A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to supplementary weighting for
- 2 limited-English-proficient students and including effective
- 3 date and applicability provisions.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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1 Section 1. Section 280.4, subsection 1, Code 2020, is 2 amended to read as follows:
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- 3 1. a. The medium of instruction in all secular subjects
- 4 taught in both public and nonpublic schools shall be the
- 5 English language, except when the use of a world language is
- 6 deemed appropriate in the teaching of any subject or when the
- 7 student is limited English proficient. When the student is
- 8 limited English proficient, both public and nonpublic schools
- 9 shall provide special instruction, which shall include but
- 10 need not be limited to either instruction in English as a
- 11 second language or transitional bilingual instruction until
- 12 the student is fully English proficient or demonstrates a
- 13 functional ability to speak, read, write, and understand the
- 14 English language.
- 15 b. As used in this section, "limited English proficient"
- 16 means a student's language background is in a language other
- 17 than English, and the student's proficiency in English is
- 18 such that the probability of the student's academic success
- 19 in an English-only classroom is below that of an academically
- 20 successful peer with an English language background .:
- 21 (1) "Emerging student" means a limited-English-proficient
- 22 student that has not yet attained a level of English-language
- 23 skill necessary to produce, interpret, and collaborate on
- 24 grade-level content-related academic tasks in English.
- 25 (2) "Fully English proficient" means a student who is able
- 26 to read, understand, write, and speak the English language
- 27 and to use English to ask questions, to understand teachers
- 28 and reading materials, to test ideas, and to challenge what
- 29 is being asked in the classroom has attained a level of
- 30 English-language skill necessary to independently produce,
- 31 interpret, collaborate on, and succeed in grade-level
- 32 content-related academic tasks in English.
- 33 (3) "Limited English proficient" means a student's language
- 34 background is in a language other than English, and the
- 35 student's proficiency in English is such that the probability

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- 1 of the student's academic success in an English-only classroom
- 2 is below that of an academically successful peer with an
- 3 English language background.
- 4 (a) "Progressing student" means a limited-English-proficient
- 5 student that, with support, approaches a level of
- 6 English-language skill necessary to produce, interpret, and
- 7 collaborate on grade-level content-related academic tasks in
- 8 English.
- 9 Sec. 2. Section 280.4, subsection 3, paragraph a, Code 2020,
- 10 is amended to read as follows:
- 11 a. In order to provide funds for the excess costs of
- 12 instruction of limited English proficient students specified
- 13 in paragraph "b" above the costs of instruction of pupils in a
- 14 regular curriculum, students each limited-English-proficient
- 15 student identified as limited English proficient an emerging
- 16 student shall be assigned an additional weighting of twenty-two
- 17 hundredths three-tenths, each limited-English-proficient
- 18 student identified as a progressing student shall be assigned
- 19 an additional weighting of twenty-five hundredths, and that
- 20 the applicable weighting shall be included in the weighted
- 21 enrollment of the school district of residence for a period not
- 22 exceeding five years as provided in paragraph "b". However, the
- 23 school budget review committee may grant supplemental aid or a
- 24 modified supplemental amount to a school district to continue
- 25 funding a program for students after the expiration of the
- 26 five-year period.
- 27 Sec. 3. APPLICABILITY. This Act applies to school budget
- 28 years beginning on or after July 1, 2020.
- 29 Sec. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act, being deemed of immediate
- 30 importance, takes effect upon enactment.
- 31 EXPLANATION
- 32 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
- 33 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.
- 34 In order to provide funds for the excess costs of instruction
- 35 of limited-English-proficient students above the costs of

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- 1 instruction of pupils in a regular curriculum, Code section
- 2 280.4 assigns students identified as limited-English-proficient
- 3 an additional weighting of 0.22 for up to five years.
- 4 This bill divides limited-English-proficient students
- 5 into two categories based on proficiency: emerging students
- 6 and progressing students. "Emerging student" means a
- 7 limited-English-proficient student that has not yet attained
- 8 a level of English-language skill necessary to produce,
- 9 interpret, and collaborate on grade-level content-related
- 10 academic tasks in English. "Progressing student" means
- 11 a limited-English-proficient student that, with support,
- 12 approaches a level of English-language skill necessary
- 13 to produce, interpret, and collaborate on grade-level
- 14 content-related academic tasks in English. Under the bill,
- 15 each emerging student shall be assigned an additional weighting
- 16 of 0.3 and each progressing student shall be assigned an
- 17 additional weighting of 0.25. The bill also modifies the
- 18 definition of "fully English proficient" to correlate with the
- 19 terminology used to define "emerging student" and "progressing
- 20 student".
- 21 The bill takes effect upon enactment and applies to school
- 22 budget years beginning on or after July 1, 2020.
