A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to and making appropriations to the justice
2 system.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

2 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
3 to the department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July
4 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following amounts, or
5 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
6 designated:

7 a. For the general office of attorney general for
8 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
9 including the prosecuting attorneys training program, matching
10 funds for federal violence against women grant programs,
11 victim assistance grants, the office of drug control policy
12 prosecuting attorney program, and odometer fraud enforcement:
13 \$ 11,672,266

14 As a condition of receiving the appropriation provided
15 in this lettered paragraph, the department of justice shall
16 maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing
17 each agency or department.

18 The general office of attorney general may temporarily
19 exceed and draw more than the amount appropriated in this
20 lettered paragraph and incur a negative cash balance as long
21 as there are receivables equal to or greater than the negative
22 balances and the amount appropriated in this lettered paragraph
23 is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

24 b. For victim assistance grants:
25 \$ 5,166,708

26 Of the moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph,
27 \$150,000 is allocated to provide grants to care providers
28 providing services to victims of human trafficking. The
29 remaining moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
30 are allocated to provide grants to care providers providing
31 services to all other victims of violent crime.

32 The balance of the victim compensation fund established in
33 section 915.94 may be used to provide salary and support of not
34 more than 24.00 full-time equivalent positions and to provide
35 maintenance for the victim compensation functions of the

1 department of justice. In addition to the full-time equivalent
2 positions authorized pursuant to this unnumbered paragraph,
3 7.00 full-time equivalent positions are authorized and shall be
4 used by the department of justice to employ one accountant and
5 four program planners. The department of justice may employ
6 the additional 7.00 full-time equivalent positions authorized
7 pursuant to this unnumbered paragraph that are in excess of the
8 number of full-time equivalent positions authorized only if
9 the department of justice receives sufficient federal moneys
10 to maintain employment for the additional full-time equivalent
11 positions during the current fiscal year. The department
12 of justice shall only employ the additional 7.00 full-time
13 equivalent positions in succeeding fiscal years if sufficient
14 federal moneys are received during each of those succeeding
15 fiscal years.

16 The department of justice shall transfer at least \$150,000
17 from the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94
18 to the victim assistance grant program established in section
19 13.31.

20 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
21 lettered paragraph that remain unencumbered or unobligated at
22 the close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
23 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until the
24 close of the succeeding fiscal year.

25 c. For legal services for persons in poverty grants as
26 provided in section 13.34:

27 \$ 2,634,601

28 d. To improve the department of justice's cybersecurity and
29 technology infrastructure:

30 \$ 202,060

31 2. a. The department of justice, in submitting budget
32 estimates for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2027, pursuant
33 to section 8.23, shall include a report of funding from sources
34 other than amounts appropriated directly from the general fund
35 of the state to the department of justice or to the office of

1 consumer advocate. These funding sources must include but
2 are not limited to reimbursements from other state agencies,
3 commissions, boards, or similar entities, and reimbursements
4 from special funds or internal accounts within the department
5 of justice. The department of justice shall also report actual
6 reimbursements for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025,
7 and actual and expected reimbursements for the fiscal year
8 beginning July 1, 2026.

9 b. The department of justice shall include the report
10 required under paragraph "a", as well as information regarding
11 any revisions occurring as a result of reimbursements actually
12 received or expected at a later date, in a report to the
13 general assembly. The department of justice shall submit the
14 report on or before January 15, 2027.

15 3. a. The department of justice shall fully reimburse
16 the costs and necessary related expenses incurred by the Iowa
17 law enforcement academy to continue to employ one additional
18 instructor position who shall provide training for human
19 trafficking-related issues throughout the state.

20 b. The department of justice shall obtain the moneys
21 necessary to reimburse the Iowa law enforcement academy to
22 employ such an instructor from unrestricted moneys from either
23 the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94 or
24 the human trafficking victim fund established in section 915.95
25 or the human trafficking enforcement fund established in 2015
26 Iowa Acts, chapter 138, section 141.

27 4. Notwithstanding sections 553.19 and 714.16C, for the
28 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027,
29 any moneys not otherwise appropriated from the antitrust fund
30 created in section 553.19 and the consumer education and
31 litigation fund created in section 714.16C are appropriated to
32 the department of justice for salaries, support, maintenance,
33 and miscellaneous purposes necessary to perform the duties
34 described in section 13.2.

