- 29 performance/general internet site and data system support;
- 30 successful progression for early readers; an early warning
- 31 system for literacy; the Iowa reading research center; computer
- 32 science professional development incentive fund; children's
- 33 mental health school-based training and support; for school
- 34 districts for students with intellectual and developmental
- 35 disabilities; distribution to the midwestern higher education

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- 1 compact to pay Iowa's member state annual obligation; community
- 2 colleges; the Iowa school for the deaf and Iowa braille and
- 3 sight saving school; the science, technology, engineering, and
- 4 mathematics collaborative initiative; the therapeutic classroom
- 5 incentive fund; the payment of claims for reimbursement
- 6 submitted for therapeutic classroom transportation; and the
- 7 LEAD-K program.
- 8 The bill includes appropriations to the department of
- 9 education for the college student aid commission for general
- 10 administrative purposes, administration of the future ready
- 11 Iowa skilled workforce last-dollar scholarship program, the
- 12 health care professional recruitment program, the national
- 13 guard service scholarship program, the all Iowa opportunity
- 14 scholarship program, the teach Iowa scholar program, the rural
- 15 Iowa primary care loan repayment program, the health care
- 16 loan repayment program, the rural veterinarian loan repayment
- 17 program, the future ready Iowa skilled workforce last-dollar
- 18 scholarship program, the future ready Iowa skilled workforce
- 19 grant program, the mental health professional loan repayment
- 20 program, and the Iowa workforce grant and incentive program.
- 21 The bill appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker
- 22 and job creation fund to the department of education.
- 23 STATE BOARD OF REGENTS. The bill appropriates moneys to
- 24 the state board of regents for the board office, universities'
- 25 general operating budgets, the western Iowa regents resource
- 26 center, the state university of Iowa, Iowa state university of
- 27 science and technology, and the university of northern Iowa.
- 28 STANDING APPROPRIATIONS. For FY 2023-2024, the bill limits
- 29 the standing appropriation for at-risk children under Code
- 30 section 279.51 and the work-study program under Code section
- 31 261.85, reduces the standing appropriation for tuition grants
- 32 for qualified students enrolled in eligible institutions
- 33 under Code section 261.25(2), and increases the standing
- 34 appropriation for tuition grants to qualified students
- 35 enrolled in accredited private institutions under Code section

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- 1 261.25(1).
- 2 DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION. The bill requires the
- 3 state board of regents to conduct a comprehensive study and
- 4 review of the diversity, equity, and inclusion programs and
- 5 efforts of each institution of higher learning under the state
- 6 board's control. The bill establishes the components the study
- 7 and review is to include.
- 8 The bill requires the state board of regents to prepare
- 9 a report containing its findings and recommendations to be
- 10 considered by the state board during its November 2023 meeting.
- 11 Additionally, the bill requires the state board of regents to
- 12 submit a final report containing findings and recommendations
- 13 to the governor and the general assembly no later than December
- 14 1, 2023.
- 15 The bill requires an institution of higher learning
- 16 under the control of the state board of regents to cease all
- 17 associated hiring in FY 2023-2024.
- 18 IOWA WORKFORCE GRANT AND INCENTIVE PROGRAM. The bill
- 19 establishes the Iowa workforce grant and incentive program
- 20 (WGIP) within the college student aid commission (commission),
- 21 subject to an appropriation of moneys by the general assembly.
- 22 The bill provides that a full-time eligible student may
- 23 receive an annual grant under the WGIP for not more than four
- 24 semesters or until the eligible student completes the eligible
- 25 program, whichever occurs first. The bill also provides that a
- 26 part-time eligible student may receive an annual grant under
- 27 the WGIP for not more than eight semesters, on a prorated
- 28 basis, or until the eligible student completes the eligible
- 29 program, whichever occurs first. The bill establishes that
- 30 the maximum amount of a grant under the WGIP to a full-time
- 31 eligible student shall not exceed \$2,000 per semester, and
- 32 the maximum amount of a grant under the WGIP to a part-time
- 33 eligible student shall be prorated based on the part-time
- 34 eligible student's semester hour enrollment. The bill requires
- 35 eligible students to submit new applications under the WGIP to

