A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to the licensure of orthotists, prosthetists,
- 2 and pedorthists and providing for fees and penalties.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. Section 147.1, subsections 3 and 6, Code 2011, 2 are amended to read as follows:
- 3. "Licensed" or "certified", when applied to a physician
- 4 and surgeon, podiatric physician, osteopathic physician and
- 5 surgeon, physician assistant, psychologist, chiropractor,
- 6 nurse, dentist, dental hygienist, dental assistant,
- 7 optometrist, speech pathologist, audiologist, pharmacist,
- 8 physical therapist, physical therapist assistant, occupational
- 9 therapist, occupational therapy assistant, orthotist,
- 10 prosthetist, pedorthist, respiratory care practitioner,
- 11 practitioner of cosmetology arts and sciences, practitioner
- 12 of barbering, funeral director, dietitian, marital and
- 13 family therapist, mental health counselor, social worker,
- 14 massage therapist, athletic trainer, acupuncturist, nursing
- 15 home administrator, hearing aid dispenser, or sign language
- 16 interpreter or transliterator means a person licensed under
- 17 this subtitle.
- 18 6. "Profession" means medicine and surgery, podiatry,
- 19 osteopathic medicine and surgery, practice as a physician
- 20 assistant, psychology, chiropractic, nursing, dentistry,
- 21 dental hygiene, dental assisting, optometry, speech pathology,
- 22 audiology, pharmacy, physical therapy, physical therapist
- 23 assisting, occupational therapy, occupational therapy
- 24 assisting, respiratory care, cosmetology arts and sciences,
- 25 barbering, mortuary science, marital and family therapy, mental
- 26 health counseling, social work, dietetics, massage therapy,
- 27 athletic training, acupuncture, nursing home administration,
- 28 hearing aid dispensing, or sign language interpreting or
- 29 transliterating, orthotics, prosthetics, or pedorthics.
- 30 Sec. 2. Section 147.2, subsection 1, Code 2011, is amended
- 31 to read as follows:
- 32 1. A person shall not engage in the practice of medicine
- 33 and surgery, podiatry, osteopathic medicine and surgery,
- 34 psychology, chiropractic, physical therapy, physical
- 35 therapist assisting, nursing, dentistry, dental hygiene,

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- 1 dental assisting, optometry, speech pathology, audiology,
- 2 occupational therapy, occupational therapy assisting,
- 3 orthotics, prosthetics, pedorthics, respiratory care,
- 4 pharmacy, cosmetology arts and sciences, barbering, social
- 5 work, dietetics, marital and family therapy or mental health
- 6 counseling, massage therapy, mortuary science, athletic
- 7 training, acupuncture, nursing home administration, hearing aid
- 8 dispensing, or sign language interpreting or transliterating,
- 9 or shall not practice as a physician assistant, unless the
- 10 person has obtained a license for that purpose from the board
- 11 for the profession.
- 12 Sec. 3. Section 147.13, Code 2011, is amended by adding the
- 13 following new subsection:
- 14 NEW SUBSECTION. 24. For orthotics, prosthetics, and
- 15 pedorthics, the board of orthotics, prosthetics, and
- 16 pedorthics.
- 17 Sec. 4. Section 147.14, subsection 1, Code 2011, is amended
- 18 by adding the following new paragraph:
- 19 NEW PARAGRAPH. x. For the board of orthotics, prosthetics,
- 20 and pedorthics, three persons licensed to practice orthotics,
- 21 prosthetics, or pedorthics who have engaged in the practice
- 22 of orthotics, prosthetics, or pedorthics in Iowa for at least
- 23 three years immediately preceding their appointment to the
- 24 board and two members who are not licensed to practice and who
- 25 shall represent the general public.
- Sec. 5. Section 147.74, Code 2011, is amended by adding the
- 27 following new subsection:
- 28 NEW SUBSECTION. 24. a. An orthotist licensed under chapter
- 29 148F may use the words "licensed orthotist" after the person's
- 30 name or signify the same by the use of the letters "L.O." after
- 31 the person's name.
- 32 b. A pedorthist licensed under chapter 148F may use the
- 33 words "licensed pedorthist" after the person's name or signify
- 34 the same by the use of the letters "L.ped." after the person's
- 35 name.

