1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to the education
2 system, including the funding and operation of the department
3 for the blind, department of education, and state board of
4 regents, and including contingent effective date provisions.
5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 DIVISION I

2 FY 2025-2026 APPROPRIATIONS — DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND

3 Section 1. GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATIONS — ADMINISTRATION.

4 There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
 5 department for the blind for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
 6 2025, and ending June 30, 2026, the following amount, or so much
 7 thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

8 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
 9 purposes, and for not more than the following full-time
 10 equivalent positions:

11 \$ 3,207,190 FTEs 88.98

12 DIVISION II

13 FY 2025-2026 APPROPRIATIONS — DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

14 Sec. 2. GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated
 15 from the general fund of the state to the department of education
 16 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30,
 17 2026, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary,
 18 to be used for the purposes designated:

19 1. GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

20 a. For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
 21 purposes, and for not more than the following full-time
 22 equivalent positions:

24 b. By January 15, 2026, the department shall submit a written
 25 report to the general assembly detailing the department's

34 For salaries, support, maintenance, capital expenditures, and

3 4. CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

4 For reimbursement for career and technical education
5 expenditures made by regional career and technical education
6 planning partnerships in accordance with section 256.136:

8 5. SCHOOL FOOD SERVICE

9 For use as state matching moneys for federal programs that
10 shall be disbursed according to federal regulations, including
11 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, and
12 for not more than the following full-time equivalent positions:

14 6. BIRTH TO AGE THREE SERVICES

15 a. For expansion of the federal Individuals with Disabilities
16 Education Improvement Act of 2004, Pub. L. No. 108-446, as

18 to increased numbers of children qualifying for those services:

20 b. From the moneys appropriated in this subsection, \$383,769
21 shall be allocated to the child health specialty clinics

15 b. From the moneys appropriated in this subsection, not more

27 For support costs associated with the creation of a program to

30 college-level classes or attend a class taught by a community
31 college-employed instructor during the summer and outside of the
32 regular school year through a contractual agreement between a
33 community college and a school district under the future ready
34 Iowa initiative:

 20 order to arrive at an overall school performance grade and report
 21 card for each attendance center, for internet site and data
 22 system support, and for not more than the following full-time
 23 equivalent positions:

26 14. SUCCESSFUL PROGRESSION FOR EARLY READERS

27 For distribution to school districts for implementation of
 28 section 279.68, subsection 2, relating to successful progression

31 15. EARLY WARNING SYSTEM FOR LITERACY

32 a. For purposes of purchasing a statewide license for an
 33 early warning assessment and administering the early warning
 34 system for literacy established in accordance with section 279.68
 35 and rules adopted in accordance with section 256.7, subsection

3 b. The department shall administer and distribute to school
4 districts and accredited nonpublic schools the early warning
5 assessment system that allows teachers to screen and monitor

14 current fiscal year. School districts may use moneys received
15 pursuant to section 257.10, subsection 11, and moneys received
16 for purposes of implementing section 279.68, subsection 2, to pay
17 the early warning assessment system fee.

19 a. For purposes of the Iowa reading research center in order
20 to implement, in collaboration with the area education agencies,
21 the provisions of section 256.9, subsection 49, paragraph "c":
22 \$ 1,500,000

23 b. From moneys appropriated in this subsection, not more than
24 \$250,000 shall be used for collaborations with the state board of
25 education relating to the approval of practitioner preparation
26 programs pursuant to section 256.7, subsection 3, paragraph "c",
27 and with the board of educational examiners for the establishment
28 and continuing oversight of the advanced dyslexia specialist
29 endorsement pursuant to section 256.146, subsection 21. For the
30 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026, the
31 center shall submit a report to the general assembly detailing
32 the expenditures of moneys used for purposes of this paragraph
33 "b".

34 c. Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys received by the

2 but shall remain available for expenditure for the purposes

11 a. For distribution to area education agencies for
12 school-based children's mental health services, including mental
13 health awareness training for educators:

15 b. Of the moneys appropriated in this subsection for
16 distribution to area education agencies, \$200,000 shall be used
17 for purposes of implementing a children's grief and loss rural

14 to section 256.111, and for not more than the following full-time
15 equivalent positions:

18 a. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the
19 moneys appropriated in this subsection shall be expended for

16 2. Each applicant for the court reporter equipment grant
17 program shall, in accordance with the rules of the commission,
18 complete and file an application for a grant award. The
19 individual shall be responsible for the prompt submission of any
20 information required by the commission.

