Senate Concurrent Resolution 9 - Introduced

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 9

- 1 A Concurrent Resolution urging the United States
- 2 Congress to modernize the Toxic Substances Control
- 3 Act of 1976.
- 4 WHEREAS, children and developing fetuses are
- 5 uniquely vulnerable to the health threats of toxic
- 6 chemicals and early-life chemical exposures have been
- 7 linked to chronic disease later in life; and
- 8 WHEREAS, a growing body of peer-reviewed scientific
- 9 evidence links exposure to toxic chemicals to many
- 10 diseases and health conditions that are rising in
- 11 incidence, including childhood cancers, prostate
- 12 cancer, breast cancer, learning and developmental
- 13 disabilities, infertility, and obesity; and
- 14 WHEREAS, the President's Cancer Panel report
- 15 released in May 2010 stated "the true burden of
- 16 environmentally induced cancers has been grossly
- 17 underestimated" and advised the President "to use
- 18 the power of your office to remove the carcinogens
- 19 and other toxins from our food, water, and air that
- 20 needlessly increase health care costs, cripple
- 21 our nation's productivity, and devastate American
- 22 lives": and
- 23 WHEREAS, states bear an undue burden from
- 24 toxic chemicals, including health care costs and
- 25 environmental damages, disadvantaging businesses that
- 26 lack information on chemicals in their supply chain and
- 27 increasing demands for state regulation; and
- 28 WHEREAS, when the Toxic Substances Control Act

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- 1 of 1976 (TSCA) was passed, about 62,000 chemicals
- 2 in commerce were grandfathered in without any
- 3 required testing for health and safety hazards or any
- 4 restrictions on usage; and
- 5 WHEREAS, in the 35 years since the TSCA was passed,
- 6 the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)
- 7 has required chemical companies to test only about 200
- 8 of those chemicals for health hazards and has issued
- 9 partial restrictions on only five chemicals; and
- 10 WHEREAS, the TSCA has been widely recognized as
- 11 ineffective and obsolete due to legal and procedural
- 12 hurdles that prevent the EPA from taking quick and
- 13 effective regulatory action to protect the public
- 14 against well-known chemical threats; and
- 15 WHEREAS, the National Conference of State
- 16 Legislatures unanimously adopted a resolution on July
- 17 12, 2009, that articulated principles for TSCA reform
- 18 and called on Congress to act to update the law; and
- 19 WHEREAS, the TSCA is the only major federal
- 20 environmental statute that has never been updated or
- 21 reauthorized; and
- 22 WHEREAS, legislation to substantially reform the
- 23 TSCA was introduced during the 109th Congress in 2005,
- 24 the 110th Congress in 2008, and again in the 111th
- 25 Congress in 2010; NOW THEREFORE,
- 26 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE, THE HOUSE OF
- 27 REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING, That the Iowa General
- 28 Assembly encourages the 112th Congress to enact
- 29 federal legislation to modernize the TSCA to strengthen
- 30 chemicals management through policy reforms; and

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- 1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 2 should require chemical manufacturers to prove
- 3 that all existing and new chemicals are not harmful
- 4 to human health, and provide essential health and
- 5 safety information on chemicals to inform the market,
- 6 consumers, and general public; and
- 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 8 should require immediate action to reduce or
- 9 eliminate the worst chemicals, including persistent,
- 10 bioaccumulative, and toxic chemicals and other
- ll priority toxics to which there is already widespread
- 12 exposure; and
- 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 14 should preserve the authority of state and tribal
- 15 governments to operate chemicals management programs
- 16 that are more protective than the federal programs; and
- 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 18 should establish health safety standards for chemicals
- 19 that rely on the best available science to protect
- 20 the most vulnerable among us, such as children and
- 21 developing fetuses; and
- 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 23 should reward innovation by fast tracking approval of
- 24 new, demonstratively safer chemicals, and invest in
- 25 green chemistry research and workforce development to
- 26 boost American business and spur jobs making safer
- 27 alternatives; and
- 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the policy reforms
- 29 should promote environmental justice by developing
- 30 action plans to reduce disproportionate exposure to

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- 1 toxic chemicals in hot spot communities; and
- 2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Chief Clerk of the
- 3 House and the Secretary of the Senate shall forward
- 4 copies of this resolution to all members of Iowa's
- 5 Congressional delegation.
