**A BILL FOR**

1 An Act relating to state government, including matters under the  
2 purview of the department of management and state membership  
3 in the Iowa individual health benefit reinsurance association,  
4 and including effective date, applicability, and retroactive  
5 applicability provisions.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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1 Section 1. Section 8.57C, subsections 2, 3, and 4, Code 2025,  
2 are amended to read as follows:

3 2. Moneys in the fund in a fiscal year shall be  
4 used as appropriated by the general assembly ~~for the~~  
5 ~~acquisition of computer hardware and software, software~~  
6 ~~development, telecommunications equipment, and maintenance and~~  
7 ~~lease agreements associated with technology components and for~~  
8 ~~the purchase of equipment intended to provide an uninterruptible~~  
9 ~~power supply~~ to the department of management to provide  
10 a stable funding source for implementation costs of state  
11 information technology projects that enhance the state's  
12 technology infrastructure, improve government services, and  
13 promote innovation and economic development, including but not  
14 limited to new information technology projects and infrastructure  
15 replacement efforts of a department or establishment.

16 3. a. The department of management shall prioritize proposed  
17 projects based on all of the following considerations:

18 (1) Whether the project aligns with the state's strategic  
19 priorities.

20 (2) Whether the project promotes or introduces new technology  
21 or significantly improves an existing system.

22 (3) Whether the project is feasible and whether the  
23 department or establishment has established readiness for the  
24 project to proceed, including a clear assessment of timelines,  
25 budgets, and measurable outcomes.

26 (4) Whether the project includes a clear change management  
27 strategy to support user adoption and aligns with lean enterprise  
28 principles to maximize value, minimize waste, and ensure  
29 continuous improvement.

30 (5) Whether the project provides a positive return on  
31 investment, considering both financial returns and nonfinancial  
32 benefits such as improved public safety, education, or health  
33 care.

34 (6) Whether the project results in infrastructure that is  
35 scalable across the state enterprise.

1     (7) Whether the department or establishment has identified  
2 how the completed project will be sustained beyond the initial  
3 funding period.

4     (8) Whether the project improves access to governmental  
5 services, particularly in rural communities.

6     (9) Whether the project involves an infrastructure project  
7 as opposed to maintenance or standard upgrades of existing  
8 technology.

9     b. The department of management shall provide a prioritized  
10 list of proposed projects for funding to the governor, who shall  
11 use the list in developing a budgetary recommendation for the  
12 general assembly pursuant to section 8.21 for the fiscal year  
13 beginning July 1, 2026, and for each fiscal year thereafter.

14     ~~3. a. There is appropriated from the general fund of the~~  
15 ~~state to the technology reinvestment fund for the fiscal year~~  
16 ~~beginning July 1, 2025, and for each subsequent fiscal year~~  
17 ~~thereafter, the sum of seventeen million five hundred thousand~~  
18 ~~dollars.~~

19     ~~b. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure~~  
20 ~~fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, and ending~~  
21 ~~June 30, 2024, the sum of eighteen million three hundred~~  
22 ~~ninety thousand two hundred ninety dollars to the technology~~  
23 ~~reinvestment fund, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 3,~~  
24 ~~paragraph "c".~~

25     ~~c. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa infrastructure~~  
26 ~~fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and ending June~~  
27 ~~30, 2025, the sum of twenty-one million one hundred thirty-one~~  
28 ~~thousand eight hundred seventy-three dollars to the technology~~  
29 ~~reinvestment fund, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 3,~~  
30 ~~paragraph "c".~~

31     c. Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys in the technology  
32 reinvestment fund that remain unencumbered or unobligated at  
33 the close of a fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain  
34 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until  
35 the close of the fiscal year that ends three years after the

1 end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made.  
2 Notwithstanding section 12C.7, subsection 2, interest or earnings  
3 on moneys in the fund shall be credited to the fund.

