A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to education, including modifying provisions
- 2 related to comprehensive school improvement plans, teacher
- 3 librarians and guidance counselors, required days or
- 4 hours of instruction in elementary and secondary schools,
- 5 agreements between school districts and community colleges
- 6 to teach certain courses, and required courses in school
- 7 districts and accredited nonpublic schools, and authorizing
- 8 school districts to offer sequential units in one classroom.
- 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

DIVISION I

ELIMINATION OF COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Section 1. Section 256.7, subsection 21, paragraph a, Code

4 2023, is amended to read as follows:

- 5 a. Requirements that all school districts and accredited
- 6 nonpublic schools develop, implement, and file with the
- 7 department a comprehensive school improvement plan report that
- 8 includes but is not limited to demonstrated school, parental,
- 9 and community involvement in assessing educational needs,
- 10 establishing local education standards and student achievement
- 11 levels, and, as applicable, the consolidation of federal and
- 12 state planning, goal-setting, and reporting requirements
- 13 information necessary for the department of education to submit
- 14 to the United States secretary of education the plan required
- 15 pursuant to the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act,
- 16 as amended by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, Pub. L.
- 17 No. 114-95. Each school district and accredited nonpublic
- 18 school shall include in its comprehensive school improvement
- 19 plan a list and description of the online coursework offered
- 20 by the school district or accredited nonpublic school to which
- 21 the student is enrolled.
- 22 Sec. 2. Section 279.61, subsection 5, Code 2023, is amended
- 23 to read as follows:
- 5. For the school year beginning July 1, 2016, and each
- 25 succeeding school year, the board of directors of each
- 26 school district shall submit to the local community, and
- 27 to the department as a component of the school district's
- 28 comprehensive school improvement plan required by section
- 29 256.7, subsection 21, an annual report on student utilization
- 30 of the district's career information and decision-making
- 31 system.
- 32 Sec. 3. Section 279.68, subsection 3, paragraph a, Code
- 33 2023, is amended to read as follows:
- 34 a. To ensure all children are reading proficiently by the
- 35 end of third grade, each school district shall address reading

- 1 proficiency as part of its comprehensive school improvement
- 2 plan, drawing upon information about students from assessments
- 3 and reassessments conducted pursuant to subsection 1 and the
- 4 prevalence of areas in which students are persistently at risk
- 5 in reading identified by classroom, elementary school, and
- 6 other student characteristics. As part of its comprehensive
- 7 school improvement plan, each Each school district shall
- 8 review chronic early elementary absenteeism for its impact
- 9 on literacy development. If more than fifteen percent of an
- 10 attendance center's students are not reading proficiently and
- 11 are persistently at risk in reading by the end of third grade,
- 12 the comprehensive school improvement plan shall include school
- 13 district shall develop and implement strategies to reduce that
- 14 percentage, including school and community strategies to raise
- 15 the percentage of students who are reading at grade level.
- 16 Sec. 4. Section 280.19, Code 2023, is amended to read as
- 17 follows:
- 18 280.19 Plans for at-risk children.
- 19 The board of directors of each public school district shall
- 20 incorporate, into the kindergarten admissions program, criteria
- 21 and procedures for identification and integration of at-risk
- 22 children and their developmental needs. This incorporation
- 23 shall be part of the comprehensive school improvement plan
- 24 developed and implemented in accordance with section 256.7,
- 25 subsection 21, paragraph "a".
- Sec. 5. Section 280.28, subsection 7, Code 2023, is amended
- 27 to read as follows:
- 28 7. *Integration of policy and reporting Reporting.* The board
- 29 of directors of a school district and the authorities in charge
- 30 of each nonpublic school shall integrate its antiharassment and
- 31 antibullying policy into the comprehensive school improvement
- 32 plan required under section 256.7, subsection 21, and shall
- 33 report data collected under subsection 6, as specified by the
- 34 department, to the department and to the local community.
- 35 Sec. 6. Section 284.5, subsection 3, Code 2023, is amended

1 to read as follows:

 Each school district and area education agency that 3 provides a beginning teacher mentoring and induction program 4 under this chapter shall develop a plan for the program. 5 school district shall include its plan in the school district's 6 comprehensive school improvement plan submitted pursuant to 7 section 256.7, subsection 21. The plan shall, at a minimum, 8 provide for a two-year sequence of induction program content 9 and activities to support the Iowa teaching standards and 10 beginning teacher professional and personal needs; mentor ll training that includes, at a minimum, skills of classroom 12 demonstration and coaching, and district expectations for 13 beginning teacher competence on Iowa teaching standards; 14 placement of mentors and beginning teachers; the process for 15 dissolving mentor and beginning teacher partnerships; district 16 organizational support for release time for mentors and 17 beginning teachers to plan, provide demonstration of classroom 18 practices, observe teaching, and provide feedback; structure 19 for mentor selection and assignment of mentors to beginning 20 teachers; a district facilitator; and program evaluation. 21 Sec. 7. Section 284.6, subsections 3, 4, and 7, Code 2023, 22 are amended to read as follows: 23 3. A school district shall incorporate develop a district 24 professional development plan into the district's comprehensive 25 school improvement plan submitted to the department in 26 accordance with section 256.7, subsection 21. The district 27 professional development plan shall include a description of 28 the means by which the school district will provide access 29 to all teachers in the district to professional development 30 programs or offerings that meet the requirements of subsection 31 1. The plan shall align all professional development with 32 the school district's long-range student learning goals and 33 the Iowa teaching standards. The plan shall indicate the 34 school district's approved professional development provider 35 or providers.

- 1 4. In cooperation with the teacher's evaluator, the
 2 career teacher employed by a school district shall develop
 3 an individual teacher professional development plan. The
 4 evaluator shall consult with the teacher's supervisor on the
 5 development of the individual teacher professional development
 6 plan. The purpose of the plan is to promote individual and
 7 group professional development. The individual plan shall
 8 be based, at minimum, on the needs of the teacher, the Iowa
 9 teaching standards, and the student achievement goals of the
 10 attendance center and the school district as outlined in the
 11 comprehensive school improvement plan. The individual plan
 12 shall include goals for the individual which are beyond those
 13 required under the attendance center professional development
- 7. Each attendance center shall develop an attendance center professional development plan. The purpose of the plan is to promote group professional development. The attendance center plan shall be based, at a minimum, on the needs of the teachers, the Iowa teaching standards, district professional development plans, and the student achievement goals of the attendance center and the school district as set forth in the comprehensive school improvement plan.

- 23 Sec. 8. Section 284.14, subsection 3, paragraph a, Code 24 2023, is amended to read as follows:
- 25 a. Commencing with the school year beginning July 1,
 26 2007, the commission shall initiate planning pilots, in

 28 the effectiveness of the pay-for-performance program. The
 29 purpose of the planning pilots is to identify the strengths
 30 and weaknesses of various pay-for-performance program designs,

- 12 administrator mentoring and induction program shall, at a
- 13 minimum, provide for one year of programming to support the
- 14 Iowa standards for school administrators adopted pursuant to
- 15 section 256.7, subsection 27, and beginning administrators'
- 16 professional and personal needs. Each school board shall
- 17 develop and implement a beginning administrator mentoring and
- 18 induction plan. The plan shall describe the mentor selection
- 19 process, describe supports for beginning administrators,

- 34 chapter 272 and is employed by a school district or area
- 35 education agency in a school district administrative position

- 1 shall develop an individual administrator professional
- 2 development plan. The purpose of the plan is to promote
- 3 individual and group professional development. The individual
- 4 plan shall be based, at a minimum, on the needs of the
- 5 administrator, the Iowa standards for school administrators
- 6 adopted pursuant to section 256.7, subsection 27, and the
- 7 student achievement goals of the attendance center and the
- 8 school district as outlined in the comprehensive school
- 9 improvement plan.
- 10 DIVISION II
- 11 TEACHER LIBRARIANS AND GUIDANCE COUNSELORS
- 12 Sec. 11. Section 256.11, subsections 9 and 9A, Code 2023,
- 13 are amended to read as follows:
- 9. a. Beginning July 1, 2006 2023, each school district
- 15 shall have employ either a qualified teacher librarian who
- 16 shall be licensed by the board of educational examiners under
- 17 chapter 272 or a person previously employed as a librarian by a
- 18 public library. The board of educational examiners shall not
- 19 require an applicant for a teacher librarian license to have
- 20 a master's degree.
- 21 b. The state board shall establish in rule standards for
- 22 school district library programs, which shall be designed to
- 23 provide for methods to improve library collections to meet
- 24 student needs, include a current and diverse collection of
- 25 fiction and nonfiction materials in a variety of formats
- 26 to support student curricular needs, and include a plan
- 27 for annually updating and replacing library materials and
- 28 equipment.
- c. The state board shall establish in rule a definition
- 30 of and standards for an articulated sequential kindergarten
- 31 through grade twelve media program.
- 32 d. A school district that entered into a contract with an
- 33 individual for employment as a media specialist or librarian
- 34 prior to June 1, 2006, shall be considered to be in compliance
- 35 with this subsection until June 30, 2011, if the individual

