## A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to the installation of cattle guards by 2 landowners along certain streets or highways, and including 3 effective date provisions.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. NEW SECTION. 314.30 Cattle guards. Notwithstanding chapter l69C or 318, or any other provision of law to the contrary:

1. A landowner may install a cattle guard on a street or highway if all of the following apply:
a. The street or highway terminates in a dead end, is completely or partially located in a flood plain, serves no residence, and exits to a secondary road.
b. The landowner owns the property on both sides of the street or highway that terminates in a dead end.
c. The effective purpose of restraining livestock using a fence along the street or highway is continually impaired by flooding or other natural forces.
d. Flooding or other natural forces have and will, with a reasonable probability, continue to create liability for the landowner and risk of injury to the public from livestock straying on to the secondary road described in paragraph "a".
2. A cattle guard installed pursuant to this section shall be installed at the landowner's expense at a distance of not less than sixty-six feet from the secondary road described in subsection 1 .
3. After a landowner installs a cattle guard pursuant to this section, the landowner shall not be required to install or maintain a fence along the street or highway described in subsection 1 , and shall not be liable for any injury or loss arising from the placement of the cattle guard. All of the following shall apply to a landowner who is not required to install or maintain a fence along the street or highway pursuant to this subsection:
a. The landowner shall not be liable to a local authority as provided in section l69C.4, subsection l, paragraph "c" for livestock straying on to the street or highway.
b. A local authority shall not take custody of the landowner's livestock on the street or highway as provided in section 169C.2.
c. The landowner shall not be subject to section l69C.6 for livestock straying on to the street or highway.
4. As used in this section:
a. "Cattle guard" means a structure consisting of parallel bars placed over a shallow ditch that allows motor vehicles to pass over the ditch, but prevents cattle and other livestock from passing over the ditch.
b. "Fence" means as defined in section l69C.l.
c. "Landowner" means as defined in section l69C.l.
d. "Local authority" means as defined in section l69C.l.
$e$. "Secondary road" means as defined in section 306.3.
Sec. 2. EFFECTIVE UPON ENACTMENT. This Act, being deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.

EXPLANATION
The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

This bill permits a landowner to install a cattle guard on a street or highway if the street or highway terminates in a dead end, is completely or partially located in a flood plain, serves no residence, and exits to a secondary road; the landowner owns the property on both sides of the street or highway that terminates in a dead end; the effective purpose of restraining livestock using a fence along the street or highway is continually impaired by flooding or other natural forces; and flooding or other natural forces have and will, with a reasonable probability, continue to create liability for the landowner and risk of injury to the public from livestock straying on to the secondary road. The bill defines a "cattle guard" as a structure consisting of parallel bars placed over a shallow ditch that allows motor vehicles to pass over the ditch but prevents cattle and other livestock from passing over the ditch.

The bill requires a cattle guard installed pursuant to the bill to be installed at the landowner's expense at a distance of not less than 66 feet from the secondary road.

The bill provides that after a landowner installs a cattle 2 guard, the landowner is not required to install or maintain a 3 fence along the street or highway, and is not liable for any 4 injury or loss arising from the placement of the cattle guard. 5 The bill further provides that, notwithstanding current law, 6 such a landowner is not liable to a local authority taking 7 custody of livestock straying on to the street or highway for 8 costs incurred by the local authority, a local authority is 9 not permitted to take custody of the landowner's livestock on 10 the street or highway, and the landowner is not subject to the ll habitual trespass provisions of Code chapter l69C for livestock 12 straying on to the street or highway.
13 The bill takes effect upon enactment.