4 4. ~~Annually, on~~ On or before January 15 of each year, a  
5 ~~state agency that received an appropriation from this fund the~~  
6 ~~department of management shall report to the legislative services~~  
7 ~~agency and the department of management general assembly the~~  
8 ~~status of all projects funded under this section that have been~~  
9 ~~completed since the previous report was submitted or that are in~~  
10 ~~progress. The report shall~~ must include a description of the  
11 project, the progress of work completed, the total estimated cost  
12 of the project, a list of all revenue sources being used to fund  
13 the project, the amount of ~~funds~~ moneys expended, the amount of  
14 ~~funds~~ moneys obligated, and the date the project was completed or  
15 an estimated completion date of the project, where applicable.

16 Sec. 2. Section 8.78, Code 2025, is amended to read as  
17 follows:

18 **8.78 Background checks.**

19 An applicant for employment with the department, or an  
20 applicant for employment with a supported entity for a position  
21 as information technology staff, may be subject to a background  
22 investigation by the department. The background investigation  
23 may include, without limitation, a work history, financial  
24 review, request for criminal history data, and national criminal  
25 history check through the federal bureau of investigation.  
26 In addition, a contractor, vendor, employee, or any other  
27 individual performing work for the department, or an individual  
28 on the information technology staff of a supported entity, may  
29 be subject to a national criminal history check through the  
30 federal bureau of investigation at least once every ~~ten~~ five  
31 years, including, without limitation, any time the department or  
32 supported entity has reason to believe an individual has been  
33 convicted of a crime. The department may request the national  
34 criminal history check and, if requested, shall provide the  
35 individual's fingerprints to the department of public safety for

1 submission through the state criminal history repository to the  
2 federal bureau of investigation. The individual shall authorize  
3 release of the results of the national criminal history check  
4 to the department and the applicable supported entity. The  
5 department shall pay the actual cost of the fingerprinting and  
6 national criminal history check, if any, unless otherwise agreed  
7 as part of a contract between the department or supported entity  
8 and a vendor or contractor performing work for the department  
9 or supported entity. The results of a criminal history check  
10 conducted pursuant to this section shall not be considered a  
11 public record under chapter 22.

12 Sec. 3. NEW SECTION. **8.94 Contracts — prohibited terms.**

13 Provisions included in a contract entered into pursuant to  
14 this subchapter that impose terms or conditions prohibited by  
15 this section are void as contrary to public policy. Such a  
16 contract shall be interpreted and enforced as if the contract did  
17 not include the prohibited terms or conditions. Prohibited terms  
18 and conditions include all of the following:

19 1. A provision requiring the department or a supported entity  
20 to defend, indemnify, hold harmless another person, or otherwise  
21 assume the debt or liability of another person in violation of  
22 Article VII, section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Iowa.

23 2. A provision that seeks to impose a term that is unknown  
24 to the department or supported entity at the time of signing the  
25 contract or that can be unilaterally changed by an entity other  
26 than the department or a supported entity.

27 3. A provision that violates chapter 13 by not allowing  
28 the department or a supported entity to participate in its own  
29 defense through representation by the attorney general.

30 4. A provision that grants to a person other than the  
31 attorney general the authority to convey to a court or litigant  
32 the state's consent to any settlement of a suit involving the  
33 contract when such settlement could impose liability on the  
34 state.

35 5. A provision that specifies that the contract is governed

1 by the laws of a foreign state or nation.

2 6. A provision that claims blanket confidentiality of the  
3 contract's terms.

4 7. A provision that claims that payment terms, including but  
5 not limited to cost proposals or other pricing information, of  
6 the contract are confidential.

7 8. A provision that authorizes or requires a venue for  
8 litigation other than an appropriate state or federal court  
9 sitting in Iowa.

10 9. A provision that requires the department or a supported  
11 entity to pay attorney fees, court costs, or other litigation  
12 expenses in the event of a contractual dispute.