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1 is making annual progress toward meeting the requirements
 2 for a teacher librarian endorsement issued by the board of
 3 educational examiners under chapter 272. A school district
 4 that entered into a contract with an individual for employment
 5 as a media specialist or librarian who holds at least a
 6 master's degree in library and information studies shall be
 7 considered to be in compliance with this subsection until the
 8 individual leaves the employ of the school district.
 9
          Beginning July 1, 2007, each school district shall
10 have a qualified guidance counselor who shall be licensed by
11 the board of educational examiners under chapter 272. Each
12 school district shall work toward the goal of having one
13 qualified quidance counselor for every three hundred fifty
14 students enrolled in the school district. The state board
15 shall establish in rule a definition of and standards for
16 an articulated sequential kindergarten through grade twelve
17 guidance and counseling program. The program shall be designed
18 to ensure that the guidance counselor can work collaboratively
19 with students, teachers, support staff, and administrators
20 to support the curricular goals of the school by offering
21 responsive services that address the growth and development
22 needs of students and the attainment of student competencies in
23 academic, career, and social areas.

      Sec. 12. Section 279.10, subsection 1, Code 2023, is amended
28 to read as follows:
29
          The school year for each school district and accredited
30 nonpublic school shall begin on July 1 and the school calendar
31 shall begin no sooner than August 23 and no later than the
32 first Monday in December. The school calendar shall include
33 not less than one hundred eighty days or one thousand eighty
34 hours of instruction during the calendar year, of which
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35 not more than five days or thirty hours of instruction may

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1 be delivered primarily over the internet. The board of
 2 directors of a school district and the authorities in charge
 3 of an accredited nonpublic school shall determine the school
 4 start date for the school calendar in accordance with this
 5 subsection and shall set the number of days or hours of
 6 required attendance for the school year as provided in section
 7 299.1, subsection 2, but the board of directors of a school
 8 district shall hold a public hearing on any proposed school
 9 calendar prior to adopting the school calendar. If the board
10 of directors of a district or the authorities in charge of an
11 accredited nonpublic school extends the school calendar because
12 inclement weather caused the school district or accredited
13 nonpublic school to temporarily close during the regular school
14 calendar, the school district or accredited nonpublic school
15 may excuse a graduating senior who has met district or school
16 requirements for graduation from attendance during the extended
17 school calendar. A school corporation may begin employment
18 of personnel for in-service training and development purposes
19 before the date to begin elementary and secondary school.

      Sec. 13. Section 279.50A, Code 2023, is amended to read as
23 follows:
      279.50A Educational standards — agreements for mathematics

