- 1 A Resolution designating November 2024 as Lung Cancer
- 2 Awareness Month.
- 3 WHEREAS, in 1904, Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau,
- 4 a public health pioneer, believing that the combined
- 5 efforts of physicians and laypersons working together
- 6 against death and disease, could be more effective in
- 7 the fight against tuberculosis, the leading cause of
- 8 death in the United States at the time, co-founded
- 9 the National Association for the Study and Prevention
- 10 of Tuberculosis, later known as the American Lung
- 11 Association; and
- 12 WHEREAS, the American Lung Association, recognizing
- 13 the importance of education, advocacy, and the funding
- 14 of research, as well as the power of people and
- 15 communities in addressing critical public health
- 16 and lung health issues, was instrumental in largely
- 17 controlling tuberculosis in the United States; and
- 18 WHEREAS, just as tuberculosis was a great health
- 19 threat in the early 20th century, lung cancer is now
- 20 the number one cancer killer of both men and women; and
- 21 WHEREAS, in the United States, lung and bronchus
- 22 (lung) cancer accounted for an estimated 127,000 deaths
- 23 or 20 percent of all cancer deaths, and represented
- 24 approximately 12 percent of all new cancer cases in
- 25 2023; and

- 1 WHEREAS, approximately 1 in 16 men and 1 in 17
- 2 women will be diagnosed with lung cancer in their
- 3 lifetime; and
- 4 WHEREAS, lung cancer claims approximately the same
- 5 number of lives annually as prostate, breast, and
- 6 pancreatic cancer combined; and
- 7 WHEREAS, an estimated 6,310 Iowans died from lung
- 8 cancer and an estimated 20,460 Iowans were newly
- 9 diagnosed with lung cancer in 2023; and
- 10 WHEREAS, lung cancer has one of the lowest five-year
- 11 survival rates with a five-year relative survival rate
- 12 of approximately 63 percent following a diagnosis
- 13 of localized or stage 1 lung cancer, 35 percent
- 14 following a diagnosis of regional lung cancer that
- 15 has spread to regional lymph nodes, and 8 percent
- 16 following a diagnosis of distant lung cancer that has
- 17 metastasized, making early detection the key to length
- 18 of survival; and
- 19 WHEREAS, while the rate of lung cancer death is
- 20 higher for men than women, lung cancer is the leading
- 21 cause of cancer deaths among women, Black Americans,
- 22 and Asian Americans; and
- 23 WHEREAS, while smoking is the leading risk factor
- 24 for lung cancer accounting for 80 percent of lung
- 25 cancer deaths, those who never smoked account for the
- 26 remaining 20 percent, and the proportion of lung cancer
- 27 diagnosed in individuals who never smoked is increasing
- 28 in the United States with women who never smoked being
- 29 more than twice as likely to develop lung cancer as men
- 30 who never smoked; and

- 1 WHEREAS, while other leading risk factors of lung
- 2 cancer include secondhand smoke, asbestos, certain
- 3 metals and organic materials, radiation, air pollution,
- 4 and diesel exhaust, family history and genetic factors
- 5 may also play a role in the development of lung
- 6 cancer; and
- 7 WHEREAS, funding for lung cancer research falls far
- 8 behind funding for research of many other cancers,
- 9 and additional research is needed in early diagnosis,
- 10 screening, and treatment of lung cancer as well as to
- 11 determine the unique impact of lung cancer on women
- 12 and the effect of health disparities on diagnosis,
- 13 treatment, and survival rates; and
- 14 WHEREAS, approximately 8 million Americans are at
- 15 high risk for lung cancer and early detection for these
- 16 individuals could reduce mortality by up to 20 percent,
- 17 but only approximately 5.7 percent of these individuals
- 18 are actually screened; and
- 19 WHEREAS, in 2024 as the American Lung Association,
- 20 the oldest American voluntary health organization,
- 21 marks its 120th anniversary of being at the forefront
- 22 of improving public health and championing lung health
- 23 by focusing on four strategic imperatives: to defeat
- 24 lung cancer, create a tobacco-free future, champion
- 25 clean air for all, and improve the quality of life for
- 26 those living with lung disease; NOW THEREFORE,
- 27 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
- 28 That the House of Representatives designates the month
- 29 of November 2024 as Lung Cancer Awareness Month and
- 30 encourages the citizens of Iowa to speak with their

- 1 doctors and other health care providers to learn more
- 2 about lung cancer; and encourages the citizens of Iowa,
- 3 government agencies, private businesses, nonprofit
- 4 organizations, the media, and other interested entities
- 5 to increase awareness about what Iowans can do to
- 6 prevent, detect, and treat lung cancer.
