A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to state
2 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa
3 infrastructure fund and the technology reinvestment fund,
4 and providing for related matters, and including effective
5 date and retroactive applicability provisions.
6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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DIVISION I

REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —

APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the following departments and agencies for the following fiscal years, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

1. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

FY 2020-2021:

For security cameras on the state capitol complex, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":
..... \$ 250,000

2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting the water quality initiative administered by the division of soil conservation and water quality as provided in section 466B.42, including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

..... \$ 5,200,000

(2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds as provided in subparagraph (2), subparagraph divisions (a) and

1 (b), all of the following shall apply:

2 (a) The demonstration projects shall utilize water quality
3 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
4 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
5 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
6 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
7 state university of science and technology.

8 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
9 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
10 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
11 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
12 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
13 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
14 located within the same subwatershed.

15 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
16 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
17 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
18 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
19 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
20 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

21 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
22 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
23 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
24 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
25 establish water quality practices on their agricultural land.

26 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
27 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
28 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
29 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
30 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
31 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
32 land shall be a confidential record.

33 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
34 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
35 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in

1 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
2 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
3 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
4 high-priority watersheds.

5 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
6 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
7 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

8 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
9 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
10 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
11 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
12 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
13 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
14 basis as provided in chapter 161A.

15 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
16 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
17 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
18 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
19 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
20 source.

21 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
22 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
23 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
24 by the soil conservation division.

32 specifically provided otherwise, unencumbered or unobligated

33 moneys from an appropriation made in this division of this Act

34 shall not revert but shall remain available for expenditure for

35 the purposes designated until the close of the fiscal year that

1 ends two years after the end of the fiscal year for which the
2 appropriation is made. However, if the project or projects for
3 which such appropriation was made are completed in an earlier
4 fiscal year, unencumbered or unobligated moneys shall revert at
5 the close of that same fiscal year.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

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Sec. 10. Section 2.12B, Code 2020, is amended by adding the following new subsection:

NEW SUBSECTION. 2A. The facilities manager for facilities under the control of the general assembly shall develop and submit to the legislative council by December 15, 2020, a five-year maintenance project schedule report, with annual written updates thereafter, for the Iowa state capitol and the Ola Babcock Miller building.

Sec. 11. Section 8.57C, subsection 3, paragraph a, subparagraph (2), Code 2020, is amended to read as follows:

(2) The fiscal year beginning July 1, ~~2020~~ 2021, and for each subsequent fiscal year thereafter.

Sec. 12. Section 8.57C, subsection 3, Code 2020, is amended by adding the following new paragraph:

NEW PARAGRAPH. *i.* There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the sum of seventeen million five hundred thousand dollars to the technology reinvestment fund, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c".

Sec. 13. ROUTINE MAINTENANCE FUND. Notwithstanding the standing appropriation in section 8A.330, there is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of administrative services for deposit in the routine maintenance fund established in section 8A.330 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, the sum of one million dollars.

DIVISION V

CONTINGENT EFFECTIVE DATE AND RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY

Sec. 14. EFFECTIVE UPON ENACTMENT. Unless otherwise provided, this Act, if approved by the governor on or after July 1, 2020, takes effect upon enactment.

Sec. 15. RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY. Unless otherwise provided, this Act, if approved by the governor on or after July 1, 2020, applies retroactively to July 1, 2020.

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EXPLANATION

The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

This bill relates to and makes appropriations to state departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund and the technology reinvestment fund, and provides for related matters. The bill is organized by divisions.

DIVISION I — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This division appropriates project funding for FY 2020-2021 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the departments of administrative services, agriculture and land stewardship, cultural affairs, human services, natural resources, public defense, public safety, transportation, and veterans affairs, and for the economic development authority, law enforcement academy, board of regents, treasurer of state, the judicial branch, and the legislative branch.

DIVISION II — TECHNOLOGY REINVESTMENT FUND. This division appropriates project funding for FY 2020-2021 from the technology reinvestment fund for the departments of corrections, education, homeland security and emergency management, human rights, human services, management, public health, revenue, and veterans affairs, and for the Iowa telecommunications and technology commission, ethics and campaign disclosure board, law enforcement academy, and the judicial branch.

DIVISION III — CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. The division makes a change to moneys appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of administrative services for major maintenance projects, the economic development authority for the vacant state buildings demolition and rehabilitation funds, and the board of regents for projects at the Iowa state university of science and technology.

This division takes effect upon enactment.

DIVISION IV — MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section 2.12B, concerning the state capitol maintenance fund, is

1 amended to require that the facilities manager for the general
2 assembly develop and submit to the legislative council by
3 December 15, 2020, a five-year maintenance schedule report,
4 with annual updates, for the Iowa state capitol and the Ola
5 Babcock Miller building. Code section 8.57C, concerning the
6 technology reinvestment fund, is amended to provide that the
7 standing appropriation to the fund from the general fund for
8 fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2020, is changed
9 to fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2021, and to
10 provide for an appropriation to the fund from the rebuild Iowa
11 infrastructure fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020,
12 of \$17.5 million.

13 The bill also reduces the standing appropriation from the
14 rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the routine maintenance
15 fund created in Code section 8A.330 for the fiscal year
16 beginning July 1, 2020, from \$2 million to \$1 million.

17 EFFECTIVE DATE AND RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY. Unless
18 otherwise provided, the bill, if approved by the governor on
19 or after July 1, 2020, takes effect upon enactment and applies
20 retroactively to July 1, 2020.