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- 1 the commission annually for reevaluation of eligibility. The
- 2 bill provides that if a grant recipient discontinues attendance
- 3 before the end of any semester, the eligible institution is
- 4 required to pay to the commission the entire amount of any
- 5 refund due to that recipient, up to the full amount of the
- 6 grant payments made during the semester.
- 7 When making awards under the WGIP, the bill requires the
- 8 commission to give priority to applicants who received an
- 9 award in the prior academic year and applicants with the least
- 10 financial ability to pay.
- 11 The bill provides that an individual who was an eligible
- 12 student who received a grant under the WGIP in the academic
- 13 year in which the eligible program is completed, and who
- 14 accepts and begins employment in an aligned occupation in this
- 15 state within six months of completing the eligible program,
- 16 may apply to the commission for one incentive payment of up to
- 17 \$2,000. The bill establishes that the commission shall pay the
- 18 incentive payment upon the successful applicant's completion of
- 19 12 consecutive months of employment in this state.
- 20 The bill establishes an Iowa workforce grant and incentive
- 21 program fund in the state treasury under the control of the
- 22 commission. The bill provides that all moneys deposited or
- 23 paid into the fund are appropriated to the commission to be
- 24 used for awarding grants and incentive payments under the WGIP.
- 25 The bill defines "commission", "eligible institution",
- 26 "eligible program", "eligible student", "financial need",
- 27 "full-time", and "part-time".
- The bill requires the Iowa workforce development board, in
- 29 collaboration with the state board of regents, to create a list
- 30 of high-wage and high-demand jobs and corresponding academic
- 31 majors offered by institutions of higher education governed by
- 32 the state board of regents for purposes of the WGIP. The bill
- 33 establishes the criteria for inclusion on the list. The bill
- 34 requires the Iowa workforce development board, in collaboration
- 35 with the state board of regents, to update the list at least

- 1 once every two years.
- 2 TASK FORCE FUNDING FOR AT-RISK STUDENTS AND DROPOUT
- 3 PREVENTION PROGRAMS. The bill requires the department of
- 4 education to convene and provide administrative support to a
- 5 task force. The bill establishes that the task force is to
- 6 study certain specified issues related to programs for at-risk
- 7 students and dropout prevention programs.
- 8 FUTURE READY IOWA SKILLED WORKFORCE GRANT PROGRAM. The
- 9 future ready Iowa skilled workforce grant program provides
- 10 tuition support to eligible students who have completed more
- 11 than two years of a four-year degree in a high-demand field.
- 12 The program provides a minimum of \$1,000 in tuition support
- 13 for eligible students who go back to school at eligible
- 14 institutions to finish an eligible program.
- The bill modifies the definition of "eligible institution"
- 16 under the program to include approved virtual institutions, as
- 17 defined in the bill. The bill also modifies the definition
- 18 of "eligible institution" to remove the requirement that the
- 19 eligible institution certify that prior to participating in
- 20 the program an eligible student has earned at least half of
- 21 the credits necessary for a bachelor's degree and is able to
- 22 complete a bachelor's degree in an eligible program of study
- 23 or academic major leading to a designated high-demand job in
- 24 the prescribed grant time frame.
- 25 The bill modifies the definition of "eligible student" to
- 26 remove the requirement that the eligible student has earned at
- 27 least half of the credits necessary for a bachelor's degree and
- 28 is able to complete a bachelor's degree in an eligible program
- 29 of study or academic major leading to a designated high-demand
- 30 job in the prescribed grant time frame. Current law requires
- 31 that an eligible student under the program must not have been
- 32 enrolled in postsecondary education during the 24 months
- 33 preceding the date on which the college student aid commission
- 34 receives the individual's application to participate in the
- 35 program. The bill strikes this requirement and replaces it

