A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations from the rebuild
2 Iowa infrastructure fund and technology reinvestment fund,
3 establishing a destination Iowa fund, providing for related
4 matters, and including effective date provisions.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

DIVISION I

REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —

4 APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa
5 infrastructure fund to the following departments and agencies
6 for the following fiscal years, the following amounts, or so
7 much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
8 designated:

1. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

For safety and security on the state capitol complex,
notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph "c":

2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund
created in [section 466B.45](#) for purposes of supporting the
water quality initiative administered by the division of soil
conservation and water quality as provided in [section 466B.42](#),
including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
purposes, notwithstanding [section 8.57, subsection 5](#), paragraph
"c":

..... \$ 8,200,000

(2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in
subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part
of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources
coordinating council.

(b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the
division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water
resources coordinating council.

(3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds
as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following shall

1 apply:

2 (a) The demonstration projects shall utilize water quality
3 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
4 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
5 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
6 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
7 state university of science and technology.

8 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
9 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
10 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
11 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
12 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
13 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
14 located within the same subwatershed.

15 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
16 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
17 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
18 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
19 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
20 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

21 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
22 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
23 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
24 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
25 establish water quality practices on their agricultural land.

26 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
27 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
28 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
29 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
30 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
31 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
32 land shall be a confidential record.

33 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
34 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
35 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in

1 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
2 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
3 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
4 high-priority watersheds.

5 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
6 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
7 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

8 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
9 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
10 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
11 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
12 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
13 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
14 basis as provided in [chapter 161A](#).

15 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
16 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
17 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
18 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
19 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
20 source.

21 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
22 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
23 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
24 by the soil conservation division.

15 the agricultural land, or the identifiable location of the
16 agricultural land.

6 revert but shall remain available for expenditure for the
7 purposes designated until the close of the fiscal year that
8 ends two years after the end of the fiscal year for which the
9 appropriation is made. However, if the project or projects for
10 which such appropriation was made are completed in an earlier
11 fiscal year, unencumbered or unobligated moneys shall revert at
12 the close of that same fiscal year.

13 2. For purposes of section 8.33, unless specifically
14 provided otherwise, unencumbered or unobligated moneys from
15 an appropriation made in section 1, subsection 10, paragraph
16 "d", of this division of this 2021 Iowa Act, as amended by 2022
17 Iowa Acts, chapter 1150, section 11, shall not revert but shall
18 remain available for expenditure for the purposes designated
19 until the project for which the appropriation was made is
20 completed.

21 Sec. 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. This division of this Act, being
22 deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.

3 DIVISION V

4 DESTINATION IOWA FUND

5 Sec. 10. NEW SECTION. 15.281 Destination Iowa fund.

6 1. For purposes of this section:

7 a. "Eligible applicant" means a city, county, or
8 not-for-profit organization.

9 b. "Rural community" means a community that has a population
10 of fewer than twenty thousand persons as determined by the most
11 recent population estimate produced by the United States bureau
12 of census or the most recent decennial census released by the
13 United States bureau of census.

14 c. "Vertical infrastructure" means land acquisition
15 and construction, major renovation and major repair of
16 buildings, all appurtenant structures, utilities, site
17 development, recreational trails, and water trails. "Vertical
18 infrastructure" does not include routine, recurring maintenance
19 or operational expenses or leasing of a building, appurtenant
20 structure, or utility without a lease-purchase agreement.

21 2. A destination Iowa fund is created in the state treasury
22 under the control of the authority. The fund shall consist of
23 all moneys appropriated to the fund. The board will oversee
24 and administer the destination Iowa fund.

25 3. Moneys in the destination Iowa fund are appropriated
26 to the authority for purposes of providing grants to eligible
27 applicants for any of the following types of projects:

28 a. Economically significant projects that increase tourism
29 opportunities.

30 b. Development and enhancement of outdoor recreational
31 opportunities.

