A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to the licensure of acupuncturists.
- 2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

H.F. 581

- 1 Section 1. Section 148E.1, Code 2015, is amended by adding
- 2 the following new subsections:
- 3 NEW SUBSECTION. 1A. "Acupuncture needle" means a solid core
- 4 instrument including but not limited to acupuncture needles,
- 5 dermal needles, intradermal needles, press tacks, plum blossom
- 6 needles, prismatic needles, and disposable lancets.
- 7 NEW SUBSECTION. 1B. "Acupuncture point" means a specific
- 8 anatomical location on the human body that serves as a
- 9 treatment site for using acupuncture.
- 10 NEW SUBSECTION. 2A. "Ashi acupuncture point" means an
- 11 acupuncture point that is located according to tenderness upon
- 12 palpation. "Ashi acupuncture point" is also known as a trigger
- 13 point.
- 14 NEW SUBSECTION. 3A. "Licensee" means a person holding a
- 15 license to practice acupuncture granted by the board pursuant
- 16 to this chapter.
- 17 NEW SUBSECTION. 3B. "Meridians" means connected points
- 18 across the human anatomy that affect a specific organ or other
- 19 part of the body.
- Sec. 2. Section 148E.1, subsections 1 and 4, Code 2015, are
- 21 amended to read as follows:
- 22 1. "Acupuncture" means a form of health care developed
- 23 from traditional and modern oriental medical concepts that
- 24 employs acupuncture, oriental medical diagnosis and treatment,
- 25 and adjunctive therapies and diagnostic techniques, for the
- 26 promotion, maintenance, and restoration of health and the
- 27 prevention of disease.
- 28 4. "Practice of acupuncture" means the insertion of
- 29 acupuncture needles and the application of moxibustion to
- 30 specific areas of the human body based upon oriental medical
- 31 diagnosis as a primary mode of therapy. Adjunctive therapies
- 32 within the scope of acupuncture may include manual, mechanical,
- 33 thermal, electrical, and electromagnetic treatment, and the
- 34 recommendation of dietary guidelines and therapeutic exercise
- 35 based on traditional oriental medicine concepts:

- 1 a. The stimulation or piercing of the skin with an
- 2 acupuncture needle for any of the following purposes:
- 3 (1) To evoke a therapeutic physiological response, either
- 4 locally or distally to the area of insertion or stimulation.
- 5 (2) To relieve pain or treat the neuromusculoskeletal
- 6 system.
- 7 (3) To stimulate ashi points to relieve pain and
- 8 dysfunction.
- 9 (4) To promote, maintain, and restore health, and prevent
- 10 disease.
- 11 (5) To stimulate the body according to auricular, hand,
- 12 nose, face, foot, or scalp acupuncture therapy.
- 13 (6) To use acupuncture needles with or without the use of
- 14 herbs, electric current, or application of heat.
- 15 b. The use of oriental medical diagnosis and treatment,
- 16 including:
- 17 (1) Moxibustion, cupping, thermal methods, magnets, gua sha
- 18 scraping techniques, acupatches, herbal poultices, hot and cold
- 19 packs, electromagnetic wave therapy, light and color therapy,
- 20 sound therapy, or therapy lasers.
- 21 (2) Massage, acupressure, reflexology, shiatsu and tui na
- 22 massage, or manual stimulation, including stimulation by an
- 23 instrument or mechanical device that does not pierce the skin.
- 24 (3) Herbal medicine and dietary supplements, including
- 25 those of plant, mineral, animal, and nutraceutical origin.
- 26 c. Any other adjunctive service or procedure that is
- 27 clinically appropriate based on the licensee's training
- 28 as approved by the national certification commission for
- 29 acupuncture and oriental medicine or the accreditation
- 30 commission for acupuncture and oriental medicine.
- 31 Sec. 3. Section 148E.2, subsection 1, paragraph b, Code
- 32 2015, is amended to read as follows:
- 33 b. Successful completion of a three-year postsecondary
- 34 training program or acupuncture college program which is
- 35 accredited by, in candidacy for accreditation by, or which

- 1 meets the standards of the national accreditation commission
- 2 for schools and colleges of acupuncture and oriental medicine
- 3 accreditation commission for acupuncture and oriental medicine.
- 4 Sec. 4. Section 148E.3, Code 2015, is amended by adding the
- 5 following new subsection:
- 6 NEW SUBSECTION. 3. A licensed professional utilizing
- 7 acupuncture as long as the licensed professional acts within
- 8 the professional's lawful scope of practice.
- 9 EXPLANATION
- The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.
- 12 This bill expands the definition of the practice of
- 13 acupuncture under Code chapter 148E and adds definitions
- 14 related to the practice of acupuncture. The bill updates the
- 15 name of the accreditation organization for the practice of
- 16 acupuncture. The bill exempts from Code chapter 148E licensed
- 17 professionals utilizing acupuncture within the scope of
- 18 practice for the professional.
