## Senate Study Bill 3092 - Introduced

## A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to the regulation of persons offering
- 2 occupational therapy services and making penalties
- 3 applicable.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. Section 148B.2, subsection 2, Code 2011, is 2 amended to read as follows: 2. "Occupational therapy" means the therapeutic application 3 4 of specific tasks used for the purpose of evaluation and 5 treatment of problems interfering with functional performance 6 in persons impaired by physical illness or injury, emotional 7 disorder, congenital or developmental disability, or the aging 8 process in order to achieve optimum function, for maintenance 9 of health and prevention of disability use of occupations, 10 including everyday life activities with individuals, groups, 11 populations, or organizations to support participation, 12 performance, and function in roles and situations in home, 13 school, workplace, community, and other settings. Occupational 14 therapy services are provided for habilitation, rehabilitation, 15 and the promotion of health and wellness to those who have 16 or are at risk for developing an illness, injury, disease, 17 disorder, condition, impairment, disability, activity 18 limitation, or participation restriction. Occupational 19 therapy addresses the physical, cognitive, psychosocial, 20 sensory-perceptual, and other aspects of performance in a 21 variety of contexts and environments to support engagement in 22 occupations that affect physical and mental health, well-being, 23 and quality of life. 24 Sec. 2. Section 148B.3, subsection 5, Code 2011, is amended

26 Sec. 3. Section 148B.3, subsection 6, Code 2011, is amended 27 to read as follows:

6. A nonresident performing occupational therapy services in the state who is not licensed under this chapter, if the services are performed for not more than <u>ninety</u> <u>thirty</u> days in a calendar year in association with an occupational therapist licensed under this chapter, and <u>the nonresident meets either</u> of the following requirements:

34 *a.* The nonresident is licensed under the law of another 35 state which has licensure requirements at least as stringent as

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1 the requirements of this chapter, or.

*b.* The nonresident meets the requirements for certification as an occupational therapist registered (O.T.R.), or a certified occupational therapy assistant (C.O.T.A.) sestablished by the American <u>national board for certification in</u>

6 occupational therapy association.

7 Sec. 4. Section 148B.4, Code 2011, is amended to read as 8 follows:

9 148B.4 Limited permit.

1. A limited permit to practice occupational therapy may 10 11 be granted to persons a person who have has completed the 12 education and experience academic and field work requirements 13 of for occupational therapists under this chapter and has 14 not yet taken or received the results of the entry-level 15 certification examination. This permit shall A permit granted 16 pursuant to this subsection shall be valid for a period of 17 time as determined by the board by rule and shall allow the 18 person to practice occupational therapy under the direction 19 and appropriate supervision of a licensed an occupational 20 therapist and shall be valid until the date on which the 21 results of the next qualifying examination have been made 22 public licensed under this chapter. This The permit shall 23 expire when the person is issued a license under section 148B.5 24 or if the person is notified that the person did not pass the 25 examination. The limited permit shall not be renewed if the 26 applicant has failed the examination. 27 2. A limited permit to assist in the practice of 28 occupational therapy may be granted to a person who has 29 completed the academic and field work requirements for 30 occupational therapy assistants under this chapter and has 31 not yet taken or received the results of the entry-level 32 certification examination. A permit granted pursuant to this 33 subsection shall be valid for a period of time as determined 34 by the board by rule and shall allow the person to assist in 35 the practice of occupational therapy under the direction and

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1 appropriate supervision of an occupational therapist licensed

2 under this chapter. The permit shall expire when the person 3 is issued a license under section 148B.5 or if the person is 4 notified that the person did not pass the examination. The 5 limited permit shall not be renewed. Sec. 5. Section 148B.6, Code 2011, is amended to read as 6 7 follows: 8 148B.6 Waiver of requirements for licensing. 9 1. The board may waive the examination and grant a 10 license to: 1. To a person certified prior to January 1, 1981, as an 11 12 occupational therapist registered (O.T.R.) or a certified 13 occupational therapy assistant (C.O.T.A.) by the American 14 Occupational Therapy Association occupational therapy 15 association. 16 2. The board shall waive the education and experience 17 requirements for licensure in section 148B.5, subsections 18 1 and 2, for applicants for a license who present evidence 19 to the board that they have been engaged in the practice of 20 occupational therapy on and prior to January 1, 1981. Proof 21 of actual practice shall be presented to the board in a manner 22 as it prescribes by rule. To obtain the benefit of this 23 waiver, an applicant must successfully complete the examination 24 within one year from January 1, 1981. However, the waiver is 25 conditional upon the applicant satisfying the education and 26 experience requirements of section 148B.5, subsections 1 and 27 2, within five years of the waiver being granted and if those 28 requirements are not satisfied at the expiration of those five 29 years the board shall revoke the license. 30 3. 2. The board may waive the examination and grant a 31 license to To an applicant who presents proof of current 32 licensure as an occupational therapist or occupational therapy 33 assistant in another state, the District of Columbia, or a 34 territory of the United States which requires standards for 35 licensure considered by the board to be equivalent to the

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1 requirements for licensure of this chapter.

