1 An Act prohibiting the department of public safety from
expending moneys appropriated to the department for purposes
of enforcing any new federal law or executive order of the
president of the United States that prohibits the sale,
transfer, or possession of firearms, firearm accessories,
or ammunition, and including effective date and retroactive
applicability provisions.
8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 80.22A Expenditure restriction
2 — firearms.

3 The department of public safety shall not expend any of the 4 state or federal moneys appropriated to the department for 5 purposes of enforcing any federal law enacted or executive 6 order of the president of the United States issued on or 7 after January 1, 2013, that prohibits the sale, transfer, or 8 possession of firearms, firearm accessories, or ammunition. 9 The expenditure restriction in this section shall include but 10 is not limited to expenditures from appropriations associated 11 with the use of personnel, land or air vehicles, buildings, 12 equipment including communications equipment, and weapons of 13 the department.

14 Sec. 2. EFFECTIVE UPON ENACTMENT. This Act, being deemed of 15 immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.

16 Sec. 3. RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY. This Act applies
17 retroactively to January 1, 2013.

EXPLANATION

19 This bill prohibits the department of public safety 20 from expending state or federal moneys appropriated to the 21 department for purposes of enforcing any federal law or 22 executive order of the President of the United States enacted 23 on or after January 1, 2013, that prohibits the sale, transfer, 24 or possession of firearms, firearm accessories, or ammunition. 25 The expenditure restriction includes but is not limited to 26 expenditures from appropriations associated with the use of 27 personnel, land or air vehicles, buildings, equipment including 28 communications equipment, and weapons of the department.

The bill provides an immediate effective date and applies retroactively to January 1, 2013.