13 10. A provision that imposes on the department or a supported  
14 entity binding arbitration or any other binding extrajudicial  
15 dispute resolution process in which the final resolution is not  
16 determined by the state.

17 11. A provision that waives the department's or a supported  
18 entity's right to a jury trial.

19 12. A provision that obligates the department or a supported  
20 entity to pay late payment charges not consistent with section  
21 8A.514, interest greater than allowed under section 8A.514 or  
22 other applicable law, or any cancellation charges, as such  
23 charges constitute pledges of the state's credit.

24 13. A provision that obligates the department or a supported  
25 entity to pay a tax.

26 14. A provision that imposes a prior notice obligation on the  
27 department or a supported entity as a condition for the automatic  
28 renewal of a software license. The department or a supported  
29 entity may provide notice of its intent to terminate a software  
30 license at any time before the renewal date established in the  
31 contract.

32 15. A provision that obligates the department or a supported  
33 entity to accept risk of loss before the receipt of items or  
34 goods.

35 16. A provision that obligates the department or a supported

1 entity to have commercial insurance.

2 17. A provision that obligates the department or a supported  
3 entity to grant to a nongovernmental entity full or partial  
4 ownership of intellectual property developed pursuant to the  
5 contract when the intellectual property is developed in whole or  
6 in part using federal funding.

7 18. A provision that limits the time in which the department  
8 or a supported entity may bring a legal claim under the contract  
9 to a period shorter than that provided in Iowa law.

10 19. A boilerplate provision included in transactional  
11 documents received by the department or a supported entity that  
12 seeks to alter the terms of the contract or to impose new terms  
13 in the contract.

14 Sec. 4. NEW SECTION. **8.95 Contracts — required terms.**

15 All of the following provisions shall be deemed to be included  
16 in a contract entered into by the department or a supported  
17 entity under this subchapter:

18 1. *Governing law.* The contract shall be governed by the laws  
19 of the state of Iowa, without giving effect to any conflicts of  
20 law principles of Iowa law that may require the application of  
21 another jurisdiction's law.

22 2. *Venue.* Any litigation commenced in connection with the  
23 contract shall be brought and maintained in an appropriate state  
24 or federal court sitting in Iowa.

25 Sec. 5. NEW SECTION. **8.96 Contracts — limitation of  
26 liability — prohibited terms.**

27 Notwithstanding section 8A.311, subsection 22, and rules  
28 adopted pursuant to that subsection, the director may include  
29 a contractual limitation of vendor liability in information  
30 technology goods and services contracts. A contractual  
31 limitation of vendor liability must take into consideration  
32 the public interest and the mitigation of risks associated  
33 with the use of information technology goods or services.  
34 Any portion of a contractual limitation of vendor liability  
35 that includes a repudiation of all liability for cybersecurity

1 incidents or a limitation on the vendor's liability for  
2 intentional torts, criminal acts, fraudulent conduct, intentional  
3 or willful misconduct, gross negligence, death, bodily injury,  
4 damage to real or personal property, intellectual property  
5 violations, liquidated damages, compliance with applicable  
6 laws, violations of confidential information obligations,  
7 or contractual obligations of the vendor pertaining to  
8 indemnification shall be void as a matter of law as contrary  
9 to public policy. A contractual limit of vendor liability that  
10 does not apply equally to the contracted parties or that limits  
11 a vendor's liability to less than the contract value inclusive of  
12 all possible extensions is void as a matter of law as contrary to  
13 public policy.

