## A BILL FOR

- An Act relating to the appropriate uses of returning dropout
   and dropout prevention program funding.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

TLSB 5940XS (5) 84 kh/sc 1 Section 1. Section 257.41, Code 2011, is amended to read as
2 follows:

3 257.41 Funding for programs for returning dropouts and 4 dropout prevention.

5 <u>1. Budget.</u> The budget of an approved program for returning 6 dropouts and dropout prevention for a school district, after 7 subtracting funds received from other sources for that purpose, 8 shall be funded annually on a basis of one-fourth or more 9 from the district cost of the school district and up to 10 three-fourths by an increase in allowable growth as defined in 11 section 257.8. Annually, the department of management shall 12 establish a modified allowable growth for each such <u>school</u> 13 district equal to the difference between the approved budget 14 for the program for returning dropouts and dropout prevention 15 for that district and the sum of the amount funded from the 16 district cost of the school district plus funds received from 17 other sources.

18 2. Appropriate uses of funding. Appropriate uses of the 19 returning dropout and dropout prevention program funding 20 include but are not limited to the following: 21 a. Salary and benefits for instructional staff, 22 instructional support staff, and school-based youth services 23 staff who are working with students who are participating 24 in dropout prevention programs, alternative programs, and 25 alternative schools, in a traditional or alternative setting, 26 if the staff person's time is dedicated to working with 27 returning dropouts or students who are deemed, at any time 28 during the school year, to be at risk of dropping out, in 29 order to provide services beyond those which are provided by 30 the school district to students who are not identified as at 31 risk of dropping out. However, if the staff person works 32 part-time with students who are participating in returning 33 dropout and dropout prevention programs, alternative programs, 34 and alternative schools and has another unrelated staff 35 assignment, only the portion of the staff person's time that

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1 is related to the returning dropout and dropout prevention 2 program, alternative program, or alternative school may be 3 charged to the program. For purposes of this paragraph, if 4 an alternative setting is necessary to provide for a program 5 which is offered at a location off school grounds and which 6 is intended to serve student needs by improving relationships 7 and connections to school, decreasing truancy and tardiness, 8 providing opportunities for course credit recovery, or helping 9 students identified as at risk of dropping out to accelerate 10 through multiple grade levels of achievement within a shortened 11 time frame, the tuition costs for a student identified as at 12 risk of dropping out shall be considered an appropriate use of 13 the returning dropout and dropout prevention program funding. 14 b. Professional development for all teachers and staff 15 working with at-risk students and programs involving dropout 16 prevention strategies. c. Research-based resources, materials, software, supplies, 17 18 and purchased services that meet all of the following criteria: 19 (1) Meet the needs of kindergarten through grade twelve 20 students identified as at risk of dropping out and of returning 21 dropouts. 22 (2) Are beyond those provided by the regular school program. 23 (3) Are necessary to provide the services listed in the 24 school district's dropout prevention plan. 25 (4) Will remain with the kindergarten through grade twelve 26 returning dropout and dropout prevention program. 27 d. Up to five percent of the total budgeted amount received 28 pursuant to subsection 1 may be used for purposes of providing 29 district-wide or building-wide returning dropout and dropout 30 prevention programming targeted to students who are not deemed 31 at risk of dropping out. 32 EXPLANATION 33 This bill specifies the appropriate uses of the returning 34 dropout and dropout prevention program funding for school 35 districts. The bill also permits up to 5 percent of the total

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1 budgeted amount received by a school district for programs 2 for returning dropouts and dropout prevention to be used for 3 purposes of providing district-wide or building-wide returning 4 dropout and dropout prevention programming targeted to students 5 who are not deemed at risk of dropping out, and provides 6 that tuition for a program offered off school grounds is an 7 appropriate use.

8 Appropriate uses of funding as specified by the department 9 of education's current administrative rules include salary 10 and benefits for teachers and guidance counselors. The 11 bill includes these items and adds instructional staff, 12 instructional support staff, and school-based youth services 13 staff. The bill also adds that students may be deemed, at 14 any time during the school year, to be at risk of dropping 15 out, which is a qualification for determining the portion of 16 staff time, and resulting payment of salary and benefits from 17 program funds, that is dedicated to and related to the dropout 18 prevention program.

19 The bill also provides that if an alternative setting is 20 necessary to provide for a program which is offered at a 21 location off school grounds and which is intended to serve 22 student needs by improving relationships and connections 23 to school, decreasing truancy and tardiness, providing 24 opportunities for course credit recovery, or helping students 25 identified as at risk of dropping out to accelerate through 26 multiple grade levels of achievement within a shortened time 27 frame, the tuition costs for a student identified as at risk of 28 dropping out shall be considered an appropriate use of program 29 funding.

30 Both the bill and the current administrative rules 31 provide that the following are appropriate uses of funding: 32 professional development for all teachers and staff working 33 with at-risk students and programs involving dropout prevention 34 strategies; and research-based resources, materials, software, 35 supplies, and purchased services that meet specified criteria.

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
