A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to state
2 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa
3 infrastructure fund, the state bond repayment fund, the
4 technology reinvestment fund, and the prison bonding fund,
5 providing for related matters, and including effective date
6 and retroactive applicability provisions.
7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

DIVISION I

REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —

4 APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa
5 infrastructure fund to the following departments and agencies
6 for the following fiscal years, the following amounts, or so
7 much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
8 designated:

9 1. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

10 a. For major maintenance projects included on the
11 department of administrative services unfunded major
12 maintenance project requests list issued for the third quarter
13 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30,
14 2016:

15 FY 2016-2017:

16 \$ 11,250,000

17 However, of the moneys appropriated in this subsection,
18 \$100,000 is allocated for the costs of major maintenance of
19 monuments without dedicated funds available for maintenance and
20 restoration, subject to a requirement that moneys shall not be
21 allocated unless a match of at least \$2 for each \$1 allocated
22 is received from private sources.

23 b. For costs associated with improvements to and renovation
24 of the Wallace building for extending the useful life of the
25 building:

28 2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

29 a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative
30 fund created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting
31 the water quality initiative administered by the soil
32 conservation division as provided in section 466B.42, including
33 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
34 notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

2 (2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
3 paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in
4 subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part
5 of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources
6 coordinating council established pursuant to section 466B.3.

7 (b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
8 shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
9 generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the
10 division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water
11 resources coordinating council established pursuant to section
12 466B.3.

13 (c) Of the moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph,
14 \$450,000 is allocated to the Iowa nutrient research center at
15 Iowa state university of science and technology for nutrient
16 water monitoring network technology and equipment. Of the
17 moneys allocated in this subparagraph division, not more than
18 \$150,000 may be used for the operations and maintenance of the
19 nutrient water monitoring network.

20 (3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds
21 as provided in subparagraph (2), subparagraph divisions (a) and
22 (b), all of the following shall apply:

23 (a) The demonstration projects shall utilize water quality
24 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
25 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
26 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
27 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
28 state university of science and technology.

29 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
30 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
31 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
32 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
33 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
34 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
35 located within the same subwatershed.

1 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
2 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. However, the
3 state's share of the amount shall not exceed 50 percent of the
4 estimated cost of establishing the practice as determined by
5 the division or 50 percent of the actual cost of establishing
6 the practice, whichever is less.

7 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
8 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
9 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
10 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
11 establish water quality practices on their agricultural land.

12 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
13 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
14 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
15 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
16 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
17 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
18 land shall be a confidential record.

19 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
20 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
21 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in
22 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
23 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
24 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
25 high-priority watersheds.

26 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
27 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
28 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

29 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
30 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
31 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
32 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
33 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
34 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
35 basis as provided in chapter 161A.

1 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
2 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
3 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
4 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
5 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
6 source.

7 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
8 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
9 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
10 by the soil conservation division.

11 b. For deposit in the agricultural drainage well water
12 quality assistance fund created in section 460.303 for
13 purposes of supporting the agricultural drainage well water
14 quality assistance program as provided in section 460.304,
15 notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

5 NEW SUBPARAGRAPH. (6) When restored, will contribute to the
6 department's fish and wildlife conservation plans.

7 Sec. 17. Section 456A.33B, subsection 2, paragraphs a and b,
8 Code 2016, are amended to read as follows:

9 a. The department, with input from stakeholders, shall
10 ~~develop~~ maintain an initial annual list of not more than
11 thirty-five significant public lakes and not more than five
12 public shallow lakes or wetlands to be considered for funding
13 based on the feasibility of restoring each lake and the use or
14 potential use of the lake, if restored. The list shall include
15 lake projects under active development that the department
16 shall recommend be given priority for funding so long as
17 progress toward completion of the projects remains consistent
18 with the goals of this section.

19 b. The department shall meet with stakeholders and
20 representatives of communities where lakes on the ~~initial~~
21 annual list are located to provide an ~~initial~~ annual lake
22 restoration assessment and to explain the process and criteria
23 for receiving lake restoration funding. Communities with
24 lakes not included on the ~~initial~~ annual list may petition the
25 director of the department for a preliminary lake restoration
26 assessment and explanation of the funding process and criteria.
27 The department shall work with stakeholders and representatives
28 of each community to develop a joint lake restoration action
29 plan. At a minimum, each joint action plan shall document the
30 causes, sources, and magnitude of lake impairment, evaluate
31 the feasibility of the lake and watershed restoration options,
32 establish water quality and fishery and wildlife goals and a
33 schedule for attainment, describe long-term management actions,
34 assess the economic benefits of the project, identify the
35 sources and amounts of any leveraged funds, and describe the

1 community's commitment to the project, including local funding.
2 The stakeholders' and community's commitment to the project may
3 include moneys to fund a lake diagnostic study and watershed
4 assessment, including development of a TMDL (total maximum
5 daily load).