- 1 c. A prosthetist licensed under chapter 148F may use the
- 2 words "licensed prosthetist" after the person's name or signify
- 3 the same by the use of the letters "L.P." after the person's 4 name.
- 5 Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. 148F.1 Title and purpose.
- 6 l. This chapter may be cited and referred to as the
- 7 "Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics Practice Act".
- 8 2. The purpose of this chapter is to provide for the
- 9 regulation of persons offering orthotic, prosthetic, and
- 10 pedorthic services to the public in order to safeguard the
- 11 public health, safety, and welfare.
- 12 Sec. 7. NEW SECTION. 148F.2 Definitions.
- 13 As used in this chapter:
- 14 1. "Board" means the board of orthotics, prosthetics, and
- 15 pedorthics.
- 16 2. "Orthosis" means a custom-fabricated or custom-fitted
- 17 brace or support designed to provide for alignment, correction,
- 18 or prevention of neuromuscular or musculoskeletal dysfunction,
- 19 disease, injury, or deformity. "Orthosis" does not include
- 20 fabric or elastic supports, corsets, arch supports, low
- 21 temperature plastic splints, trusses, elastic hoses, canes,
- 22 crutches, soft cervical collars, dental appliances, or other
- 23 similar devices carried in stock and sold as "over-the-counter"
- 24 items by a drug store, department store, corset shop, or
- 25 surgical supply facility.
- 3. "Orthotic and prosthetic education program" means a course
- 27 of instruction accredited by the commission on accreditation
- 28 of allied health education programs, consisting of both of the
- 29 following:
- 30 a. A basic curriculum of college level instruction in math,
- 31 physics, biology, chemistry, and psychology.
- 32 b. A specific curriculum in orthotic or prosthetic courses,
- 33 including but not limited to:
- 34 (1) Lectures covering pertinent anatomy, biomechanics,
- 35 pathomechanics, prosthetic-orthotic components and materials,

- 1 training and functional capabilities, prosthetic or orthotic
- 2 performance evaluation, prescription considerations, etiology
- 3 of amputations and disease processes necessitating prosthetic
- 4 or orthotic use, and medical management.
- 5 (2) Subject matter related to pediatric and geriatric 6 problems.
- 7 (3) Instruction in acute care techniques, such as immediate
- 8 and early post-surgical prosthetics and fracture bracing
- 9 techniques.
- 10 (4) Lectures, demonstrations, and laboratory experiences
- 11 related to the entire process of measuring, casting, fitting,
- 12 fabricating, aligning, and completing prostheses or orthoses.
- 13 4. "Orthotic and prosthetic scope of practice" means a
- 14 list of tasks, with relative weight given to such factors
- 15 as importance, criticality, and frequency, based on
- 16 internationally accepted standards of orthotic and prosthetic
- 17 care as outlined by the international society of prosthetics
- 18 and orthotics' professional profile for category I and category
- 19 III orthotic and prosthetic personnel.
- 20 5. "Orthotics" means the science and practice of evaluating,
- 21 measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling, fitting,
- 22 adjusting, or servicing an orthosis under an order from a
- 23 licensed physician or podiatric physician for the correction or
- 24 alleviation of neuromuscular or musculoskeletal dysfunction,
- 25 disease, injury, or deformity.
- 26 6. "Orthotist" means a health care professional,
- 27 specifically educated and trained in orthotic patient care,
- 28 who measures, designs, fabricates, fits, or services orthoses
- 29 and may assist in the formulation of the order and treatment
- 30 plan of orthoses for the support or correction of disabilities
- 31 caused by neuromusculoskeletal diseases, injuries, or
- 32 deformities.
- 33 7. "Pedorthic device" means therapeutic shoes, such as
- 34 diabetic shoes and inserts, shoe modifications made for
- 35 therapeutic purposes, below-the-ankle partial foot prostheses,

