5 Sec. 2. Section 22.7, subsection 37, Code Supplement 2003,

is amended to read as follows:

37. Mediation documents records as defined in section 8 679C.1 679C.102, except written mediation agreements that 9 resulted from a mediation which are signed on behalf of a 10 governing body. However, confidentiality of mediation 11 documents resulting from mediation conducted pursuant to 1 12 chapter 216 shall be governed by chapter 216. 1 13

Sec. 3. Section 216.15B, subsection 2, Code 2003, is

2. If formal mediation is conducted by a mediator pursuant 1 16 to this section, the confidentiality of all mediation 1 17 communications and mediation documents is protected as 1 18 provided in section 679C.2 679C.108.

679.12 CONFIDENTIALITY.

If mediation is conducted pursuant to this chapter, the 1 29 confidentiality of all mediation communications and mediation 1 30 documents is protected as provided in section 679C.2 679C.108.

Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. 679C.101 SHORT TITLE. This chapter shall be known as the "Uniform Mediation Act". Sec. 7. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.102 DEFINITIONS.

As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise 35 requires:

"Mediation" means a process in which a mediator 1. 2 facilitates communication and negotiation between parties to 3 assist them in reaching a voluntary agreement regarding their

4 dispute. "Mediation communication" means a statement, whether 6 oral or in a record, verbal or nonverbal, that occurs during a 7 mediation or is made for purposes of considering, conducting, 8 participating in, initiating, continuing, or reconvening a

9 mediation or retaining a mediator. 10 3. "Mediation party" means an individual who participates 11 in a mediation and whose agreement is necessary to resolve the 2 12 dispute.

4. "Mediator" means an impartial individual who conducts a 14 mediation.

5. "Nonparty participant" means a person, other than a

16 mediation party or mediator, that participates in a mediation.
17 6. "Person" means an individual; corporation; business 17 2 18 trust; estate; trust; partnership; limited liability company; 2 19 association; joint venture; government; governmental
2 20 subdivision, agency, or instrumentality; public corporation;
2 21 or any other legal or commercial entity.
2 22 7. "Proceeding" means any of the following:
2 23 a. A judicial, administrative, arbitral, or other

2 24 adjudicative process, including related prehearing and 2 25 posthearing motions, conferences, and discovery. 2 26 A legislative hearing or similar process. 2 27 8. "Record" means information that is inscribed on a 2 28 tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or other 29 medium and is retrievable in perceivable form. 9. 30 "Sign" means any of the following: To execute or adopt a tangible symbol with the present 2 31 32 intent to authenticate a record. 2 33

- To attach or logically associate an electronic symbol, b. or process to or with a record with the present intent sound, 35 to authenticate a record.
 - Sec. 8. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.103 SCOPE.

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- Except as otherwise provided for in subsections 2 and this chapter applies to a mediation that occurs under any 4 of the following circumstances:
 - The mediation parties are required to mediate by а. statute or court or administrative agency rule or referred to mediation by a court, administrative agency, or arbitrator.
- b. The mediation parties and the mediator agree to mediate 9 in a record that demonstrates an expectation that mediation 10 communications will be privileged against disclosure.
- The mediation parties use as a mediator an individual 12 who holds oneself out as a mediator or the mediation is 13 provided by a person that holds itself out as providing 3 14 mediation.
 - 2. This chapter shall not apply to a mediation relating to 16 or conducted by any of the following circumstances: 17 a. Relating to the establishment, negotiation,
- 3 18 administration, or termination of a collective bargaining 19 relationship.
- b. Relating to a dispute that is pending under or is part 21 of the processes established by a collective bargaining 22 agreement, except that this chapter applies to a mediation 23 arising out of a dispute that has been filed with an 3 24 administrative agency or court.
 - c. Conducted by a judge who might make a ruling on the case.
 - Conducted at any of the following: d.
 - A primary or secondary school if all the parties are 29 students.
 - (2) A correctional institution for youths if all the 31 parties are residents of that institution.
 - 3. If the mediation parties agree in advance in a signed 33 record, or a record of proceeding reflects agreement by the 34 mediation parties, that all or part of a mediation is not 35 privileged, the privileges under sections 679C.104 through 1 679C.106 do not apply to the mediation or part agreed upon. 2 However, sections 679C.104 through 679C.106 apply to a 3 mediation communication made by a person that has not received 4 actual notice of the agreement before the communication is 5 made.
 - Sec. 9. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.104 PRIVILEGE AGAINST DISCLOSURE == ADMISSIBILITY == DISCOVERY.
 - 8 1. Except as otherwise provided in section 679C.106, a 9 mediation communication is privileged as provided in 10 subsection 2 and is not subject to discovery or admissible in evidence in a proceeding unless waived or precluded as provided by section 679C.105. 11 12
 - 2. In a proceeding, the following privileges shall apply:
- a. A mediation party may refuse to disclose, and may prevent any other person from disclosing, a mediation 4 16 communication.
- b. A mediator may refuse to disclose a mediation 4 18 communication, and may prevent any other person from 4 19 disclosing a mediation communication of the mediator.
 - c. A nonparty participant may refuse to disclose, and may prevent any other person from disclosing, a mediation communication of the nonparty participant.
 - 22 Evidence or information that is otherwise admissible or 2.4 subject to discovery does not become inadmissible or protected 25 from discovery solely by reason of its disclosure or use in a 26 mediation.
 - Sec. 10. NEW SECTION. 679C.105 WAIVER AND PRECLUSION OF 28 PRIVILEGE.
- 1. A privilege under section 679C.104 may be waived in a 30 record or orally during a proceeding if it is expressly waived 4 31 by all mediation parties and if all of the following apply:
 - a. In the case of the privilege of a mediator, the
- 4 33 privilege is expressly waived by the mediator.
 - b. In the case of the privilege of a nonparty participant,

