## A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to bicyclists' right-of-way at certain
- 2 crosswalks, and making penalties applicable.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. Section 321.327, subsection 1, Code 2022, is
2 amended to read as follows:

1. Where traffic-control signals are not in place 4 or in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the 5 right-of-way, slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield, 6 to a pedestrian <u>or a person riding a bicycle</u> crossing the 7 roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked 8 crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in 9 this chapter.

## EXPLANATION

11The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with12the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

Under current law, a person riding a bicycle on a highway 14 is subject to the provisions of Code chapter 321 (motor 15 vehicles and law of the road) and has all the rights and 16 duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle, except those 17 provisions which by their nature can have no application or 18 those provisions for which specific exceptions have been set 19 forth regarding police bicycles (Code section 321.234). In 20 addition, current law penalizes certain actions against persons 21 riding a bicycle, such as steering a vehicle unreasonably close 22 to the bicycle or projecting an object at the bicycle (Code 23 section 321.281).

This bill requires the driver of a vehicle to yield the right-of-way to a person riding a bicycle crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk, or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, in the same manner required when yielding be pedestrians where traffic-control signals are not in place or in operation.

A driver of a vehicle convicted of a violation under the hill is guilty of a simple misdemeanor punishable by a \$135 scheduled fine. By operation of law, if the violation causes a serious injury, a court could impose an additional fine of \$500 or suspend the person's driver's license for not more than 90 st days, or both. If the violation causes a death, a court could