- 1 and foot orthoses for use at the ankle or below. The term also
- 2 includes subtalar-control foot orthoses designed to manage the
- 3 function of the anatomy by controlling the range of motion of
- 4 the subtalar joint. Excluding pedorthic devices which are
- 5 footwear, the proximal height of a custom pedorthic device
- 6 does not extend beyond the junction of the gastrocnemius and
- 7 the Achilles tendon. "Pedorthic device" does not include
- 8 nontherapeutic inlays or footwear regardless of method of
- 9 manufacture; unmodified, nontherapeutic over-the-counter shoes;
- 10 or prefabricated foot care products.
- 11 8. "Pedorthic education program" means an educational
- 12 program accredited by the national commission on orthotic and
- 13 prosthetic education consisting of all of the following:
- 14 a. A basic curriculum of instruction in foot-related
- 15 pathology of diseases, anatomy, and biomechanics.
- 16 b. A specific curriculum in pedorthic courses, including
- 17 lectures covering shoes, foot orthoses, and shoe modifications,
- 18 pedorthic components and materials, training and functional
- 19 capabilities, pedorthic performance evaluation, prescription
- 20 considerations, etiology of disease processes necessitating
- 21 use of pedorthic devices, medical management, subject matter
- 22 related to pediatric and geriatric problems, and lectures,
- 23 demonstrations, and laboratory experiences related to the
- 24 entire process of measuring and casting, fitting, fabricating,
- 25 aligning, and completing pedorthic devices.
- 9. "Pedorthic scope of practice" means a list of tasks
- 27 with relative weight given to such factors as importance,
- 28 criticality, and frequency based on nationally accepted
- 29 standards of pedorthic care as outlined by the national
- 30 commission on orthotic and prosthetic education comprehensive
- 31 analysis with an empirical validation study of the profession
- 32 performed by an independent testing company.
- 33 10. "Pedorthics" means the science and practice of
- 34 evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling,
- 35 fitting, adjusting, or servicing a pedorthic device under an

- 1 order from a licensed physician or podiatric physician for the
- 2 correction or alleviation of neuromuscular or musculoskeletal
- 3 dysfunction, disease, injury, or deformity.
- 4 ll. "Pedorthist" means a health care professional,
- 5 specifically educated and trained in pedorthic patient
- 6 care, who measures, designs, fabricates, fits, or services
- 7 pedorthic devices and may assist in the formulation of the
- 8 order and treatment plan of pedorthic devices for the support
- 9 or correction of disabilities caused by neuromusculoskeletal
- 10 diseases, injuries, or deformities.
- 11 12. "Prosthesis" means an artificial medical device that
- 12 is not surgically implanted and that is used to replace a
- 13 missing limb, appendage, or any other external human body part
- 14 including an artificial limb, hand, or foot.
- 13. "Prosthetics" means the science and practice of
- 16 evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling,
- 17 fitting, adjusting, or servicing a prosthesis under an order
- 18 from a licensed physician.
- 19 14. "Prosthetist" means a health care professional,
- 20 specifically educated and trained in prosthetic patient care,
- 21 who measures, designs, fabricates, fits, or services prostheses
- 22 and may assist in the formulation of the order and treatment
- 23 plan of prostheses for the replacement of external parts of the
- 24 human body lost due to amputation or congenital deformities or
- 25 absences.
- 26 15. "Resident" means a person who has completed an education
- 27 program in either orthotics or prosthetics and is continuing
- 28 the person's clinical education in a residency accredited by
- 29 the national commission on orthotic and prosthetic education.
- 30 16. "Residency" means an approved supervised program of
- 31 a minimum duration of one year to acquire practical clinical
- 32 training in orthotics or prosthetics in a patient care setting.
- 33 Sec. 8. NEW SECTION. 148F.3 Duties of the board.
- 34 The board shall administer this chapter. The board's duties
- 35 shall include but are not limited to the following:

- 1 l. Adoption of rules to administer and interpret this
- 2 chapter, chapter 147, and chapter 272C with respect to the
- 3 education and licensing of orthotists, prosthetists, and
- 4 pedorthists.
- 5 2. Adoption of rules to establish accepted standards of
- 6 orthotic and prosthetic scope of practice, including the
- 7 classification of devices and supervision of nonlicensed
- 8 caregivers.
- 9 3. Adoption of rules relating to professional conduct and
- 10 licensing and the establishment of ethical and professional
- 11 standards of practice.
- 12 4. Acting on matters concerning licensure and the process
- 13 of applying for, granting, suspending, imposing supervisory
- 14 or probationary conditions upon, reinstating, revoking, or
- 15 renewing a license.
- 16 5. Establishing and collecting licensure fees as provided
- 17 in section 147.80.
- 18 6. Developing continuing education requirements as a
- 19 condition of license renewal.
- 20 7. Evaluating requirements for licensure in other states to
- 21 determine if reciprocity may be granted.
- 22 8. Adoption of rules providing temporary licensing for
- 23 persons providing orthotic, prosthetic, and pedorthic care
- 24 in this state prior to the effective date of this Act. A
- 25 temporary license is good for no more than one year.
- 26 Sec. 9. NEW SECTION. 148F.4 Persons and practices not
- 27 affected.
- 28 This chapter does not prevent or restrict the practice,
- 29 services, or activities of any of the following:
- 30 l. A person licensed in this state by any other law from
- 31 engaging in the profession or occupation for which the person
- 32 is licensed, including but not limited to persons set out in
- 33 section 147.1, subsections 3 and 6.
- A person employed as an orthotics, prosthetics, or
- 35 pedorthics practitioner by the government of the United States

