addition, the board of the area education agency may provide
19 for furnishing expensive and specialized equipment for school
20 districts. School districts shall pay to area education
21 agencies the cost of providing the services.

22 <u>2.</u> The board of an area education agency may also provide 23 services authorized to be performed by area education agencies 24 to other area education agencies in this state and to provide a 25 method of payment for these services.

26 <u>3. a. Beginning July 1, 2012, area education agency 267</u> 27 shall establish a remediation services and curricula alignment 28 pilot project designed to meet the requirements of paragraph 29 <u>b</u>. The services and curricula alignment strategies developed 30 under the pilot project shall be implemented statewide by area 31 education agencies by July 1, 2013. This paragraph is repealed 32 July 1, 2015.

33 b. By July 1, 2013, the board of an area education agency
34 shall make available to school districts located in the
35 area education agency remediation services for students in

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1 grades eleven and twelve, as well as activities and services 2 designed to align school district curricula with postsecondary 3 English and mathematics requirements and decrease the need 4 for remedial coursework at the postsecondary level. The area 5 education agency shall facilitate meetings and the delivery of 6 information between the department of education, postsecondary 7 public institutions, and school districts. The area education 8 agency shall comply with all state and federal privacy laws in 9 order to ensure the confidentiality and appropriate uses of 10 information delivered pursuant to this subsection.

11 Sec. 5. Section 279.60, Code 2011, is amended to read as
12 follows:

13 279.60 Kindergarten assessment — access to data — reports. 1. Each school district shall administer the dynamic 14 15 indicators of basic early literacy skills kindergarten 16 benchmark assessment or other kindergarten benchmark assessment 17 adopted by the department of education in consultation with 18 the early childhood Iowa state board to every kindergarten 19 student enrolled in the district not later than the date 20 specified in section 257.6, subsection 1. The school district 21 shall also collect information from each parent, guardian, 22 or legal custodian of a kindergarten student enrolled in the 23 district, including but not limited to whether the student 24 attended preschool, factors identified by the early childhood 25 Iowa office pursuant to section 2561.5, and other demographic 26 factors. Each school district shall report the results of 27 the assessment and the preschool information collected to 28 the department of education in the manner prescribed by the 29 department not later than January 1 of that school year. The 30 early childhood Iowa office in the department of management 31 shall have access to the raw data. The department shall review 32 the information submitted pursuant to this section and shall 33 submit its findings and recommendations annually in a report to 34 the governor, the general assembly, the early childhood Iowa 35 state board, and the early childhood Iowa area boards.

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2. By July 1, 2013, each school district shall administer
 compass, a computer-adaptive college placement test published
 by ACT, inc., to all students enrolled in grade eleven, and
 shall submit student test results to the statewide longitudinal
 data system. Each student's test results shall be included
 in the annual report submitted in accordance with section
 279.61, subsection 2, and shall provide a comparison between
 the student's scores and the scoring thresholds established
 by the state board of education pursuant to section 256.7,
 subsection 26. Each school district shall use the test
 results to identify students in need of academic remediation in
 English and mathematics and to design and implement curriculum
 alignment activities that lead to better prepared high school
 graduates.

15 Sec. 6. STATE MANDATE FUNDING SPECIFIED. In accordance 16 with section 25B.2, subsection 3, the state cost of requiring 17 compliance with any state mandate included in this Act shall 18 be paid by a school district from state school foundation aid 19 received by the school district under section 257.16. This 20 specification of the payment of the state cost shall be deemed 21 to meet all of the state funding-related requirements of 22 section 25B.2, subsection 3, and no additional state funding 23 shall be necessary for the full implementation of this Act 24 by and enforcement of this Act against all affected school 25 districts.

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EXPLANATION

This bill establishes requirements for school districts, area education agencies (AEAs), postsecondary institutions, and the department of education relating to student testing and remediation at the secondary level and alignment of the secondary curricula with the curricula requirements of accredited postsecondary institutions.

33 The bill directs the state board of education to adopt high 34 school graduation-related rules which by July 1, 2013, require 35 school districts to administer compass, a computer-adaptive

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1 college placement test published by ACT, inc., to all students 2 enrolled in grade 11. The state board must also establish 3 by rule English or language arts and mathematics proficiency 4 scoring thresholds on the placement test for identifying 5 students in need of academic remediation in English and 6 mathematics. The scoring thresholds shall be used by AEAs and 7 school districts to design and implement curriculum alignment 8 activities that lead to better prepared high school graduates. 9 By July 1, 2013, the director of the department of education 10 must collect, utilizing the statewide longitudinal data 11 system and unique student identifiers, the compass test data 12 from school districts. Each public and private accredited 13 postsecondary institution must submit, by July 1, 2013, student 14 academic performance data to the department if a student 15 enrolled in the institution has a unique student identifier 16 provided by the department. Data collected shall be shared 17 with the student's school district and the AEAs in which the 18 school districts are located. The director shall collaborate 19 with postsecondary institutions and school districts to reach 20 the goal of decreasing the number of students who require 21 postsecondary remediation services in the 2012 academic year by 22 25 percent by the 2017 academic year.

Area education agency boards are directed by statute to improve interconnectivity between schools and school districts, and the bill adds to this list, effective July 1, 26 2013, accredited postsecondary education institutions. Such 27 efforts, under the bill, must include but not be limited to the 18 identification of deficiencies in school districts' English and 29 mathematics coursework and curricula based on the assessment 30 results submitted to the department's statewide longitudinal 31 data system. The bill adds curricula alignment and remediation 32 services to the list of services which AEAs may provide to the 33 school districts located within their boundaries.

Beginning July 1, 2012, AEA 267 must establish a remediation 35 services and curricula alignment pilot project designed to meet

2 alignment strategies developed under the pilot project shall be
3 implemented statewide by AEAs by July 1, 2013.

By July 1, 2013, each AEA board shall make available to school districts remediation services for students in grades 11 and 12, as well as activities and services designed to align school district curricula with postsecondary English and mathematics requirements and decrease the need for remedial coursework at the postsecondary level. The AEA shall facilitate meetings and the delivery of information between the department, postsecondary public institutions, and school districts. The AEA must comply with all state and federal privacy laws in order to ensure the confidentiality and appropriate uses of student-related information.

By July 1, 2013, each school district shall include a student's compass test results in the annual report submitted to the student or the student's parent or guardian documenting the student's progress toward meeting the goal of successfully completing the core curriculum and high school graduation requirements, and shall provide a comparison between the student's scores and the scoring thresholds established by the state board. Each school district shall use the test results to identify students in need of academic remediation in English and mathematics and to design and implement curriculum alignment activities that lead to better prepared high school graduates.

This bill may include a state mandate as defined in Code section 25B.3. The bill requires that the state cost of any state mandate included in the bill be paid by a school district from state school foundation aid received by the school district under Code section 257.16. The specification is deemed to constitute state compliance with any state mandate funding-related requirements of Code section 25B.2. The inclusion of this specification is intended to reinstate the requirement of political subdivisions to comply with any state

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1 mandates included in the bill.

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