35 Sec. 2. OFFICE OF CONSUMER ADVOCATE. There is appropriated

1 from the commerce revolving fund created in section 546.12 to
2 the office of consumer advocate of the department of justice
3 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30,
4 2027, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary,
5 to be used for the purposes designated:

6 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
7 purposes:
8 \$ 3,784,047

9 The office of consumer advocate shall include in its charges
10 assessed or revenues generated an amount sufficient to cover
11 the amount stated in its appropriation and any state-assessed
12 indirect costs determined by the department of administrative
13 services.

14 Sec. 3. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — FACILITIES.

15 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
16 to the department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning
17 July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following amounts,
18 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
19 designated:

20 a. For the operation of the Fort Madison correctional
21 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
22 miscellaneous purposes:
23 \$ 46,724,722

24 b. For the operation of the Anamosa correctional facility,
25 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
26 purposes:
27 \$ 40,255,974

28 c. For the operation of the Oakdale correctional facility,
29 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
30 purposes:
31 \$ 59,344,020

32 d. For the Oakdale correctional facility for
33 department-wide institutional pharmaceuticals and miscellaneous
34 purposes:
35 \$ 10,175,417

- 1 e. For the operation of the Newton correctional facility,
2 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
3 purposes:
4 \$ 32,509,092
- 5 f. For the operation of the Mount Pleasant correctional
6 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
7 miscellaneous purposes:
8 \$ 30,619,297
- 9 g. For the operation of the Rockwell City correctional
10 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
11 miscellaneous purposes:
12 \$ 11,916,579
- 13 h. For the operation of the Clarinda correctional facility,
14 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
15 purposes:
16 \$ 29,678,380
- 17 i. For the operation of the Mitchellville correctional
18 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
19 miscellaneous purposes:
20 \$ 26,350,539
- 21 j. For the operation of the Fort Dodge correctional
22 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
23 miscellaneous purposes:
24 \$ 34,467,251
- 25 k. For reimbursement of counties for temporary confinement
26 of prisoners, as provided in sections 901.7, 904.908, and
27 906.17, and for offenders confined pursuant to section 904.513:
28 \$ 1,345,319
- 29 1. For federal prison reimbursement, reimbursements for
30 out-of-state placements, and miscellaneous contracts:
31 \$ 234,411
- 32 2. The department of corrections shall use moneys
33 appropriated in subsection 1 to continue to contract for the
34 services of a Muslim imam and a Native American spiritual
35 leader.

1 Sec. 4. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — ADMINISTRATION. There
2 is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
3 department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning July
4 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following amounts, or
5 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
6 designated:

7 1. For general administration, including salaries and the
8 adjustment of salaries throughout the department, support,
9 maintenance, employment of an education director to administer
10 a centralized education program for the correctional system,
11 and miscellaneous purposes:

12 \$ 9,650,695

13 a. It is the intent of the general assembly that each
14 lease negotiated by the department of corrections with a
15 private corporation for the purpose of providing private
16 industry employment of inmates in a correctional institution
17 shall prohibit the private corporation from utilizing inmate
18 labor for partisan political purposes for any person seeking
19 election to public office in this state and that a violation
20 of this requirement shall result in a termination of the lease
21 agreement.

22 b. It is the intent of the general assembly that as a
23 condition of receiving the appropriation provided in this
24 subsection the department of corrections shall not enter into
25 a lease or contractual agreement pursuant to section 904.809
26 with a private corporation for the use of building space for
27 the purpose of providing inmate employment without providing
28 that the terms of the lease or contract establish safeguards to
29 restrict, to the greatest extent feasible, access by inmates
30 working for the private corporation to personal identifying
31 information of citizens.

32 2. For educational programs for inmates at state penal
33 institutions:

34 \$ 3,108,109

35 a. To maximize the funding for educational programs,

1 the department shall establish guidelines and procedures to
2 prioritize the availability of educational and vocational
3 training for inmates based upon the goal of facilitating an
4 inmate's successful release from the correctional institution.

5 b. The director of the department of corrections may
6 transfer moneys from Iowa prison industries and the canteen
7 operating funds established pursuant to section 904.310, for
8 use in educational programs for inmates.