35 the privilege is expressly waived by the nonparty participant. A person that discloses or makes a representation about 2 a mediation communication which prejudices another person in a 3 proceeding is precluded from asserting a privilege under 4 section 679C.104, but only to the extent necessary for the 5 person prejudiced to respond to the disclosure or

6 representation. 3. A person that intentionally uses a mediation to plan, to attempt to commit, or to commit a crime, or to conceal an ongoing crime or ongoing criminal activity is precluded from 10 asserting a privilege pursuant to section 679C.104.
11 Sec. 11. NEW SECTION. 679C.106 EXCEPTIONS TO PRIVILEGE.

Sec. 11.

1. No privilege exists under section 679C.104 for a 13 mediation communication that involves any of the following: 14 a. An agreement evidenced by a record signed by all

mediation parties to the agreement.

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b. A communication that is available to the public under chapter 22 or made during a session of a mediation which is 5 18 open, or is required by law to be open, to the public.

c. A threat or statement of a plan to inflict bodily 20 injury or commit a crime of violence.

- d. A plan to commit or attempt to commit a crime, the 22 commission of a crime, or activity to conceal an ongoing crime
- 23 or ongoing criminal activity. e. A communication that is sought or offered to prove or 25 disprove a claim or complaint of professional misconduct or 26 malpractice filed against a mediator.
- Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, 28 communication that is sought or offered to prove or disprove a 29 claim or complaint of professional misconduct or malpractice 30 filed against a mediation party, nonparty participant, or 31 representative of a mediation party based on conduct occurring 32 during a mediation.
- g. A communication that is sought or offered to prove or 34 disprove abuse, neglect, abandonment, or exploitation in a 35 proceeding in which a child or adult protective services 1 agency is a party, unless the child or adult protection case is referred by a court to mediation and a public agency 3 participates.
- 2. There is no privilege under section 679C.104 if a 5 court, administrative agency, or arbitrator finds, after a 6 hearing in camera, that the party seeking discovery or the proponent of the evidence has shown that the evidence is not 8 otherwise available, that there is a need for the evidence that substantially outweighs the interest in protecting 10 confidentiality, and that the mediation communication is 11 sought or offered in any of the following situations:
 - a. A court proceeding involving a felony or misdemeanor. b. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, a
- 14 proceeding to prove a claim to rescind or reform a contract or 15 a defense to avoid liability on a contract arising out of the 16 mediation.
- 3. A mediator shall not be compelled to provide evidence 6 18 of a mediation communication referred to in subsection 1,
 - 19 paragraph "f", or subsection 2, paragraph "b".
 20 4. If a mediation communication is not privileged under 21 subsection 1 or 2, only the portion of the communication 22 necessary for the application of the exception from 23 nondisclosure may be admitted. Admission of evidence under 24 subsection 1 or 2 does not render the evidence, or any other 25 mediation communication, discoverable or admissible for any 26 other purpose.

NEW SECTION. 679C.107 PROHIBITED MEDIATOR Sec. 12. 28 REPORTS.