      1. If a school district's total enrollment exceeds six
26
27 hundred pupils, the A school district may enter into an
28 agreement with a community college under which the community
29 college may offer, or provide a community college-employed
30 instructor to teach, one of the units in accordance with
31 section 256.11, subsection 5, paragraph "a", or one of the units
32 in accordance with section 256.11, subsection 5, paragraph
33 "d" or "e" any unit, and if the unit of coursework under
34 the agreement meets the requirements specified in section
35 257.11, subsection 3, paragraph "b", subparagraphs (2) through
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- 1 (7), the unit offered shall be deemed to meet the education
- 2 program requirement for a unit of mathematics or science,
- 3 as applicable, pertaining to the unit under section 256.11,
- 4 subsection 5, paragraph "a", "d", or "e" if applicable. The
- 5 provisions of this subsection are applicable only if all of the
- 6 following conditions are met:
- 7 a. The school district has made every reasonable and good
- 8 faith effort to employ a teacher licensed under chapter 272
- 9 for the unit of science or mathematics, as applicable, and
- 10 is unable to employ such a teacher. For purposes of this
- 11 subsection, "good faith effort" means the same as defined in
- 12 section 279.19A, subsection 9.
- 13 b. Enrollment for the unit exceeds five pupils.
- 14 c. a. The unit is offered during the regular school day.
- 15 d_{r} b. The unit is made accessible by the school district
- 16 to all eligible pupils.
- 2. Pupils enrolled in a unit of coursework offered pursuant
- 18 to subsection 1 are not eligible for supplementary weighting
- 19 under section 257.11, subsection 3.
- 20 DIVISION V
- 21 AUTHORIZATION TO OFFER SEQUENTIAL UNITS IN ONE CLASSROOM
- Sec. 14. Section 256.11, Code 2023, is amended by adding the
- 23 following new subsection:
- 24 NEW SUBSECTION. 5A. a. The board of directors of a
- 25 school district or the authorities in charge of an accredited
- 26 nonpublic school may authorize a teacher who is appropriately
- 27 licensed by the board of educational examiners under chapter
- 28 272 to teach two or more sequential units of one subject area
- 29 in the same classroom at the same time in grades nine through
- 30 twelve. The board of directors of a school district or the
- 31 authorities in charge of an accredited nonpublic school shall
- 32 award high school credit to a student upon the student's
- 33 successful completion of the course. The teacher must meet the
- 34 minimum certification requirements of the national organization
- 35 that administers the advanced placement program if one of the

1 units being offered pursuant to this paragraph is an advanced
2 placement course.

The board of directors of a school district or the 4 authorities in charge of an accredited nonpublic school may 5 authorize a community college-employed instructor who is 6 providing instruction in the school pursuant to section 261E.8 7 through a contractual agreement between a community college 8 and the school district or accredited nonpublic school to 9 teach two or more sequential units of one subject area in 10 the same classroom at the same time in grades nine through The board of directors of a school district or the 12 authorities in charge of an accredited nonpublic school shall 13 award high school credit to a student upon the student's 14 successful completion of the course if the board of directors 15 of the school district or the authorities in charge of the 16 accredited nonpublic school approved the course pursuant to 17 section 261E.8, subsection 3. The community college-employed 18 instructor must meet the minimum certification requirements 19 of the national organization that administers the advanced 20 placement program if one of the units being offered pursuant to 21 this paragraph is an advanced placement course.

23 EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS

Sec. 15. Section 256.7, subsection 26, paragraph a, subparagraph (3), Code 2023, is amended to read as follows:

(3) The rules establishing a core curriculum shall address the core content standards in subsection 28 and the skills and knowledge students need to be successful in the twenty-first century. The core curriculum shall include social studies and twenty-first century learning skills which include but are not limited to civic literacy, health literacy, technology literacy, financial literacy, family life and consumer sciences, and employability skills; and shall address the curricular needs of students in kindergarten through grade twelve in those areas. The state board shall further define

- 1 the twenty-first century learning skills components by rule.
- 2 Sec. 16. Section 256.11, subsection 1, paragraph a, Code
- 3 2023, is amended to read as follows:
- 4 a. If a school offers a prekindergarten program, the
- 5 program shall be designed to help children to work and play
- 6 with others, to express themselves, to learn to use and manage
- 7 their bodies, and to extend their interests and understanding
- 8 of the world about them. The prekindergarten program shall
- 9 relate the role of the family to the child's developing sense
- 10 of self and perception of others. Planning and carrying out
- 11 prekindergarten activities designed to encourage cooperative
- 12 efforts between home and school and shall focus on community
- 13 resources. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection,
- 14 a prekindergarten teacher shall hold a license certifying
- 15 that the holder is qualified to teach in prekindergarten. A
- 16 nonpublic school which offers only a prekindergarten may, but
- 17 is not required to, seek and obtain accreditation.
- 18 Sec. 17. Section 256.11, subsections 3 and 4, Code 2023, are
- 19 amended to read as follows:
- 20 3. The following areas shall be taught in grades one through
- 21 six: English-language arts, social studies, mathematics,
- 22 science, health, age-appropriate and research-based human
- 23 growth and development, physical education, traffic safety,
- 24 music, and visual art. Computer science instruction
- 25 incorporating the standards established under section 256.7,
- 26 subsection 26, paragraph "a", subparagraph (4), shall be
- 27 offered in at least one grade level commencing with the school
- 28 year beginning July 1, 2023. The health curriculum shall
- 29 include the characteristics of communicable diseases including
- 30 acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The state board as part
- 31 of accreditation standards shall adopt curriculum definitions
- 32 for implementing the elementary program.
- 33 4. The following shall be taught in grades seven and
- 34 eight: English-language arts; social studies; mathematics;
- 35 science; health; age-appropriate and research-based human