14 Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. **8.97 Confidentiality of communications**  
15 **with chief information security officer.**

16 In the interest of facilitating communication between the  
17 chief information security officer and other entities concerning  
18 security incidents and security breaches, all such communications  
19 and any documents generated based in whole or in part on such  
20 communications are confidential. Notwithstanding chapter 22 or  
21 any other provision of law to the contrary, the department  
22 shall not release such communications pursuant to state open  
23 records laws, and such communications shall not be received  
24 into evidence, subject to discovery, or otherwise used in a  
25 trial, hearing, or other proceeding in or before any court,  
26 regulatory body, or other authority of the state or a political  
27 subdivision of the state, unless the communications are subject  
28 to a protective order that prohibits further disclosure of  
29 such communications and requires any court filings of such  
30 communications to be made under seal. It is the intent of the  
31 general assembly that these prohibitions and restrictions also  
32 apply to federal courts, regulatory bodies, and other authorities  
33 and for purposes of federal open records laws, to the extent  
34 allowed by federal law and court rules. The chief information  
35 security officer shall not release such communications other than

1 for any of the following purposes:

2 1. Identifying a cybersecurity threat, including the source  
3 of the cybersecurity threat, or a security vulnerability, and  
4 then only to government officials for purposes of addressing the  
5 threat.

6 2. Responding to, or otherwise preventing or mitigating,  
7 a specific threat of death, serious bodily harm, or serious  
8 economic harm.

9 3. Responding to, investigating, prosecuting, or otherwise  
10 preventing or mitigating a serious threat to a minor, including  
11 sexual exploitation and threats to physical safety.

12 4. Preventing, investigating, disrupting, or prosecuting an  
13 offense under state or federal law.

14 5. Providing a confidential cybersecurity briefing to the  
15 governor or a member of the general assembly.

16 Sec. 7. NEW SECTION. **8.98 Criminal justice information.**

17 1. The department is authorized to maintain an integrated  
18 information system that enables automated data sharing among the  
19 executive branch, judicial branch, and local agencies.

20 2. The department is designated as the Iowa statistical  
21 analysis center for the purpose of coordinating with data  
22 resource agencies to provide data and analytical information  
23 to federal, state, and local governments. Notwithstanding any  
24 other provision of state law to the contrary, unless prohibited  
25 by federal law or regulation, the department shall be granted  
26 access, for purposes of research and evaluation, to all of the  
27 data listed in this subsection, except that intelligence data and  
28 peace officer investigative reports maintained by the department  
29 of public safety shall not be considered data for the purposes  
30 of this section. The department of management and any record,  
31 data, or information obtained by the department under this  
32 subsection is subject to the federal and state confidentiality  
33 laws and rules, including as described in chapter 22, applicable  
34 to the original record, data, or information, and to the original  
35 custodian of the record, data, or information. Authorized access

1 under this subsection includes but is not limited to all of the  
2 following:

- 3 a. Juvenile court records and all other information  
4 maintained under sections 232.147 through 232.151.
  - 5 b. Child abuse information under sections 235A.15 through  
6 235A.19.
  - 7 c. Dependent adult abuse records maintained under chapter  
8 235B.
  - 9 d. Criminal history data maintained under chapter 692.
  - 10 e. Sex offender registry information maintained under chapter  
11 692A.
  - 12 f. Presentence investigation reports maintained under section  
13 901.4.
  - 14 g. Corrections records maintained under sections 904.601 and  
15 904.602.
  - 16 h. Community-based correctional program records maintained  
17 under chapter 904.
  - 18 i. Parole records maintained under chapter 906.
  - 19 j. Deferred judgment, deferred or suspended sentence, and  
20 probation records maintained under chapter 907.
  - 21 k. Violation of parole or probation records maintained under  
22 chapter 908.
  - 23 l. Fine and victim restitution records maintained under  
24 chapters 909 and 910.
  - 25 m. Child welfare records maintained under chapter 235.
- 26 3. The department is authorized to provide data analysis and  
27 reporting on issues that may affect the state's correctional  
28 population and various subgroups of the population. This  
29 reporting may include the review of filed, public legislative  
30 bills, joint resolutions, and amendments, and compiling criminal  
31 justice data for completion of correctional impact statements  
32 under section 2.56, racial impact statements, and an annual  
33 prison population forecast.
- 34 4. The department is authorized to maintain a multiagency  
35 information system to track the progress of juveniles and adults

1 who have been charged with a criminal offense in the court system  
2 through various state and local agencies and programs. This  
3 system must utilize existing databases, including the Iowa court  
4 information system, the Iowa corrections offender network, the  
5 child welfare information system of the department of health  
6 and human services, the federally mandated national adoption  
7 and foster care information system, and other state and local  
8 databases pertaining to juveniles and to adults who have been  
9 charged with a criminal offense in the court system, to the  
10 extent practicable.