- 1 if that person practices solely under the direction or control
- 2 of the organization by which the person is employed.
- A person pursuing a course of study leading to a degree
- 4 or certificate in orthotics, prosthetics, or pedorthics in an
- 5 educational program accredited or approved according to rules
- 6 adopted by the board, if the activities and services constitute
- 7 a part of a supervised course of study and the person is
- 8 designated by a title which clearly indicates the person's
- 9 status as a student, resident, or trainee.
- 10 Sec. 10. NEW SECTION. 148F.5 Qualifications for licensure
- 11 as orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist.
- 12 1. To qualify for a license to practice orthotics or
- 13 prosthetics, a person shall meet the following requirements:
- 14 a. Possess a baccalaureate degree from a college or
- 15 university.
- 16 b. Have completed the amount of formal training, including
- 17 but not limited to an orthotic and prosthetic education
- 18 program, and clinical practice established and approved by the
- 19 board.
- 20 c. Complete a clinical residency in the professional area
- 21 for which a license is sought in accordance with standards,
- 22 guidelines, or procedures for residencies established and
- 23 approved by the board. The majority of training must be
- 24 devoted to services performed under the supervision of a
- 25 licensed practitioner of orthotics or prosthetics or a person
- 26 certified as a certified orthotist, certified prosthetist,
- 27 or certified prosthetist orthotist whose practice is located
- 28 outside the state.
- 29 d. Pass all written, practical, and oral examinations that
- 30 are required and approved by the board.
- 31 e. Be qualified to practice in accordance with accepted
- 32 standards of orthotic and prosthetic care as established by the
- 33 board.
- 34 2. To qualify for a license to practice pedorthics, a person
- 35 shall meet the following requirements:

- 1 a. Submit proof of a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 2 b. Have completed the amount of formal training, including
- 3 but not limited to a pedorthic education program, and clinical
- 4 practice established and approved by the board.
- 5 c. Complete a qualified work experience program or
- 6 internship in pedorthics that has a minimum of one thousand
- 7 hours of pedorthic patient care experience in accordance
- 8 with any standards, quidelines, or procedures established
- 9 and approved by the board. The majority of training must
- 10 be devoted to services performed under the supervision of a
- 11 licensed practitioner of pedorthics or a person certified as
- 12 a certified pedorthist whose practice is located outside the
- 13 state.
- d. Pass all examinations that are required and approved by
- 15 the board.
- 16 e. Be qualified to practice in accordance with accepted
- 17 standards of pedorthic care as established by the board.
- 18 3. The standards and requirements for licensure established
- 19 by the board shall be substantially equal to or in excess of
- 20 standards commonly accepted in the professions of orthotics,
- 21 prosthetics, or pedorthics, as applicable. The board shall
- 22 adopt rules as necessary to set the standards and requirements.
- 23 4. A person may be licensed in more than one discipline.
- 24 Sec. 11. NEW SECTION. 148F.6 Assistants and technicians.
- 25 l. a. A person shall not work as an assistant to an
- 26 orthotist or prosthetist or provide patient care services or
- 27 fabrication of orthoses or prostheses, unless the work is
- 28 performed under the supervision of a licensed orthotist or
- 29 prosthetist.
- 30 b. An assistant may perform orthotic or prosthetic
- 31 procedures and related tasks in the management of patient care.
- 32 An assistant may also fabricate, repair, and maintain orthoses
- 33 and prostheses.
- 34 2. a. A person shall not work as a technician unless
- 35 the work is performed under the supervision of a licensed

