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A BILL FOR

- 1 An Act relating to the state child care assistance eligibility
- 2 requirements and provider reimbursement rates.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

- 1 Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES CHILD
- 2 CARE ASSISTANCE FAMILY INCOME ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS.
- The department of health and human services shall amend
- 4 its administrative rules pursuant to chapter 17A to provide
- 5 income eligibility for state child care assistance, according
- 6 to family size for children needing basic care, to families
- 7 whose nonexempt gross monthly income does not exceed the
- 8 following amounts according to the following schedule:
- 9 a. One hundred fifty percent of the federal poverty level,
- 10 effective July 1, 2023.
- 11 b. One hundred sixty percent of the federal poverty level,
- 12 effective July 1, 2024.
- 13 c. One hundred seventy percent of the federal poverty level,
- 14 effective July 1, 2025.
- d. One hundred eighty percent of the federal poverty level,
- 16 effective July 1, 2026.
- e. One hundred ninety percent of the federal poverty level,
- 18 effective July 1, 2027.
- 19 f. Two hundred percent of the federal poverty level,
- 20 effective July 1, 2028.
- 21 2. The department of health and human services shall amend
- 22 its administrative rules pursuant to chapter 17A to provide
- 23 that child care assistance under the child care assistance
- 24 plus exit eligibility program shall continue until a family's
- 25 nonexempt gross monthly income exceeds two hundred fifty
- 26 percent of the federal poverty level.
- 27 3. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, for child
- 28 care providers reimbursed under the state child care assistance
- 29 program, the department of health and human services shall set
- 30 provider reimbursement rates based on the most recent market
- 31 rate survey completed in 2021.
- 32 Sec. 2. EMERGENCY RULES. The department of health and
- 33 human services may adopt emergency rules under section 17A.4,
- 34 subsection 3, and section 17A.5, subsection 2, paragraph "b",
- 35 to implement the provisions of this Act and the rules shall

- 1 be effective immediately upon filing unless a later date is
- 2 specified in the rules. Any rules adopted in accordance with
- 3 this section shall also be published as a notice of intended
- 4 action as provided in section 17A.4.
- 5 EXPLANATION
- The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.
- 8 This bill relates to the state child care assistance income
- 9 eligibility requirements for families and reimbursement rates
- 10 for child care providers.
- 11 The state child care assistance program is administered by
- 12 the department of health and human services (HHS). The bill
- 13 directs HHS to amend its administrative rules to provide income
- 14 eligibility for state child care assistance, according to
- 15 family size for children needing basic care, to families whose
- 16 nonexempt gross monthly income does not exceed 150 percent
- 17 of the federal poverty level, effective July 1, 2023; 160
- 18 percent of the federal poverty level, effective July 1, 2024;
- 19 170 percent of the federal poverty level, effective July 1,
- 20 2025; 180 percent of the federal poverty level, effective July
- 21 1, 2026; 190 percent of the federal poverty level, effective
- 22 July 1, 2027; and 200 percent of the federal poverty level,
- 23 effective July 1, 2028. The bill also directs HHS to amend
- 24 its administrative rules to provide that eligibility for the
- 25 child care assistance plus exit program shall continue until a
- 26 family's nonexempt gross monthly income exceeds 250 percent of
- 27 the federal poverty level.
- 28 The bill directs HHS, for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
- 29 2023, to set reimbursement rates for child care providers under
- 30 the state child care assistance program to rates based on the
- 31 most recent market rate survey completed in 2021.
