## A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to state
- 2 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa
- 3 infrastructure fund, the state bond repayment fund, the

- 6 date provisions.

- 29 This bill relates to and makes appropriations to state
- 30 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
- 31 fund and the revenue bonds capitals fund, and provides for
- 32 related matters. The bill is organized by divisions.
- 33 DIVISION I REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This
- 34 division appropriates project funding for FY 2017-2018 from
- 35 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the

- 1 departments of administrative services, agriculture and land
- 2 stewardship, the blind, cultural affairs, human rights, human
- 3 services, natural resources, public defense, public safety, and
- 4 transportation, and for the economic development authority,
- 5 treasurer of state, and the board of regents.
- 6 DIVISION II TECHNOLOGY REINVESTMENT FUND. This division
- 7 appropriates project funding for FY 2017-2018 from the
- 8 technology reinvestment fund for the departments of education,
- 9 human rights, human services, management, public health, public
- 10 safety, and homeland security and emergency management, and
- ll for the office of the chief information officer and the state
- 12 public defender.
- 13 DIVISION III MISCELLANEOUS APPROPRIATIONS. This division
- 14 appropriates project funding for FY 2016-2017 from the revenue
- 15 bonds capitals fund to the department of administrative
- 16 services for major maintenance projects and for FY 2017-2018
- 17 from the state bond repayment fund for the state board of
- 18 regents for tuition replacement. This division takes effect
- 19 upon enactment.
- 20 DIVISION IV CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. This
- 21 division makes a change to moneys appropriated from the
- 22 rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the board of regents for
- 23 a project at the state university of Iowa and projects at
- 24 the Iowa state university of science and technology for FY
- 25 2017-2018 and FY 2021-2022. The division also makes a change
- 26 to moneys appropriated from the state bond repayment fund to
- 27 the department of administrative services for repair of the
- 28 dome of the Iowa state capitol for FY 2016-2017 to authorize
- 29 expenditure of moneys remaining upon completion of repairs to
- 30 the dome for maintenance projects for the Iowa state capitol

- 2 This division also makes a change in moneys appropriated
- 3 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the state fair
- 4 authority for FY 2017-2018.
- 5 DIVISION V MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section 8.57,
- 6 concerning the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund, is amended
- 7 to provide that the definition of "vertical infrastructure"
- 8 specifically includes renewable fuel infrastructure programs.
- 9 Code section 8.57C, concerning the technology reinvestment
- 10 fund, is amended to provide that the appropriation to the
- 11 fund from the general fund for fiscal years beginning on or
- 12 after July 1, 2017, is changed to fiscal years beginning on
- 13 or after July 1, 2018, and to provide for an appropriation to
- 14 the fund from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for the
- 15 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2017, of \$10 million. Code
- 16 section 12.88, concerning the revenue bonds capitals fund, is
- 17 amended to provide that for FY 2017-2018, any unobligated and
- 18 unencumbered moneys in the fund from the previous fiscal year
- 19 are appropriated to the department of administrative services
- 20 for major maintenance projects.