9 c. Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in
10 this subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the
11 close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
12 available for expenditure for the purposes designated in this
13 subsection until the close of the succeeding fiscal year.

14 3. For the development and operation of the Iowa corrections
15 offender network (ICON) data system:

16 \$ 2,000,000

17 4. For offender mental health and substance abuse
18 treatment:

19 \$ 28,065

20 5. For department-wide duties, including operations, costs,
21 and miscellaneous purposes:

22 \$ 5,500,000

23 Sec. 5. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — JUDICIAL DISTRICT
24 DEPARTMENTS OF CORRECTIONAL SERVICES.

25 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
26 to the department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning
27 July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following amounts,
28 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for salaries,
29 support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes:

30 a. For the first judicial district department of
31 correctional services:

32 \$ 17,395,981

33 It is the intent of the general assembly that the first
34 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
35 the drug courts operated by the district department.

1 b. For the second judicial district department of
2 correctional services:
3 \$ 14,105,725

4 It is the intent of the general assembly that the second
5 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
6 two drug courts to be operated by the district department.

7 c. For the third judicial district department of
8 correctional services:
9 \$ 8,915,376

10 d. For the fourth judicial district department of
11 correctional services:
12 \$ 6,563,898

13 e. For the fifth judicial district department of
14 correctional services, including funding for electronic
15 monitoring devices for use on a statewide basis:
16 \$ 25,194,813

17 It is the intent of the general assembly that the fifth
18 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
19 the drug court operated by the district department.

20 f. For the sixth judicial district department of
21 correctional services:
22 \$ 17,554,811

23 It is the intent of the general assembly that the sixth
24 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
25 the drug court operated by the district department.

26 g. For the seventh judicial district department of
27 correctional services:
28 \$ 11,003,457

29 It is the intent of the general assembly that the seventh
30 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
31 the drug court operated by the district department.

32 h. For the eighth judicial district department of
33 correctional services:
34 \$ 10,259,926

35 2. Each judicial district department of correctional

1 services, within the moneys available, shall continue programs
2 and plans established within that district to provide for
3 intensive supervision, sex offender treatment, diversion of
4 low-risk offenders to the least restrictive sanction available,
5 job development, and expanded use of intermediate criminal
6 sanctions.

7 3. Each judicial district department of correctional
8 services shall provide alternatives to prison consistent with
9 chapter 901B. The alternatives to prison must ensure public
10 safety while providing maximum rehabilitation to the offender.
11 A judicial district department of correctional services may
12 also establish a day program.

13 4. The office of drug control policy of the department
14 of public safety shall consider federal grants made to the
15 department of corrections for the benefit of each of the eight
16 judicial district departments of correctional services as local
17 government grants, as defined pursuant to federal regulations.

18 5. The department of corrections shall continue to contract
19 with a judicial district department of correctional services
20 to provide for the rental of electronic monitoring equipment
21 available statewide.

22 6. The public safety assessment shall not be utilized in
23 pretrial hearings when determining whether to detain or release
24 a defendant before trial until such time the use of the public
25 safety assessment has been specifically authorized by the
26 general assembly.

27 Sec. 6. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — REALLOCATION OF
28 APPROPRIATIONS. Notwithstanding section 8.39, within
29 the moneys appropriated in this Act to the department of
30 corrections, the department may reallocate the moneys
31 appropriated and allocated as necessary to best fulfill the
32 needs of the correctional institutions, administration of
33 the department, and the judicial district departments of
34 correctional services. However, in addition to complying with
35 the requirements of section 904.116 and providing notice to

1 the legislative services agency, the department of corrections
2 shall also provide notice to the department of management,
3 prior to the effective date of the revision or reallocation of
4 an appropriation made pursuant to this section. The department
5 of corrections shall not reallocate an appropriation or
6 allocation for the purpose of eliminating any program.

7 Sec. 7. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — INTENT — REPORTS.

8 1. The department of corrections, in cooperation with
9 townships, the Iowa cemetery associations, and other nonprofit
10 or governmental entities, may use inmate labor during the
11 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, to restore or preserve
12 rural cemeteries and historical landmarks. The department, in
13 cooperation with the counties, may also use inmate labor to
14 clean up roads, major water sources, and other water sources
15 around the state.