32 c. Projects that contribute to quality of life in rural
33 communities.

34 4. Projects must meet all of the following criteria to be
35 eligible for a grant to an eligible applicant from the fund:

1 *a.* The project must be primarily vertical infrastructure.

2 *b.* The project must be available for year-round use by the
3 public.

4 *c.* An eligible applicant must intend to own the property
5 that is the subject of the project upon completion.

6 5. The board shall prioritize making awards to applicants
7 that have not been awarded money from the destination Iowa fund
8 or other programs intended to support community attraction
9 and tourism projects after July 1, 2018. The board shall
10 prioritize awarding grants to projects that include primarily
11 new construction over projects that primarily renovate or
12 replace existing facilities. The board shall not award a grant
13 in an amount exceeding fifty percent of the total cost of the
14 project.

15 6. At the beginning of each fiscal year, the authority
16 shall allocate fifty percent of the moneys available in the
17 destination Iowa fund to projects in rural communities. If
18 any portion of the moneys allocated under this subsection has
19 not been awarded by April 1 of the fiscal year for which the
20 allocation is made, the portion which has not been awarded may
21 be awarded to any eligible project in the state. If a county
22 is the applicant, a project will be deemed to be located in a
23 rural community if the geographic location of the project is in
24 or near a city that is a rural community.

25 7. Applications for grants from the destination Iowa fund
26 shall be submitted to the authority. For those applications
27 that meet the eligibility criteria described in subsection
28 4, the authority shall forward the applications and provide
29 a staff evaluation to the board. Work completed and costs
30 incurred prior to the date of board approval of a grant are
31 ineligible for reimbursement, except the acquisition of real
32 estate.

33 8. The board shall make final funding decisions on
34 each application and may approve, deny, defer, or modify
35 applications for grants under the program. The board and the

1 authority may negotiate with applicants regarding the details
2 of projects and the amount and terms of any award. In making
3 final funding decisions pursuant to this subsection, the board
4 and the authority are exempt from chapter 17A.

5 9. If an application is approved, the authority shall enter
6 into an agreement with the applicant to provide a grant awarded
7 from the fund.

8 10. Notwithstanding section 12C.7, subsection 2,
9 interest or earnings on moneys deposited in the destination
10 Iowa fund shall be credited to the destination Iowa fund.
11 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys credited to the
12 destination Iowa fund shall not revert at the close of a fiscal
13 year. The authority shall not use more than five percent of
14 the moneys in the fund at the beginning of each fiscal year for
15 purposes of administrative costs and program support.

16 DIVISION VI

17 ON-STREAM IMPOUNDMENT RESTORATION

18 Sec. 11. Section 456A.33C, subsections 2, 3, and 4, Code
19 2023, are amended by striking the subsections and inserting in
20 lieu thereof the following:

21 2. The department shall establish an on-stream impoundment
22 restoration program for purposes of funding projects for the
23 maintenance, restoration, and sustainability of eligible water
24 bodies and their related watersheds from moneys appropriated to
25 the department for this purpose.

26 3. a. The department shall fund projects for eligible water
27 bodies that are designed to achieve the following goals:

28 (1) Ensure a cost-effective, positive return on investment
29 for the citizens of Iowa.

30 (2) Ensure local community commitment to watershed
31 protection.

32 (3) Ensure significant improvement in water clarity,
33 safety, and quality.

34 (4) Provide for sustainable, healthy, and functioning
35 bodies of water.

1 (5) Contribute to the department's fish and wildlife
2 conservation plans.

3 b. The process and criteria the department shall utilize
4 to fund projects under this section shall favor proposals
5 which include nonstate matching funds of at least one dollar
6 for every dollar of state funding, and funding for watershed
7 improvement practices and participation of corresponding
8 watershed management authority.

9 EXPLANATION

10 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
11 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

12 This bill relates to and makes appropriations from
13 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund and the technology
14 reinvestment fund and provides for related matters. The bill
15 is organized by divisions.