6 Sec. 18. Section 456A.33B, subsection 2, paragraph c,
7 subparagraph (2), Code 2016, is amended to read as follows:

8 (2) If proposed, dredging of the lake will be conducted to
9 a mean depth of at least ~~ten~~ eight feet to gain water quality
10 benefits unless a combination of biologic and structural
11 controls is sufficient to assure water quality targets will be
12 achieved at a shallower average water depth.

13 Sec. 19. Section 456A.33B, subsection 2, paragraph d, Code
14 2016, is amended to read as follows:

15 *d.* The department shall evaluate the joint action plans
16 and prioritize the plans based on the criteria required in
17 this section. The department's annual lake restoration plan
18 and report shall include the prioritized list and the amounts
19 of state and other funding the department recommends for each
20 lake restoration project. The department ~~may~~ shall seek public
21 comment on its recommendations prior to submitting the plan and
22 report to the general assembly.

23 Sec. 20. Section 456A.33B, subsection 2, Code 2016, is
24 amended by adding the following new paragraph:

25 NEW PARAGRAPH. *e.* The department shall ensure that at least
26 eight percent, but no more than twelve percent, of the annual
27 appropriation for lake restoration projects in accordance with
28 the department's annual lake restoration plan and report shall
29 be invested in public shallow lakes or wetlands restoration
30 projects.

32 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

33 Sec. 21. Section 8.57C, subsection 3, paragraph a,
34 subparagraph (2), Code 2016, is amended to read as follows:

35 (2) The fiscal year beginning July 1, ~~2016~~ 2017, and for

1 each subsequent fiscal year thereafter.

2 Sec. 22. Section 12.79, subsection 3, Code 2016, is amended
3 to read as follows:

4 3. Moneys in the fund in a fiscal year shall be used as
5 appropriated by the general assembly for prison improvement and
6 prison construction projects. However, for the fiscal year
7 beginning July 1, 2016, any unobligated and unencumbered moneys
8 in the fund from the previous fiscal year are appropriated to
9 the department of corrections for major maintenance projects.

10 Sec. 23. IOWA COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK — AUTHORIZATION
11 FOR CONTRACTS. Pursuant to section 8D.11, subsection 1,
12 paragraph "a", the general assembly authorizes the Iowa
13 telecommunications and technology commission to enter into a
14 contract or contracts in excess of the contract limitation
15 amount established in section 8D.11, subsection 1, paragraph
16 "c", for purposes of the commission's network core upgrade
17 project. This authorization applies for the duration of the
18 commission's project and to all existing or future contracts
19 associated with the project, whether or not the award is made
20 to a single vendor or multiple vendors.

21 Sec. 24. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND — LIMITATION ON
22 EXPENDITURES.

23 1. For purposes of this section, "restricted employee"
24 means an elective constitutional or statutory officer, a state
25 employee whose salary is set by the governor within a range set
26 by the general assembly, or a president of a state board of
27 regents institution.

28 2. Beginning July 1, 2016, moneys appropriated from the
29 rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund and used for public vertical
30 infrastructure projects as defined in section 8.57, subsection
31 5, paragraph "c", shall not be used for salary or other
32 compensation costs of a restricted employee.

33 Sec. 25. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND — FY 2017-2018
34 BUDGET REQUEST INFORMATION. Finalized agency budget requests
35 submitted to the governor for the fiscal year beginning

1 July 1, 2017, that include a request for an appropriation
2 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to be used for a
3 public vertical infrastructure project as defined in section
4 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c", shall include salary cost
5 information as required by this section. The salary cost
6 information shall include the number of full-time equivalent
7 positions to be utilized for the requested project and that
8 portion, in dollars, of salaries and any compensation costs
9 attributable to these full-time equivalent positions that will
10 be paid from the requested appropriation from the rebuild Iowa
11 infrastructure fund.

12 Sec. 26. EXECUTIVE COUNCIL — PROPERTY ACQUISITION
13 AUTHORIZATION. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, the
14 executive council may, in its sole discretion, expend moneys
15 as a performance of duty expense pursuant to section 7D.29 to
16 provide funding for the acquisition of property located at 525
17 East 9th street in the vicinity of the capitol complex.

18 Sec. 27. EFFECTIVE UPON ENACTMENT. The following provision
19 of this division of this Act, being deemed of immediate
20 importance, takes effect upon enactment:

21 1. The section of this division of this Act authorizing the
22 Iowa telecommunications and technology commission to enter into
23 a contract or contracts.

24 EXPLANATION

25 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
26 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

27 This bill relates to and makes appropriations to state
28 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
29 fund, the technology reinvestment fund, the state bond
30 repayment fund, and the FY 2009 prison bonding fund, and
31 provides for related matters. The bill is organized by
32 divisions.