- 1 orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist.
- 2 b. A technician may assist a person licensed under this
- 3 chapter with fabrication of orthoses, prostheses, or pedorthic
- 4 devices but shall not provide direct patient care.
- 5 Sec. 12. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. **148F.7** Limitation on provision of 6 care and services.
- 7 A licensed orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist may provide
- 8 care or services only if the care or services are provided
- 9 pursuant to an order from a licensed physician, a licensed
- 10 podiatric physician, an advanced registered nurse practitioner
- 11 who has a written collaborative agreement with a collaborating
- 12 physician or podiatric physician that specifically authorizes
- 13 ordering the services of an orthotist, prosthetist, or
- 14 pedorthist, an advanced registered nurse practitioner who
- 15 practices in a hospital or ambulatory surgical treatment center
- 16 and possesses clinical privileges to order services of an
- 17 orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist, or a physician assistant
- 18 who has been delegated the authority to order the services of
- 19 an orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist by the assistant's
- 20 supervising physician. A licensed podiatric physician or an
- 21 advanced registered nurse practitioner collaborating with a
- 22 podiatric physician may only order care or services concerning
- 23 the foot from a licensed pedorthist or orthotist.
- 24 Sec. 13. NEW SECTION. 148F.8 Penalties.
- 25 l. If any person, company, or other entity violates a
- 26 provision of this chapter, the attorney general may petition
- 27 for an order enjoining the violation or for an order enforcing
- 28 compliance with this chapter. Upon the filing of a verified
- 29 petition in court, the court may issue a temporary restraining
- 30 order, without notice or bond, and may preliminarily and
- 31 permanently enjoin the violation. If it is established
- 32 that the person, company, or other entity has violated or is
- 33 violating the injunction, the court may punish the offender
- 34 for contempt of court. Proceedings under this section shall
- 35 be in addition to, and not in lieu of, all other remedies and

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- 1 penalties provided in this chapter.
- If a person practices as an orthotist, prosthetist,
- 3 or pedorthist or represents the person as such without being
- 4 licensed under the provisions of this chapter, then any other
- 5 licensed orthotist, pedorthist, or prosthetist, any interested
- 6 party, or any person injured by the person may petition for
- 7 relief as provided in subsection 1.
- 8 3. If a company or other entity holds itself out to provide
- 9 orthotic, prosthetic, or pedorthic services without having
- 10 an orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist licensed under the
- ll provisions of this chapter on its staff to provide those
- 12 services, then any other licensed orthotist, prosthetist,
- 13 or pedorthist or any interested party or injured person may
- 14 petition for relief as provided in subsection 1.
- 15 Sec. 14. Section 272C.1, subsection 6, Code 2011, is amended
- 16 by adding the following new paragraph:
- 17 NEW PARAGRAPH. ag. The board of orthotics, prosthetics, and
- 18 pedorthics, created pursuant to chapter 147.
- 19 Sec. 15. INITIAL BOARD. The initial members of the board of
- 20 orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics established pursuant to
- 21 this Act shall be appointed to the following terms:
- 22 l. Two professional members eligible for licensure and one
- 23 public member shall be appointed for a term of two years.
- 24 2. One professional member eligible for licensure and one
- 25 public member shall be appointed for a term of one year.
- 26 EXPLANATION
- 27 This bill creates new Code chapter 148F that requires
- 28 the licensure of persons offering orthotic, prosthetic, or
- 29 pedorthic services. The bill provides for the establishment of
- 30 a five-member licensing board consisting of three professional
- 31 members and two members who represent the general public.
- 32 The bill provides for fees to fund the board and provides
- 33 penalties for violation of the practice requirement. The
- 34 penalties, including criminal penalties, are set out for all
- 35 health-related boards in Code chapters 147 and 272C. In

- 1 addition to penalties, the bill sets out several procedures for
- 2 enforcing compliance with this licensing law. The attorney
- 3 general may seek a judicial ruling to stop violations. That
- 4 same standing for court action is extended to any licensed
- 5 orthotist, pedorthist, or prosthetist, any interested party, or
- 6 any person injured by the violation. The board is similar in
- 7 composition and responsibilities to the other health-related
- 8 licensing boards.
- 9 Orthotics is the science and practice of evaluating,
- 10 measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling, fitting,
- 11 adjusting, or servicing a custom-fabricated or custom-fitted
- 12 brace or support for the correction or alleviation of
- 13 neuromuscular or musculoskeletal dysfunction, disease, injury,
- 14 or deformity.
- Pedorthics is the science and practice of evaluating,
- 16 measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling, fitting,
- 17 adjusting, or servicing a specially designed shoe or shoe
- 18 insert for the correction or alleviation of neuromuscular or
- 19 musculoskeletal dysfunction, disease, injury, or deformity.
- 20 Prosthetics is the science and practice of evaluating,
- 21 measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling, fitting,
- 22 adjusting, or servicing an artificial medical device that is
- 23 not surgically implanted and that is used to replace a missing
- 24 limb, appendage, or any other external human body part.
- 25 The bill provides qualifications for licensure as an
- 26 orthotist, prosthetist, or pedorthist and requirements for
- 27 assistants and technicians to be supervised by such licensees.