16 DIVISION I — REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND. This
17 division appropriates project funding for FY 2023-2024 from
18 the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for projects for the
19 departments of administrative services, agriculture and land
20 stewardship, the blind, corrections, education, health and
21 human services, natural resources, public defense, public
22 safety, and transportation, and for the economic development
23 authority, treasurer of state, ethics and campaign disclosure
24 board, Iowa communications network, board of regents, and the
25 judicial branch.

26 DIVISION II — TECHNOLOGY REINVESTMENT FUND. This division
27 appropriates project funding for FY 2023-2024 from the
28 technology reinvestment fund for projects for the departments
29 of justice, corrections, education, health and human services,
30 homeland security and emergency management, management, and
31 revenue, and for the auditor of state, the board of parole, the
32 Iowa law enforcement academy, and the judicial branch.

33 DIVISION III — CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS. This
34 division allows moneys appropriated from the rebuild Iowa
35 infrastructure fund to the board of regents for an industrial

1 technology center at the university of northern Iowa for FY
2 2022-2023 to also be expended for steam tunnel repairs at
3 the university of northern Iowa. The division also allows
4 moneys appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund
5 to the department of public defense for a readiness center
6 in FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-2023 to not revert but to remain
7 available for expenditure until the project is completed. The
8 division takes effect upon enactment.

9 DIVISION IV — MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. Code section
10 8.57C, concerning the technology reinvestment fund, is amended
11 to provide that the standing appropriation to the fund from the
12 general fund for fiscal years beginning on or after July 1,
13 2023, is changed to fiscal years beginning on or after July 1,
14 2024, and to provide for an appropriation to the fund from the
15 rebuild Iowa infrastructure fund for the fiscal year beginning
16 July 1, 2023, of \$18.4 million.

17 DIVISION V — DESTINATION IOWA FUND. New Code section
18 15.281 establishes a destination Iowa fund under the control
19 of the economic development authority. The bill provides
20 that moneys in the fund will be appropriated to the authority
21 for providing grants to eligible cities, counties, and
22 not-for-profit organizations to fund projects that increase
23 tourism opportunities, development and enhancement of outdoor
24 recreational opportunities, or otherwise contribute to
25 quality of life in rural communities. The bill defines rural
26 communities as a community that has a population of fewer than
27 20,000 persons as determined by the most recent population
28 estimate produced by the United States bureau of census or the
29 most recent decennial census released by the United States
30 bureau of census. The bill further provides that projects
31 must be primarily vertical infrastructure and available for
32 year-round use by the public, and provides that the applicant
33 for project moneys must intend to own the property that is
34 the subject of the project upon completion. The bill also
35 provides that the economic development authority shall allocate

1 50 percent of the moneys available in the destination Iowa
2 fund at the beginning of each fiscal year to projects in rural
3 communities, but may reallocate any portion of the moneys
4 allocated to rural communities for all eligible projects if
5 moneys allocated for rural communities have not been awarded
6 by April 1 of the fiscal year for which the allocation is
7 made. The bill establishes the application process for grants
8 from the new fund and provides that the economic development
9 authority board shall make final funding decisions. The bill
10 provides that interest or earnings on moneys deposited in the
11 destination Iowa fund shall be credited to the destination Iowa
12 fund and moneys credited to the destination Iowa fund shall not
13 revert at the close of a fiscal year. The bill provides that
14 the economic development authority shall not use more than 5
15 percent of the moneys in the fund each fiscal year for purposes
16 of administrative costs and program support.

17 DIVISION VI — ON-STREAM IMPOUNDMENT RESTORATION. This
18 division amends Code section 456A.33C, creating the on-stream
19 impoundment fund, by eliminating the fund and creating an on-
20 stream impoundment restoration program. Current requirements
21 in Code section 456A.33C regarding funding projects from the
22 fund are retained for purposes of the program.
