**A BILL FOR**

1 An Act relating to the funding of, the operation of, and  
2 appropriation of moneys to the college student aid  
3 commission, the department for the blind, the department  
4 of education, the economic development authority, the  
5 department of workforce development, and the state board of  
6 regents, and providing for related matters.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

27 board shall establish a submission deadline for the annual  
28 budget and any budget amendments that allow a reasonable period  
29 of time for preparation by the early childhood Iowa area boards  
30 and for review and approval or request for modification of  
31 the materials by the early childhood Iowa state board. In  
32 addition, each early childhood Iowa area board must continue to  
33 comply with reporting provisions and other requirements adopted  
34 by the early childhood Iowa state board in implementing section  
35 256I.9.



1 c. Of the amount appropriated in this subsection for

12 aid programs, the loan repayment program for health care  
13 professionals, the national guard educational assistance  
14 program, the teacher shortage loan forgiveness program, the all  
15 Iowa opportunity foster care grant and scholarship programs,  
16 the registered nurse and nurse educator loan forgiveness  
17 program, the barber and cosmetology arts and sciences tuition  
18 grant program, the teach Iowa scholar program, and for the  
19 rural Iowa primary care and rural Iowa advanced registered  
20 nurse practitioner and physician assistant loan repayment  
21 programs.

22 The bill modifies the standing appropriations for  
23 Iowa tuition grants for students attending nonprofit and  
24 for-profit institutions and for Iowa tuition grants for  
25 vocational-technical tuition grants.

26 The bill appropriates moneys to the department of education  
27 for purposes of the department's general administration,  
28 vocational education administration, division of vocational  
29 rehabilitation services including independent living and the  
30 entrepreneurs with disabilities program and independent living  
31 centers, state library for general administration and the  
32 enrich Iowa program, public broadcasting division, vocational  
33 education to secondary schools, school food service, early  
34 childhood Iowa fund, expansion of the federal Individuals  
35 with Disabilities Education Improvement Act birth through



1 age three services, early head start projects, textbooks  
2 for nonpublic school pupils, the core curriculum and career  
3 information and decision-making system, the student achievement  
4 and teacher quality program, jobs for America's graduates  
5 specialists, education reform, successful progression for early  
6 readers, the Iowa reading research center, competency-based  
7 education, bullying prevention training materials, regional  
8 telecommunications councils, distribution to the midwestern  
9 higher education compact to pay Iowa's member state annual  
10 obligation, and community colleges.

11 From the moneys appropriated for education reform, the  
12 bill allocates moneys to develop and implement a coaching and  
13 support system for administrators, to support the Iowa online  
14 state job posting system initiative, for purposes relating  
15 to the attendance center performance rankings developed by  
16 the department, to support implementation of the proposed  
17 model for an extended learning time pilot project developed  
18 by the department, for an English language literacy for all  
19 grant pilot program, and for the costs of providing department  
20 support to education task forces, commissions, and councils  
21 established in 2013 legislation.

22 The bill also limits the standing unlimited appropriation  
23 established in Code section 285.2 for purposes of paying  
24 nonpublic school transportation claims to not more than  
25 \$8,560,931.

26 The bill reduces state aid for area education agencies  
27 for the 2014-2015 fiscal year by \$15 million; reduces from  
28 \$50 million to \$1.3 million for the 2014-2015 fiscal year  
29 the moneys allocated for purposes of teacher leadership  
30 supplemental aid payments to school districts for implementing  
31 the career paths, leadership roles, and compensation framework  
32 or comparable system; increases from \$700,000 to \$2 million  
33 for fiscal year 2014-2015 the moneys allocated to the  
34 department for the development of a delivery system to assist  
35 in implementing the career paths and leadership roles; and

1 eliminates an allocation of \$10 million for the 2014-2015  
2 fiscal year to be used for purposes of implementing the  
3 supplemental assistance for high-need schools.

4 The bill appropriates moneys to the state board of regents  
5 for the board office, universities' general operating budgets;  
6 the southwest Iowa regents resource center; the northwest Iowa  
7 regents resource center; the quad-cities graduate studies  
8 center; Iowa public radio; the state university of Iowa; Iowa  
9 state university of science and technology; the university of  
10 northern Iowa; and for the Iowa school for the deaf and the  
11 Iowa braille and sight saving school, including tuition and  
12 transportation costs for students residing in the schools and  
13 licensed classroom teachers.

14 FY 2014-2015 — WORKFORCE TRAINING PROGRAMS. The bill  
15 appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker and job  
16 creation fund to the department of education, the economic  
17 development authority, regents institutions, the college  
18 student aid commission, and the department of workforce  
19 development for workforce training purposes.

20 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker  
21 and job creation fund to the department of education for  
22 deposit in the workforce training and economic development  
23 funds; for distribution to community colleges for the purposes  
24 of implementing adult education and literacy programs as  
25 provided for by the bill; for certain accelerated career  
26 education program capital projects at community colleges; for  
27 deposit in the pathways for academic career and employment  
28 fund; for deposit in the gap tuition assistance fund; for  
29 deposit in the statewide work-based learning intermediary  
30 network fund; and for support costs associated with  
31 administering a workforce preparation outcome reporting system.

32 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker  
33 and job creation fund to the economic development authority for  
34 the purposes of providing assistance under the high quality  
35 jobs program.

1 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker  
2 and job creation fund to the state board of regents for  
3 capacity building infrastructure in areas related to technology  
4 commercialization, marketing and business development  
5 efforts in areas related to technology commercialization,  
6 entrepreneurship, and business growth, and infrastructure  
7 projects and programs needed to assist in implementation of  
8 activities relating to commercialization of research.

9 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker  
10 and job creation fund to the college student aid commission  
11 for purposes of providing skilled workforce shortage tuition  
12 grants.

13 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled  
14 worker and job creation fund to the department of workforce  
15 development to develop a long-term sustained program to  
16 train unemployed and underemployed central Iowans with skills  
17 necessary to advance to higher-paying jobs with full benefits.
