- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. Section 664A.8, Code 2023, is amended to read as
2 follows:

3 664A.8 Extension of no-contact order.

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4 Upon the filing of an application by the state or by the 5 victim of any public offense referred to in section 664A.2, 6 subsection 1 which is filed within ninety days prior to the 7 expiration of a modified no-contact order, the <u>The</u> court shall 8 modify and extend the no-contact order <u>upon the expiration of</u> 9 <u>the no-contact order</u> for an additional period of five years, 10 unless, <u>upon the filing of an application by the defendant</u> 11 <u>within ninety days prior to the expiration of a modified</u> 12 <u>no-contact order</u>, the court finds that the defendant no longer 13 poses a threat to the safety of the victim, persons residing 14 with the victim, or members of the victim's family. The number 15 of modifications extending the no-contact order permitted by 16 this section is not limited.

EXPLANATION

18 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with 19 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

20 This bill relates to the modification and extension of a 21 no-contact order.

22 Current law provides that upon the filing of an application 23 by the state or by a victim of domestic abuse assault, 24 harassment, stalking, sexual abuse in the first, second, or 25 third degree, or any other public offense for which there is a 26 victim which is filed within 90 days prior to the expiration of 27 a modified no-contact order, the court shall modify and extend 28 the no-contact order for an additional period of five years 29 unless the court finds the defendant no longer poses a threat 30 to the safety of the victim, persons residing with the victim, 31 or members of the victim's family.

32 The bill provides that the court shall modify and extend the 33 no-contact order upon the expiration of the no-contact order 34 for an additional period of five years, unless, upon the filing 35 of an application by the defendant within 90 days prior to the