21 3. A recipient of a grant under the court reporter equipment
22 grant program must use the moneys awarded by the college student
23 aid commission for the purchase of court reporter equipment and

26 The inclusion of this explanation does not constitute agreement with
 27 the explanation's substance by the members of the general assembly.

28 This bill relates to and makes appropriations to the education
 29 system. The bill appropriates moneys for FY 2025-2026 from the
 30 general fund of the state and other funds to the department for
 31 the blind, department of education, and state board of regents
 32 and its institutions. The bill is organized by divisions.

33 DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND. The bill appropriates moneys to
 34 the department for the blind for its administration.

35 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION. The bill appropriates moneys to the

1 department of education for purposes of the department's general
2 administration; career and technical education administration;
3 public broadcasting division; career and technical education
4 reimbursement; school food service; expansion of the federal
5 Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act birth
6 through age three services; early head start projects; the
7 student achievement and teacher quality program; statewide
8 student assessment; statewide clearinghouse to expand work-based
9 learning; postsecondary summer classes for high school students
10 program; jobs for America's graduates specialists; attendance
11 center performance/general internet site and data system support;
12 successful progression for early readers; an early warning system
13 for literacy; the Iowa reading research center; computer science
14 professional development incentive fund; children's mental health
15 school-based training and support; school districts for students
16 with intellectual and developmental disabilities; distribution
17 to the midwestern higher education compact to pay Iowa's member
18 state annual obligation; community colleges; the Iowa school for
19 the deaf and Iowa educational services for the blind and visually
20 impaired program; the science, technology, engineering, and
21 mathematics collaborative initiative; the therapeutic classroom
22 incentive fund; an online state job posting system; the LEAD-K
23 program; division of special education; professional development;
24 and the administration and various programs of the college
25 student aid commission.

26 The bill also appropriates moneys from the Iowa skilled worker
27 and job creation fund to the department of education for various
28 purposes.

29 STATE BOARD OF REGENTS. The bill appropriates moneys to
30 the state board of regents for the board office, universities'
31 general operating budgets, the western Iowa regents resource
32 center, the state university of Iowa, the Iowa state university
33 of science and technology, and the university of northern Iowa.

34 STANDING APPROPRIATIONS. For FY 2025-2026, the bill limits
35 the appropriation associated with the work-study program under

1 Code section 256.209.

2 Additionally, for FY 2025-2026, the bill limits the
3 appropriation associated with programs for at-risk children under
4 Code section 279.51, if the portion of 2025 Iowa Acts, Senate
5 File 445, or any successor legislation, that reduces the standing
6 appropriation in Code section 279.51(1), is not enacted.

7 STATE PROGRAM ALLOCATION. Code section 284.13 establishes how
8 moneys appropriated for purposes of the student achievement
9 and teacher quality program are to be allocated. The bill
10 extends such allocations to FY 2025-2026. The bill provides
11 that beginning in FY 2026-2027, of the moneys appropriated for
12 purposes of the student achievement and teacher quality program,
13 the final priority for the allocation is \$10 million for purposes
14 of implementing the supplemental assistance for high-need schools
15 provisions of Code section 284.11.

16 COURT REPORTER EQUIPMENT GRANT PROGRAM. The bill establishes a
17 court reporter equipment grant program and requires the college
18 student aid commission to administer the program. A person is
19 eligible to apply for a grant award under the grant program if
20 the person is enrolled in a court reporter training program in
21 this state. A recipient of a grant under the grant program
22 must use the moneys awarded by the college student aid commission
23 for the purchase of court reporter equipment and software for
24 the court reporter training program in which the recipient
25 is participating. The bill requires the college student aid
26 commission to adopt rules to administer the grant program.

27 The bill establishes a court reporter equipment grant program
28 fund and appropriates moneys from the general fund of the state
29 to the grant program fund in FY 2025-2026.

30 The bill repeals Code sections 15.485 and 15.486, which
31 established the court reporter equipment grant program and the
32 court reporter equipment incentive fund. The bill transfers
33 moneys to the new fund from the previous fund.