- 29 1. Except as required in subsection 2, a mediator shall 30 not make a report, assessment, evaluation, recommendation, 31 finding, or other communication regarding a mediation to a 32 court, administrative agency, or other authority that may make 33 a ruling on the dispute that is the subject of the mediation.
 - 2. A mediator may disclose any of the following:
 - Whether the mediation occurred or has terminated, whether a settlement was reached, and attendance.
 - b. A mediation communication as permitted under section 679C.106.
 - c. A mediation communication evidencing abuse, neglect, abandonment, or exploitation of an individual to a public agency responsible for protecting individuals against such mistreatment.
- 3. A communication made in violation of subsection 1 shall not be considered by a court, administrative agency, or 7 10 arbitrator.

7 11 Sec. 13. NEW SECTION. 679C.108 CONFIDENTIALITY. Unless subject to chapter 21 or 22, mediation 7 12 7 13 communications are confidential to the extent agreed to by the 7 14 parties or provided by other law or rule of this state. 7 15 Sec. 14. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.109 MEDIATOR'S DISCLOS MEDIATOR'S DISCLOSURE OF 7 16 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST == BACKGROUND. 1. Before accepting a mediation, an individual who is 17 18 requested to serve as a mediator shall do all of the 19 following: 7 20 a. Make an inquiry that is reasonable under the 21 circumstances to determine whether there are any known facts 22 that a reasonable individual would consider likely to affect 23 the impartiality of the mediator, including a financial or 24 personal interest in the outcome of the mediation and an existing or past relationship with a mediation party or 26 foreseeable participant in the mediation. b. Disclose any such known fact to the mediation parties 2.7 28 as soon as is practical before accepting a mediation. 2. If a mediator learns any fact described in subsection 1 30 after accepting a mediation, the mediator shall disclose it as 31 soon as is practicable. 3. At the request of a mediation party, an individual who 7 33 is requested to serve as a mediator shall disclose the 34 mediator's qualifications to mediate a dispute. 4. A person that violates subsection 1, 2, or 7 is precluded by the violation from asserting a privilege under 8 section 679C.104. 8 8 Subsections 1, 2, 3, and 7 do not apply to an 8 4 individual acting as a judge. 8 5 6. This chapter does not require that a mediator have a 8 6 special qualification by background or profession. 8 7. A mediator must be impartial, unless after disclosure 8 of the facts required in subsections 1, 2, and 3 to be 8 8 disclosed, the parties agree otherwise. 8 10 Sec. 15. NEW SECTION. 679C.110 PARTICIPATION IN 8 11 MEDIATION. 8 12 An attorney or other individual designated by a mediation 8 13 party may accompany the mediation party to and participate in 8 14 a mediation. A waiver of participation given before the 8 15 mediation may be rescinded. Sec. 16. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.111 RELATION T SIGNATURES IN GLOBAL AND NATIONAL COMMERCE ACT. 8 16 RELATION TO ELECTRONIC 8 17 8 18 The provisions of this chapter modify or supersede the 8 19 federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce 8 20 Act, 15 U.S.C. } 7001 et seq., but this chapter does not 21 modify, limit, or supersede section 101c of that Act or 8 8 22 authorize electronic delivery of any of the notices described 8 23 in section 103b of that Act. Sec. 17. 679C.112 UNIFORMITY OF APPLICATION 8 2.4 NEW SECTION. 8 25 AND CONSTRUCTION. 8 26 In applying and construing this chapter, consideration 8 27 should be given to the need to promote uniformity of the law 8 28 among states that enact the uniform mediation Act. 8 2.9 Sec. 18. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.113 SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. 8 If any provision of this chapter or the application thereof 31 to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity 8 8 32 shall not affect other provisions or applications of this 33 chapter which can be given effect without the invalid 34 provision or application, and to this end, the provisions of 8 8 35 this chapter are severable. 9 679C.114 APPLICATION TO EXISTING Sec. 19. NEW SECTION. 9 AGREEMENTS OR REFERRALS. 1. This chapter governs a mediation pursuant to a referral 9 4 or an agreement to mediate made on or after July 1, 2004. 9 2. On or after July 1, 2004, this chapter governs an 9 agreement to mediate whenever made. 6 Sec. 20. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 679C.115 MEDIATOR IMMUNITY. 9 A mediator or a mediation program shall not be liable for civil damages for a statement, decision, or omission made in 9 8 10 the process of mediation unless the act or omission by the 11 mediator or mediation program is made in bad faith, with 12 malicious purpose, or in a manner exhibiting willful or wanton 13 disregard of human rights, safety, or property. This section 14 shall apply to mediation conducted before the workers' 15 compensation commissioner and mediation conducted pursuant to 16 chapter 216.
