A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to the funding of, the operation of, and
2 appropriation of moneys to the college student aid
3 commission, the department for the blind, the department of
4 education, and the state board of regents, and providing for
5 properly related matters.
6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

4 Section 1. ADMINISTRATION. There is appropriated from
 5 the general fund of the state to the department for the blind
 6 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June
 7 30, 2023, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is
 8 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

32 for purposes of the chiropractic loan forgiveness program

10 8. EARLY CHILDHOOD IOWA FUND — GENERAL AID
11 For deposit in the school ready children grants account of
12 the early childhood Iowa fund created in section 256I.11:
13 \$ 23,406,799
14 a. From the moneys deposited in the school ready children
15 grants account for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and
16 ending June 30, 2023, not more than \$265,950 is allocated for
17 the early childhood Iowa office and other technical assistance
18 activities. Moneys allocated under this lettered paragraph
19 may be used by the early childhood Iowa state board for the
20 purpose of skills development and support for ongoing training
21 of staff. However, except as otherwise provided in this
22 subsection, moneys shall not be used for additional staff or
23 for the reimbursement of staff.
24 b. Of the amount appropriated in this subsection for
25 deposit in the school ready children grants account of the
26 early childhood Iowa fund, \$2,318,018 shall be used for efforts
27 to improve the quality of early care, health, and education
28 programs. Moneys allocated pursuant to this lettered paragraph
29 may be used for additional staff and for the reimbursement
30 of staff. The early childhood Iowa state board may reserve
31 a portion of the allocation, not to exceed \$88,650, for the
32 technical assistance expenses of the early childhood Iowa
33 state office, including the reimbursement of staff, and
34 shall distribute the remainder to early childhood Iowa areas
35 for local quality improvement efforts through a methodology

1 identified by the early childhood Iowa state board to make the
2 most productive use of the funding, which may include use of
3 the distribution formula, grants, or other means.

4 c. Of the amount appropriated in this subsection for
5 deposit in the school ready children grants account of
6 the early childhood Iowa fund, \$825,030 shall be used for
7 support of professional development and training activities
8 for persons working in early care, health, and education by
9 the early childhood Iowa state board in collaboration with
10 the professional development component groups maintained by
11 the early childhood Iowa stakeholders alliance pursuant to
12 section 256I.12, subsection 7, paragraph "b", and the early
13 childhood Iowa area boards. Expenditures shall be limited to
14 professional development and training activities agreed upon by
15 the parties participating in the collaboration as approved by
16 the early childhood Iowa state board.

17 d. Of the amount appropriated in this subsection for deposit
18 in the school ready children grants account of the early
19 childhood Iowa fund, \$200,000 shall be used to invest in this
20 state's early childhood database system that integrates state
21 administrative data to provide results that inform and improve
22 the early childhood system of programs and services in this
23 state.

25 a. For expansion of the federal Individuals with
26 Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004, Pub. L. No.

4 b. The moneys appropriated in this subsection shall be

5 used for implementation and expansion of early head start

6 pilot projects addressing the comprehensive cognitive, social,

7 emotional, and developmental needs of children from birth to

8 age three, including prenatal support for qualified families.

9 The projects shall promote healthy prenatal outcomes and

10 healthy family functioning, and strengthen the development of

11 infants and toddlers in low-income families. Priority shall be

12 given to those organizations that have previously qualified for

13 and received state funding to administer an early head start

14 project.

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19 20. EARLY WARNING SYSTEM FOR LITERACY

20 For purposes of purchasing a statewide license for an early
 21 warning assessment and administering the early warning system
 22 for literacy established in accordance with section 279.68 and
 23 rules adopted in accordance with section 256.7, subsection 31:

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25 The department shall administer and distribute to school
 26 districts and accredited nonpublic schools the early warning
 27 assessment system that allows teachers to screen and monitor

28 but shall remain available for expenditure for the purposes

29 e. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, ~~2021~~ 2022, and
30 ending June 30, ~~2022~~ 2023, to the department an amount up to
31 twenty-five thousand dollars for purposes of the fine arts
32 beginning teacher mentoring program established under section
33 256.34.