16 2. By January 15, 2027, the department shall provide an
17 annual status report regarding private-sector employment to
18 the general assembly. The report must include the number
19 of offenders employed in the private sector, the combined
20 number of hours worked by the offenders, the total amount of
21 allowances, and the distribution of allowances pursuant to
22 section 904.702, including any moneys deposited in the general
23 fund of the state.

24 Sec. 8. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — ELECTRONIC MONITORING
25 REPORT. The department of corrections shall submit a report
26 on electronic monitoring to the general assembly by January
27 15, 2027. The report must specifically address the number
28 of persons being electronically monitored and break down the
29 number of persons being electronically monitored by offense
30 committed. The report must also include a comparison of any
31 data from the prior fiscal year with the current fiscal year.

32 Sec. 9. STATE AGENCY PURCHASES FROM PRISON INDUSTRIES.

33 1. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise
34 requires, "state agency" means the government of the state
35 of Iowa, including but not limited to all executive branch

1 departments, agencies, boards, bureaus, and commissions, the
2 judicial branch, the general assembly and all legislative
3 agencies, institutions within the purview of the state board of
4 regents, and any corporation whose primary function is to act
5 as an instrumentality of the state.

6 2. State agencies are encouraged to purchase products from
7 Iowa state industries, as defined in section 904.802, when
8 purchases are required and the products are available from
9 Iowa state industries. State agencies shall obtain bids from
10 Iowa state industries for purchases of office furniture during
11 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, exceeding \$5,000 or
12 in accordance with applicable administrative rules related to
13 purchases for the agency.

14 Sec. 10. IOWA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY.

15 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
16 state to the Iowa law enforcement academy for the fiscal year
17 beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following
18 amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
19 purposes designated:

20 a. For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
21 purposes, including jailer training and technical assistance:
22 \$ 2,919,407

23 b. The Iowa law enforcement academy may temporarily exceed
24 and draw more than the amount appropriated in this subsection
25 and incur a negative cash balance as long as there are
26 receivables equal to or greater than the negative balance and
27 the amount appropriated in this subsection is not exceeded at
28 the close of the fiscal year.

29 2. The Iowa law enforcement academy may select at least
30 five automobiles of the department of public safety, division
31 of state patrol, prior to turning over the automobiles to
32 the department of administrative services to be disposed
33 of by public auction, and the Iowa law enforcement academy
34 may exchange any automobile owned by the academy for each
35 automobile selected if the selected automobile is used in

1 training law enforcement officers at the academy. However, any
2 automobile exchanged by the academy must be substituted for
3 the selected vehicle of the department of public safety and
4 sold by public auction with the receipts being deposited in the
5 depreciation fund maintained pursuant to section 8A.365 to the
6 credit of the department of public safety, division of state
7 patrol.

8 3. The Iowa law enforcement academy shall provide training
9 for domestic abuse and human trafficking-related issues
10 throughout the state. The academy shall offer the training at
11 no cost to the attendees and the training shall not replace any
12 existing domestic abuse or human trafficking training offered
13 by the academy.

14 Sec. 11. STATE PUBLIC DEFENDER.

15 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
16 to the office of the state public defender of the department
17 of inspections, appeals, and licensing for the fiscal year
18 beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following
19 amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
20 purposes designated:

21 a. For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
22 purposes:

23 \$ 38,627,894

24 b. For payments on behalf of eligible adults and juveniles
25 from the indigent defense fund, in accordance with section
26 815.11:

27 \$ 41,226,374

28 2. Moneys received by the office of the state public
29 defender pursuant to Tit. IV-E of the federal Social Security
30 Act remaining unencumbered and unobligated at the end of the
31 fiscal year shall not revert but shall be transferred to the
32 Tit. IV-E juvenile justice improvement fund created in 2022
33 Iowa Acts, chapter 1146, section 11, subsection 3, to remain
34 available for expenditure by the office of the state public
35 defender in succeeding fiscal years for the purposes allowed by

1 Tit. IV-E of the federal Social Security Act.

2 Sec. 12. BOARD OF PAROLE. There is appropriated from the
3 general fund of the state to the board of parole for the fiscal
4 year beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the
5 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
6 used for the purposes designated:

7 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
8 purposes:

9 \$ 1,545,114

10 Sec. 13. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC DEFENSE.

11 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
12 state to the department of public defense, for the fiscal year
13 beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30, 2027, the following
14 amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
15 purposes designated:

16 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
17 purposes:

18 \$ 7,646,037

19 2. The department of public defense may temporarily exceed
20 and draw more than the amount appropriated in this section and
21 incur a negative cash balance as long as there are receivables
22 of federal funds equal to or greater than the negative balance
23 and the amount appropriated in this section is not exceeded at
24 the close of the fiscal year.