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1 growth and development; career exploration and development;
 2 physical education; music; and visual art. Computer science
 3 instruction incorporating the standards established under
 4 section 256.7, subsection 26, paragraph "a", subparagraph (4),
 5 shall be offered in at least one grade level commencing with
 6 the school year beginning July 1, 2023. Career exploration
 7 and development shall be designed so that students are
 8 appropriately prepared to create an individual career
 9 and academic plan pursuant to section 279.61, incorporate
10 foundational career and technical education concepts aligned
11 with the six career and technical education service areas
12 as defined in subsection 5, paragraph "h", and incorporate
13 relevant twenty-first century skills to facilitate career
14 readiness, and introduce students to career opportunities
15 within the local community and across this state.

16 curriculum shall include age-appropriate and research-based
17 information regarding the characteristics of sexually
18 transmitted diseases, including HPV and the availability of
19 a vaccine to prevent HPV, and acquired immune deficiency
              The state board as part of accreditation standards
21 shall adopt curriculum definitions for implementing the
22 program in grades seven and eight. However, this subsection
23 shall not apply to the teaching of career exploration and
24 development in nonpublic schools. For purposes of this
25 section, "age-appropriate", "HPV", and "research-based" mean the
26 same as defined in section 279.50.
27
      Sec. 18. Section 256.11, subsection 5, paragraphs f, q, and
28 i, Code 2023, are amended to read as follows:
29
      f. Four Two sequential units of one world language, which
30 may include American sign language. The department may waive
31 the third and fourth years of the world language requirement on
32 an annual basis upon the request of the board of directors of
33 a school district or the authorities in charge of a nonpublic
34 school if the board or authorities are able to prove that a
35 licensed teacher was employed and assigned a schedule that
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- 1 would have allowed students to enroll in a world language
- 2 class, the world language class was properly scheduled,
- 3 students were aware that a world language class was scheduled,
- 4 and no students enrolled in the class.
- g. (1) All students physically able shall be required
- 6 to participate in a minimum of one-eighth unit of physical
- 7 education activities during each semester they are enrolled
- 8 in school except as otherwise provided in this paragraph.
- 9 A minimum of one-eighth unit each semester is required. A
- 10 twelfth grade student who meets the requirements of this
- 11 paragraph may shall be excused from the physical education
- 12 requirement by the principal of the school in which the student
- 13 is enrolled if the parent or guardian of the student requests
- 14 in writing that the student be excused from the physical
- 15 education requirement. A student who wishes to be excused

- 26 unit of physical education An activity that is sponsored by
- 27 the school in which the student is enrolled which requires at
- 28 least as much physical activity per week as one-eighth unit of
- 29 physical education.
- 30 (2) Students in grades nine through eleven may be excused
- 31 from the physical education requirement in order to enroll
- 32 in academic courses not otherwise available to the student
- 33 if the board of directors of the school district in which
- 34 the school is located, or the authorities in charge of the
- 35 school, if the school is a nonpublic school, determine that

- 1 students from the school may be permitted to be excused
- 2 from the physical education requirement. A student may be
- 3 excused by the principal of the school in which the student
- 4 is enrolled, in consultation with the student's counselor,
- 5 for up to one semester, trimester, or the equivalent of a
- 6 semester or trimester, per year if the parent or guardian of
- 7 the student requests in writing that the student be excused
- 8 from the physical education requirement. The student seeking
- 9 to be excused from the physical education requirement must, at
- 10 some time during the period for which the excuse is sought, be
- 11 a participant in an organized and supervised athletic program
- 12 which requires at least as much time of participation per week
- 13 as one-eighth unit of physical education.