34 f. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, ~~2021~~ 2022, and
35 ending June 30, ~~2022~~ 2023, to the department an amount up

1 to six hundred twenty-six thousand one hundred ninety-one
 2 dollars shall be used by the department for a delivery system,
 3 in collaboration with area education agencies, to assist in
 4 implementing the career paths and leadership roles considered
 5 pursuant to [sections 284.15, 284.16, and 284.17](#), including but
 6 not limited to planning grants to school districts and area
 7 education agencies, technical assistance for the department,
 8 technical assistance for districts and area education agencies,
 9 training and staff development, and the contracting of external
 10 expertise and services. In using moneys allocated for purposes
 11 of this paragraph, the department shall give priority to school
 12 districts with certified enrollments of fewer than six hundred
 13 students. A portion of the moneys allocated annually to the
 14 department for purposes of this paragraph may be used by the
 15 department for administrative purposes and for not more than
 16 five full-time equivalent positions.

17 *g.* For the fiscal year beginning July 1, ~~2022~~ 2023, and
 18 for each subsequent fiscal year, to the department, ten
 19 million dollars for purposes of implementing the supplemental
 20 assistance for high-need schools provisions of [section 284.11](#).
 21 Annually, of the moneys allocated to the department for
 22 purposes of this paragraph, up to one hundred thousand dollars
 23 may be used by the department for administrative purposes and
 24 for not more than one full-time equivalent position.

25 DIVISION VII

26 COLLEGE STUDENT AID COMMISSION — IOWA COLLEGE ACCESS NETWORK
 27 Sec. 18. COLLEGE STUDENT AID COMMISSION —
 28 APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated from the general
 29 fund of the state to the college student aid commission for the
 30 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023,
 31 the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
 32 used for the purposes designated:

33 For the coordination of activities with the Iowa college
 34 access network to assist students enrolled in grades 9 through
 35 12 in completing the free application for federal student aid:

1 \$ 150,000

2 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
3 section that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close of
4 the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain available for
5 expenditure for the purposes designated until the close of the
6 succeeding fiscal year.

7 EXPLANATION

8 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
9 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

10 This bill appropriates moneys for fiscal year 2022-2023 from
11 the general fund of the state and other funds to the college
12 student aid commission, the department for the blind, the
13 department of education, and the state board of regents and its
14 institutions. The bill is organized by divisions.

15 DIVISION I — FY 2022-2023. The bill appropriates moneys to
16 the department for the blind for its administration.

17 The bill includes appropriations to the college student aid
18 commission for general administrative purposes, administration
19 of the future ready Iowa skilled workforce last-dollar
20 scholarship program, the health care professional recruitment
21 program, the national guard service scholarship program, the
22 all Iowa opportunity scholarship program, the teach Iowa
23 scholar program, the rural Iowa primary care loan repayment
24 program, the health care loan repayment program, the rural
25 veterinarian loan repayment program, the future ready Iowa
26 skilled workforce last-dollar scholarship program, the
27 comprehensive transition and postsecondary program scholarship
28 program, mental health practitioner loan repayment program, and
29 the Iowa workforce grant and incentive program.

30 The bill appropriates moneys to the department of education
31 for purposes of the department's general administration,
32 career and technical education (CTE) administration, division
33 of vocational rehabilitation services including independent
34 living programs, the entrepreneurs with disabilities program,
35 and independent living centers, state library for general

1 administration and the enrich Iowa program, public broadcasting
 2 division, career and technical education reimbursement for
 3 expenditures made by CTE regional planning partnerships, school
 4 food service, early childhood Iowa fund, expansion of the
 5 federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement
 6 Act birth through age three services, early head start
 7 projects, textbooks for nonpublic school pupils, the student
 8 achievement and teacher quality program, statewide student
 9 assessment, statewide clearinghouse to expand work-based
 10 learning, postsecondary summer classes for high school students
 11 program, jobs for America's graduates specialists, attendance
 12 center performance/general internet site and data system
 13 support, the online state job posting system, successful
 14 progression for early readers, an early warning system for
 15 literacy, the Iowa reading research center, computer science
 16 professional development incentive fund, children's mental
 17 health school-based training and support, for school districts
 18 for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities,
 19 adult education and literacy programs, distribution to the
 20 midwestern higher education compact to pay Iowa's member state
 21 annual obligation, and community colleges.

