- 1 An Act relating to appropriations to the justice system.
- 2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

4	Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.
5	1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
6	to the department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July
7	1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, the following amounts, or
8	so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
9	designated:
10	a. For the general office of attorney general for
11	salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
12	including the prosecuting attorneys training program, matching
13	funds for federal violence against women grant programs,
14	victim assistance grants, the office of drug control policy
15	prosecuting attorney program, and odometer fraud enforcement:
16	\$ 6,563,298
17	As a condition of receiving the appropriation provided
18	in this lettered paragraph, the department of justice shall
19	maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing
20	each agency or department.
21	The general office of attorney general may temporarily
22	exceed and draw more than the amount appropriated in this
23	lettered paragraph and incur a negative cash balance as long
24	as there are receivables equal to or greater than the negative
25	balances and the amount appropriated in this lettered paragraph
26	is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

29	The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be