11 5. The multiagency information system is authorized to count  
12 and track decision points for juveniles in the juvenile justice  
13 system and minors in the child welfare system, evaluate the  
14 experiences of the juveniles and minors, and evaluate the success  
15 of the services provided. The system is also authorized to  
16 count and track decision points for adults who have been charged  
17 with a criminal offense in the court system, including but not  
18 limited to dismissed charges, convictions, deferred judgments,  
19 and sentence information.

20 6. If the department has insufficient moneys or resources to  
21 implement this section, the department is authorized to determine  
22 which portion of this section may be implemented, if any, and the  
23 remainder of this section shall not apply.

24 Sec. 8. NEW SECTION. **8.99 Confidentiality of data.**

25 1. For purposes of chapter 22, the department shall not be  
26 deemed to be the lawful custodian of records the department  
27 maintains for another department or establishment under this  
28 subchapter, to the extent the records in question are held by the  
29 department as an automated data processing unit of government or  
30 held by the department solely for storage for another department  
31 or establishment. Such records include but are not limited to  
32 all of the following:

- 33 a. Electronic messaging system data.
- 34 b. Mainframe data.
- 35 c. Storage solutions or other electronic information, such as

1 on-premises server data storage and cloud data storage.

2 2. If the department receives a request pursuant to chapter  
3 22 for records over which the department has determined it  
4 is not the lawful custodian, the department shall deny the  
5 request and inform the requester to seek the information from  
6 the lawful custodian as provided in chapter 22. The department's  
7 determination that it is not the lawful custodian of records is  
8 presumed valid. The presumption may be rebutted by clear and  
9 convincing evidence to the contrary.

10 3. The department shall provide assistance to the lawful  
11 custodian of records held by the department so that the lawful  
12 custodian can comply with the production obligations of chapter  
13 22.

14 4. If the department receives a subpoena in an  
15 administrative, civil, or criminal case for records for which  
16 the department is not the lawful custodian, the department shall  
17 notify the lawful custodian and the attorney general's office and  
18 cooperate in any efforts to resist the subpoena.

19 Sec. 9. Section 216A.131A, Code 2025, is amended to read as

22 The department shall fulfill the responsibilities of this  
23 subchapter, including the duties specified in sections 216A.133,  
24 216A.135, 216A.136, 216A.137, 216A.138, and 216A.140.

26 l, and t, Code 2025, are amended by striking the paragraphs.

29 subparagraphs.

30 Sec. 12. Section 216A.133, subsection 1, paragraph s, Code  
31 2025, is amended to read as follows:

32 s. Provide expertise and advice to the legislative services  
33 agency, the department of management, the department of  
34 corrections, the judicial branch, and others charged with  
35 formulating fiscal, correctional, or minority impact statements.

2 2025, is amended by striking the paragraph.

28 individual or group basis; fraternal benefit societies providing  
29 hospital, medical, or nursing benefits under chapter 512B;  
30 and health maintenance organizations, other entities providing  
31 health insurance or health benefits subject to state insurance  
32 regulation, and all other insurers as designated by the board of  
33 directors of the Iowa comprehensive health insurance association  
34 with the approval of the commissioner shall be members of the  
35 association. However, the state, including an institution under

1 the control of the state board of regents, shall not be a member  
2 of the association.

