A BILL FOR

2 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa
3 infrastructure fund and the technology reinvestment fund,

DIVISION I

REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —

APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund to the following departments and agencies for the following fiscal years, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

1. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting the water quality initiative administered by the division of soil conservation and water quality as provided in section 466B.42, including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

..... \$ 5,200,000

(2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources coordinating council.

(3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following shall apply:

(a) The demonstration projects shall utilize water quality practices as described in the latest revision of the document entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land

1 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
2 state university of science and technology.

3 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
4 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
5 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
6 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
7 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
8 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
9 located within the same subwatershed.

10 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
11 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
12 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
13 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
14 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
15 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

16 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
17 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
18 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
19 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
20 establish water quality practices on their agricultural land.

21 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
22 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
23 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
24 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
25 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
26 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
27 land shall be a confidential record.

28 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
29 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
30 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in
31 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
32 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
33 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
34 high-priority watersheds.

35 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph

1 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
2 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

3 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
4 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
5 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
6 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
7 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
8 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
9 basis as provided in [chapter 161A](#).

10 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
11 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
12 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
13 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
14 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
15 source.

16 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
17 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
18 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
19 by the soil conservation division.

17 project for which the appropriation was made is completed,
18 whichever is earlier.

21 SEC. 2. REVERSION.

22 1. For Except as provided in subsection 2, for purposes
23 of section 8.33, unless specifically provided otherwise,
24 unencumbered or unobligated moneys from an appropriation made
25 in this division of this Act shall not revert but shall remain
26 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until the
27 close of the fiscal year that ends two years after the end of
28 the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made. However,
29 if the project or projects for which such appropriation was
30 made are completed in an earlier fiscal year, unencumbered
31 or unobligated moneys shall revert at the close of that same
32 fiscal year.

33 2. For purposes of section 8.33, unless specifically
34 provided otherwise, unencumbered or unobligated moneys from
35 an appropriation made in section 1, subsection 14, of this

1 division of this 2019 Act shall not revert but shall remain
2 available for expenditure for the purpose designated until the
3 close of the fiscal year that begins July 1, 2022.

4 Sec. 7. 2019 Iowa Acts, chapter 137, section 4, is amended
5 to read as follows:

6 SEC. 4. REVERSION.

7 1. For Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2,
8 for purposes of section 8.33, unless specifically provided
9 otherwise, unencumbered or unobligated moneys from an
10 appropriation made in this division of this Act shall not
11 revert but shall remain available for expenditure for the
12 purposes designated until the close of the fiscal year that
13 ends two years after the end of the fiscal year for which the
14 appropriation is made. However, if the project or projects for
15 which such appropriation was made are completed in an earlier
16 fiscal year, unencumbered or unobligated moneys shall revert at
17 the close of that same fiscal year.

18 2. For purposes of section 8.33, unless specifically
19 provided otherwise, unencumbered or unobligated moneys from an
20 appropriation made in section 3, subsection 6, of this division
21 of this 2019 Act shall not revert but shall remain available
22 for expenditure for the purposes designated until the close of
23 the fiscal year that begins July 1, 2023, or until the project
24 for which the appropriation was made is completed, whichever
25 is earlier.

26 Sec. 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. This division of this Act, being
27 deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.

28 DIVISION IV

29 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

30 Sec. 9. Section 8.57C, subsection 3, paragraph a,

5 hundred thousand dollars to the technology reinvestment fund,
6 notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c".

7 Sec. 11. NEW SECTION. 15.221 Carbon ignition fund.

8 1. A carbon ignition fund is created in the state treasury
9 under the control of the authority. The fund shall consist of
10 all moneys appropriated to the fund.

11 2. Moneys in the carbon ignition fund are appropriated to
12 the authority for purposes of funding grants for projects in
13 agriculture and energy for increased participation in carbon
14 markets.

15 3. Notwithstanding section 12C.7, subsection 2, interest
16 or earnings on moneys deposited in the carbon ignition fund
17 shall be credited to the carbon ignition fund. Notwithstanding
18 section 8.33, moneys credited to the carbon ignition fund shall
19 not revert at the close of a fiscal year.

20 EXPLANATION

21 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
22 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

23 This bill relates to and makes appropriations to state
24 departments and agencies from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure
25 fund and the technology reinvestment fund, and provides for
26 related matters. The bill is organized by divisions.

27 DIVISION I — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This
28 division appropriates project funding for FY 2022-2023 from
29 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the
30 departments of agriculture and land stewardship, the blind,
31 corrections, cultural affairs, human services, natural
32 resources, public defense, public safety, and transportation,
33 and for the economic development authority, treasurer of state,
34 and the judicial branch. The division also appropriates
35 project funding from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for

1 multiple fiscal years to the board of regents and the state
2 fair authority.

3 DIVISION II — TECHNOLOGY REINVESTMENT FUND. This
4 division appropriates project funding for FY 2022-2023
5 from the technology reinvestment fund for the departments
6 of corrections, education, homeland security and emergency
7 management, human rights, inspections and appeals, management,
8 public defense, public safety, and revenue, and for the Iowa
9 telecommunications and technology commission, and the judicial
10 branch.

11 DIVISION III — CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. This
12 division allows moneys appropriated from the technology
13 reinvestment fund to the department of human services over
14 multiple fiscal years beginning with FY 2018-2019 that would
15 revert if unencumbered and unexpended three years after the
16 close of the fiscal year in which the appropriation was made
17 to not revert until four years after the close of the fiscal
18 year in which the appropriation was made. The division also
19 allows moneys appropriated to the Iowa veterans home for FY
20 2019-2020 that would revert if unencumbered and unexpended
21 as of June 30, 2022, to not revert but remain available for
22 expenditure until the close of the fiscal year beginning July
23 1, 2022. The division also allows moneys appropriated to the
24 department of human services for FY 2019-2020 that would revert
25 if unencumbered and unexpended as of June 30, 2022, to not
26 revert but remain available for expenditure until the close of
27 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023. This division of the
28 bill takes effect upon enactment.

29 DIVISION IV — MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section
30 8.57C, concerning the technology reinvestment fund, is amended
31 to provide that the standing appropriation to the fund from the
32 general fund for fiscal years beginning on or after July 1,
33 2022, is changed to fiscal years beginning on or after July 1,
34 2023, and to provide for an appropriation to the fund from the
35 rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for the fiscal year beginning

1 July 1, 2022, of \$20.5 million.

2 The division creates a carbon ignition fund in the state
3 treasury under the control of the economic development
4 authority. Moneys in the fund shall be used to fund grants for
5 projects in agriculture and energy for increased participation
6 in carbon markets.
