A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to state
2 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa
3 infrastructure fund, the technology reinvestment fund, the
4 sports wagering receipts fund, and the autism support fund,
5 providing for related matters, and including effective date
6 provisions.
7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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DIVISION I

REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —

APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the following departments and agencies for the following fiscal years, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

1. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

For costs associated with the placement of a monument to Martin Treptow on the capitol complex grounds:

2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting the water quality initiative administered by the division of soil conservation and water quality as provided in section 466B.42, including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

(2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following shall

1 apply:

2 (a) The demonstration projects shall utilize water quality
3 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
4 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
5 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
6 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
7 state university of science and technology.

8 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
9 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
10 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
11 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
12 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
13 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
14 located within the same subwatershed.

15 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
16 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
17 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
18 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
19 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
20 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

21 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
22 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
23 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
24 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
25 establish water quality practices on their agricultural land.

26 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
27 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
28 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
29 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
30 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
31 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
32 land shall be a confidential record.

33 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
34 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
35 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in

1 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
2 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
3 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
4 high-priority watersheds.

5 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
6 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
7 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

8 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
9 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
10 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
11 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
12 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
13 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
14 basis as provided in [chapter 161A](#).

15 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
16 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
17 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
18 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
19 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
20 source.

21 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
22 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
23 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
24 by the soil conservation division.

27 loan program for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of vacant
28 buildings owned by the state or by a county that has purchased
29 real property from the federal government which are no longer
30 used for a state or federal purpose. The authority shall give
31 preference to applicants that have not previously been awarded
32 money from this fund.

33 3. Notwithstanding [section 12C.7, subsection 2](#), interest
34 or earnings on moneys deposited in the vacant state buildings
35 rehabilitation fund shall be credited to the vacant state

1 buildings rehabilitation fund. Notwithstanding [section 8.33](#),
2 moneys credited to the vacant ~~state~~ buildings rehabilitation
3 fund shall not revert at the close of a fiscal year.

4 Sec. 15. ROUTINE MAINTENANCE FUND. Notwithstanding the
5 standing appropriation in section 8A.330, there is appropriated
6 from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of
7 administrative services for deposit in the routine maintenance
8 fund established in section 8A.330 for the fiscal year
9 beginning July 1, 2021, the sum of one million dollars.

11 AUTISM SUPPORT FUND

12 Sec. 16. AUTISM SUPPORT FUND — APPROPRIATION. There is
13 appropriated from the autism support fund created in section
14 225D.2 to the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund created in
15 section 8.57, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021, and
16 ending June 30, 2022, the sum of seven hundred fifty thousand
17 dollars, notwithstanding any provision of section 225D.2 to the
18 contrary.

19 DIVISION VI

20 SPORTS TOURISM PROGRAM

21 Sec. 17. Section 15F.401, subsection 1, paragraph a, Code
22 2021, is amended to read as follows:

23 a. The authority shall establish, and, at the direction of
24 the board, shall administer a sports tourism program to provide
25 financial assistance for projects that promote sporting events
26 for organizations of accredited colleges and universities,
27 professional sporting events, and other sporting events in the
28 state.

29 Sec. 18. Section 15F.401, subsection 1, paragraph b,
30 subparagraph (3), Code 2021, is amended to read as follows:

31 (3) "*Organization*" means a corporation, conference,
32 association, or other organization which has as one of
33 its primary purposes the sponsoring or administration
34 of extracurricular intercollegiate athletic contests or
35 competitions, or professional sporting events.

1 Sec. 19. Section 15F.401, subsection 1, paragraph b, Code
2 2021, is amended by adding the following new subparagraph:

3 NEW SUBPARAGRAPH. (4) "Professional sporting events" means
4 any sporting events for which the competing athletes receive
5 payment for their participation in such sporting event.