22 For the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the bill reduces the standing
 23 appropriations for at-risk children under Code section 279.51.

24 The bill appropriates moneys to the state board of regents
 25 for the board office, universities' general operating budgets;
 26 the western Iowa regents resource center; Iowa public radio;
 27 the state university of Iowa; Iowa state university of science
 28 and technology; the university of northern Iowa; and for the
 29 Iowa school for the deaf and the Iowa braille and sight saving
 30 school.

31 DIVISION II — WORKFORCE TRAINING PROGRAMS — APPROPRIATIONS
 32 FY 2022-2023. The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa
 33 skilled worker and job creation fund to the college student aid
 34 commission and the department of education.

35 DIVISION III — IOWA WORKFORCE GRANT AND INCENTIVE PROGRAM.

1 The bill establishes the Iowa workforce grant and incentive
2 program within the college student aid commission. The bill
3 provides that the Iowa workforce grant and incentive program
4 will provide grants to certain eligible students who are
5 pursuing an eligible program for high-demand jobs. The bill
6 provides that the amount of the grant is based on the number of
7 semester hours in which the student is enrolled.

8 The bill requires the Iowa workforce development board to
9 update its list of high-demand jobs at least once every five
10 years. The bill also provides that this list shall be used for
11 purposes of the Iowa workforce grant and incentive program.

12 DIVISION IV — CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT AND TRANSPORTATION
13 REIMBURSEMENT. The bill appropriates moneys to the department
14 of education for developing guidelines related to behavior in
15 the classroom, the therapeutic classroom incentive fund, and
16 the payment of claims for reimbursement submitted under Code
17 section 256A.25A(1)(a) (therapeutic classroom transportation
18 claims).

19 DIVISION V — APPROPRIATION — STANDING LIMITED. The bill
20 increases the standing limited appropriation to the college
21 student aid commission for tuition grants to qualified students
22 who are enrolled in accredited private institutions from
23 \$48,896,050 to \$50,118,451. In addition, the bill increases
24 the standing limited appropriation to the college student aid
25 commission for tuition grants to qualified students who are
26 enrolled in eligible institutions from \$456,220 to \$500,000.

27 DIVISION VI — STATE PROGRAM ALLOCATION. Current Code
28 section 284.13 establishes how moneys appropriated for purposes
29 of the student achievement and teacher quality program are to
30 be allocated. The bill extends the allocations established
31 pursuant to Code section 284.13 to the fiscal year beginning
32 July 1, 2022. The bill provides that for the fiscal year
33 beginning July 1, 2023, and for each subsequent fiscal year, of
34 the moneys appropriated for purposes of the student achievement
35 and teacher quality program, the final priority for the

1 allocation is \$10 million for purposes of implementing the
2 supplemental assistance for high-need schools provisions of
3 Code section 284.11.

4 DIVISION VII — COLLEGE STUDENT AID COMMISSION — IOWA
5 COLLEGE ACCESS NETWORK. The bill appropriates \$150,000 from
6 the general fund of the state to the college student aid
7 commission for purposes of the coordination of activities with
8 the Iowa college access network to assist students enrolled
9 in grades 9 through 12 in completing the free application for
10 federal student aid. Any moneys that remain unencumbered or
11 unobligated at the close of the fiscal year shall not revert
12 but shall remain available for expenditure until the close of
13 the succeeding fiscal year.