- 1 life; age-appropriate and research-based human growth and
- 2 development; substance abuse and nonuse; emotional and social
- 3 health; health resources; cardiopulmonary resuscitation; and
- 4 prevention and control of disease, including age-appropriate
- 5 and research-based information regarding sexually transmitted

- 8 teacher librarians and guidance counselors, required days or
- 9 hours of instruction in elementary and secondary schools,
- 10 agreements between school districts and community colleges to
- 11 teach certain courses, and required courses in school districts
- 12 and accredited nonpublic schools, and authorizes school
- 13 districts to offer sequential units in one classroom.
- 14 DIVISION I ELIMINATION OF COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL
- 15 IMPROVEMENT PLAN. Current law requires all school districts
- 16 and accredited nonpublic schools to file with the department
- 17 of education (DE) a comprehensive school improvement plan
- 18 that includes demonstrated school, parental, and community
- 19 involvement in assessing educational needs, establishing local
- 20 education standards and student achievement levels, and, as
- 21 applicable, the consolidation of federal and state planning,
- 22 goal-setting, and reporting requirements. The division strikes
- 23 this requirement. The division requires all school districts

- The division provides that the board of directors of a school district or the authorities in charge of an accredited nonpublic school may authorize a community college-employed instructor who is providing instruction in the school pursuant to Code section 261E.8 (district-to-community college sharing or concurrent enrollment program) to teach two or more sequential units of one subject area in the same classroom at the same time in grades 9 through 12. The division requires the board of directors of a school district or the authorities in charge of an accredited nonpublic school to award high school credit to a student upon the student's

- 1 successful completion of the course if the board of directors
- 2 of the school district or the authorities in charge of the
- 3 accredited nonpublic school approved the course pursuant to
- 4 Code section 261E.8. The division provides that the community
- 5 college-employed instructor must meet the minimum certification
- 6 requirements of the national organization that administers the
- 7 advanced placement program if one of the units being offered
- 8 pursuant to this provision is an advanced placement course.
- 9 DIVISION VI EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS. Current law requires
- 10 that the core curriculum established by the state board
- 11 of education shall include, among other things, technology
- 12 literacy. The division strikes this requirement.
- 13 Current law requires that the prekindergarten program shall
- 14 relate the role of the family to the child's developing sense

- 19 The division strikes the requirement that the health
- 20 curriculum provided in school districts and accredited
- 21 nonpublic schools in grades 1 through 12 include instruction
- 22 related to the characteristics of acquired immune deficiency
- 23 syndrome. The division makes conforming changes to Code
- 24 section 279.50 (human growth and development instruction).
- 25 The division provides that the career exploration and
- 26 development curriculum provided in school districts and
- 27 accredited nonpublic schools in grades seven and eight shall
- 28 incorporate relevant skills to facilitate career readiness, and
- 29 introduce students to career opportunities within the local
- 30 community and across this state.
- 31 Current law provides that the world language instruction
- 32 provided in school districts and accredited nonpublic schools
- 33 in grades 9 through 12 shall include four sequential units of
- 34 one world language. The division reduces this requirement to
- 35 two sequential units of one world language.

1 Current law provides that the fine arts instruction provided 2 in school districts and accredited nonpublic schools in grades 3 9 through 12 shall include three units of the fine arts. 4 division reduces this requirement to two units of fine arts 5 and provides that this instruction may include dance, music, 6 theater, or visual art. Current law requires that all students in grades 9 through 8 12 in school districts and accredited nonpublic schools who 9 are physically able shall participate in physical education 10 activities during each semester, unless certain exceptions 11 apply. Current law establishes that a student in grade 12 may 12 be excused from this requirement if the parent or guardian of 13 the student requests in writing that the student be excused 14 from the physical education requirement in order to enroll in 15 academic courses not otherwise available to the student or be 16 enrolled or participating in certain specified activities, 17 including an organized athletic program that requires at least 18 as much participation per week as physical education. 19 division provides that any student in grades 9 through 12 may 20 be excused from this requirement. The division adds to the 21 list of specified activities for which a student may be excused 22 from the physical education requirement any activity that 23 is sponsored by the school in which the student is enrolled 24 which requires at least as much physical activity per week as 25 one-eighth unit of physical education. The division removes 26 from the list of specified activities for which a student may 27 be excused from the physical education requirement an organized 28 athletic program that requires at least as much participation 29 per week as physical education. Current law provides that the health education instruction 30 31 provided in school districts and accredited nonpublic schools 32 in grades 9 through 12 shall include certain specified subject 33 areas.