25 Sec. 14. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY AND EMERGENCY
26 MANAGEMENT.

27 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
28 to the department of homeland security and emergency management
29 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, and ending June 30,
30 2027, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary,
31 to be used for the purposes designated:

32 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
33 purposes:

34 \$ 2,396,138

35 2. The department of homeland security and emergency

1 management may temporarily exceed and draw more than the amount
2 appropriated in this section and incur a negative cash balance
3 as long as there are receivables of federal funds equal to or
4 greater than the negative balance and the amount appropriated
5 in this section is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal
6 year.

7 Sec. 15. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY. There is appropriated
8 from the general fund of the state to the department of public
9 safety for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, and ending
10 June 30, 2027, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is
11 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

12 1. For administrative functions, including salaries and
13 the adjustment of salaries throughout the department, and the
14 criminal justice information system:

15 \$ 7,325,444

16 2. For the division of criminal investigation, including
17 the state's contribution to the peace officers' retirement,
18 accident, and disability system provided in chapter 97A in the
19 amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as defined in
20 section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which the moneys
21 are appropriated, to meet federal fund matching requirements:

22 \$ 23,282,804

23 3. For the criminalistics laboratory fund created in
24 section 691.9:

25 \$ 650,000

26 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
27 subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close
28 of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain available
29 for expenditure for the purposes designated until the close of
30 the succeeding fiscal year.

31 4. a. For the division of narcotics enforcement, including
32 the state's contribution to the peace officers' retirement,
33 accident, and disability system provided in chapter 97A in the
34 amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as defined in
35 section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which the moneys

1 are appropriated, to meet federal fund matching requirements:
2 \$ 10,496,573

3 b. For the division of narcotics enforcement for undercover
4 purchases:
5 \$ 209,042

6 5. For the division of state fire marshal, for fire
7 protection services as provided through the state fire service
8 and emergency response council as created in the department,
9 and for the state's contribution to the peace officers'
10 retirement, accident, and disability system provided in chapter
11 97A in the amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as
12 defined in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which
13 the moneys are appropriated:
14 \$ 3,635,378

15 6. For the division of state patrol, for salaries, support,
16 maintenance, workers' compensation costs, and miscellaneous
17 purposes, including the state's contribution to the peace
18 officers' retirement, accident, and disability system provided
19 in chapter 97A in the amount of the state's normal contribution
20 rate, as defined in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries
21 for which the moneys are appropriated:
22 \$ 94,251,941

23 It is the intent of the general assembly that members of the
24 state patrol be assigned to patrol the highways and roads in
25 lieu of assignments for inspecting school buses for the school
26 districts.

27 7. For deposit in the sick leave benefits fund established
28 in section 80.42 for all departmental employees eligible to
29 receive benefits for accrued sick leave under the collective
30 bargaining agreement:
31 \$ 279,517

32 8. For costs associated with the training and equipment
33 needs of volunteer fire fighters:
34 \$ 1,075,520

35 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this

1 subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close
2 of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain available
3 for expenditure for the purposes designated in this subsection
4 until the close of the succeeding fiscal year.

5 9. For the public safety interoperable and broadband
6 communications fund established in section 80.44:

7 \$ 115,661

8 10. For the office to combat human trafficking established
9 in section 80.45, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
10 miscellaneous purposes:

11 \$ 200,742

12 11. For department-wide duties, including operations,
13 costs, and miscellaneous purposes:

14 \$ 3,430,000

15 12. For the office of drug control policy, for salaries,
16 support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, including
17 statewide coordination of the drug abuse resistance education
18 (D.A.R.E.) programs or other similar programs:

19 \$ 270,546

20 Notwithstanding section 8.39, the department of public
21 safety may reallocate moneys appropriated in this section
22 as necessary to best fulfill the needs provided for in the
23 appropriation. However, the department shall not reallocate
24 moneys appropriated to the department in this section unless
25 notice of the reallocation is given to the legislative services