- 1 with a requirement that the eligible student must be at least
- 2 25 years of age at the time the student enrolls in an eligible
- 3 program.
- 4 The bill strikes a provision that prohibits new awards from
- 5 the grant program.
- 6 ALL IOWA OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP. The bill modifies several
- 7 provisions of the all Iowa opportunity scholarship program,
- 8 including modifying the definition of "eligible foster care
- 9 student" and modifying eligibility requirements under the
- 10 program. The bill provides that these provisions apply to
- 11 applications submitted under the program before, on, or after
- 12 the effective date of this division of the bill.
- 13 EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS CORRECTIONS. The bill
- 14 makes corrections to 2023 Iowa Acts, House File 68. These
- 15 provisions of the bill are effective upon enactment and apply
- 16 retroactively to January 24, 2023.
- 17 EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS DEPOSIT OF MONEYS. The
- 18 bill allows moneys in the education savings account fund to
- 19 be deposited into an account at any financial institution,
- 20 including financial institutions outside the state of Iowa,
- 21 if such deposits are adequately protected and necessary for
- 22 the effective administration of the education savings account
- 23 program.
- 24 GAP TUITION ASSISTANCE. The bill modifies the provisions
- 25 of the gap tuition assistance program to eliminate certain
- 26 requirements and make other changes related to coverage for
- 27 tuition assistance and eligible certificate programs.
- 28 STATE GOVERNMENT REALIGNMENT MODIFICATIONS. The bill
- 29 provides that certain provisions applicable to school district
- 30 employees also apply to employees of the Iowa educational
- 31 services for the blind and visually impaired program. The bill
- 32 requires the state board of regents to transfer all property
- 33 and records in its custody related to the Iowa educational
- 34 services for the blind and visually impaired program to the
- 35 department of education.

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- 1 The bill modifies the definition of "approved career and
- 2 technical education program" for purposes of the career and
- 3 technical education program.
- 4 STATE PROGRAM ALLOCATION FINE ARTS BEGINNING TEACHER
- 5 MENTORING PROGRAM. The bill allows the department of education
- 6 to consider in-kind contributions received by an organization
- 7 described in Code section 256.34 (fine arts beginning teacher
- 8 mentoring program) for matching purposes.
- 9 Current Code section 284.13 establishes how moneys
- 10 appropriated for purposes of the student achievement and
- 11 teacher quality program are to be allocated. The bill extends
- 12 the allocations established pursuant to Code section 284.13
- 13 to FY 2023-2024, and increases the allocations for the fine
- 14 arts beginning teacher mentoring program. The bill provides
- 15 that beginning in FY 2024-2025 rather than FY 2023-2024, of the
- 16 moneys appropriated for purposes of the student achievement and
- 17 teacher quality program, the final priority for the allocation
- 18 is \$10 million for purposes of implementing the supplemental
- 19 assistance for high-need schools provisions of Code section
- 20 284.11.
- 21 EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT AND PROGRAM-SHARING PROPERTY TAX LEVY.
- 22 Current law provides that the board of directors of a community
- 23 college may certify for a levy a tax on taxable property in
- 24 the merged area at a rate not exceeding 3 cents per \$1,000 of
- 25 assessed valuation for equipment replacement for the community
- 26 college. Current law also allows the board of directors to
- 27 certify for a levy on taxable property in the merged area at a
- 28 rate in excess of 3 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation if
- 29 the excess tax levied does not cause the total rate certified
- 30 to exceed 9 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation and if the
- 31 revenue generated by the levy is used for, among other things,
- 32 the purchase of instructional equipment. The bill modifies
- 33 this provision to allow for the revenue generated by the levy
- 34 to be used for the purchase of equipment.
- 35 These provisions of the bill take effect upon enactment.

- ONLINE STATE JOB POSTING SYSTEM REPEAL. The bill requires
- 2 the department of workforce development, in consultation with
- 3 the department of education, to establish a system that allows
- 4 the department of education, school districts, charter schools,
- 5 area education agencies, and accredited nonpublic schools to
- 6 post job openings on an internet site. The bill establishes
- 7 requirements related to the system and the internet site.
- 8 The bill repeals Code section 256.27, which provides for the
- 9 department of education's operation of an online state job
- 10 posting system.