33 DIVISION I — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This
34 division appropriates project funding for FY 2016-2017 from
35 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the

1 departments of administrative services, agriculture and land
2 stewardship, corrections, cultural affairs, human services,
3 natural resources, public defense, and transportation, and for
4 the economic development authority, treasurer of state, the
5 Iowa law enforcement academy, and the board of regents. The
6 division appropriates project funding for FY 2016-2017 and
7 FY 2017-2018 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for
8 projects for the department of cultural affairs and the state
9 fair authority. The division appropriates project funding for
10 FY 2016-2017, FY 2017-2018, and FY 2018-2019 from the rebuild
11 Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the judicial branch.

12 DIVISION II — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —
13 TECHNOLOGY APPROPRIATIONS. This division appropriates project
14 funding for FY 2016-2017 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
15 fund for technology projects for the departments of education,
16 human rights, management, public defense, public health,
17 homeland security and emergency management, and public safety,
18 and for the Iowa telecommunications and technology commission
19 and secretary of state. The division appropriates project
20 funding for FY 2016-2017 and FY 2017-2018 from the rebuild Iowa
21 infrastructure fund for technology projects for the department
22 of cultural affairs.

23 DIVISION III — MISCELLANEOUS APPROPRIATIONS. This division
24 appropriates project funding for FY 2016-2017 from the
25 technology reinvestment fund for the department of education.
26 This division also appropriates project funding for FY
27 2016-2017 from the state bond repayment fund for the department
28 of administrative services, the Iowa finance authority, the
29 board of regents, and the Iowa veterans home.

30 DIVISION IV — CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. This
31 division provides for the reversion of certain unencumbered or
32 unobligated moneys from the technology reinvestment fund to the
33 department of education for FY 2012-2013.

34 The division also makes a change to moneys appropriated from
35 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the board of regents

1 for a project at the state university of Iowa for FY 2016-2017
2 and FY 2017-2018.

3 This division also strikes funding from the rebuild Iowa
4 infrastructure fund for project funding to the board of regents
5 and the Iowa veterans home for FY 2016-2017. The bill provides
6 funding for these projects through the state bond repayment
7 fund.

8 The bill makes a change to the funding match requirements
9 for moneys appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
10 fund for project funding to the department of human services
11 for FY 2015-2016. This provision applies retroactively to July
12 1, 2015.

13 This division takes effect upon enactment.

14 DIVISION V — SHALLOW LAKES. This division amends Code
15 section 456A.33B concerning the requirement of the department
16 of natural resources to develop a lake restoration plan and
17 report. The division adds definitions to the Code section and
18 provides that "lake" includes both significant public lakes
19 and public shallow lakes or wetlands. The division further
20 defines "significant public lake" and "public shallow lake or
21 wetland". The division adds the department's fish and wildlife
22 conservation plans as a goal for lake restoration projects
23 and provides that the annual report include not more than
24 five public shallow lakes or wetlands to be considered for
25 funding. In addition, the bill provides for stakeholder input
26 in developing the annual plan and report and requires that the
27 department seek public comment prior to submitting the plan and
28 report to the general assembly. Finally, the division provides
29 that not less than 8 percent, nor more than 12 percent, of the
30 annual appropriation for lake restoration projects be invested
31 in public shallow lakes or wetlands restoration projects.

32 DIVISION VI — MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section
33 8.57C, concerning the technology reinvestment fund, is amended
34 to provide that the appropriation to the fund from the general
35 fund for fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2016, is

1 changed to fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2017.

2 Code section 12.79, concerning the FY 2009 prison bonding
3 fund, is amended to provide that for FY 2016-2017, any
4 unobligated and unencumbered moneys in the fund from the
5 previous fiscal year are appropriated to the department of
6 corrections for major maintenance projects.

7 The division also authorizes the Iowa telecommunications and
8 technology commission to enter into a contract or contracts
9 in excess of the statutory contract limitation amount for
10 purposes of the commission's network core upgrade project.
11 This provision of this division of the bill takes effect upon
12 enactment.

13 The division further provides that beginning July 1, 2016,
14 moneys appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund
15 and used for vertical infrastructure projects shall not be
16 used for salary and other compensation costs of a restricted
17 employee. The division defines "restricted employee" as an
18 elective constitutional or statutory officer, a state employee
19 whose salary is set by the governor within a range set by the
20 general assembly, or a president of a state board of regents
21 institution.

22 The division also provides that finalized agency budget
23 requests submitted to the governor for FY 2017-2018 for an
24 appropriation from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund shall
25 include salary cost information relative to that requested
26 appropriation.

27 The division also authorizes, for FY 2016-2017, the
28 executive council to expend moneys, in its sole discretion, as
29 a performance of duty expense for the acquisition of property
30 located in the vicinity of the capitol complex.