2 Sec. 6. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 148B.8 Unlawful practice. 3 1. A person shall not practice occupational therapy or 4 assist in the practice of occupational therapy, provide 5 occupational therapy services, hold oneself out as an 6 occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant or 7 as being able to practice occupational therapy or assist in 8 the practice of occupational therapy, or provide occupational 9 therapy services in this state unless the person is licensed 10 under this chapter.

11 2. It is unlawful for any person not licensed as an 12 occupational therapist in this state or whose license is 13 suspended or revoked to use in connection with the person's 14 name or place of business in this state the words "occupational 15 therapist", "licensed occupational therapist", or any word, 16 title, letters, or designation that implies that the person is 17 an occupational therapist.

18 3. It is unlawful for any person not licensed as an 19 occupational therapy assistant in this state or whose license 20 is suspended or revoked to use in connection with the person's 21 name or place of business in this state, the words "occupational 22 therapy assistant", "licensed occupational therapy assistant", or 23 any word, title, letters, or designation that implies that the 24 person is an occupational therapy assistant.

Sec. 7. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 148B.9 False use of titles prohibited. A person or business entity, including the employees, agents, or representatives of the business entity, shall not use in connection with that person or business entity's business activity, the words "occupational therapy", °occupational therapist", "licensed occupational therapist", 'occupational therapist registered", "doctor of occupational therapy", "occupational therapy assistant", "licensed occupational therapy assistant", "licensed cocupational therapy assistant", "O.T./L.", 'O.T.R./L.", "O.T.D.", "O.T.A.", "O.T.A./L.", "C.O.T.A.", or

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1 any words, abbreviations, or insignia indicating or implying 2 that occupational therapy is provided or supplied unless such 3 services are provided by or under the direction and supervision 4 of an occupational therapist licensed pursuant to this chapter. 5 EXPLANATION

6 This bill amends Code chapter 148B, regulating persons 7 offering occupational therapy services. The bill amends the 8 definition of "occupational therapy" to mean the therapeutic 9 use of occupations, including everyday life activities to 10 support participation, performance, and function in roles and ll situations in a variety of settings. The bill states that 12 occupational therapy services are provided for habilitation, 13 rehabilitation, and the promotion of health and wellness. The 14 bill states that occupational therapy addresses physical, 15 cognitive, psychosocial, sensory-perceptual, and other aspects 16 of performance to support engagement in occupations that affect 17 physical and mental health, well-being, and quality of life. The bill strikes Code section 148B.3(5), regarding the 18 19 limited practice of a nonresident performing occupational 20 therapy services in the state. The bill amends Code section 21 148B.3(6) to decrease the number of days in which a nonresident 22 performing occupational therapy services in the state who is 23 not licensed under Code chapter 148B can perform services in 24 a calendar year from 90 to 30 days. The bill also amends Code 25 section 148B.3(6) to provide that a nonresident practicing in 26 the state without a license pursuant to the Code chapter must 27 meet the requirements for certification as an occupational 28 therapist or a certified occupational therapy assistant 29 established by the national board for certification in 30 occupational therapy.

The bill amends Code section 148B.4 to state that a limited permit to practice occupational therapy or to assist in the practice of occupational therapy may be granted to a person who has completed the academic and field work requirements, but has not taken or has not received results from the entry-level

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1 certification examination. The limited permit is valid for a 2 period determined by the board by rule and allows a person to 3 practice occupational therapy, or to assist in the practice 4 of occupational therapy, under the direction and appropriate 5 supervision of an occupational therapist licensed under the 6 Code chapter. The limited permit expires when the person is 7 issued a license under Code section 148B.5 or the person is 8 notified that the person did not pass the examination. The 9 limited permit may not be renewed.

10 The bill amends Code section 148B.6 by striking a provision 11 regarding the waiver of the education and experience 12 requirements for licensure of applicants who present evidence 13 of engagement in the practice of occupational therapy on or 14 prior to January 1, 1981.

15 The bill provides that it is unlawful for a person to 16 practice occupational therapy or to assist in that practice, 17 or claim to be an occupational therapist or occupational 18 therapy assistant, or claim to practice occupational therapy 19 or assist in the practice of occupational therapy, or provide 20 occupational therapy services in the state without a license. 21 The bill specifies that a person not licensed in the state 22 as an occupational therapist or an assistant in the practice 23 of occupational therapy shall not use words that would imply 24 the person is an occupational therapist or an assistant to an 25 occupational therapist.

The bill also specifies that a person shall not use words or other abbreviations in connection with that person's business activity that would imply that occupational therapy is provided unless the services are provided under the direction and supervision of an occupational therapist licensed under Code chapter 148B.

A person who violates this bill may be subject to licensing 33 sanctions and, unless a specific penalty is otherwise provided, 34 is guilty of a serious misdemeanor pursuant to Code section 35 147.86.

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