3 Sec. 20. REPEAL. Sections 216A.136, 216A.137, and 216A.138,  
4 Code 2025, are repealed.

5 Sec. 21. EFFECTIVE DATE. The following, being deemed of  
6 immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment:

7 The section of this Act amending section 513C.10, subsection  
8 1, paragraph "a".

9 Sec. 22. EFFECTIVE DATE. The following take effect July 1,  
10 2026:

11 The portions of the section of this Act amending section  
12 8.57C, subsections 2 and 4.

13 Sec. 23. APPLICABILITY. The following apply to contracts  
14 entered into or renewed on or after July 1, 2025:

15 1. The section of this Act enacting section 8.94.

16 2. The section of this Act enacting section 8.95.

17 3. The section of this Act enacting section 8.96.

18 Sec. 24. RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY. The following applies  
19 retroactively to January 1, 2020:

20 The section of this Act amending section 513C.10, subsection  
21 1, paragraph "a".

22 EXPLANATION

23 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with  
24 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

25 This bill relates to state government.

26 The bill strikes current law providing for the use of moneys  
27 in the technology reinvestment fund for certain technology  
28 projects and instead requires the department of management (DOM)  
29 to use moneys in the fund for technology projects using factors  
30 set forth in the bill. The bill requires DOM to provide  
31 a prioritized list of proposed projects to the governor, who  
32 must use the list to develop a budgetary recommendation to the  
33 general assembly, and to report completed and ongoing projects  
34 to the general assembly annually. The bill strikes the standing  
35 appropriation to the technology reinvestment fund and provides

1 that any moneys in the fund shall remain available for three  
2 years after the appropriation is made.

3 The bill increases the frequency at which a person performing  
4 work for DOM or an individual on the information technology staff  
5 of a supported entity may be subject to a national criminal  
6 history check through the federal bureau of investigation from at  
7 least once every 10 years to every 5 years.

8 The bill prohibits the inclusion of certain provisions in  
9 information technology contracts and declares those provisions  
10 void if present in such contracts. The bill also provides that  
11 such contracts are deemed to include provisions requiring the  
12 contract to be governed by Iowa law and litigation related to the  
13 contract to be brought and maintained in a state or federal court  
14 sitting in Iowa. The bill authorizes the director of DOM to  
15 include limitations of vendor liability in information technology  
16 goods and services contracts, but sets forth prohibited terms in  
17 such limitations of liability.

18 The bill makes all communication concerning cybersecurity  
19 between the chief information security officer and other entities  
20 confidential and allows the communications to be released only  
21 for specific purposes.

22 Under current law, the department of health and human services  
23 serves as the Iowa statistical analysis center and maintains an  
24 integrated information system for data sharing among federal,  
25 state, and local governments. The bill transfers these powers  
26 and duties to DOM and grants DOM access to criminal justice  
27 information other than intelligence data and peace officer  
28 investigative reports maintained by the department of public  
29 safety. DOM is authorized to provide data analysis and reporting  
30 on issues that may affect the state's correctional population and  
31 various subgroups of the population, to maintain a multiagency  
32 information system to track the progress of juveniles and  
33 adults charged with a criminal offense through state and local  
34 agencies and programs, and to count and track decision points for  
35 individuals in the juvenile justice system, child welfare system,

1 and court system. If DOM lacks sufficient moneys to perform the  
2 authorized tasks of the Iowa statistical analysis center, the  
3 bill allows DOM to determine which, if any, to implement.

4 The bill states that DOM is not the lawful custodian under  
5 Code chapter 22 (open records) for records DOM maintains in DOM's  
6 information technology capacity for other state entities as an  
7 automated data processing unit of government or when held by DOM  
8 solely for storage for another department or establishment. The  
9 bill requires DOM to deny requests for information for which DOM  
10 is not the lawful custodian, to provide assistance to the lawful  
11 custodian to comply with production obligations, and to cooperate  
12 in any efforts to resist associated subpoenas.

13 The bill excludes the state from membership in the Iowa  
14 individual health benefit reinsurance association. This  
15 provision takes effect upon enactment and applies retroactively  
16 to January 1, 2020.