6 Sec. 20. Section 15F.401, subsection 2, paragraph a, Code
7 2021, is amended to read as follows:

8 a. A city or county in the state or a public entity,
9 including a convention and visitors bureau or a district,
10 may apply to the authority for financial assistance for a
11 project that actively and directly promotes sporting events for
12 accredited colleges and universities, professional sporting
13 events, and other sporting events in the area served by the
14 city, county, or public entity.

15 Sec. 21. SPORTS TOURISM PROGRAM — SPORTS WAGERING RECEIPTS
16 FUND. There is appropriated from the sports wagering receipts
17 fund created in section 8.57, subsection 6, to the economic
18 development authority for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
19 2021, and ending June 30, 2022, the following amount, or so
20 much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
21 designated:

24 EXPLANATION

25 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
26 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

27 This bill relates to and makes appropriations to state
28 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
29 fund and the technology reinvestment fund, and provides for
30 related matters. The bill is organized by divisions.

31 DIVISION I — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This
32 division appropriates project funding for FY 2021-2022 from
33 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the
34 departments of administrative services, agriculture and land
35 stewardship, blind, cultural affairs, human services, public

1 safety, transportation, and veterans affairs, and for the
2 economic development authority, board of regents, and treasurer
3 of state. The division also appropriates project funding from
4 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for multiple fiscal years
5 to the departments of corrections, public defense, and natural
6 resources.

7 DIVISION II — TECHNOLOGY REINVESTMENT FUND. This
8 division appropriates project funding for FY 2021-2022
9 from the technology reinvestment fund for the departments
10 of corrections, education, homeland security and emergency
11 management, human rights, human services, inspections and
12 appeals, management, public defense, public safety, revenue,
13 and veterans affairs, and for the judicial branch, the office
14 of the chief information officer, and for the ethics and
15 campaign disclosure board.

16 DIVISION III — CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. This
17 division makes a change to moneys appropriated from the rebuild
18 Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of administrative
19 services for major maintenance projects, the economic
20 development authority for the vacant state buildings demolition
21 and rehabilitation funds, the board of regents for projects
22 at the Iowa state university of science and technology, and
23 the judicial branch for furniture and equipment at certain
24 justice centers. The division also makes a change to the
25 reversion provision for moneys appropriated from the rebuild
26 Iowa infrastructure fund to the department of cultural affairs
27 for maintenance projects for the state historical building in
28 FY 2017-2018. The division takes effect upon enactment.

29 DIVISION IV — MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section
30 8.57C, concerning the technology reinvestment fund, is amended
31 to provide for an appropriation to the fund from the rebuild
32 Iowa infrastructure fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
33 2021, of \$17.5 million.

34 Code section 15.261, concerning the vacant state buildings
35 demolition fund, is amended to allow moneys in the fund to be

1 used for demolition of vacant buildings purchased by a county
2 from the federal government. The Code section is also amended
3 to give preference to applicants who have not previously been
4 awarded money from the fund.

5 Code section 15.262, concerning the vacant state buildings
6 rehabilitation fund, is amended to allow moneys in the fund
7 to be used for rehabilitation of vacant buildings purchased
8 by a county from the federal government. The Code section is
9 also amended to give preference to applicants who have not
10 previously been awarded money from the fund.

11 The bill reduces the standing appropriation from the rebuild
12 Iowa infrastructure fund to the routine maintenance fund
13 created in Code section 8A.330 for the fiscal year beginning
14 July 1, 2021, from \$2 million to \$1 million.

15 DIVISION V — AUTISM SUPPORT FUND. This division
16 appropriates moneys from the autism support fund to the rebuild
17 Iowa infrastructure fund for FY 2021-2022.

18 DIVISION VI — SPORTS TOURISM PROGRAM. Code section
19 15F.401, creating the sports tourism program, is amended to
20 provide that the program is authorized to provide financial
21 assistance for projects that promote professional sporting
22 events. The bill further appropriates moneys to the economic
23 development authority for the sports tourism program for FY
24 2021-2022 from the sports wagering receipts fund created in
25 Code section 8.57, subsection 6.
